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

It is sufficient to say, that Experience teacheth us, that nothing makes a deeper Impression on the Mind (which is naturally inclined to Knowledge) than the Observation of the Behaviour and Success of other Men.

## The PREFACE.

THE Erection of the Dignity of Baronets, in this Kingdom, is so well known, that it is somewhat needless for me to relate the Occasion thereof. My present Design is to shew, that the first stated Number answer'd the Qualifications requir'd, of being Gentlemen of three Descents; and I refer to Vouchers and Authorities for Proofs of each Article, whereby the Reader may make a Judgment of what is set forth; and I take this Opportunity to return my Thanks to the several Gentlemen who have favour'd me with their Assistance.

WHEN I first set about this Work, I flatter'd myself with Hopes, that each Family would have oblig'd me with a Sight of their Pedigrees, and such other Evidences, as might have brought to Light the Actions of many Persons of Worth and Note, to whom they were related, whereby it would have been greatly facilitated; but, in this, I found myself disappointed; for, after a great Expence and Trouble in Attendance, and gathering Materials, I met with such Discouragements, that had it not been out of Esteem and Respect for several Gentlemen of known Worth and excellent Accomplishments, I should have wholly laid aside the Publishing these Collections.

THE Characters I presume to give, (bowever mean they may be) have proceeded

ed from no low fordid Principle, but (after the strictest Enquiry) from an Assurance of the intrinsick Merits of the Persons treated of, and a Belief that they may bereafter have some Insuence on their Posterity and this degenerate Age. And as I have not slatter'd, so, I hope, I have not disoblig'd any, for I have industriously avoided Resections.

IF there be any who think I have wrote too favourably of such as suffer'd for their Loyalty to King CHARLES the First, I can truly answer, that as I esteem'd their Adherence to their Sovereign, in his Troubles, to be a Virtue; so the Reader will find that I have had an equal Regard for those Patriots who endeavour'd the Redressing the Grievances of the Nation, and the exorbitant Power of the Crown.

RECEIVING Informations and Inscriptions of Monuments from many Persons, several of whom were unskill'd in Orthography, 'tis very likely the Names of Men and Places (which so often occur) are sometimes misspelt, it being next to an Impossibility to correct every Letter or Syllable mistaken; which 'tis hoped the Judicious will allow, and also excuse Slips of the Press, occasion'd by my being out of Town when some Sheets were corrected.

BUT if this Specimen should provoke some Gentlemen to communicate what Papers remain in

in their Custody relating to their Families, I promise to do them Justice (if my Health permits) by an Appendix, in the remaining Part of this Work, wherein I shall take Notice of the Births, Deaths, &c. since the making my Collections, or the printing these Sheets. That some Pages are twice number'd, has proceeded from Defects in some Families, the Accounts whereof I drew up long ago, and thought my self oblig'd to cancel and enlarge, sinding many Particulars that were not then come to my Knowledge; and I have omitted giving an Account of the Families of those Baronets advanc'd to the Dignity of Peerage, as being already printed.

WHAT I have farther to offer, is, to defire the candid Perusal of this my first Attempt, and that the Gentlemen concern'd will excuse the Length of Time it has taken up, which has been owing to a Drudgery few are capable of judging off, and to a violent Indisposition and ill State of Health, that for a very considerable Time, made me incapable of Reading or Writing.



## ENGLAND:

OR,

An Historical and Genealogical Account of all the Baronets.



HE Rise and Institution of this Order of Baronets, having been already treated of, I need only observe, that on the first Erection of the Dignity, several Persons were promoted by Letters Patents, all of the same

Date; which being rank'd by subsequent Patents under the Great Seal, I shall treat of them according to the Order of Precedency therein determin'd. The first was

Sir

Sir NICHOLAS BACON of RED-GRAVE, Kt. Suff. No 1.

(May 22 A. D. 1611. R. Jac. 9.)

OF the original Descent of this Family of Bacon, our Genealogists are not agreed; tho' of the Name there have been many Persons of great

Account in former Ages.

They are deduc'd by some from Thomas de Bacon, by whose Marriage, and those of his Descendants, they are thought to be originally of the County of Chester, or Parts adjacent. Richard Bacon, having sounded and endow'd a Priory at Rocester, in Com Staff. with large Possessions and Liberties, about the Reign of King John. (a) All which were consirm'd by Ranulph Earl of Chester, his Uncle, as also by King Henry III.

Others derive them from Aspelo Bakun. temp. Hen. 3, whose Grand-son William, marry'd one of

the Family of Ufford. (b)

The Pedigree (c) remaining in the Family, makes their Descent from Grimbaldus, who came into England with William Earl Warren, at the Time of the Conquest, to whom he was a-kin; which Grimbald had Lands in Normandy, and after his Arrival in England, founded the Church of Letheringset, in Com. Suff. whereof Edmund, his second Son, was Parson; and his other Sons were Radulph and Ramulph.

ROGER, Son of Ranulph, is noted by an ancient Author. (d) He was Father of Robert Bacon, who had a Son Reginald. All which Descents, with the History of the Foundation and Presentation to the Church of Lethering set, were transcribed out of the Lieger-Book belonging to Binham Priory, some Time in the Custody of Sir Thomas Widrington, a Commissioner for the Great Seal in the Time of Oliver's Usurpation.

The said Bobert Bacon, with William Bacon, (who will be mention'd hereafter) and Alexander Kerdington, held of William Lord Montfichet (e) four Knights Fees, temp. King Stephen. And in the History of the Foundation of the Church of Letheringset, Jeffry Ridel (descended from Matilda, the Heir of Ridel, by Geva, Daughter to Hugh Lupus, sift Earl of Chester) is still dhis Cousin. From this Roger descended several Persons in sormer Ages, who were of great Account, and eminently distinguish'd.

Temp. Hen. 2. Richard de Bacon, is mention'd as a Witness to a Charter of that King's made to Robert Burghon, of Lands in Snoring, written next after the Names of Hemy Bishop of Durham, and Richard de Glanvill, and preceding Michael Bilet, &c. who were Justices or Judges; whereupon he is thought to be of the same Class, and being of Lodne, gave ten Acres of Land in Ofmundeshage, to the Monks of Bungey. (f) And some of this Family held the Manour of Bacon in Lodne (g) in after Ages.

Many of them lye bury'd in the Augustin Fryers at Ipswich, viz. Sir Robert Bacon, Sir Henry Bacon.

con, another Sir Robert Bacon, Lady Sabina, Wife of —— Bacon, John Bacon, his Son, and nine other Children, and Sir Henry Bacon of Garleston, or Garneston, who dy'd A. D. 1335. (r) But forasmuch as they are not direct Ancestors to those we are principally to treat of, and that no Issue is now remaining from them, I shall therefore proceed to William Bacon, Brother (I presume) to that Robert Bacon, first spoken of, and with whom he is mention'd.

Which William is taken Notice of among the Knights, bearing Banners, as well Normans as of other Provinces, in the Reign of King Philip II of France. (1) And is also nam'd in a Deed concerning a Tenement in Bradfield, which Eddicus Schute held (m) As likewise in a Deed betwixt Abbot Sampson; he liv'd temp. Ric. 1, & Job. and is probably the same William who about that Time marry'd a Daughter of Thomas Lord Bardolph. was Father of another William Bacon, who was of Monks Bradfield in Com. Suff. and Father of Adam, who the 4th of Edw. 1st, (\*) paid half a Mark for Scutage to the Army serving against Scotland, for the fourth Part of a Knight's Fee in Brome, held of the Honour of Hartismore in Suffolk. He had two Sons, Wido Bacon of Bradfield, who dy'd without Issue, and Robert Bacon of Hesset, or Hegesset, in Com. Suff. where he held one Message of the Fee of St. Edmund, (now call'd St. Edmund's-Bury) and his Brother Wido held one also of the Convent of the faid Place, as was found by Inquisition 14 Ed. I. (n)

The said Rolert, by Alice his Wise, Daughter to —Borgate, had Issue John Bacon of Hesset and Bradfeld, Father of John Bacon of the said Places, who had Issue another John, who, by Helena his Wise, Daughter to Sir George Tillot of Rougham, in Com. Nort. had two Sons, William Bacon, Progenitor to those of that Name at Hesset, and John Bacon of Drenston in Com. Suff. whose Posterity had some Time born for Arms Azure on a Chevron, between three Flower-de-luces, Or, as many Gryphons Heads eraed, of the First. (0)

He marry'd the Daughter and Heir of John Thosp, Son of William Thosp, by the Daughter and Heir of—Quapled, Son of Sir William Thosp, by the Daughter and Heir of Sir Roger Bacon, (a Commander in the Wars temp. Edw. 2, and Edw. 3.) Son of Sir Henry Bacon, Son of another Sir Henry, a Justice Itinerant 29 Henry III, lineally descended

from Grimbaldus. (p.)

The said John was Father of Edmund Bacon of Drenkston; for both whom, as also for John, Son of the said Edmund, was this Memorial in the Windows of the Church of Hesset. Pray for the Sould of John Bacon, and Margery his Wife, Edmund Bacon, and his Wife also, and for the Welfare of John Bacon. The said John, by Agnes his Wife, Daughter to Thomas Cockfield, had Issue Robert, hereafter mention'd.

I am not unappris'd that two Kings of Arms (q) deduce the Stem of John Bacon of Drenkflon, Father to the said Robert, a different Way, and by other Ancestors; but I can't be of their Opinion, in regard they cite no Proofs, and in some Particulars are manifestly wrong.

The said Robert Bacon of Drenkston, last mention'd, lies bury'd at Hesset with his Wife, (Isabel, Daughter of John Cage of Pakenham, in Com. Suff.) under a Stone Tomb, with an Inscription importing,

That he, and divers of his Famliy, Had been Sheep-Reeves to the Abbot of Bury.

He had three Sons, Thomas Bacon of Linfled in Com. Kanc. and of Northaw in Com. Hertf. Esq; who bore for his Motto, In Medio Virtus.

Secondly, Nichelas, hereafter mention'd.

Thirdly, James, one of the Aldermen of London, who lett Issue Sir James Bacon of Fifton-Hall,

in Com. Suff.

Nicholas Bacon, scond Son of Robert, was born at Chiselburst, in the County of Kent, was bred in Bennet's College in Cambridge, to which he was a Benefactor, by endowing fix Scholarships of the faid College, (r) and building the Chapel and Library over it, and having been a diligent Student of the Laws at Grays Inn. (s) He fo profited therein, that King Homy VIII, in the 36th of his Reign, granted him the Manours of Redgrave, Badfdale, and Gyflingham, late belonging to the Monastery of St. Edmund's-Bury, in Com. Suff. with the Park of Redgrave, and fix Acres of Land in Wortham, in the Tenure of Thomas Fisher; as also the Tythes of Redgrave, to hold in Capite by Knight's Service. (\*). He was made Attorney of the Court of Wards, Anno 38 H. VIII. (t) And upon the Death of that King, (which happen'd

foon after) had his Patent for the same Trust renew'd (u) by his Son and Succeffor King Ed.VI; in the 6th Year of whose Reign, he was constituted (x) Treasurer for that Society, (Grays Inn) whereof he had been so long a Member; and, being grown famous for his Knowledge, was shortly after, viz. 1 Eliz. made Lord-Keeper of the Great Seal of England, and knighted; (2) which Office in his Time was, by Act of Parliament. made equal in Authority with the Chancellor. (a) What is otherwise observ'd of him, is, that being no Friend to the Queen of Scots, (then Prifoner in England) he was (b) privy and affenting to what Hales had publish'd, afferting that of the House of Suffolk before her, for which Hales suffer'd Imprisonment, and had not Cecil stood his faithful Friend, he had underwent the same Fate: nothing being more distasteful to Queen Elizabetw, than a Dispute upon that Point. 14 Eliz. upon those Proposals made by the Nobility of Scotland for her Enlargement, he chiefly oppos'd it, alledging, That no Security could ballance the Danger thereof. In short, he promoted the Interest of England to his Power, and to secure his own, made use of the Policy of the Age, viz. great Alliance. He and Cecil marry'd two Sisters; Walfingham and Millmay, two more; Knolles, Esfex, and Leicester, were also link'd together.

As to Greatness, Sir Nicholas never affected it, according to his Motto Mediccria Firms, nor was he so much for a large, as a good Estate. His Houses at Redgrave in Suff. and Gorbambury in B 4. Com.

Com. Hertf. were convenient, but not stately; which made Queen Elizabeth tell him, when the call'd at Redgrave, in her Progress, That it was too little for bis Lordship. To which he answer'd, No, Madam, but your Highness has made me too big for it. However, on that Remark he is said to have added the Wings to the House now standing at Redgrave. Camden gives him this Character, Vir prapino quis ingenio accerrimo, singulari prudentia, summa eloquentia, tenaci memoria & sacris Conciliis alterum Co*lumen. (c)* Of Person very corpulent, most quick Wit, fingular Prudence, admirable Eloquence, and another Pillar to the Privy-Council. This Corpulency of Body grew on him in his old Age, to which the Queen alluding us'd to fay, Sir Nicholas's Soul lodges well.

He dy'd 21 Eliz. A. D. 1579, having been marry'd twice, and was interr'd on the South fide of the Choir of St. Paul's Cathedral, London, where he had a noble Monument erected to his Memory,

with this Epitaph.

His first Lady was Jane, Daughter to William Fernley of West Creeting, in Com. Suff. Esq, by whom

whom he had three Daughters, and as many Sons, the eldest, Sir Nicholas, will be mention'd hereafter. Nathaniel Bacon, his second Son, was seat-

ed at Staffkey in Com. Norf.

Edward Bacon, Esq, third Son, was of Shrubland-Hall, in Com. Norf. in Right of his Wise Helen, Daughter and Heir to Thomas Little of Shrubland aforesaid, and Bray in Com. Berks, hy Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter and Co-heir to Sir Robert Lytton of Knebworth, in Com. Hertford, Kt. and is Ancestor to the Bacons of Shrubland, now re-

maining.

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The second Wise to Sir Nicholas, the Lord Keeper, was Ame, Daughter to Sir Anthony Cook, of Giddy hall, in Com. Ellex; by whom he had two Sons, Anthony, who dy'd before his Father, and the famous Sir Francis Bacon, Kt. Sollicitor-General, Attorney-General, of the Privy-Council, Lord-Keeper of the Great Seal, Lord Chancellor, Baron Verulam, and Viscount St. Alban's successively, temp. Jac. 1. (e) His Actions and Character are writ at large in most of the Histories of those Times: Therefore I shall only add, that he dy'd at Highgate, April 9. A. D. 1626, leaving no Issue by Anne his Wise, Daughter and Co-heir to Benedict Barnham, Esq. Alderman of London.

Sir Nicholas Bacon, the eldest Son and Heir of the said Lord-Keeper, was possessed of a great Estate upon his Death, holding of the Crown, 22 Eliz. by several (\*) Tenures of Knight's Service, the Manours and Advowsons of Redgrave, Hinderly, alias Hyldersley, and Wortham, Ricklinghall, alias West hall, and Wynerston; also the Hundred of Blackborne, with the Rent of sitty seven Quarters of Oats with annual Suit and Service of the Inhabitants within the Parishes of Stow-Langtoft,

toft, Hunston, Langbam, Walsham, Ashfilde, Barnbam parva, Lyvermere, Culforde, Thorpe, Fakerham magna, Fakenham parva, Ixworth, Westhowe, Wordwell. Ryseworth, Watsfile, Rykenball, Hynderly, Weston, Bardwell, and Stawnton; likewise the Manour of Allifield magna, and 40 Messuages there, and in Little Albfield and Ixworth; also the Manours of Mettingham, Illetshall, and Sheap-meadow, with 60 Mesfuages; 60 Tofts in Mettingbam, Bungaye, and the Rectory of Mettingham; the Manour of Bromfield, and 70 Messuages in Bromfeld, Wenerston, alias Waynston; the Manours of Inham, alias Inghamball; Tymworth, Barnham near Thetford, and Playford in Barnham, and 30 Messuages, &c. in Ingbam, with the Advowsons of Ingham and Tymworth; the Rectory and Manour of Walham; the Liberties and Franchises of St. Edmund's-bury; the Manour and Rectory of Tymworth, held of the Manour of Ingham; also the Manour and Advowson of Burgat. (f) He was Knighted at Norwick by Queen Elizabeth, the 22d of August 1578, and was at length the first advanced to the Degree of Baronet, by his Majesty King James. He marry'd Anne, Daughter and fole Heir to Edmund Butts of Thornedge, in that County, Esq; (Brother of Sir' . William Butts) by Anne his Wife, third Daughter and Co-heir to Henry Buers, Esq.

By this Lady, Sir Nicholas came posses'd, interalia, of the Manour of Foxhead, and three Parts of the Estate of Sir Andrew de Beurs, who liv'd temp. Edw. 3. (g). They both lye bury'd under a stately Monument, in the Church of Redgrave. He had Issue 7 Sons and 3 Daughters; whereof Anne marry'd Sir Robert Drury; Dorothy, Sir Basingborn Gawdy of Essex; and Jemima, Sir William Waldegrave

grave of Smalbridge, Kts. The Sons were, 1. Sir-Edmund, 2. Henry, who dy'd without Issue at Jerusalem, 3. Sir Robert, of whom hereafter. 4. Bachevil Bacon of Hockbam, who marry'd Mary, Daughter to——French of——in Effex, and left only Daughters his Co-heirs, one of whom, viz. Philippa, was Wife of Robert Kedington of Hockbam, Esq. High-Sheriff of the County of Norfolk, a lineal Descendant from Robert de Kedington of Kedington-Hall, in Com. Suff. who dy'd 5 June 1391, 14 Ric. II. 5. Sir Butts Bacon. 6. Sir Nicholas Bacon, both Baronets, of whom in their proper Places; and, 7. Sir Nathaniel Bacon of Culford, in Com. Suffolk, Knight of the Bath, who marry'd Jane, Daughter to Hercules Mentas, Widow to Sir William Cornwallis, Kt. and had Posterity.

Edmund, eldest Son and Heir to Sir Nicholas, succeeded in the Dignity and the Estate at Redgrave; he marry'd Philippa, Daughter to Edward Lord Wotton, and dying without Issue,

Sir Robert, his next Brother, was Heir to the Estate and Title, known before by the Denomination of Robert Bacon of Riborough, Esq. (an Estate now in Possession of Sir Edmund Bacon, Bart.) at which Seat he resided the most part of his Life, and in that Parish Church this Inscription now remains;

Robert Bacon of Redgrave, in the County of Suffolk, Bart. was bury'd the 16th of December 1635. And Dame Anne Bacon, his Wife, was bury'd the 27th of September 1640.

The faid Dame Anne was Daughter to Sir John Perton of Iselbam, Kt. and Bart. from whom proceeded Philippa, marry'd to Hamon Claxton of Livermore; Anne, to Thomas Hunt of Sherington;

and Alice to Richard Gwyn of Fakenham-Market, Esquires; As also divers Sons, whereof Edmund, Nathaniel, Henry, Francis, and Drury, dy'd young, or unmarry'd; and Nicholas Bacon, who marry'd Margaret, Daughter and Co-heir to-Hobart of Thwayts, dy'd without Issue. The other Sons were Butts Bacon, who marry'd Dorothy, Daughter to Sir John Tracy, Kt. Peyton Bacon, who marry'd the Daughter of Charles Suckling of Wotton, Liq. and Robert Bacon, the eldest Son, who marry'd Car tharine, Daughter to Grave Violet, Esq. and dy'd in his Father's Life-time, having Issue four Daughters, viz. Jemima, who marry'd- Gardner of Essex, and afterwards Sir John Brattell, Assay-Master of the Tower; Philippa, Wife to George Reeve of Thwayt, Esq. Francis and Anne; and a Son, Edmund, who succeeded his Grand-father, Sir Robert, in the Title and Estate.

Which Sir Edmund Bacon of Redgrave, Bart. marry'd Elizabeth, one of the Daughters and Coheirs to Sir Robert Crane, Bart. and deceasing .... was bury'd in the Church of Redgrave, where a noble Monument is erected to the Memory of him and his Lady. He had fixteen Children that were christen'd, of which only five Daughters furviv'd him; whereof Sarah dv'd unmarry'd. The others were, Francis, wedded to Walter Narbone of Calne, in Com. Wilts, Esq, Susanna, to Charles Morris of Loddington, in Com. Leicester, Esq; Elizabeth, to William Ettrick of the Middle-Temple, Esq; and Philippa, to Sir Edward Bacon of Gillingham, Bart. so that this Dignity, and some part of the Estate, came to Robert, his Nephew, Son and Heir of Butts Bacon, Lig, which Sir Robert was before seated at Egmore, in Com. Norf. and after the Death of his Uncle Sir Edmund, was possess'd of the Estate at Redgrave; which descending to him under some Incumbrances, he thought convenient

convenient to sell that Estate; and afterwards purchas'd, at Garboldisham, in the aforesaid County of Norfolk, where he built a handsome Seat for the suture Residence of his Family, and dy'd Jan. the 31st, 1704, leaving Issue, by Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter to Daniel Chandler of London, Esq. two Daughters, Abigal and Jane; with two Sons, Edmund and Butts. He was succeeded in the Dignity and Estate, by his eldest Son and Heir.

Sir Edmund Bacon, now of Garboldisham, Bart. was one of the Knights of the Shire for Norfolk the 12th of Queen Anne, and the fixth of this Line that hath born the Title. He marry'd, in Nov. 1712, Mary, Daughter of Sir Robert Kemp, Bart. and sole Heir to her Mother Letitia, Daughter of Robert King of Great Thirlow, in the County of Suffolk, Esq. and hath Issue one Daughter, Letitia.

Sir RICHARD MOLINEUX of SEPHTON, Kt. Lanc. N° 2.

(May 22. A. D. 1611. R. Jac. 9.)

HEN William Duke of Normandy, invaded this Kingdom, A. D. 1066, he was attended by many noble Normans, among whom was William des Moulins, (a) no less famous for his Virtue, than for his noble Extraction, as appears from many of our own, as well as French Writers; particularly from the Roll of Battle-Abbey, in which List his Name standeth the 18th in order.

To this, William des Moulins, or Molins, Roger de Poistiers (who was then possels'd of all that Tract of Land in Lancashire, between the Rivers of Rebble and Mercy, and Lord of Lancasher, by the Gift of William the Conqueror) gave, among other Lands, by Consent of the said Conqueror, the Manours of Sephton, (b) Torneton, Kerdon, (now Kuerdon) and ten Caracates and an half of Land, at the Service of half a Knight's Fee; whereof he made Sephton his chief Seat; wherein he was succeeded by his Son and Heir,

Vivian, who, by his Wife Siwarda, had Issue Adam, who held half a Knight's Fees at Sephton, and gave in pure and free Alms to the Church of the blessed Mary, at Cockersand, (c) certain Acres of Land in Meeling and Conscough, under

der his Seal of the cross Moline, circumscrib'd, S. Adami de Molineus. This Adam held one Knight's Fee in Sephton, Torneton, and Kerdon, by Castle-guard of the Castle of Lancaster; and having took to Wife Annota, sole Daughter and Heir of Beneditt de Gernet, Lord of Speke in Com. Lanc. had Issue three Sons, I. Robert. 2. Gilbert, who held by Gift of his Brother Robert, one Caracate of Land in Thorneton, by Knight's Service, as much as thereunto appertain'd. 3. Henry, and a Daughter, Siwarda, who became the Wife of-Fitzannot.

Robert, the eldest Son, marry'd Reatrice, Daughter and Heir of Robert de Villers, Lord of Little Crosby, Son of Alan, Son of——de Villers, who enter'd England with William the Conqueror. To this Robert, Stephen Earl of Bologn, who afterwards succeeded to the Crown of England, made the Grant following, (d) Stephanus Comes Bolognia & Mortaignia Vic. & omnibus Baronibus suis : Sciatis quod concedo Rob. de Moliness terram suam in Liderlandt pro 14. Sol. per an. ei & baredibus suis T. Rob. Dap. & Rob. de Villers. He gave two Caracates in Kerdon, with his Sister Sywarda, that his Brother held by Knight's Service; and out of them, bequeath'd three Acres to Cockersand, in free Alms.

He was succeeded by his Son Richard, who paid 20 s. for Relief of half a Knight's Fee in Sephton, Thorneton, and Kerdon, which Adam de Molines formerly held; (e) and gave one Ploughland to Richard de Thorneton, for the yearly Rent of a Pound of Pepper; and to Raymond de Lytherlandt, two Ox-gangs in Lytherlandt, to hold by Knight's Service; and to Simon, his only Brother,

Lands call d Hasteneroft, on the Way between Sephton and Thorneton, to hold by Homage and due Service: The Seal appendent, a Cross Flowery, without any Shield, and the Inscription round it, Sigillum Richardi de Mulinaus. Having marry'd Edith, Daughter of Aumary Pincerna, (i. e. Butler) of Warrington, he had Issue Adam and Robert, who held three Ox-gangs in Thorneton, by Knight's Service, of his Father; of which Robert, proceeded Richard, Father to another Robert of Thorneton, Progenitor to those of Mellingwood.

Adam, the eldest Son of Robert, succeeded at Sephton, being stil'd Dominus Adam de Molineus, and was a Witness to the Grant of the fourth part of the Ville of Maghull, by Simon de Halfal (f) Sanfdate. He held Lands in Little Crosby, by Descent, and 12 Henry III, had a Forestership in Com. Lanc. (g) His Wise was Letice de Brinley, and their

Issue William and Roger.

This Adam is supposed to be the Knight who was portray'd (in the Glass of three Windows in the upper Part of Bridgnorth Church in Com. Salop) in antique Mail, cloth'd with a Surcoat, and girt with his Sword and Spurs; over which is an equilateral triangular Shield, on which the

Arms of Molineux are depicted.

Roger, the youngest Son, bore for his Arms, (b) the Cross Argent quater-pierc'd, and had Issue William, Father to James, who having marry'd Margaret, the Daughter and Heir of William de Aula de Brentworth, for want of Issue Male, lest his Estate to his Daughters; and Julian, one of his Co-heirs, was marry'd to Richard Windsor, of Stanwell; from whom are descended the Barons

rons of Windsor, of Bradenham, and the present

Earls of Plymouth.

Sir William de Molineus of Sefton, Kt. eldest Son of Adam, was reckon'd among those in Com. Lanc. who had 15 Liberatas Terra, and over, held by Knights Service, and were call'd to receive the Degree of Knighthood by Philip de Ulnesby, Shoriff of that County, 4 Hen. III, A. D. 1255. He gave to William, Son of his Brother Roger, Lands in Netherton, near Sefton, to hold by Knights Service, and the yearly Rent of an Half-penny, by a Deed without Date; and by Margaret his Wife, Daughter of Alan de Thornton, had three Sons, Sir Richard, William, and Simon; to the two latter their Father gave Lands in Letherland. And

Sir Richard inherited, who gave to Thomas his Son, the Edge within his Demesne of Shefton, to hold at the Rent of one Penny yearly; and to Peter, another Son, by Charter without Date, Lands call'd Ireland, at Six Pence yearly Payment, and to Richard, Son of Thomas de Wykessehon, his Heirs and Assigns, unam Placeam of his Lands in Little Crosby, at the annual Rent of a Penny, to which, as Witnesses, subscrib'd Richard de Molineus, William de Aytre, Robert de Molineus, and many others. The Seal a Lyon rampant, with

the Inscription of Sir Richard.

By Emme his Wife, he had four Sons, I. Sir William. 2. Robert, Father to Robert of Netberton. 3. Thomas, who bore for Arms, Azure a Cheveron, between three cross Molines, Or. He releas'd all his Right of Common of Pasture in the Marsh of Richard of Hawkley, from whom are descended the Molineurss of that Place.

Which Sir Richard dy'd 37 Edward III; and to

him succeeded his eldest Son,

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Sir

Sir William de Molineux, who had two Wives; the first was Joan, the Daughter and Heir of Fordan Ellall, Forester of Wyresdale, by Alice his Wife, one of the Daughters and Co-heirs of Thomas de Twenge. The second was the Lady Margaret, Widow and Reliest of Sir Robert Holland of Eakeston, Kt. (Brother to Thomas Holland, Knight of the Garter) and Daughter and Heir of Sir Alan Heton of Bulhell, Kt. By the former he had feveral Sons, 1. Sir William. 2. Thomas of Kuerdale, who added a Flower-de-Luce Argent in the dexter Canton of his Arms, and was flain at Radcott-bridge, having taken Arms for King Richard II. 3. Sir John Molineux of Crosby, who bore his cross Moline crown'd, Or; and left 3 Daughters his Heirs. 4. Richard, Parson of the Church of Selton, (who had the Field of his Arms with semi de France for Distinction;) also Robert, Peter, and Simon.

William, the eldest Son of the last Sir William, was likewise a Knight. He granted to Sir John Dalton a yearly Rent-Charge of 50 Marks, to be receiv'd out of all his Lands of Ellall, as appears by a Deed now in the Family, dated at Bisham, on Saturday, the Vigil of the holy Trinity, 43 Edward III.

He was a Person of great Courage and Accomplishments, distinguish'd himself at the Battel of Navarret in Spain, under Edward the Black Prince, and was there made a Knight Baneret, Anno 1367. Under his Command he serv'd in all those Wars, (k) as he did in those of France; and in his Return homewards, dy'd at Canterbury, A. D. 1372, and was there bury'd, as appears by this Epitaph.

Sir Richard Molineux, Kt. who, I Henry IV, was found Cousin and next Heir of Thomas Chatterton (n) of Ellall, viz. Son of William Molineux, Kt. Son of William, Son of Joan, Daughter of Alice, Sister of Laderina, Mother to Alan, Father of Alan, Father of William, who was Father to (the

sforesaid) Thomas Chatterton.

This Sir Richard was High-Sheriff of the County of Lanc. for Life; and with Sir Robert de Ursewill ferv'd as Knights of that Shire in the Parliament held at Westminster 20 Richard II, and had for their Expences, for 34 Days Attendance, 131. 12s. (m) He took to Wife Ellen, Daughter of Sir Thomas Ursewick, Kt. who, it is probable, had been Escaetor of that County: For an Office was taken before him, upon the Death of Thomas Molineux of Cuerdale, (Uncle to Sir Richard;) the Import whereof was, That the Reversion of the Lands and Tenements ought to descend to William Molineux, Kt. as Son and Heir of William Molineax of Sefton; and from that William, to another William Molineux, Kt. and after him, to Richard Molineux, then living, under Age, and in Ward to John D. of Lancaster, King of Castile and Leon.

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Leon, Anno 6 Richard II. (o) The said Ellen was afterwards marry'd to Sir Thomas Savage, Kt. But by her first Husband she had a Daughter, Agnes, Wise of Thomas Clisten, Esq, and three Sons, 1. Richard 2. Adam, who was Bishop of Chester, and Keeper of the Privy-Seal in the Reign of Henry VI; and, 3. Robert, who was found Heir to his Brother Adam, by the Inquist. post Morten. Which Robert marry d Margaret, Daughter of Sir Baldwin Lestrange, Kt. and left only a Daughter his sole Heir, and Wise of William Troutbeck.

Richard, Son and Heir of the last Sir Richard, eminently distinguish'd himself in the Wars of France, at the Battel of Agincourt,; and receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood in the Reign of Hen. V. He was in Favour also with Henry VI, who, by Letters Patent, gave to him, his Sons, and their Heirs, the chief Forestership of the Royal Forest and Parks in West Derby-shire; the Stewardship in Salford-shire; and the Office of Constable of Lever-

pool, as the following Record testifies.

He had two Wives, viz. Joan, Daughter and Heir of Sir Gilbert Hagdon, Kt. Relict of Piers Ligh of Lyme in Com. Ceftr. and by her had several Sons, I Richard. 2. Thomas of Haughton, in Com. Not. whose Posterity I shall distinctly treat of. 3. Jahn, Rector of Sefton. 4. Henry. 5. Gilbert, who marry'd the Lady of Cheneys, in Com. Bucks. 7. Robert. 8. William. The Daughters were Catherine, Wife of Sir Robert Ratcliff, Kt. and asterwards of John Stanbope, Esq. and Elizabeth, marry'd to Sir Robert Southworth, Kt.

By a fecond Wife, Helen, Daughter of Radcliff of the Tower, and Relict of Harrington; he had two Daughters, Anne marry'd to Richard Nevil of Leverfedge; and Margaret, to Sir Peter

Ligh of Bradley, Kt.

Richard, the eldest Son of the last Sir Richard, was so much in Favour with his Prince, and had so much Honour done him by his Country, that in the Act of Petition of Resumption, Anno 36 Henry VI, there was this provisional Clause in his Behalf, viz. Provided always that this Act extend not, nor in any wise be prejudicial unto Richard Molineux of Section, Esq, one of the Ushers of our Privy-Chamber, in, of, or to, the Constableship of our Castle of Leverpool; the Stewardship of West Derby-shire and Stafford-shire; the Forestership of our Forest of Symonswood, and of our Parks of Croxtath and Toxtath, &c.

He was afterwards knighted; and by his Wife Elizabeth, Sifter of Thomas Earl of Derby, and Daughter of Thomas, Baron Stanley of Latham, he had two Sons, Thomas, and Fames Arch-deacon of Richmond, and Rector of the Church of Sephton; and three Daughters, Margaret, marry'd first to John Duton, and then to William Bulkley of Beaumarris; Eleanor, first to Sir John Leyland of Morley, afterward to Roger Ashton; and Joan, Wise of Christopher Restaurant Schiller

pher Earton of Smitheless.

Sir Thomas Molineux, Son and Heir of Sir Richard, was in Arms for King Edward, under the Duke of Gloucester, for Recovery of the Town of Berwick from the Scots, and on St. James's Eve (p) was there made Knight Baneret. He dy'd the 7th of Henry VII, leaving by Anne his Wise (the eldsit of the five Daughters, and Co-heirs of Sir Thomas Dutton of Dutton) two Daughters; Jane, Wise of Sir Robert Foulshurst of Crow, Kt. and Elizabeth of James Radcliff, in Com. Lanc. and as many Sons; the youngest of whom was Edward, Rector of the Churches of Sephton, Salton, and Aughton, 17 Henry VIII, and the eldest

Sir William Molineux of Sephton, Kt. "flourish'd" under King Henry the VIIIth, being a Man of great Command in Lancashire, bringing a confiderable Strength of it to the seasonable Succour of the Duke of Norfolk; (q) with whom he perform'd signal Service at the Battel of Flod-den Field," taking there, with his own Hands, two Streamers still in the Family. In this Battel the King of Scots and chiefest Gentry were slain, and the Lancashire Archers are said to have had a great Share in the Victory. The King, afterwards, wrote this gratulatory Letter to Sir William Molineux. (r)

"TRusty and well-belov'd, we greet you well, and understand, as well by the Report of our right trusty Cousin and Counsellor, the Duke of Norfolk, as otherwise, what acceptable Service you, among others, lately did unto us, by your valiant Towardness, in assisting our said Cousin against our great Enemy the late King of Scots; and how courageously you, as a very hearty,

Given under our Signet, at our Castle at Windsor, the 27th of November.

Which Sir William marry'd, first Jane, sole Daughter and Heir of Sir Richard Rugge of Rugge, in Com. Salop, Kt. by Margaret his Wife, Daughter and Heir of John Sheen of Sheen-Place, Esq. and of Isabel his Wife, Daughter and Heir of Thomas Heath, Esq. in Com. Salop, and had Issue two Sons, Sir Richard, and Sir Thomas, who dy'd without Issue; and as many Daughters, Jane marry'd to Richard Bould of Bould, Esq. and Anne, the Wife of Alexander Standesh of Standesh, Esq.

His second Wife was Elizabeth, sole Daughter of Cubbert Clifton, in Com. Lanc. F.sq. by whom he had a Son nam'd also Thomas, who dy'd without Issue: And Anne (Heir to her Brother Thomas)

marry'd to Henry Halfall of Halfall, Esq.

Sir William dy'd A. D. 1548, and was fuc-

œeded by his eldest Son

Richard, who received the Honour of Knighthood at the Coronation of Queen Mary, (f) and was High-Sheriff of the County of Lanc. 8 Elizand dy'd in the 11th of her Reign, A. D. 1568, C 4 having

Richard, who marry'd Anne, Daughter of John Molineux of Mellingwood, by whom he had Issue. 3. John, who wedded Anne, Daughter of Richard Ratcliff of Langley. 4 and 5, Anthony and Alexander. Of the Daughters, Jane was marry'd to Thomas Molineux, Alice to James Prescot of Dreby, in Com. Linc. Eleanor to Francis Sutton of Sutton, in Com. Cestr. Margaret to John Warren of Poynton in the same County; and Anne to Thomas Dalton of Thurnham. By his second Wife, Eleanor Daughter of Robert Maghull of Magbull, he was Father to Thomas, Robert, and Anthony; and one Daughter Eleanor, Wife of John Moore of Bankhall, in Com. Lanc.

William, the eldest Son of Sir Richard, did not survive his Father, but dy'd at Halfall, A. D. 1567, leaving (by his Wife Bridget, Daughter of John Carell of Warnham, in Com. Suffex, Esq. Attorney of the Dutchy of Lancaster) three Sons, 1. Richard. 2. John, who marry'd Dorothy, Daughter and Heir of John Booth of Barton, and had Issue. 3. Thomas and a Daughter Elizabeth, Wise of Sir William Norris of Speke, Knight of the

Richard Molineux succeeded his Grand father Sir Richard in the Estate; but, being under Age, was in Ward to Sir Gilbert Gerard, Master of the Rolls; he was knighted by Queen Elizabeth the 24th of June 1586, aged then 26 Years, and was rais'd to the Dignity of a Baronet by King James the 1st, on the 22d of May, in the 5th of his Reign 1611.

By his Wife Fiances, Daughter of the above Sir Gilbert, (from whom the Earls of Macclesfield. &c. and the Barons Gerard of Bromley, descended) he

Frances to Sir Thomas Gerard of Bryn, in Com. Lanc. Bart. Bridget to Ralph Standish, in Com. Lanc. Esq., Julian to Sir Thomas Walmsley of Dunkenhagh, Kt. and Margaret to George Simon of Bright.

Sir Richard Molineux, Bart. eldest surviving Son of the last Sir Richard, succeeded to the Title and Estate; and, by his Majesty King Charles the Ist, was farther advanc'd to the Honour of Viscount Marybourgh of the Kingdom of Ireland, by Letters Patents dated at Westminster the 22d of December, in the 4th Year of his Reign. He marry'd Mary, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Thomas Carryl of Bentone, in Com. Suss. Kt. and had Issue four Sons, I. Richard. 2. Carryl. 3. Philip. 4. Francis: And two Daughters, Elizabeth marry'd to Sir William Stanley of Hooton, Bart. and Mary to Sir George Selby

Richard succeeded to the Honour and Estate; he marry'd Frances, Daughter of William Seymour, Marquels of Hertford; but dying without Issue, [she afterwards marry'd Thomas Earl of Southampton] the Honour and Estate devolv'd upon his Brother

Carral Lord Viscount Molineux, &c. This Lord and his Brother Richard, afore-mention'd, took up Arms at the breaking out of the Rebellion, for his Majesty King Charles the Ist, and rais'd for his Service two Regiments, one of Horse, and the other of Foot; they ferv'd with them during the whole Time of that unnatural War. and were in Oxford when it surrender'd to the Rebels. They afterwards attended King Charles the IId, when he march'd out of Scotland, and were with him in the Battel of Worcester, upon which they liv'd in Retirement for fome Time: and Lord Richard dying foon after. the Honour and Estate fell, as before is mention'd, to his Brother Carryl, who was Out-law'd and excepted from compounding by the Rebels; but, having made some Friends, he at last got Leave to compound for the Estate; and, paying an excessive Fine, was put in the Possession of it, and liv'd to a very great Age. The late King James the IId, on his Accession to the Throne, constituted him Lord Lieutenant and Cultos Rotulorum of the County of Lancaster; as alfo Admiral of the narrow Seas. He dy'd at his Seat at Croxfled, the 2d of February 1698. Having marry'd Mary, Daughter of Sir Alexander Barlow of Barlow, in Com. Lanc. he had Issue three Sons and five Daughters; Richard, his eldest Son, marry'd Mary, Daughter of the late Marquess of Powis, and dy'd at Powis Caftle soon after, in his LifeTime, without Issue. Carryl, the second Son, dy'd an Infant. William, his youngest, succeeded him. Of his Daughters, Mary marry'd Sir Thomas Prefon, Bart. Frances, Sir Neal O Neal of the Kingdom of Ireland, Bart. Margaret, Jenico Presson, Lord Viscount Gormanston, of the Kingdom of Ireland. Elizabeth, Edward Withrington of Horsey, in Com. Northumb. Esq. and Anne to William Withrington of Cheesebarn Grange, in the same County, Esq.

William Lord Viscount Molineux, now living, hath taken to Wife Bridget, Daughter and Heir of Robert Lucie of Cherlecote, in Com. Warw. Esq. and

THIS ancient and knightly Family is extracted from the Eastern People, call'd Easterlings or Oosterlings, \* who dwelt near the Baltick Sea. Sir William le Esterling, the first that came into England, was one of the twelve Knights that accompany'd Robert Fitz Hammond, Earl of Gloucester, (a) to the Assistance of Justin ap Gorgant, King of Glamorgan, against Prince Rese, about the

the Year 1090, in the Reign of William Rufus; and the said Robert Fitz-Hammond, on the Death of Prince Rese, turning his Forces against Justin, and conquering his whole Dominion, in Recompence to the valiant Services of his Followers,

divided the Country amongst them.

Sir William Esterling had for his Share, the Cassile and Manour of St. Donats, &c. which, from that Time, has remain'd the principal Residence of his Descendants. (b) Sir John Esterling, Son of that Sir William, marry'd Matilda, Daughter and Heir to Sir Robert Corbert, Kt. and had Sir Morris, who, by his Wise Cicely, Daughter and Heir to Picot de Say, had Issue Sir Robert Stradling, the first that abbreviated his Name; which Sir Robert, by Howise his Wise, Daughter to Sir Hugh Brin, Kt. lest Issue Sir Gilbert, Father to Sir William, whose Son Sir John had Issue Sir Peter; who, in Right of his Wise Julian, Daughter and sole Heir to Thomas Hawey, became (c) possess'd temp. Edw. I. of the Manours of Hawey and Alfreyands, in Com. Som. and Compton Hawey, in Com. Dors.

The said Sir Peter left Issue Sir Edward Stradling of St. Donats, Kt. who marry'd Eleanor Daughter to Sir Gilbert Stradling, a younger Branch of this Stock, Heir to her Mother, a Daughter to Richard Garnon; of whose Inheritance he posses'd

two Manours in Com. Onon.

Sir Edward Stradling, his Son and Heir, was, with Sir Henry Power, return'd Knights of the Shire for the County of Somerset, in the Parliament held at Westminster, 17 Edw. 3, having 121. Allowance for thirty nine Days Expences, coming. \* stay, and returning.

In Right of his Wife Wenlian, Sifter and Heir to Sir Lawrence, and Daughter to Sir Roger Berkrolls, by his Wife, one of the Co-heirs of Pagan de Turbervile, Lord of Castle Coitif, he obtain'd the Lordship of Est Orchard, in Com. Glam. which was given by Robert Pitzbamon to Sir Lawrence Berkrolls, who was another of the twelve Knights that accompany'd him; and likewise Part of the Inheritance of the Turbervile's, another of those twelve Knights; but the Castle of Coitif, (d) on Failure of Issue Male of Berkrolls, devolv'd to Gamage and his Heirs Male, by special Entail.

Sir William Stradling, Son and Heir to Sir Edward, succeeded to this Estate 9 Henry the IVth. He went in Pilgrimage to Jerusalem, and was there made Knight of the Holy Sepulchre, and having marry'd Isabel, Daughter and Heir to Sir Folm St. Barbe, Kt. was succeeded by Edward, his

Son and Heir.

Which Edward accompany'd his Father to the Holy Sepulchre, and was also made, with him, Knight of that Order, about the Beginning of the Reign of King Henry the VIth. He marry'd Jane, Daughter to the great Henry Beaufort, Son of John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, afterwards made Cardinal of St. Eusebius, Bishop of Winchester, and Lord Chancellor of England, by whom he had Issue

Sir Henry Stradling, who in his Passage from St. Donats, to his Seat in Somersetshire, was taken Prisoner by Colyn Dolphin, a Pyrate of Britany, \*and his Ransom rated so high, that for the Payment of 2200 Marks, he was forc'd to sell his two Manours in Oxfordshire, the Castle and Manour of Rogerstown, call'd in Welsh Tre Gwillin, in the Parish of Baseltk,

felck, together with the Lordship of Satton in Monmouthshire. He went afterwards, according to the Devotion of those Times, and visited the Holy Sepalchre, and other reverend Antiquities in Palessim, where he likewise received the Order of Knighthood of the Sepulchre; but, in his Return Home, dy'd in the Isle of Cyprus, being under 26 Years of Age, and was bury'd in the City of Famagusta, leaving Issue Thomas Stradling, Esc, for whom this cenotaphial Memorial now remains in the Chapel at St. Donats.

FIERE lyeth Thomas Stradling, Esq. Son to " I Sir Harry Stradling, Kt. and Elizabeth his "Wife, (the Daughter of William Thomas of Rag-" land, Kt. " in the County of Mommouth) who dy'd " at Cardife, in the Monastery of Preaching-Fry-"ers, the 8th Day of September, in the Year of "our Lord 1480; whose Bones, after the Diffo-" lution of the faid Monastery, Sir Thomas Strad-"ling, Kt. his Grand-son, caus'd to be taken up " and carry'd to St. Donats, and bury'd by his "Son the 4th of June 1537; and afterwards Sir " Edward Stradling, Kt. the 5th of that Name, tran-" flated the faid Bones out of the Chancel, in-" to the Chapel annex'd to the faid Chancel, in " the Year of our Lord 1573; after whose Death, " his Wife was marry'd to Sir Rees ap Thomas, "Knight of the Garter, and dy'd at Picton, in " the County of Pembroke, the 5th Day of Fe-"breary, in the Year of our Lord 1535, and " was bury'd at Carmarthen, in the Church of the " Monastery of Preaching-Fryers, with the said " Sir Rees ap Thomas her Husband.

" spent some Time at Rome, return'd an accomplish'd Gentleman; and, retiring to his Inheritance, which was large, built a firm "Structure on that Foundation of Literature he had laid at Oxford, and elsewhere. In 1575. or the Year after, he receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood, became a very useful Man in his "Country, and was at the Charge of such Her-"culean Works for the publick good, that no "Man, in his Time, went beyond him, for his fingular Knowledge in the British Language "and Antiquities, for his eminent Encourage-"ment of Learning, and learned Men, and " for his great Expence and indefatigable In-"dustry, in collecting together several ancient "Manuscripts of Learning and Antiquity; all "which, with other Books, were reduc'd in-" to a well-order'd Library at St. Donat's, to the great Credit and Kenown of the Family.

"He writ a Welsh Grammar mostly in Latin, " of which one gives this Character, He Inflitutiones aden concinne composita, & omnibus suis numeris absoluta, ut eis addi quicquam nec ab eis demi quicquam poterit, nisi secundam bujus operis author in posterum editionem maturet. He wrote also the Conquest of the Lordship of Glamorgan, or Morganwe, with other Pieces; and having marry'd Agnes, Daughter to Sir Edward "Gage of Furle, in Sussex, paid his last Debt to "Nature without Issue, aged eighty Years, or more, and was bury'd in a Chapel he him-"felf had built, (dedicated to the Virgin Mny) "joining to the Parish-Church of St. Donat's, between the Bodies of his Great Grand-father and Grand-mother, on the North Side, and "the Body of his Father on the South Side, " leaving his Estate to his next Kinsman, Sir " John Stradling, Kt. who, with the faid Agnes, "erected

Sir John, as was said before, became posses'd of the Estate: He was Grand-son to the afore-said Henry Stradling, great Uncle to the last Sir Edward; which Henry having to Wise the Daughter and Heir to Thomas Tubb, Esq.; a learned Lawyer, had Issue Francis Stradling, who resided at St. George's, near Brisol; and by Mary his Wise, Daughter to Bartholomew Mitchel, Esq.; was Father

Father to the said Sir John, the Heir to Sir Edward.

Which John was educated in puerile Learning, under Edward Green, Prebendary of the Cathedral Church at Briftol, became a Commoner of Brazen-nose College in \* Oxon. 1579, aged sixteen Years, or thereabouts; and in 1583, took a Degree in Arts, as a Member of Magdalen-Hall, being then accounted in Miracle for his Forwardness in Learning, and Pregnancy of Parts; foon after, his great Worth being discover'd in London, while he continu'd in one of the Inns of Courts, (but especially after he had return'd from his Travels beyond the Seas) he was courted and admir'd by the learned Camden, and others; wrote feveral Things, and was a good Epigrammatist. Anno 1608, upon the 15th of May, King James the Ist made him a Knight, being then denominated, de Com. Salop; (b) and the next Year, becoming Heir to his Kinfman, he settled at St. Donat's Cafile, and was advanc'd to the Degree of a Baronet, A. D. 1611, at which Time he was esteem'd a most wise and learned Person. In the Year 1620, he was High-Sheriff of the County of Glamorgan, and being involv'd in secular Affairs, and the Service of his Country, was taken off Writing 'till the latter Part of King James the Ist; at which Time he publish'd Beati Pacifici, printed 1623, and Divine Poems, in seven several Classes, written to King Charles the Ist. He had Issue by his Wife Elizabeth, Daughter to Edward, Son to Sir Edward Gage aforesaid, eight Sons and three Daughters, viz. Jane, marry'd to William Thomas of Wanoe; Elizabeth.

His Sons were, 1. Sir Edward. 2. Thomas, Lieutenant-Colonel under his Brother Sir Edward. 3. John, a Captain in the Expedition to the Isle of Rhee, under the Duke of Buckingham, where he was stain. 4. Sir Harry, knighted by King Charles the Ist; he was Captain of a Man of War; but after the Parliament, in the Times of the Rebellion, had got all the King's Ships into their Power, he refign'd his Post; and being in Pembroke-Calle when it was furrender'd by Power and Langborne, he was banish'd to Ireland, where he dy'd at Cork, and was bury'd in that City. The Lord Clarendon writes, that he and Rettleby were the only Captains the Parliament could not corrupt. (a) 5. Edmund dy'd young. 6. Francis, a Captain of Foot in Ireland, in the Reign of King Charles the Ist, where he dy'd, before the Troubles broke out in England. 7. Donat dy'd young. George, D. D. and Dean of Gloucester.

Sir Edward Stradling, Bart. the eldest Son, tostify'd his Loyalty to King Charles the Ist, by accepting a Commission to be Colonel of Foot, at the first breaking out of the Civil Wars: He engag'd at the Battel of Edghill, and was there taken Prisoner; (b) from whence being carry'd to Warwick Castle, he remain'd in that Garrison 'till his Releasement; after which, coming to Oxford, he dy'd in that City, and was bury'd

in the Chapel of Jesus College. He marry'd Mary, Daughter to Sir Thomas Mansel of Margam, Bart. and had Issue four Sons and five Daughters, viz. Jane, Wife to Thomas Carne of Little-Nash, Esq. Dorothy, to Henry Hill, Foan,

Sir Thomas, a Colonel of Foot in the Reign of King Charles the IId; he was knighted by King James the IId, and made Captain of his Majesty's Foot-Guards, and Serjeant-Porter; he dy'd at Merthirmsur, and was bury'd in the Parish-Church. Sir Edward Stradling, Baronet, eldest Son of the last Sir Edward, inherited his Father's Virtues and Loyalty; he brought a Troop of Horse to the Atlistance of the King at Newbury; and, after the Loss of that Day, retir'd to Oxford, where he dy'd of a Consumption, and his Body was convey'd thence, and bury'd with his

Ancestors at St. Donats.

He marry'd Catherine, Daughter to Hugh Perry, Esq., Alderman of London, (afterwards Wise of Bushy Mansel of Britton-Ferry, Esq.) by which Lady he had a Son Edward, and two Daughters, Catherine marry'd to Sir William Walter, Kt. and Jane to George Bowen of Kettlehill, in Com. Glam.

THIS Family, anciently written de Hoston, and Houghton, have been of great Eminency in the County of Lancaster, in former Ages, and were denominated, from their Possessians, Houghton Tower, a stately and large Stone Edifice, built upon an high, but very steep Hill, in the Middle of a Park in the Hundred of Leyland. The first mention'd, is Adam de Hoston, (a) who held one Carucat of Land in Hoston, temp. Hen. II; from whom, after two Generations

ons of the same Name, was Sir Adam de Hogbton, written Kt. 50 Henry the IIId, and 11 Edward the Ist; as also among the Witnesses to a Charter of Henry Duke of Lancaller, to the Abbey of W baley, in Com. Lanc. 34 Edward the Ist. (b) He had two Sons. Richard, stil'd Filius Dom. Ada. 2 Edward the Ist; and Adam de Houghton. Stil'd also in Deeds, Filius Dom. Ade, 20 Edward the Ist, and afterwards, Frater Magistri Richardi. Which Richard was Sheriff of the County of Lancaster, 29 Edward the 1st, an Office, in those Days, of great Trust and Authority. He had a Son Richad, who, dving without Issue, the Estate came to his Cosin and Heir, another Richard de Hoghton, Son of Adam de Hoghton. Which Richard was a Knight, and, in the 16th of Edward the IId, with Sir Gilbert de Singilton, Kt. were return'd Knights of the Shire for the County of Lancaster, in the Parliament held at Tork, (c) and had their Wages allow'd for Attendance. &c. In the 1st Year of Edward the IIId, \* he paid 13 s. and 9 d. for a third Part of one Knight's-Fee in Hoghton, Cleton, Pernwortham, Wheleton, cum Hepay, which he held of the Dutchy of Lancaster: Which Richard de Cleton and Richard de Feton held before. In the same Year he and Edmund de Nevyle serv'd as Knights of the Shire for the afore-mention'd County, as also in the 11th of that King's Reign, and had their Wages allow'd. He dy'd 14 Edmurd the IIId, (d) having not a little increas'd the Estate, by Means of his Wife Sybill, Daughter and Heir to Hunry de Lea, who had great Posfessions, and were Owners of the Manour of Molington Banafter, in Com. Ceftr. (e) in Right of Clementia,

mentia, Daughter of Robert Banaster, Baron of Manaton, and Wise of William de Lea, who receiv'd the same from her Father in Frank Marniage; and altho' these Leas sometimes seal'd with five Mascles in Bend for Arms, and differ'd in the writing their Names; yet were they nevertheless a Cadet of the first Dinasty of the Lansasters, primitively Barons of Kendal, in Com. Westmorland, and lineal Descendants from Ivo Talbor, Earl of Anjou in France, and Barons of Kendal, temp. W. Conq. Their usual Arms were Argent, three Bars, Sable; the Reverse of which the Family of Houghton now bear.

The said Richard, by his Wife Sybill, afore-mention'd, had Issue Adam de Hoghton, and a Daughter nam'd Sybill, the Wife of William, Son of Ri-

chard de Bold.

Adam, last mention'd, is stil'd a Knight in Deeds, 22 Edward the IIId; in which Year he and John Cockaine serv'd in Parliament, as Knights of the Shire for the County of Lancaster, and had, for their Expences, 15 l. 4 s. for thirty Days. (f) In the 37th of that King's Reign he ferv'd again, as Knight for that Shire; as also in the 39th, and had, with the other Knight, 171. 4 s. for forty three Days Attendance. + He dy'd 10 Richard the IId, leaving Issue by Ellen his Wife, who surviv'd her Husband, two Sons, Richard and Henry, and as many Daughters. Agnes the eldeft, Wife to Sir Thomas, Son of Sir Adam Banaster, Kt. and Sibyll, to William, Brother of that Sir Thomas. Sir Henry de Hoghton, the youngest Son, was one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Lancaster, 9 Henry the IVth, \* and was Progenitor. to those of the Name of Pendleton, in that Cour-

ty,

ty, which, in after Times, went off in two Heirs Females; Catherine, marry'd to a younger Son of Houghton of Houghton, as hereafter is mention'd; and Mary, to George Singleton of Stayning, and

secondly, to Livesey Coner.

Richard de Hoghton, elder Brother to the last Henry, was return'd with Robert de Clifton, as Knights of the Shire for Lancaster, 6 Richard the IId: as also 4 Henry the IVth, with Sir Nicholas de Haverington, Kt. In which Year the Sheriffs were directed to levy 27 l. for their Coming, Attendance, and Returning, computed fixty nine Days, 28 Edward the IIId. (a) He had License to inclose and impark at Hoghton; he founded a Chantry in the Church of Riblechefter, (b) 7 Henry the IVth, and dy'd to Henry the Vth, (c) leaving his Grand-son Richard Heir to the Estate: Sir William de Hoghton, his Son, dying before him. He had also another Son Edward, who held Lands at Presson and Writtington, and is supposed to be the Ancestor to the Houghtons in Com. Suf. who are said to be deriv'd from Edward, a third Son of this Family. (d)

Riebard, Grand-son and Heir of Sir Richard, did his Homage, and had Livery of his Lands in Houghton and Lea, 4 Henry the VIth; was a Knight 22 Henry the VIth, and dy'd 19 Edward the IVth. (e) He had five Sons, Lawrence, Alexander, William, George, and Arthur; the two last dy'd without Issue; Lawrence succeeded in the

Estate, and dying the same Year,

Alexander, his Brother, and next Heir, is found to be possessed of the Inheritance, and was aged twenty six Years, 19 Edward the IVth, when

(1) when the Office was taken. In the 22d of that King's Reign, having valiantly behav'd himfelf under the Duke of Gloucester, in Scotland, he was made Knight Baneret, (b) with several others of prime Note, on St. James's Eve. He deceas'd 15 Henry the VIIth, leaving a fole Daughter and Heir, aged eleven Years at the Time of the Inquisition; and 17 Henry the VIIth, her Mother Elizabeth, Daughter of William Troutbeck, had Affignation of Dower. The greatest Part of the Estate descended to his next Brother and Heir. William Hoghton, Esq, third Son of Henry.

Which William was in the Expedition into Scotland, under the Duke of Gloucester, and reœiv'd from him the Honour of Knighthood, at the same Time his Brother, Sir Alexander, was made a Baneret. He purchas'd Lands in Ingolbead, 11 Henry the VIIth, and dy'd in the 17th of that King's Reign, leaving Issue by Mary his Wife, Daughter of Richard Southworth of Samsbury, Esq. Richard his Son and Heir, aged thirty Years.

This Richard was afterwards knighted, and ferv'd with Thomas Butler, as Knights of the Shire for the County of Lancaster, I Edward the VIth; he marry'd three Wives, first Alice, Daughter and Co-heir of Thomas Astron of Astron Under-Line, in Com. Staff. Esq; and Cosin and Heir of Sir James Harrington of Wolphage, in Com. Northampton, Kt. by whom he left Iffue Thomas, his Son and Heir, aged forty Years at the Death of his Father, 1 Eliz.

The said Thomas marry'd Catherine, Daughter ef Thomas Gerrard of Bryne, in Com. Lanc. Esq. and dy'd 22 Elizabeth, leaving Jane, his Daughter

and

and Heir, 26 Years old at his Death, and at that Time Wife to James, Son and Heir of Roger Bradshaigh of Haigh, in Com. Lanc. Esq, who had a great Contest about the Estate, which was at length decided for Alexander, second Brother, and next Heir Male to Thomas, Father of Jane afore-mention'd.

Which Alexander Houghton, Esq. marry'd twice in the 17 Elizabeth, to Dorothy, Daughter of Richard Ashton of Middleton, in Com. Lanc. Esq. and afterwards to Elizabeth, Sister of Thomas and Batholomew Hesketh, and Widow of George Warbuston, Esq. but he left no Issue by either of them; whereupon the Estate descended to Thomas his half Brother, viz. eldest Son to Sir Richard Hoghton last mention'd, by his second Wise Alice, Daughter of ——Morley.

Which Thomas was kill'd in the 49th Year of

his Age, at Lea-Hall, (an Estate now in the Family) by —— Langton of Newton, commonly call'd Baron of Walton, 21 Nov. 32 Elizabeth 1589. His Wife Anne, Daughter of Henry Kighley of Kighley, in Com. Lanc. Esq., became afterwards second Wise to Sir Richard Sherburn of Stonyhurst, Kt. She dy'd at Lea, 30 Ostob. A. D. 1609, aged 60 Years; having Issue by her first Husband, 1. Sir Richard, Kt. and Bart. 2. William of Grimfargh, who dy'd A. D. 1642, and lest Posterity, which lately became extinct, and the Estate devolv'd to the head Branch of the Family. 3. Thomas, who marry'd Catherine, one of the Daughters and Co-heirs of John Honghton of Pendleton, Esq., and lest four

Daughters and Co-heirs. 4. Adam of Lea-Moor, who left Posterity. And, 5. Henry, who marry'd Anne, Daughter of Lawrence Townley, Esq., also two Daughters, Mary, second Wife to Thomas Walmsley of Dunken-Hall, Esq., and Catherine, Wife of Tho-

mas Middleton of Leighton, Efq.

Sir Richard Houghton of Houghton, eldest Son of Thomas, was under Age at his Father's Death, and in Ward to Sir Gilbert Gerrard: He succeeded to a very great Estate, was knighted by Queen Elizabeth, and made a Baronet with the first advanc'd to the Dignity. He serv'd in several Parliaments as Knight of the Shire for his County; entertain'd King James the Ist at Houghton-Tower. for several Days, when that King call'd there in his Progress into Scotland, Anno 1617, and dy'd 12 Nov. A. D. 1630, aged 60 Years, 6 Weeks, and 2 Days. Catherine his Wife, Daughter of Sir Gilbert Gerrard of Gerrard's Bromley, in Com. Staff. dy'd 17 Nov. 1617, aged 48 Years, and 6 Months: He had by her 5 Sons and 8 Daughters, 1. Gilbert. 2. Thomas. 3. Richard. 4. Ratcliff. And, 5. Roger; flain in Germany. The last three left no Issue. Of the Daughters, Anne marry'd Sir John Cotton of Lamwade, in Com. Cantab. Kt. and afterwards Sir John Charleton; Frances was living unmarry'd Anno 1662; Catherine was Wife to James Stewart, Lord Galloway: Elizabeth to Nicholas Girling, Esq. Alice dy'd unmarry'd; Gilibert was marry'd to Sir George Muscamp of the County of Northumberland Margaret and Eleanor dy'd unmarry'd.

Sir Gilbert, his Successor, was 39 Years old at the Death of his Father, and was knighted at Wbitehall July the 21st 1604: He was in Favour with King James, whom he serv'd in a good Post at Court several Years; and after his Death, honourably distinguish'd his Loyalty to King Charles the Ist. Hongbton-Tower, in those unhappy Times, serv'd as a Garrison, and part of it was blown up by Accident, which is since rebuilt. Sir Gilbert serv'd also several Years in Parliament as Knight of the Shire for the County of Lancaster; was an accomplish'd Gentleman, and, by a prudent Management, made Acquisitions to the Estate that de-

**scended** 

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cended to him. He dy'd in April 1647, having marry'd Margaret, the eldest of the 4 Daughters and Co-heirs of Sir Roger Ashton, Kt. Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber, and Master of the Great Wardrobe to King James the Ist; to which Sir Roger, the faid King, by Writ under the Privy-Seal, in the 9th Year of his Reign, granted to his Coat-Armour, an Augmentation out of the two National Badges of England and Scotland, viz. A Canton Or, charg'd with a Rose and Thifile, conjoin'd party per pale Gules and Vert, in Regard of the Marriage of the faid Sir Roger with Mary, Daughter of Andrew Stemart, who dy'd in the Life-Time of his Father Andrew Stewart, Lord Avingdale \* in Scotland, descended from the Blood Royal: Sir Gilbert's Descendants therefore quarter the said Coat in Right of his Lady, who bore him 6 Sons and 4 Daughters.

George, the eldest Son, dy'd unmarry'd in his

Father's Life-Time.

Richard, second Son, succeeded to the Title and Estate.

Roger, third Son, was flain by a Cannon-Bullet

at Hessamore, A.D. 1643.

Gilbert, fourth Son, marry'd Lettice, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Francis Gamull of Chester, Kt. and dy'd Anne 1661.

Thomas, fifth Son, dy'd young.

And Henry took to Wife Mary, Daughter of Peter Egerton, and Relieft of Sir Thomas Stanley of Bicker-

faff, Kt. and Bart.

Of the Daughters, Catherine, marry'd Thomas Preston of Holker, Esq. Mary, Sir Hugh Calverly, Margaret, Alexander Righy of Middleton, Esq. and Anne dy'd young.

Sir Richard Honghton, Bart. was elected Knight of the Shire for Lancaster, in the Reign of King Charles the IId, and departed this Life Anno 1678. He marry'd the Lady Sarah, Daughter to Philip Stanbope, Earl of Chestersield, and had Issue several Sons and Daughters: Of the Sons, those that arriv'd to Maturity, were Charles and Benjamin; the lat-

ter is now living unmarry'd, 1713.

Charles succeeded to the Title and Estate, and took to Wise Mary, eldest Daughter of John Skevington, Lord Viscount Mazareen, in the Kingdom of Ireland, by whom he had Issue 5 Sons and 6 Daughters: Of the Sons, Henry, the eldest, deceased at the Age of 21 Years, being enter'd in the Temple for his greater Proficiency in the Management of Affairs. Henry, Philip, and Skevington are now living, and James dy'd young. Of the Daughters, Mary, the eldest, dy'd Anne 1713, Cordelia, Anne, Margaret, Elizabeth, and Lucy, are all living.

The faid Sir Charles dy'd at Haughton-Tower, 10th of June 1711; was bury'd at Walton among his Ancestors; and Henry, his second Son and Heir, suc-

ceeded him.

Which Sir Henry Houghton, Bart. is now in Poslession of the ancient Inheritance of his Family, and in Ollob. 1711, marry'd Mary, eldest Daughter of Sir William Boughton of Lawford in Com. Warw. Bart. He serv'd in Parliament for the Borough of Presson, in the late and the present Reign, and is the 5th that hath born this Title, and the 19th Generation of that Sir-name on Record.

Sir HENRY HOBART of INT-WOOD, Kt. Norf. No 9.

(22 May, A.D. 1611. R. Jac. 9.)

PROM Sir James Hobart, Kt. Attorney-General, and of the Privy-Council to King Henry the VIIth, doth the several Branches of the Hobarts owe their principal Rise; yet the Family was of genteel Extraction in Norfolk, for many Generations before. John Hobart is mention'd in Deeds to be Owner of Lands at De la Tye, in the said County, Anno 13 Richard the IId, A. D. 1389. His Son Godfry, of the same Place, is also mention'd Anno 9 Henry the IVth; and his Son John, 10 Henry the VIth; which John had Issue, Thomas Hobart of the Tye and Gedford-street, in the said County, and deceasing 37 Henry the VIth,

VIth, left Issue (by his Wife Eleanor, Daughter and Heir of John Taylor, alias Amfrey) William, his Son and Heir; which William was Father to Thomas Hobart, who resided at Leyham, and had Issue two Sons, William and James: The eldest Son William had the Estate at Leyham, and having marry'd Anne, Daughter to Sir Philip Tilney, and Heir to her Mother, from them descended the Hobarts of Monks Illegh, afterwards of Lindsey, and the Hobarts of Milding, and others who settled in London.

Fames, the younger Son of Thomas, and Brother of that William, was born in Norfolk, and by his prudent Acquisitions, lest a fine Estate to his Posterity. He was (says my Author) (a) a right good Man, of great Learning and Wisdom: Being enter'd at Lincolns-Inn for the Study of the Laws, he made fuch Proficiency therein, that 2 Richard the IIId, he became one of the Governours of that So-Gety; and 2 Nov. 2 Henry the VIIth, was conflituted (b) Attorney-General by the King, and afterwards fwom of his Privy-Council. Dr. Holland, in the Additions to Cambden (c) gives this Account of him, "The River Tare, faith he, " receiveth a Brook, which passeth by nothing memorable, but Halles Hall, and that only " memorable for his ancient Owner, Sir James " Hobart, Attorney-General, and of the Privy-"Council to King Henry the VIIth; by him dubb'd "Knight at such Time as he created Honry, his "Son, Prince of Wales, who, by building from the Ground the fair Church of Loddon, being " his Parish-Church, St. Olave's-Bridge [common-" ly call'd St. Tooley's] over Waveney, that divi-" deth Norfolk and Suffolk, the Cawfey thereby, " and other Works of Piety, deserv'd well of the "Church

"Church, his Country, and the Common-Weal, "and planted three Houses of his own Issue." From Mr. Weaver (d) we are are informed, that he was bury'd in Loddon Church, by his Wife Margaret, Daughter of Peter Naunton, Esq, that dy'd before him, A. D. 1484. They had Issue two Sons, Walter and Miles, and a Daughter mar-

ry'd to ——Sampson.

Walter, the eldest Son, succeeded at Halles-Hall; and having been knighted, was High-Sheriff of Norfolk and Suffolk, 27 Henry the VIIIth. From Anne, his first Wife, Daughter to Sir Henry Heydon, Kt. the Hobarts of Halles Hall and Blyford, in Com. Suff. descended; and from this Sir Walter, by his second Wife,—Daughter to John Ratcliff, Lord Fitzwater, and Sister to Robert Earl of Susce, are derived the Hobarts of Morley, in Com. Norf.

Miles, second Son of Sir James, was seated at Plomsted, in the said County of Norfolk; and having marry'd Eleanor, Daughter to John Blever-basset, had Issue two Sons, Thomas and John; which latter marry'd Anne, Daughter of Sir Philip Tilney, Kt. and setling at Wayte, in Com. Norf. became the

Founder of that Branch.

Thomas, the eldest, succeeded to the Estate at Plumsted, and by his Wise Audrey, Daughter of William Hare of Beeston, in Com. Nors. Esq., had two Sons, Miles and Henry; the former received the Honour of Knighthood, inherited the Estate at Plumssead, and was succeeded therein by Sir Thomas Hobert, Kt. his Son and Heir.

Henry aforesaid, Brother to Sir Miles Hobart, apply'd himself to the Study of the Law; and being enter'd at Lincoln's-Inn, attain'd such Knowledge therein, and grew in such Esteem, that 39 Elizabeth, he was elected one of the Governours of that

that Society; (e) and in the Parliament that met the same Year, was return'd one of the Burgesses for Tarmouth; as also 43 Eliz. in which Year he was chose Lent-Reader to the said Society of Lincolns-Inn. and two Years after, call'd to the Degree of Serieant at Law. On the Accession of King James to the English Crown, the Honour of Knighthood was conferr'd both on him the said Henry, and his eldest Son John, 23 July 1603, and in the first Parliament call'd by that King, serv'd for the City of Norwich. (f) He was so much reverenc'd for his Abilities and Learning, that in the 4th of that Reign, he was made Attorney of the Court of Wards; and, in the same Year, by Letters Patent, dated July 4, constituted the King's Attorney-General. He was advanced to the Degree of a Baronet, A. D. 1611; and, in the same Year, 16 Odob. constituted Lord Chief Justice of the Common-Pleas, which Post he fill'd with notable Sufficiency, and dy'd therein 26 Dec. Anno I Car. I. A great Loß to the Weal publick, as Sir Henry Spelman writes. (g) Since his Death has been publish'd Reports of several Law-Cases. which bear this Title:

The Reports of that reverend and learned Judge, the Right Honourable Sir Henry Hobart, Kt. and Bart. Lord Chief Justice of his Majesty's Court of Common-Pleas, and Chancellor to both their Highnesses

Henry and Charles, Princes of Wales, &c.

He lyeth bury'd under a fair Monument, in the middle Isle, on the North Side, in Christ Church, Norwich; and had Issue by Dorothy, his Wife, Daughter to Sir Robert Bell of Beaupree Hall, Kt. Lord Chief Baron of the Exchequer, three E 2 Daughters

Daughters, Elizabeth, Frances, and Dorothy, with feveral Sons.

Fobn, the eldest, knighted with his Father, succeeded to the Title of Baronet; was seated at Blickling, in Com. Norf. a Manour his Father had purchas'd, and had built there a frately House; an Estate, formerly in the Noble Family of Bullen's, Maternal Ancestors to Queen Elizabeth: He was also possess'd of the Estate at Plumfied, upon the Failure of the Line of his Cousin Sir Thomas Hobart. He serv'd in Parliament for the Borough of Thetford, I Car. I, and for the County of Norfolk (b) in the 16th of that Reign. He marry'd two Wives, Philippe, Daughter to Robert Sidney, Earl of Leicester, and Frances, Daughter to John Egerton, Earl of Bridgwater, but left no Issue Male; whereupon the Title and Estate entail'd, descended to his Nephew, John Hobart, Esq. Son and Heir of his Brother, Sir Miles Hobart, Kt. by Susan his Wife. Daughter to Sir John Peyton of Iselham, Bart.

Sir Henry succeeded his Father in the Title and Estate, Anno --- He was elected one of the Burgesses for Lyn Regis, in the Parliament that met at Oxford, 32 Charles the IId, and sat with his Father, who serv'd in the same Parliament as Knight of the Shire for Norfolk. He appear'd, with the first, in Defence of our Liberties and Religion, at the Time of the Revolution; and in the Convention-Parliament, (being one of the Knights of the Shire for Norfolk) declar'd for the Vacancy of the Throne. He was Gentleman of the Horse to his late Majesty King William; and, in the seventh Year of his Reign, was again elected one of the Knights of the Shire for Norfolk, and constantly behav'd himself like a Man of Honour, and a true Patriot of his Country: Refenting some Words spoken by Oliver L'neve, Esq, a Duel enfu'd, wherein he was mortally wounded, and dy'd Anno - leaving Issue by - his Lady. Daughter of Sir John Maynard, Kt. Serjeant at Law, one Son, John, and three Daughters, whereof Anne marry'd the Honourable Charles Howard, youngest Son of Henry, late Earl of Suffolk, and Brother to the present Earl; Catherine, the Honourable Charles Churchill, Esq. Colonel of ? ale Diagoons, and Dorotby, unmarry'd.

The present Sir John Hobart of Blickling, Bart. only Son of Sir Henry, was educated at Clare-Holl, in Cambridge, and afterwards travell'd beyond the Seas; from whence returning, he was elected a Member in the present Parliament for the Borough of St. Ives, in the County of Cornwall,

THIS Family, as Mr. Camden observes, derive themselves from the Uffords, (a) Earls of Suffolk, who descended from William Malet, a Norman Baron, (b) that was Sheriff of Torkshire in the 3d of William the Ist, and from him received the Grants of many Lordships and Manours, and among others, he possess those of Sibton, and Psyton-Hall, in Com. Suff. (c) at the Time of the general Survey. "Isledam, says the "Author first cited, formerly belonged to the Bernards, which came to the Family of the Peytons, by Marriage. Which knightly Family

"mily of Peyton flower'd out of the same Male "Stock, whence the Uffords, Earls of Suffolk, defeended; albeit they assum'd the Sir-name of Peyton, according to the Use of that Age, from their Manour of Peyton-Hall, in Boxford in the

" County of Suffolk.

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The first of whom was Reginald de Peyton, (d) second Son of Walter, Lord of Sibton, (a Descendant of the Malets) and Dapiser, or Steward, to Hugh de Bygod; for whose Soul he gave to the Market of Thetford divers Lands. He had Issue two Sons,

William de Peyton, who held certain Lands in Boxford, of the Fee of the Abbey of St. Edmunds-bury, as appears by a Charter of his Nephew John.

The other was John de Peyton, to whom King Stephen, and his Cosin-German, William de Cassineto, Baron of Horsford, granted all his Lands in Peyton, well, peaceably, and rightly, with Soc and Sac, with all Liberties and Appurtenances to hold, as his Ancestors before held the same, and that he should have Warren, &c. The Baron of Horsford's Charter begins thus,

Willielmus, filius Roberti filii Walteri, Dapifero suo & omnibus amicis & bominibus, &c. granting to fobn, Son of Reginald his Cosin, the Service of Robert de Ramest t, in Fee and Inheritance, &c.

Which John had Issue four Sons, John, the elder, Robert, Peter, and John, the younger.

Robert was Lord Justice of Ireland, in the Time of Hemy the IIId, and Edward the Ist; and, being Lord of Ufford, assumed the Sirname of his Ancestors. Whose Son, Robert de Ufford, was created Earl of Suffolk II Edward the IIId, † 1336, and made Knight of the Garter. He was at the Battel of Cagn, and merited so well, that the E 4 King

King rewarded him with the Honour of Eye

formerly belonging to his Family.

Brothers to the Earl were Thomas de Ufford, Knight of the Garter, "and John Ufford, who "was brought up at Cambridge, and made Doctor of Law, promoted first to the Deanry of Lincoln, then to the Chancellorship of England, and lastly, to the Arch-bishoprick of Canterbury, which he never enjoy'd, being cut off by the "Plague, (which consum'd nine Parts of the Men in England\*) before he receiv'd either his Pall or Consecration, June 7, Anno 1348, and lyeth obscurely bury'd in that Cathedral Church."

Peter de Peyton, Lord of Peyton-Hall, who held Lands in Ramshot and Peyton, in the Time of King John, and took to Wife Helena—of whom he had Issue, Robert de Peyton, Father to Sir John de Peyton, Kt. of the same Places; whose Male-Issue seem'd to fail temp. Edw. III.

The fourth Son was John de Peyton, Jun. who fold t "Job. de Peyton fratri meo Primogenito" to John, his eldest Brother, all his Lands which he had in Boxford, of the Fee of the Abbey of St. Edmonds; which their Father, John de Peyton, and William their Uncle, formerly possess'd.

Sir John, the eldest Son, succeeded, and was Lord of Peyton-Hall in Boxford, and possess Lands in Stoke-Neyland, in Com. Suff. In which Parish-Church, both his Father and he, with his Wise Agnes, and many of his Posterity, lyeth interrid; as we learn from || Mr. Weever, who has transmitted to us their Memorial, in these Words: "At the up-" per End, in the North Side of this Church "next

"next to the Chancel, John de Peyton, the Son of Reginald, lyeth interr'd under a Marble Stone; about the Verge whereof these few French Words following are only remaining;

## — Jena de Peytona**—— Mercye—lame** Crist—

"Under another Marble Stone adjoyning, his "Son, Sir John Peyton, Kt. lyeth inhum'd with this French Inscription;

Vous que par ici passet, Pur l'ame sire Jeban de Peytona priet. Le Cours de oi ici gist; L'ame receyue Jbu crist. Amen.

This Sir John de Peyton flourish'd under Henry the IIId, as may appear by a Catalogue of Knights in that Reign; and having Issue by his Wife, Matilda de Bueris, (Buers) (as is evident by her Arms, impal'd at Boxford, after the ancient Manner) three Sons and one Daughter, Agnes, mention'd in the last Will and Testament of her Brother, and William and James de Peyton, who was Witness to a dateless Charter of his Father, and to another of his elder Brother, who was

Sir John de Peyton, Kt. Successor to his Father; to whom, and Clementia his Wife, 27 Henry \* the IIId, John, Son of William de Essington, gave two Acres of Land. &c.

Anno 14 Edward the Ist, a Fine pass'd at Colshefter, before Solomon de Roff, and other Judges; wherein John de Peyton, and his Wise, acknowledg'd to John de Dikely 13 s. 4 d. Rent in Bromley, & c. Anno 28 Edw. I. This Sir John serv'd in the Parliament

liament held at Westminster, as one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Susfolk, \* having reasonable Allowance for his Expence; as also in another Parliament, 29 Edward the Ist, soon after which he dy'd; for his last Will and Testament bares date the Monday before the Feast of St. Michael, A. D. 1318, part whereof follows; "In the "Name of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, &c. "I John de Peyton, Kt. &c. make my Will, &c. my "Body to be bury'd in the Parish-Church of Stoke-"Neyland, near the Altar of St. Edmund, in the "Chapel which I built: To Robert, my Son, all my Lands; to John, my Son, twenty Marks; to James, my Brother, forty Shillings; to Gilian, my Daughter, a Nun of Mallines, twenty

" Shillings; to Agnes, my Sister, &c. Given at Peyton in Stoke-Neyland.

Sir Robert, the eldest Son, succeeded, who, in many of his Evidences is stil'd Chevalier and Monsieur; as by a Fine in the King's Court at Tork, 12 Edward III, between Robert de Peyton, Chevalier, and Foan his Wife, Demandants; and Thomas de Corney, Rector of the Church of Boxford de-forciants, for Lands and Rents in Effington, &c. whereby he entail'd the same upon his Heirs Male, by Joan his Wise; and, for want of such Issue, upon John his Brother, &c. the Remainder, &c. And, in a Letter of John of Eltham, Earl of Cornwall, Son to King Edward the IId, John, Son of the noble King of England, to Monseur Robert de Peyton salut. Ec. + Anno 23 Edward the IIId, to him and Foan his Wife, and Fobn his younger Son, Thomas Welsh of Boxford granted Lands in Boxford.

He dy'd 25 Edward the IIId, and was bury'd near his Father. Having had two Wives, first, the Lady Christiana de Apleton, Widow of William de Apleton, and Heir to Lands in Haxwell and Boxford; who, leaving no Children, dy'd 19 Edward the IId, and was bury'd at Stoke-Neyland with great Pomp, whose Funeral Expences are thus set down, \* fitty Quarter of Wheat 41. 10 s. one Hogshead of Wine 53 l. 4 s. four Muttons 5 s. eight Barrow-Hogs 24 s. ten Calves, &c.

His second Wise was Joan de Marney, of the noble Family of the Marneys in Esex, by whom there was Issue Sir John, the next Heir; William, from whom was a Release to his Father Robert, dated 13 Edward the IIId; and John de Peyton, Junior; to whom William Castelayne, John de Rikell, &c. granted the Manour of Badlees, in Wal-

dingfield, 5 Edward the IIId.

Sir John succeeded, and marry'd Margaret, the Daughter and Co-heir of Sir John Gernon of Lees, in Essex, Kt. Lord of Wicken, in Com. Cantab. in whose Right he possess'd the Manour of Wicken; and 17 Ricbard the IId, jointly with her, held Part of the Manour of Essevice of one Knight's Fee; in whose Reign he dy'd, and was bury'd with his Ancestors at Stoke-Neyland. She liv'd 'till 2 Henry the Vth, and, departing this Life A.D. 1414; was bury'd at Wicken.

Their Son and Heir, John de Peyton, Esq. inhefited, who took to Wise Joan, Daughter and Heir of Sir Hammon Sutton of Wickesho, in Com. Suff. Kt. by whom Wickesho came to this Family. Who, by his last Testament, A. D. 1404, constituted his said Wise Executrix, Margaret his Mother then living; and dying about the 5th of Henry the

the IVth, was bury'd, as he appointed, with his Ancestors. He left Issue, by his said Wife, (afterward marry'd to Sir Rogery Druny) Margery. Wife of Thomas Daubeny of Sharrington, in Norfolk, Esq. and three Sons, John, Thomas, and Robert; to whom their Mother Joan, in her Widowhood, gave the Manour of Wickesho.

About this Time also there was a Sir Robert Peyton, that was with King Henry the Vth at

the Siege of Roan.

John, the eldest, was left a Minor, being sifteen Years old, 8 Henry the IVth, at which Time an Agreement was made between the Lady Margaret, his Grand-mother, Joan his Mother of the one Part; and John Burgoyne of Drayton, in Com. Cantab. of the other; for an Intermatriage with Grave, Daughter of the said Burgoyne. Which Marriage took Effect; and from them proceeded two Sons, John and Thomas, and a Daughter Anne, marry'd to Jeffry Lockton, Esq. He dy'd in the Flower of his Age, the 6th of October, 4 Henry the Vth, (†) as appears by Inquest taken at Fordbam, before William Alyngton, Escaetor, &c.

His Son John, aged three Years and three quarters at his Father's Death, dv'd in his Minority the 29th of Odober 11 Henry the VIth, as is set forth in the Inquisition taken at Colchester, Tuesday after the Feast of St. James; at which Time a Tenement call'd Welles, in Birch Mag. in Com. Ess. by Reason of his tender Age, was

in the King's Hands.

Whereupon Thomas, then aged seventeen Years, and seis'd of the Manour of Esthorp, was the next

next Heir; and his Mother Grace dying the 6th of May, he was found her Heir to the Manour of Messing, which was held of the Crown, as of the Honour of Keynes, by the Service of one Knight's Fee; also of the Manour of Binchall, and the Castle. Upon the Feast of All Saints, 18 Henry the VIth, (\*) his Age was prov'd at Cambridge, viz. twenty two Years; at which Time it was sworn by John Welford, that he was born and baptiz'd at Dry-Drayton, in that County, 7 Henry the Vth, A. D. 1418. many agreeing in the Verdict; among whom Robert Chapman alledg'd, that the Day on which he was born being the Feast of St. Valentine, there was a great Storm: One knew it by the great Wind; another broke his Leg by a fall from his Horse; another, for that his Wise was bury'd; another, for then his Lease was burnt; another, for then his Daughter Margaret was burnt; another fell from a Tree and broke his Arm; another, for then his Mother was bury'd, as the feveral Jurors depos'd upon their Oaths.

This Thomas was High Sheriff of Cambridge and Huntingdon, 21 and 31 Henry the VIth; and, about the 17th of Edward IVth, he began to rebuild the Church of Isleham, agreeing then with John Waltham, alias Sudbury, free Mason, for the same. In the Chancel of which Church he lies interr'd, having a Monument erected there to his Memory, viz. his Effigies cast in Brass, with the

following Inscription:

He marry'd first Margaret, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir John Bernard of Isleham, Kt. by which Match Isleham descended to this Family; and he had Issue by her Thomas, Margaret, and Grace.

His second Wife was Margaret, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Hugh Francis of Giffords, in the Parish of Wickbambrook, in Com. Suff. Of this Match proceeded two Sons, 1. Christopher Peyton, Esq. who. as Heir to his Mother, had great Possessions in Wickhambrook and Bury. In the Minority of his Nephew Robert, he was, by his Brother Thomas, constituted Supervisor in building the Church begun by their Father. In the 12th of Henry the VIIth, he was Sheriff of Cambridge and Huntingdon; and having marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of Reginald Brooke of Aspall, in Com. Suff. Arm. by her became Ancestor to the Peytons of Bury. He dy'd 15 Henry the VIIth, and, with his Wife, was bury'd in Islebam Church, on the Roof whereof are these Words cut in Wood;

" Pray for the good Prosperity of Christopher Pey-"ton, and Elizabeth bis Wife, and for the Soul of "Thomas Peyton, Esq, and Margaret his Wife; " and Mother of the said Christopher Peyton: And " for the Souls of all the Posterity of the Said Christo-

pher Peyton, who dy'd March 17, 1485.

Younger Sons of whose Family were Edward Peyton, mention'd by Fox; Christopher, Auditor to King James the Ist; neither of whom left. Issue Male: And Henry Peyton of London, Merchant, who had Posterity; and another Sir Henry Peyton, Kt. who marry'd the Lady Mary, Daughter of Edward Seymour, Duke of Somerset.

Thomas

Thomas Peyton, the only Son by the first Venter, succeeded in the Inheritance of Islebam, and his Father's other Estates, and was chief Heir Male of that noble Family: And by his Wise Joan, the Daughter of —— Calthorp, he had the Manour of \* Calthorp, and Issue, Robert, Thomas, John, and Robert; which two last are mention'd in his Brother Sir Robert's Will: And four Daughters, Elizabeth marry'd to Edward Langley, Esq. Jane, to John Langley of Lolteworth, in Com. Cantab. Esq. Anne, to John Asleby of Harefeild, in Middlesex, Esq. and Dorothy, mention'd also in the said Will.

The eldest of whom, Sir Robert, inherited, who was Sheriff of Cambridge and Huntingdon, 14 Henry the VIIth; and making his Will the 18th of March, 9 Henry the VIIIth, dy'd the same Year. By which he bequeath'd many Vestments and Legacies to the Churches of Denton, and Knolton in Kent; Wicken, Spiney, and Bokeworth, in Com. Cantab. and, with his Lady Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir Robert Cleer of Ormsby, in Com. Norf. lieth bury'd in the Chapel of St. Catherine at Islebam, with this Epitaph;

Of pour Charpty pray for the Soule of Six Robert Peyton, Kingght, which departed to God the 18th Day of Marche, 1518; and of the Soul of Dame Elifabeth, hys Alyfe, whiche departed to God in the Pear of our Lord 1500.

They left Issue, 1. Sir Robert. 2. John, who marry'd Dorothy, Daughter of Sir Robert Tyndall of Hockwould, in Com. Norf. Kt. of whom descended

cended the Peytons of Knolton and Donnington, Barts. as will hereafter be mention'd in their proper Places; and, 3. Edward, who dy'd without Issue. Also two Daughters, Margaret marry'd to Francis Fenney of Knollball, in Com. Suff. Esq. from whom descend the Jenneys of that Place. Elizabeth, Wife of William Wig fron of Wolfton, in Com. Warw. Kt. To both which Daughters their Father gave, by Will, each three hundred Marks.

Sir Robert was the next Heir, who was Sheriff of the two aforesaid Counties, 17 and 27 Henry the VIIIth, and accompany'd that King to the Siege of Bullen; and was again Sheriff I Queen Mary. He marry'd Frances, Daughter and Heir of Francis Hassylden, of Little Chesterford in Esfex, Esq, and of Steeple-Marden, in Com. Cantab. and Okeford Shillings, in Com. Rutl. by whose Right

he became possess'd of those Places.

This Lady founded the famous Hospital at Illebam, and was bury'd by her Husband in that Church, where their Memories are still preserv'd

by the following Inscriptions;

" Pray for the Soule of Sir Robert Peyton, " Knyght, the Son of Sir Robert Peyton, Kt. " whiche marryed Frances, Daughter and Heyre " of Francys Haffylder, Esq, deceased; whiche " Sir Robert deceased the fyrst Day of August, " A. D. 1550, whose Soul God pardon.

Hic jacet Francisca Peyton, nuper Uxor Roberti Peyton Militis, Eximium Charitatis & Religionis Exemplar, qua, in sempiternam Nominis sui memoriam Publicum Hospitium, de suo Nomine vulgo dictum (Peyton's Hospital) propriis sua sumptibus in Isleham extruxit, perpetuis Censibus dotavit & confirmavit.

Robert the eldest, Lord of Isleham, was Knight of the Shire for Cambridge, 4th and 5th of Queen Mary, and High-Sheriff of the united Counties of Cambridge and Huntingdon, 9 Eliz. and receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood from King James the Ist at Royston, November 1608. He marry'd the Lady Elizabeth Rich, Daughter of Richard, Baron Rich of Leez, Lord High-Chancellor of England; by whom he had Issue three Sons, Robert, who dy'd in his Father's Life-Time; John, the Baronet, and Richard, who dy'd without Issue: And as many Daughters, Mary, wedded first to Charles Balam of Walfoken, in Com. Norf. Esq. 2dly to Sir Richard Cox of Braham, in the Isle of Ely, Kt. Frances, Wife of John Hagar of Burne-Castle, in Com. Cantab. Esq. and Winifride, Wife of - Osborne, Counsellor at Law, then of ---- Harefleet of Kent; and afterwards of John Hornbye, in Com. Linc. F.fq;

Sir John Peyton of Isleham, Kt. succeeded his Father Sir Robert, and was Lord of Peyton-Hall, in Boxford, Wicker, and Wikesho, &c. He was Sherisf of the Counties of Cambridge and Huntingdon 35 Eliz. and Knight of the Shire for the last mention'd County, as also I James the Ist, and the next Year High-Sherisf again; and in the ninth of that Reign, receiv'd the new Order of

By his Wife Alice, Daughter to Sir Edward Ofborn, who was Lord Mayor of London 25 Elizabeth, A.D. 1583, and Progenitor to the Duke of Leeds. He had five Sons and fix Daughters; Sir Edward, the next Baronet; John, who dy'd without Issue; Robert, Fellow of Queen's College in Cambridge; Roger, William, and Thomas, who was slain

slain at the Burse in Holland. These lest no Issue, The Daughters were Anne, marry'd to Robert the second Son of Sir Nicholas Bacon of Redgrave, Bart. Alice, Wise of John, Son and Heir of Sir John Peyton of Donnington, Bart. Elizabeth, of Sir Anthony Irby, in Com. Linc. Kt. Mary, of Sir Roger Mesers of Houghton, in Com. Linc. Kt. from whom proceeded Peyton Meers; Frances and

Susan Peyton, dy'd unmarry'd.

He was succeeded, both in Estate and Honour, by Edward his eldest Son, who was bred in Grammar Learning at St. Edmund's Bury, and afterward educated at Cambridge. He was knighted at Whiteball February 4, 1610; and, during his Father's Life. was denominated of Great Bradley, in Com. Suff. and serv'd in the Parliaments, from the 18th of James the Ist, to the 3d of Charles the Ist, as one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Cambridge, and was Cuftos Rotulorum thereof; which Office he was depriv'd of by the Endeavours of the great Favourite of James the Ist, the Duke of Buckingham. Whereat he was so much disgusted, that he first drew his Pen against the Court, and writ with great Acrimony of Stile against \* King Charles the Ist, and the Royalists; and at length, siding with the Presbyterians in the Times of the great Rebellion, had his Share of Sufferings for that Cause, while the War lasted; which so impoverished him, that he fold Isleham, (which had continud in the Family fo many Years) and ruin'd the whole Estate, drawing in his eldest Son to join with him in the Sale thereof, only referving Annuities for both their Lives

This Sir Edward first marry'd Matilda, Daughter of Robert Livesay of Tooting, in Com. Surr. Hsq., by whom he had Issue John, and Edward, who was a Clergy-man, and left two Sons, Robert and

George.

Sir John, who had two Wives,——Daughter of Sir Edward Bellingham, who left no Issue. By his second Wife——Daughter of——Hobart, he had three Sons; Edward, who dy'd young; Sir John Peyton, Bart. who succeeded him; and Thomas, who was first an Ensign, and afterwards Captain in the Guards. A Gentleman of bright Parts, and good Accomplishments, which recommended him to the Notice and Favour of King Charles the Isd; he dy'd a Batchelor. The Father dy'd 1666, and was bury'd in St. Giles's in the Fields, London.

Which Sir John Peyton, the third of that Name, is now living, having ferv'd his King and Country in several military Stations; for, presently after the Restoration, he went with the Earl of Rutherford to Tangier, under whom he serv'd there 'til his Death; and then returning into England, he rode in the Guards in the Lord of Oxford's Regiment; from whence, by the Interest of the late Duke of Leeds, his near Relative, he was preferr'd to be a Lieutenant in Sir John Han-

mer's Company, in the Duke of Buckingbam's Regiment, in which he serv'd at Sea the last Dutch War; and, when that was ended, went into Ireland with the Regiment, 1674. The next Year the Earl of Essex gave him a Company, which he exchang'd for a Commission of Lieutenant of Horse. And, in King James's Reign, when the Lord Tyconnell turn'd out the Protestants, he agreed with his Secretary to surrender to him his Post, upon Payment of the yearly Value of 1001. per Annum for his Life, which he now receives. During the Administration of the late Earl of Rochester, her late Majesty made him Governor of Ross Castle in Kerry; but his Choice determining him to reside at Dublin, he quitted that Post.

He first marry'd—the Daughter of — Numan, and Widow of Mr. Kana O Hara. His second Wise was — the Daughter of — Lloyd of Morton-Hall, in Wales, Fig. and Widow of Richard Barry. His present Wise is Rebecca Williams of Liverpool, Widow of Daniel Tomlinson, Minister. He lives now in Ireland, but has no Issue.

## LIONEL TOLMACH of HELMING-HAM, Esq; Suff. Nº 12.

(May 22, A. D. 1611. R. Jac. 9.)

Notwithstanding Hugh Talmashe, who subscrib'd, about the Reign of King Stephen, to the Charter Sans date, of John de St. John, made to Eve, the first Abbess of Godstow, in Com. Oxon. (a) is the first of the Family I meet with; yet, without doubt, it has flourish'd from the Time of the Conquest; and, in Doomsday-Book, Toedmag (as the Name was then spelt) is said to possess Lands. (\*)

The aforesaid Hugh Talmashe, or another of the same Name, took upon him, in his old Age, the Habit of a Monk at Gloucester; and gave to the Monastery a Moiety of his Town of Hampton, which Peter his Son confirm'd, in the Time

of Hamlin the Abbot. (b).

This Peter gave two Hides in Sack of the Fee of Reginald de St. Wallerie, to the Abbey of Tame, in Com. Bucks. which were confirm'd 11

Henry II. (c)

William Talemasche, with Osbert de Remos, gave Lands in Bentley and Dodenes, to the Priory of Inswich, in Com. Suff. confirm'd to the said Priory 5 70b. (d)

Hugh de Talmache, 25 Edward the Ist, held of the Crown the Manour of Bentley, and the Manour of Aketon, in Com. Suff. (e) by Knight's Service;

vice; William Talemach, in the 29th Year of the Reign of King Edward the Ist, was summon'd, among the Knights in the Counties of Norfolk and Suffolk, to attend the King at Berwick upon Tweed, with Horse and Arms for an Expedition into Scotland. (f)

Sir Peter Talmache, Kt. was the first impanell'd on the Jury, about John de Hasting's claiming the Stewardship of the Liberty of St. Edmondsbury, in Com. Suff. which was try'd by Inquisition before the Escaetor, in the Court of St. Edmond's, 30 Edward the Ist. (g)

John Talmache, temp. Edward the IIId, held the faid Manour of Bentley of the King, by Knight's Service (b); at the same Time Catherine Talmache (his Mother I presume) held half a Knight's Fee

in Bentley, in Capite.

From the said John descended Lionel Talmache of Bentley, Esq, who marry'd Anne, Daughter and Heir to Helmingham of Helmingham, in Com. Suff. (\*) whereby he acquir'd that Inheritance, (which is now the capital Mansion of the Family) and was succeeded therein by

John, his Son and Heir, who marry'd the Daughter and Heir of Roger Louth of Sautrey, in Com. Hunt. and had Issue five Sons and four Daughters;

of which Lionel succeeded to the Estate.

Which Lionel, I Henry the VIIIth was found, by Inqusition, to hold Bentley of the King by Knight's Service. (i) He was High Sheriff of Norfolk and Suffolk 4 Henry the VIIIth, and in the 22d Year of that King, Richard Downs alienated to him the Mansion, Scite, and Precinct, of the late dissolv'd Monastery of Dognashe, and the Manours of Dognashe and Charles, and Lands F 4

in Berghol, Capel, Taddeston, Sutton, Holbrook, Brabame, Weneham, Copdocks, Stratford, Roydon, Ramysden, and Ipswich. (k) 28 Henry the VIIIth, the King granted him the Manour of Wansden, with the Rectory thereof; likewise the Manour and Rectory of Le Church Hey, and the Manours of Buryhall, Wyllows, and Overball, to hold of the Crown by Knight's Service. He departed this Life on or before 7 Edward the VIth, seiz'd (1) inter alia in the County of Suffolk, of the Manours of Dodneyfhe and Charles; together with the Manours of Rumborough, Thorney, Liefnes, and Hyntlesham, call'd the Priory of St. Peter's Manour in Hyntlesham, held of the Crown in Capite, leaving, by Editb his Wife, Daughter and Heir of — Foice of Crekes-Hall, in Helmingbam, Esq. Lionel his Son and Heir.

Which Lionel purchas'd several Estates in the Reign of Queen Elizabeth. In the first Year Thomas Colbre alien'd to him one Messuage in Ecclessome and Monkssome. Thomas Rouse fold him the Manour of Monksome, and Thomas Sturgis the third Part of the Manour of Framsden Anno 11 Eliz. (m) He held a Moiety of four Parts of the Manour of Framsden, with the Appurtenances, and a Moiety of a third Part; likewise forty Messuages, twenty Cottages, &c. in Framsden, Helmingham, Wynston, Depingbam, Pentangle, Thorp, Allfeild, Soham, Coun-I, and Cretingham, juxta Framsden, Monydon, Oteley, and Claxton; and the Manours of Monkisone and Clopton, and the Advowsons of Monkisone and Eccleson; as also the Manours of Bentley, Buryball, Wyllows, and Overball, held likewise of the Queen in Capite. He was knighted by Queen Elizabeth, and deceasing in the 18th Year of her Reign, left, by Dorothy his

his Wife, Daughter to Richard Wentworth of (n) Nettlested, Esq. Lionel, his Son and Heir, aged four-teen Years.

The faid Liouel, 34 Queen Eliz. was High-Sheriff of Norfolk and Suffolk, was afterwards knighted; and, having marry'd Susan, Daughter of Ambrose Jermin of Rushbrook, in Com. Suff. Kt. was succeeded in his Estate by a Son of his own Name,

Lionel Talmach, Esq, who was High-Sheriff of Suffolk in the 6th Year of King James the 1st, and was afterwards advanced to the Degree of a Baronet, at the first Institution of the Dignity A. D. 1611. In the 14th of that King's Reign, he was again High-Sheriff of Suffolk, and having marry'd Catherine, Daughter to Gregory Lord Cromwell, was succeeded in Title and Estate by his Son and Heir

Sir Lionel Talmach, Kt. and Bart. He was knighted in the Life-Time of his Father, and liv'd in great Honour and Esteem in his County. He serv'd in Parliament for the Borough of Orford, the 18th of King James the Ist, and 3d of Charles the 1st, and, by the Lady Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter of John Lord Stanbope of Harrington, had Issue a Son, Lionel, and seven Daughters, Elizabeth marry'd William Lord Allington,—Sir John Mordant, Bart.—Sir Henry Felton, Bart.—Sir Robert Brook of Naction, in Com. Suff. another to Chomley of Vale Royal, in Com. Cest. Esq. another to Sir Nicbolas Bacon of Shurbland, in Com. Suff. Kt. the other dy'd unmarry'd.

Sir Lionel Talmach of Helmingham, Bart. Son and Heir of the last Sir Lionel, marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter and Heir of William Murray, Earl of Dysert, in

that Part of Great Britain call'd Scotland. [She was afterwards second Wife of John Maitland, Duke of Lauderdale. He had Issue by her eleven Children; those arriv'd to Maturity, were three Sons and two Daughters, Elizabeth marry'd Argybald, late Duke of Argyle, and is Mother to the prefent Duke. Catherine was Wife to the Lord Down. eldest Son and Heir of the Earl of Murray; and afterwards marry'd the present Earl of Sunder-Of the Sons, Lionel the eldest, is now Earl of Dylert. Thomas Tolmach was Lieutenant-General of the Forces under his Majesty King William the IIId; and William Tolmach, the youngest, was Captain of a Man of War by Commission from the aforesaid Prince, and dy'd in the West-Indies.

Lieut. Gen. Tolmach aforesaid, was universally admir'd, few, if any, ever having the Happinels to be so much the Darling of all sorts of People: His earlier Years were spent Abroad in Service of his Country, and the honourable Fatigues of a foreign War; and, when he came Home, not all the Allurements of Court-Favours, under King Fames the IId, could tempt him to forfake his Country's Cause, or espouse a Party opposite to her Interests. He stuck close to his Honour, at the Expence of a valuable Employment, and much more valuable Expectations, rather than be a Spectator to those Miseries which were about to exercise his native Land; and afterwards vigoroufly contributed his Affistance at the Revolution, and was firm in his Adherence to it, without being acted by those little Motives of advancing his Fortune or his Figure in the World; esteeming all his Preferments as the Instruments and Opportunities of being more figually and fuccessfully useful to his Country; and, for her Service, was brave in the most dangerous EmerEmergencies, and catch'd at all Opportunities to fignalize his Courage, without forfeiting his Judgment; exposing himself to Danger, whensoever her Honour or Advantage call'd upon him; and, after seventeen Campaigns, seal'd his Tenderness for her, by laying down his Life in her Service. If all the other Actions of his Life were falent, Atblone would speak both his Valour and his Conduct. The unfortunate Expedition against Breft, where he commanded in Chief, and lost his Life, could not be imputed to him; for tho' he had too much Honour directly to oppose it, yet he never entertain'd any Thought of fucceeding; nor could it be suppos'd he should, when the Expedition was the Talk of the Town for several Weeks before he embark'd. His Death was lamented by all, and some thought he fell a Sacrifice to his Enviers.

Lionel, the present Earl of Dysert, Lord Huntingtoper, &c. inherited those Honours, according to the Laws of Scotland. He was elected Knight of the Shire for Suffolk, in three Parliaments call'd by King William; and, on the Succession of her late Majesty Queen Anne, had the Offer of a Baron's Patent the first she would create; but declining that Offer, he was again elected Knight of the Shire for Suffolk, 'til the Act of Union of the two Kingdoms declar'd him a Peer of Great Britain. was, in her late Majesty's Reign, Lord Lieutenant, Cuffos Rotulorum, and Vice-Admiral of the County of Suffolk, likewise High-Steward of the Town of Ipswich. He marry'd Grace, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Thomas Wilbraham of Woodbey, in Cheshire, Bart. and had Issue Lionel, his Son. and Heir, who departed this Life, leaving a Sonand a Daughter, Lionel and --; likewise four Daughters, Elizabeth, Grace, and Catherine, now fiving, and Mary deceas'd.

Sir GERVASE CLIFTON of CLIF-TON, Knight of the Bath. Nott. No 13-

(22 May, A. D. 1611. R. Jac. 9.)

Of this Family, Gervase Holles, Esq. a laborious Antiquary (a) has given a succinct Account to the Death of Sir Gervase Cliston, who was the first created a Baronet; he observes, they took Sir-name from Cliston, a Ville about two Miles distant from Nottingham, which in its Saxon Etimon signifies a Ville situate upon a Rock or shelving Ground, as Sir W. Dugdale rightly observes, (b) and upon a Prominent is this seated (yet in a fertile Soil) at the Foot of which the Trent runneth. Where the Clistons have a noble Seat, from which, assending by many Steps, we rest upon the Top, in a fair Bowling-Green, that yields a most pleasant Prospect, overlooking the Trent, the Town of Nottingham, the Vale of Belvoir, and part of the Forest of Sherwood.

They

They derive themselves from Alvaredus de Clifton, a Knight, said to be living in the Time of William Peverell, the Conqueror's Bastard; and for Proof of this, Alvaredus, and three others of his lineal Posterity, is cited an Authority amongst the Collections of Mr. Seintlow Kniveton, thus render'd in

English:

Memorandum, Alvared Clifton, Kt. Lord of the Manour of Wilford, with the Apurtenences in Demessea of Fee, was Warden of the Castle of Nottingham, in the Time of William Peverell; after whose Death, Sir Robert Clifton, Kt. his Son and Heir, was Lord of the said Manour, and Warden of the said Castle; which Manour and Office Sir Gervase Clifton, Kt. Son and Heir of the said Sir Robert, held all his Life-Time. This Sir Gervase made the outer Ward of the Castle, and made the Castle Mills; likewise dug a Trench from the Trent Water to the said Mills, thro' his own Demessea Lands, as far as Kingis Meadow. Moreover, the said Gervase made a Wear [gurgustum] in his Water of Trent, to feed the said Mills.

In an old Plea-Roll of the Forests, &c. before Geffry Fitz-Peers, Anno 33 Honry the IId, I find Gervase de Cliston amerc'd for his Trespass; the same Person who is mention'd above, in relation

to Nottingbam Castle.

Gerbode de Escalt was Lord of Cliston and Langor, Anno 31 Henry the IId, Parcel of the Honour of Peverell, to which Gerbode succeeded Gerard de Rodes; and he granted to Sir Gervase de Cliston, all his Lands and Tenements in Cliston and Willesford, &c. and all kind of Homages and Services, of his Free-Men and Villains of Cliston, Wilesford, and Brotton, &c. as by an Inspecimes of King Edward the Ist, reciting and confirming the Charter made by Rodes.

Anno

Anno 21 Edward the Ist, we find that Clifton with the Soke, then an Escheat to the King, was of the Honour of Peverell, valu'd at 40 l. per Annum, and Ralph de Rodes held it of the King by the Service of half a Knight's-Fee; so that as Rodes held this Manour immediately of the King, he might grant it about the Beginning of King Folin, to Gervase de Clifton, to hold of himself by particular Services, Anno 5 Joh. a Fine was levy'd betwirt this Gervase de Cliston and Robert de Alvideleg, in Relation to an Agreement that the Son of the said Gervase should marry the Daughter of the said Robert; and therein the faid Gervase and his Sister Ismania, quit Claim all Conventions, and all Charters of Inheritance of the said Robert, which concern'd that Marriage. This Gervase had also a Daughter Cicely, who was the Wife of Roger de Cress, for 3 Job. she being then his Widow, ow'd forty Marks and a Palfrey, to have her reasonable Dower of the Freehold of the said Roger in Nottingham; and that fhe might not be compell'd to marry. It seems it came to a Suit, for, in the same King's Reign, she impleaded William de Cress, (Son of Roger) for Right of her Dower in Hoddesac, Kelum. Pedling, Rampton, Weston. and Marcham: And the said William de Cress, 5 Job. settled upon her, in Consideration of her Dower, half a Knight's-Fee in Melton, with other Lands.

It is conceiv'd, that his Son and Grand-son were both of them nam'd Gervase; for, 20 Henry the IIId, (thirty two Years after the Time last mention'd) there was a Fine levy'd between Gervase de Cliston, (taken for the Son) and Hugh de Bel, concerning two Oxgangs of Land in Wilford. Anno 52 Henry the IIId, Gervase Son of Gervase de Cliston, (the Grand-son) gives one

Mark for a Writ in Com. Not.

To the last Gervase, the Son of Gervase, John the Son of Alfred de Suleney, confirm'd eight Yard Land in Brotton, 6 Edward the Ist. And, in the 9th Year of the same King's Reign, Richard de Einolf, and Isold his Wife, granted him an Oxgang in Willford. This same Gervase was High-Sheriff of the Counties of Nottingbam and Derby, Anno 7, 9, 10, and 11 Edward the Ist; and in 15, 18, 19 Years of that King, he was High-Sheriff of Torkshire. In his Shrivalty of the 18th Year, upon Complaint of John de Carleton, he was committed to Gaol for making a false Return of a Writ. In the 20th of Edward the Ist, a Mandate was issu'd out to the Sheriff of Nottingham and Derby, that he should Attach the said Gervase, to compel him to give his Accompts for the Time, wherein he was Sheriff of Torkshire, at a certain Time appointed; at which Day he came, and accompted accordingly; and the same Year had Allowance for several Sums of Money, which in the 19th, whilst he was Sheriff of Torksbire, he had expended by the King's Command.

The same Gervase de Clifton, (for he liv'd long) I find to be Lord of the Manour of Clifton, cum Membris, in the 9th of Edward the IId; as likewise of Hickeling and Brotton, together with Richard de Grey: But in the 17th of the same King, an Office was found after his Death, wherein he is said to dye seis'd of the Manours of Clifton, Willeford, and Broughton, in the County of Nottingham; leaving Robert de Clifton, the Son of Gervase, his eldest Son, (who dy'd before him) his next Heir, and about twenty five Years of Age; who, the same Year, did his Homage. to the King, as next Cousin and Heir to his Grand-father, and had Seisin of his Lands accordingly. The next Year, it appears by a Fine levy'd

levy'd by the said Robert de Cliston, that he had marry'd his eldest Son Gervase to Margaret, (the Daughter of Robert de Pierpoint) as appears by the Inquisition taken after his Death, being both then very young, and in the Custody of John de Sbirewode. Nor did Robert de Cliston live long after, for we find him dead Anno I Edward the IIId; and his Son Gervase, then sourteen Years of Age, and marry'd to Margaret, the Daughter of

Robert de Pierpoint.

Gervase de Clifton, (the Son of Robert) Anno 10 Edward the IIId, had Liberty of Free-warren granted to him in all his Demesn Lands of Broughton, Sulney, &c. in Com. Not. I find him a Knight Anno 18 Edward the IIId, for then there was a Fine levy'd between Gervase de Clifton, Chevalier, Plaintiff; and Rob. de Vaus, and Amfelice his Wife, Defendants: By which the said Robert and his Wife, granted to the said Gervale and his Heirs, two Parts of the Manour of Normanton upon Sore, for the yearly Rent of 16 l. Sterling. He was High-Sheriff of the Counties of Nottingbane and Derby, Anno 19 Edward the IIId. and the next Year Eschaetor of the same Counties. In the 19th Year of that King it appears, that Robert de Clifton, his Son and Heir, was marry'd; the said Gervase de Clifton, Kt. assuring then, by Fine, the Manour of Broughton, with the Advowfon of the Church of Broughton, upon his Son Robert de Clifton, and Isabel his Wife, and their Heirs. Anno 22 Edward the IIId, he, with John de Vaus, as Knights of the Shire for Nottingham. in the Parliament held at Westminster, had their Wages allow'd: And the 20th Year of the same King, there was a Fine pass'd concerning the Manour of Wilford, between Gervase de Clifton, Chevalier, and Isabella his Wife, and Robert Son of the said Gervase, Plaintiffs, &c.

This Robert his Son, was by Margaret Pierpont his first Wise, and this Isabel his second Wise, was the Daughter of Herbert, alias Finch, and the Widow of William Scot of Braburne, in Kent, as appears by the Epitaph upon her Tomb in that Church. By this last Wise, he had two Daughters, Joan marry d to John Digge, and Isabel the Wise of John Gerningham, as in a MS of Sir Gernale Cliston, Bart. The first of these Matches is prov'd from the aforesaid Monument in Braburne Church; these following being two of the Lines of her Epitaph;

Gervasium Cliston istam genuisse Johannam Sta, lege cui Job. Digge sociatus erat, &c.

To this Sir Gervase Cliston, King Edward the IIId, in the 51st Year of his Reign, grants Liberty, calling him his beloved and faithful Gervase de Cliston, Chevalier, that during his Life he be put upon no Assizes or Juries, and Recognizances whatsoever, neither be Mayor, Sheriss, Eschaetor, Coroner, or any Bailiss, or Servant of the Crown, and its Heirs, against his Will. Dated at Shene, 3 July.

The Word (Mayor) might be purposely inserted, because formerly he had been Mayor of (anterbury.—The last Mention of him, is in a Deed dated 3 R. 2, whereby he grants a Crest to Richard de Bevercotes of Bevercotes, in Com. Not. a knightly Family of great Antiquity. This Grant is seal'd with his Seal of Arms, viz. the Cinquefoils and Lyon rampant, and circumscrib'd thus, Sinis Comment of Circumscrib'd and Comment of Circumscrib'd thus, Sinis Comment of Circumscrib'd and Comment

zill. Gervas. Clifton Mil.

After this, I meet with him no more, nor is it likely he liv'd many Years longer, he being then about fixty eight Years of Age, manifest from his being fourteen Years old at his Father's G. Death,

Death, Anno I Edward the IIId. Neither find I any Thing of his Son Robert, who possibly might die before him; only it is supposed, that the aforementioned Isabel, (Wise of this Robert de Cliston) was the Daughter of——Neville of Rolston, in Com. Nott. for in Cliston Church there is a fair Monument of Free-Stone, raised about a Yard from the Ground; on the Top of which is the Effigies of a Soldier, with his Wise by his Side. There is no Inscription, only two or three fair Escocheons on the Side of the Monument, whereon is impaled Cliston with a fretty Coat, in which is a Canton per pale, and a Ship quarterly, with a Saltire Ermine.

It's farther observ'd, that the last nam'd Sir Gervase Cliston had License from the King, Anno 22 Edward the IIId, to alien in Mortmain eleven Messuages, five Virgats, and one Oxgang of Land, and three Sol-Rents in Stanton in the Wolds and Cliston, with the Advowson of the Church of Stanton to three Chaplains, to celebrate divine Service every Day in the Church of St. Mary of Cliston, for the Health and good Estate of him

the said Gervase and Isabel his Wife.

The next is Sir John Clifton, (Son of Robert) to him King Henry the IVth, by Writ dated the fifth of February, in the first Year of his Reign, granted an Annuity of forty Marks yearly, to be receiv'd of the Sheriff of Nottingham, for his good and faithful Service already done, and hereafter to be perform'd; and having, Anno 4 Henry the IVth, serv'd in the Parliament held at Westmirster, with Sir Richard Stanbop, as Knights of the Shire for Nottingham, had their Wages allow'd for fixty five Days. He was that Yearslain at the Battel of Shrewsbury, fighting on the King's Side against the Piercies; having, as Hollinshed tells us, receiv'd from the King that Morning the Order of Knighthood.

hood, which (if true) must be the Dignity of a Baneret; for 'tis plain from the Record last cited, that he was a Knight before. He marry'd Catherine, Daughter of Sir John Cressey of Hodsack, in the County of Nottingham, Kt. and Sister and Co-heir of Sir Hugh de Cressey, who dy'd in the 9th Year of the same King: The other Sister Elizabeth, was the Wife of John Markham: Between which Families of Cliston and Markham, the Inheritance of Cressey was divided, namely, Haddesoke, with the Soke, viz. Haddesoke, Holme, Woodhouse, Oulecotes, Harmeston, Filixthorp, Stirape, Letwel, and Eildingwells, to Cliston, for their Purparty; and the Manours of Braytost, Risegate, Claypole, Sc. in Lincolnshire, to Markham for his Share.

This Sir John Clifton's Son and Heir was after his own Name, Sir John Clifton, as appears from a Grave-Stone in Clifton Church, which has this Inscription;

Hic jacet Isabella, filia Rob. Franceys de Formarke militis uxor Dom. Johannis Clifton cujus anima propietur Deus.

Upon the Stone are empal'd the Arms of Clifton, viz. Semi de Cinquefoils, a Lyon rampant, with Franceys of Formanke, viz. A Chevron between

tbree Eagles display'd.

The next is Sir Gervase Cliston, whom I take to be Son of the last, but the Records here are Intricate. 23 Henry the VIth, Gervase Cliston was Lieutenant to Humfrey Duke of Gloucester, Constable of Dover Castle. 27 Henry the VIth, the King grants to John, Cardinal-Priest of St. Ballin, and Gervase Cliston, Esq, the Custody of all the Lands late William Horsey's, deceased. Anno 29 Henry the VIth, he was Sheriss of Kent. In the

30 H.6, the King granted to him and John Scott, Esq; the Custody of two Parts of the Mancurs of Skirbecke, Wekes, and Frampton, for twelve Years: and the same Year, to him the said Gervase Clifton, Esq; the Custody of all the Temporals of the Arch-Bishoprick of Canterbury. In the same 30th, I find him to be Treasurer of the Town of Calais, which Office was given him (in Recompence of his good Service) 24 May, 29th of that King, Sir Richard Vernon, his Predecessor in that Office, having deliver'd up his Letters Patent to be cancell'd. In the 36th Year of the same King, I find a Protection granted by him, (feal'd with his Seal of Arms, and circumscrib'd Sigill. Gervas. Clifton militis Thesaurarii, Villa de Cales) to Richard Kingesmelle, of Crowley in the County of Suffex, Yeoman, who was to attend him for the fafe Keeping, Defence, and Victualling of that Garrison. In the 27th Year of that Reign, he was again High-Sheriff of Kent; and it appears, that he had been Treasurer of the King's Houshold; for there is a Warrant in an uncertain Year of that King, directed to the Keeper of the Privy-Seal, commanding him to direct his Letters to the Chamberlains of the Exchequer, to pay to certain Persons the Sum of 460 l. due to them whilst Sir Gervase Clifton, Kt. stood Treasurer of the Houshold. In the 5th of Edward the IVth, he, with Matilda his Wife, late Wife of Robert de Willinghby, granted to Anthony Widevile, Lord Scales, divers Manours in the Counties of Lincoln, Nottingham, Derby, and Warwick, which were lately the Inheritance of Ralph Lord Cromwell. And the Chronicles tell us, that Richard Duke of Tork, in the 18th of Henry the VIth, made Sir Gervase Clifton Captain of Pontboise, near Paris, when the French King besieg'd and took the Town by Asfault, but lost above 3000 Men before it. that

that in the 11th of Edward the IVth, the Monday after the Battel of Tewksbury, Sir Gervase Cliston (who was then taken Prisoner) was beheaded in the Market-Place there, together with Edmund Duke of Somerset, and others.

This most active and fignal Gentleman is believ'd by some of the Family, to be the immediate Ancestor of the Baronets; but 'tis doubted, from an Office found at Nottingham, Anno 32 Henthe IVth, after the Death of Sir Gervase Clifton, Kt. which fays, that the said Gervase dy'd the 8th of December, Anno 32 Henry the VIth; and that Robert Clifton, Esq, is his Son and next Heir, of the Age of thirty Years and better. Offices are found some Months, and sometimes some Years, after the Death of the Deceas'd; but never any Inquisition found the last Person seiz'd to be dead whilst he was yet living. Besides, Robest Clifton (Son and Heir of that Sir Gervase Clifton of Nottinghamshire, after whose Death this last mention'd Office is found) was High-Sheriff of that County, Anno 29 and 38 of Henry the VIth, and 7 Edward the IVth, at which Time he was a Knight. And the Office found after his Death says, that he dy'd in the 18th Year of that King, leaving Gervase Clifton his Son and Heir, about forty Years of Age. So that upon these Circumstances there were two several Persons of the same Name of Sir Gervase Clifton living together, temp. Henry VI. That he of Clifton (and our Ancestor) was the same of whom. Anno 32 Henry the VIth, that Office was found. That the other (who was the Soldier, and lost his Head for the Cause of the Lancastrians) was fome Cadet, most likely descended from that Sir Gervase which marry'd Scott's Widow in the Days of Edward the IIId, because this last wrote himself of Braburne in Kent.

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It is plain there was a Sir Gervase Clifton of Clifton, temp. Henry VI, and that Robert Clifton was his Son and Heir, who was High-Sheriff of Nottingham and Deiby, Anno 29 and 38 Hemy the VIth. And after, in the 7th of Edward the IVth, Robert Clifton, Kt. is mention'd then as late Sheriff of Nottingham and Derby. To this Sir Robert Clifton, and Gervise Clifton, his Son and Heir, King Edward the IVth, in the 16th Year of his Reign, granted License to found a College in the Chapel of the Trinity, within the Parish-Church of St. Mary of Clifton, to the Honour of God and the bleffed Virgin, pro uno Custode & duobus Capellanis, to celebrate divine Service every Day for the good Estate of the said King, and Elizabeth his Queen, whilst they liv'd, and for their Souls after their Decease; and for the good Estate of the said Sir Robert Clifton and Gervale, &c. and for the Soul of William Booth, late Arch-Bishop of Tork, and for the Souls of Dame Alice Clifton, late Wife of the said Robert, and of Seth Worsley, Esq. &c. dated at Nottingham Castle 22 July. This Alice his Wife, was Daughter of John Booth, Esq., and Sister of the Arch-Bishop, as appears by the following Inscription upon her Monument in Clifton Church.

Hic jacet Dom. Alicia Clifton, filia Johannis Booth, Armig. Soror bona memoria Dom. Will. Booth quond. Ebor. Archiep. & uxor Dom. Rob. Clifton mil. Qua objit novem die Septemb. Anno Dom. 1470. cujus, &c.

Sir Robert Clifton dy'd 9 April 1478, seiz'd (as appears by the Office found after his Decease) of the Manour of Clifton-Willeford, (with the Advowsons of those Churches) and Haddesoke with the Soke, leaving Gervase Clifton his Son and Heir, above

above forty Years of Age; and that he had another Son Robert Clifton, who was Arch-Deacon of the East-Riding, in Com. Ebor. He lies bury'd at Clifton, with this Inscription upon his Grave-Stone:

Orate pro anima Rob. Clifton, militis fundatoris tertius Capellanor. Collegii in bac Eccles. qui obiit novem die Aprilis, Anno Dom. 1478.

Gervofe Clifton, his Son and Heir, was High-Sheriff of Nottingbam and Derly, 11 and 17 E. 4. And the same King (having made him [his trusty and well-belov'd 'Squire Gervase Clifton, Receiver-General of all his Lordthips in the Counties of Nottingham and Deiby, by several Letters Patent; and · Steward of his Manours and Lordships of Gedling, She'ford, and Stoke-Bardolfe; and Surveyor of his Works and Reparations in his Castle of Nottingham, and of his Repairs in his Lodges of Bestwood Park and Clipston) ailigns certain Persons, in the 20th Year of his Reign, to take up his Accompts. 22 Edward the IVth, that King ordains the said Gervase Sheriff of the Counties of Nottingham and Derby, and affigus him 100 l. out of the Exchequer, for the better sustaining of his Charge in that Office. Anno 1 Richard the IIId, he was made one of the Knights of the Bath at the Coronation. And the same King, in the same Year, grants to him and his Heirs Males, for his fingular and faithful Service done heretofore, not only in favouring his Right and Title, &c. the Manour or Lordship of Ratcliffe upon Sore, with Lands in Kingston, in the County of Nottingham, and Lands in Kegworth in the County of Leicester, being the Forfeitures of Hen-19 Stafford, Duke of Buckingbam; and the Manour or Lordship of Overton Longvile, in the County

of Huntingdon, with the Advowson of that Church, late the Inheritance and Forfeiture of Sir Richard Tocotes; and the Manour or Lordship of Dalbury, and Dalbury-Lees, with the Advowson of that Church, and other Lands in Etwall and Wirkesworth, in Com. Derby; the Inheritance before of Henry late Duke of Exon, to hold of that

King by Knight's Service, &c.

Sir John Beaumont (in his Poem of Bosworth-Field) faith, he was slain there, fighting on Richard's Side, against the Earl of Richmond, (after King Henry the VIIth;) and that Biron (being his Friend, but of the other Party) procur'd the Conqueror to restore his Lands to his Son. But 'tis plain he was not flain there, and probably did not serve there; or if he did, it was on the other Side, repenting that he had adher'd to the Usurper; for not long after the Beginning of King Henry the VIIth's Reign, we find him not only entrusted, but rewarded by him, being in his third Year made Sheriff of the Counties of Nottingham and Derby; and the same Year having granted him the Custody of the Manours of Carleton in Lindrike, and King from in Carleton, being then in the King's Hands, by reason of the Minority of George Lord Fitz-Hugh; and that he dy'd in the 6th Year of the same King, in the House of the Fryers Predicants in London, and was bury'd in Clifton Church, as appears from this following Inscription upon a flat Marble there:

Orate pro Anima Gervassii Cliston, Militis, Filii & Heredis Roberti Cliston, Militis, Fundatores Collegii de Cliston, finiti & stabiliti per Dominum Gervassum, qui obiit in domo Fratrum Predicatorum apud London, 12° Die Maii, Anno 1491. cujus Corpus abinde per Agnetem Filiam Roberti Constable de Flamburgh, Militis, secundam

dam Uxorem ejus dem Gervassi, & alios ejus Executores, juxta voluntatem suam, issue bonorisice & decenter conductum suit, & sub boc Lapide marmoreo bumatus; cujus Anima propitietur Deus—Pro cujus quidem Agnetis prosperitate dum vixerit, & pro cujus Anima cum ab bac luce migraverit, speciales ordinantur Memoria & Orationes per Gardianum & Capellanos Collegii pradicti, juxta Compositionem & Statuta inde ordinata, perpetuis suturis Temporibus devote sacienda.

The Inquisition, after his Death, taken at Blitbe, the 30th of October, Anno 7 Henry the VIIth, says, That he dy'd the 12th Day of May last past, (which was in the 6th Year of that King) and Robert Clifton, Clerk, was his Son and Heir, and above thirty Years old at the Death of his Father.

Of this Robert Clifton I hear no more, but upon Tradition, that being pioufly devoted, he became a Secular Priest, dy'd unmarry'd, and gave his temporal Estate to his younger Brother Gervase Clifton, afterwards knighted; for he was made Knight of the Bath by King Henry the VIIth, in the 10th Year of his Reign, at the Time he created his second Son, Henry, Duke of Tork. In the 14th Year of that King, Robert Wield gave to Sir Gervase Clifton, Kt. and John de St. Andrew, Esq, all his Lands in Bovington, juxta Sutton; and in the 17th of Henry the VIIth, he was made Sheriff of the Counties of Nottingham and Derby. I meet with him no more after; but it appears by Inquifition taken after his Son's Death, in the 9th of King Henry the VIIIth, that Robert Clifton was his Son and Heir; and that he had a younger Son, Hugh Clifton, and tho' not mention'd in the Inquifition, he had another Son, Gervale Clifton, who was of the Custom-House at the Port of London, and was Father of Sir Gervase Cliston, summon'd to Parliament as a Baronet of the Realm, the 6th of James the Ist, by the Title of Lord Cliston of

Leighton-Brom wold.

Of his Son Robert I find no Mention at all in Record, until the Office found after his Death; yet did he, by his Marriage, add the greatest Lustre of Nobility to his Family; for he marry'd Anne, Daughter to Henry Lord Clifford, and Sister to Henry, the first Earl of Cumberland, who, thro' the Lines of Clifford, Percy, and Mortimer, was lineally descended from Lionel Plantagenet, Duke of Clarence, third Son of that victorious Monarch King Edward the IIId. She was marry'd, after his Death, to Robert Melford— This Robert Clifton dy'd a young Man, the 3d of September, the 9th of Henry the VIIIth, leaving Gervase Clifton his Son and Heir, not two Years old, as appears by the Inquisition taken at Nottingham.

Which Gervase Clifton was of full Age, and su'd out his Livery in the 28th Year of Henry the In the 33d Year of that Reign, the King grants to his Servant, Sir Gervale Clifton, Kt. for the Sum of 651 l. 5s. his Manour of Armyn, in the County of Tork, late belonging to the dissolv'd Monastery of the Virgin Mary in Tork, to him, his Heirs and Assigns for ever. Anno 34. the same King grants him the Ward and Marriage of Gervase Boswell; and Anno 38 Henry the VIIIth, the Ward and Marriage of Thomas Fairfax. were his Rewards for his Court-Service: As to his civil Employments, he was Justice of the Peace, and Quorum, the most Part of his long Life; and I find him Sheriff of Nottingbam and Derby in the last Year of Henry the VIIIth, and again the first of the Reign of Queen Mary; and after, of Nottingbam alone, in the 13th of Queen Elizabeth.

He had likewise several military Employments; for he ferv'd under King Hemy the VIIIth, at the Siege of Bulloigne, and was knighted, says Hollinfeed in his Chronicles, at Muscleburgh by the Duke of Somerset, in the Reign of King Edward the VIth. It is likely he was there, but 'tis manifest he was knighted in the Days of King Henry the VIIIth. Anno 2 Eliz. A. D. 1560, he serv'd at the Siege of Leith in Scotland, under the Lord Grey; and upon Notice of the Peace concluded, Sir Genvale Clifton was fent into the Trenches, on the West Side of Leith. to command the Soldiers to forbear Hostility; and the next Day (the 7th of June) he was sent into the Town, with Sir Francis Leke, to cause the Peace to be proclaim'd, where he was feasted by Monfieur Doysel, the Governor.

Notwithstanding this martial Inclination, he was a Gentleman of a most courteous and accostable Disposition; so that he was usually stil'd, and is remember'd to this Day, by the Name of Sir Gervase the Gentle, which Character, they say, Queen Elizabeth gave him, if this Distich was hers, (which Tradition affirms) of sour of her

Nottinghamshire Knights.

Gervase the Gentle, Stanhop the Stout, Marcham the Lyon, and Sutton the Lout.

He was twice marry'd, first to Mary, Daughter to Sir John Nevile of Cheet, in Com. Ebor. Kt. by whom he had five Children, viz. Elizabeth, the first Wife of Peter Freschevile of Staveley, Esq, Frances, Robert, Gervase, and Anthony, which four last dy'd young, unmarry'd: Their Names and Statues are all on the right Side of his Tomb, and in Cliston Church. The second Wife of Sir Gervase Cliston, was Winisted, Daughter and Heir to William Thraytes of Owlton, in the County of Susfolk,

folk, Esq, who brought him George Clifton, his Heir apparent, who marry'd Winifride, the Daughter of Sir Anthony Thorold. He dy'd before his Father, I August 1587, leaving his Wise with Child of Sir Gerusse Clifton, who was created Baronet, himself being, at the Time of his Death, but twenty Years and seven Months old, as appears upon his Monument.

Sir Gervase Chiston, his Father, dy'd in the same Year 1587, on the 20th of January next following, as we may see upon his stately Monument,

which bears this Inscription:

Here lye the Bodies of Gervase Clifton of Clifton, in the County of Nottingham, Kt. and Dame Mary his first Wise, Daughter of Sir John Nevile of Cheete, in the County of Tork, Kt. And of Dame Winifride his second Wise, Daughter and Heyre of William Thranges of Owlton, in the County of Suffolk, Esq. which Dame Mary deceased the 10th of April, Anno 1564. And the said Gervase deceased the 20th Day of January, Anno 1587. And the said Dame Winifride deceased

The faid Sir Gervase, at the Time of his Death, left his Grand-son and Heir, but sour Months and eleven Days old, as we may see by the Office found for him. Which Sir Gervase Cliston, the Grand-son was made Knight of the Bath, at the Coronation of K. James 1, and afterwards accepted of the Title of a Baronet. He was a Gentleman every Way worthy of his ancient Extraction and deferving Ancestors, having liv'd with as much Lustre and Love in his Country, as any in his Time; being of a Nature like his Grand-sather, most affable and courteous; of a Disposition most Noble; of good Erudition; and throughout the long

long and unnatural Rebellion, temp. Car. I, of a most unshaken and unsully'd Loyalty to his lawful Sovereign. For one Thing he was more remarkable, (having in that gone beyond any of our Nation, as yet heard of;) he had fix Wives, and marry'd a seventh when he was near seventy Years old. His first two were Earls Daughters; his two second, grave Widows; and the last Couple, young Gentlewomen: But in particular, his first Lady was Penelope, Daughter to Robert Rich, Earl of Warwick, she dy'd 26 October 1613; he had by her Gervase, his eldest Son, who marry'd and dy'd without Issue. By his second Lady Frances. Daughter of Francis Clifford, Earl of Cumberland, he had Issue Clifford Clifton, and four Daughters; Margaret, marry'd first to Sir John South, secondly, to William Witchcot, Esq, thirdly, to Robert Lord Hunsdon. Elizabeth was Wife of Richard Tempell, Esq. and secondly to Anthony Eyre, Esq. Aide, to Sir Francis Rhodes; and Lettice, to Clifton Rhodes, Esq. This Lady dy'd November 22, 1627. aged thirty three Years. The third was Mary, Daughter of John Egiock of Egiock, in Com. Wigorn, Esq. Widow of Sir Francis Leake of Sutton, in Com. Derby, and dy'd January 19, 1630. fourth was Isabel, Daughter of -Meek, Relict of John Hodges, Aklerman of London, bury'd at Clifton, (as were also his other Ladies) July 10, 1637. The fifth was Anne, Daughter of Sir Francis South, of Lincolnshire, Kt. bury'd at Clifton 1 June, 1639. The fixth was Jane, Daughter of Anthony Eyre of Rampton, Esq. (by whom was Robert Clifton, who marry'd Sarab, Daughter of Nathaniel Parkburst of Woodford, in Esfex, Esq; Charles, who dy'd unmarry'd; and Jane, Wife of Christopher Pack of Coates, in Com. Leic. Esq.) she dy'd at London, and was bury'd at Clifton the 17th of March 1655. The seventh Wife of Sir Gervale.

Gervase, was Alice, Daughter of Henry Earl of Huntingdon, who surviv'd her Husband, but dy'd the same Year, and was bury'd in St. Giles's Church, London, 1666. In the Chancel of Clifton, by the Side of the Vault, is a noble Mausoleum for those of his Ladies bury'd at Clifton; and himfelf deceasing, June 28, 1666, in the 80th Year of his Age, was bury'd with his Ancestors, the 2d of August, with great Pomp, attended by the Heralds of the College of Arms; and a very curious Monument is erected to his Memory over the Door into the Vault, containing, A Buflo of bimself, within seven Escutcheons Baron and Femme, fet circular between two Pillars, with Entabliture and oven Pediment, with an Acroster of the Arms and Quarterings manteled and cressed; at the Bottom is an Inscription, Hic intus cum Partibus & Uxoribus, &c. which are there specify'd, as we have already mention'd. He was succeeded in the Dignity by his eldest Son,

Sir Gervase Cliston, Bart. who marry'd Sarah, Daughter of Sir Thomas Pusey of Celston, Esq, of the ancient Family of the Puseys, in Com. Bucks; and dying the 14th of January 1675, his Nephew

succeeded, who was

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Sir William Clifton, Bart. aged then about 15 Years, Son and Heir to Sir Clifford Clifton, Kt. by Frances, Daughter of Sir Hencage Finch, Kt. Recorder of London; which Sir Clifford was another Son of Sir Gervase Clifton, Kt. and Bart. and had Issue also two Daughters, Catherine, marry'd to Sir John Parsons, Bart. and Arabella, to Sir Francis Wheeler, Kt. one of the Admirals under K. William, who was unfortunately cast away near Cadiz. The said Sir William Clifton dying unmarry'd, was succeeded in Title and Estate by his Cousin, the present Sir Gervase Clifton, Bart. eldest Son of Robert Clifton, Esq, another Son of Sir Gervase Clifton,

Clifton, Kt. and Bart. by his fixth Wife Jane,

Daughter of Anthony Eyre, Esq.

Which Sir Gervase now resides at Cliston, and hath marry'd Anne, Daughter of Dudley Bagnall, of the Neury, in the Kingdom of Ireland, Esq. [which Family is now the only remaining Branch of those two samues Brothers, Sir Samuel and Sir Henry Bagnall, who were sent into Ireland by Queen Elizabeth, the first with the Title of Marshal of that Kingdom; and the latter distinguish'd himself very eminently at the taking of Cadiz, where he receiv'd eight Wounds, and cover'd with Blood, was then knighted] by whom he hath Issue six Sons, Robert, William, Dudley, Alfred, George, and Gervase, and one Daughter, Jane, all living unmarry'd, 1713.

# Sir Thomas Gerard of Bryn, Kt. Lanc. N° 14.

(May 22, A. D. 1611. R. Jac. 9.)

As it was the Custom, in ancient Times, for Persons to assume Sir-names from their Possissions, Offices, &c. so did they likewise frequently vary the same in After-Ages. Hence is it we often meet with several Families of different Appellation, descended from one common Ancestor, as will, among others, evidently appear in the following Account.

Walter Fitzother, at the Time of the general Survey by William the Conqueror, was Castellan of Windsor, Warden of the Forests in Berkshire, and posses's several Lordships in the Counties of Middlesex, Hants, and Bucks; (a) that Dominus Otherus

held in the Time of Edward the Confessor.

William, the eldest Son of that Walter, took the Sir-name of Windsor from his Father's Office, and was Ancestor to the Lords Windsor, (b) whose Heir is the present Earl of Plymonth; and from Gerald, Brother to that William, the Gerards, and many

other Families, are lineally descended.

The said Gerald is sometimes sir-nam'd de Windfor, and also Fitz-Walter, (i. e.) Son of Walter; the
latter Cambden stiles him, mentioning, that King
Henry the Ist gave him Molesford, in Com. Berks;
(c) and that the Carews, as well of England as
Ireland, descended from him. He was Castellan of
Pembroke, which Castle he fortify'd and desended
with great Courage against the Welsh; and having
stain Oen, Son of Cadugan ap Blethyn, chief Lord

of Cardigan-shire, was made Pesident of the County of Pembrook. He had by Nessa his Wife, Daughter of Rees, Son of Theodore the Great Prince of South-Wales, three Sons, William, Maurice, and David; the latter was Bishop of St. David's, A. D.

1148, and dy'd 1176.

Maurice Fitz-Gerald, the second Son, was one of the Adventurers with Richard Strongbow, Earl of Pembrook, in the Conquest of Ireland; and with Robert Fitz-Stephen, his half Brother, 130 Soldiers, and 300 Foot-Archers, landed at Bauvan, A. D. 1619, took Weisford, (a) and by their Valour open'd the Way for subjecting that Dominion to the Crown of England: The said Maurice setling there. became the Ancestor to several great and noble Families, which flourish'd in that Kingdom, particularly to the Earls of Kildare, Primier Earls of that Realm; a younger Branch of which are the Earls of Defmond, (third Earl of the said Kingdom) the last of which was Gerald Fitz-Gerald, the eleventh Earl of Desmond, who had vast Possessions, and many Castles, with Kerry, a County-Palatine, a Number of Vasfals, and of his Kindred and Sir-name above 500 Gentlemen, with which Power (being encourag'd by the Pope and the Spaniards) he rais'd great Commotions in the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, and ruin'd himself and almost his whole Kindred.

William Fitz-Gerald, eldest Son of Gerald, was possessed of the Castle of Karriu, or Carrio, in South-Wales, the Inheritance of his Mother; and 12 Henry the IId, held in England, in Com. Bucks, two Knights-Fees in Hermitage, (b) as also the Manour of Sperselt. He, and Odo his Son, gave the Village of Redbard, distant a Mile from Caren-Castle, to the Knights-Templers, (c) and dy'd 1173.

From this Odo, who had the faid Castle of Karriu. Carrio, or Carew as now written, the numerous Family of the Carews descend, as we shall farther shew in this Work. From Raymund, another of the Sons of the said William, sometimes call'd Crassus, a principal Sharer in the Conquest of Iraland, who had a natural Son nam'd Maurice, the Lords Fitz Maurice of Kerry, in Ireland, derive themselves, the said Raymund having no Issue by his Wife Basilia, Daughter to Richard Strongbow, Earl of Pembrook. Silvefter, Henry, and William, were other Sons of the aforesaid William Fitz-Gerald; the latter is the direct Ancestor to this Family of Gerard, that we are to treat of. (d) He was Justice in Eyre, in Com. Cestr. and was Father of that William who marry'd Emme, eldest Daughter and Co-heir to Sir Richard King fley de King fley, in Com. Ceft; Kt. and of Joan his Wife, Daughter and Co-heir of Alex. de Stanton; whose Mother Annabella, was Daughter and Heir of Randolph Silvester, 18 E. 1. The said William Gerard, 16 E. 1, was one of the Jury on the Death of Sir Hamon Mally of Dunbam-Masty: He left Issue two Sons, William and John. · William, the eldest, marry'd Matilda, Daughter to Henry de Glasebouse; did Homage to Edward Earl of Chester, afterwards King E. 2. for his Lands in Chester, and dy'd at Eton-Hall 26 E. 3. left Issue two Sons, William and Thomas Gerrard. The faid Thomas had Crewood, and divers Lands in King fley-Crouton and Bradley, by Gift of his Father, which were confirm'd to him by his Brother, 23 E. 3. From him the Gerrards of Crew, in Cheshire descended, that is now ended in an Heiress, marry'd to Edward Norris of Speake, in Com. Lanc. Esq. William, the elder Brother, was aged thirty Years (\*) at his Father's Death; and by Marriage

riage with the Daughter and Heir of Peter de Bryn, or Brynbill, in Com. Lanc. became possess'd of that Estate, which he lest to his Son Sir Peter Gerard de Bryn, who dy'd 4 Ric. 2. leaving Thomas, his eldest Son, Heir to the Estate at Bryn; to Peter, his second Son, he lest Kingsley; and John, his third Son, marrying Helen, only Daughter and Heir to Richard de Ince, (the intended Wise of Thomas, his elder Brother, then engag'd in the Wars against the Scots) became possess'd of that Estate; and from them the noble Family of the Gerards, Barons of Gerards Bromley, the late Earls of Macclessield, the Gerards of Flambords, Barts, and other Branches, are descended.

The faid Thomas, the eldest Son, was knighted in the Scottish Wars, having valiantly behav'd himself, and brought considerable Succours to that Service. 17 Ric. 2, being then a Knight, he serv'd in Parliament for Lancashire, (\*) and lest Issue

Sir Thomas Gerrard, Kt. who receiv'd a Commission from H. 4. as Duke of Lancaster, to appear at Shrewsbury with able Men, [Homines defensibiles.] The said Sir Thomas left Issue a Son of his one Name, the 1st of H. 5, who attended that Prince in his glorious Wars against France; and John Gerrard, to whom a Commission of Array was sent by the said King. The last Sir Thomas Gerard, Kt. 16st Issue Sir Thomas Gerrard, Kt. 13 H. 6, who was likewise in the Wars against France, and dying without Issue,

Sir Thomas Gerard of Kingsley, became his Heir, (who was Great Grand son to Peter Gerard of Kingsley before-mention'd) who was living temp. H. 4; and marrying Isabel, Daughter to Thomas Strangeways, Esq, had Issue John, who dy'd 10 H.6, Father to Peter,

who deceas'd 4 H. 7, Father to Sir Thomas Gerard last nam'd, aged 14 Years, Anno 18 H. 7. (†)

Which Sir Thomas marrying Dowse, Daughter to Sir Thomas Ashton of Underlyne, in Com. Lane. Kt. had Issue by her, Peter, who marry'd Margaret, Daughter of Sir William Stanley, Kt. and Heir to her Mother, Margaret, Daughter and Heir to Sir John Bromley of Bromley, in Staffordshire, Kt. but dying before his Father, A.D. 1492, 8 H. 7, was bury'd with his Ancestors, in their Chapel adjoining to the Parish Church of Winwick, and a Monument erected to his Memory, is yet remaining. The faid Peter left Issue Sir Thomas Gerard, and four Daughters, Joan, Wife to Richard Done of Uskington, in Cheshire, Isabel marry'd Richard Langton, stild Baron Walton and Newton, in Lancashire; the third Daughter marry'd Will. Ratcliff of Wimber ly; and the fourth, John Southworth of Sam/bury, Efgrs.

Sir Thomas Gerard succeeded his Grand-sather Sir Thomas, in the Estates of Bryn and Kingsley, he brought considerable Succours of his Tenants and Archers out of Brindall, to the Assistance of Thomas Earl of Surry, against the Scots, who, Anno 1513, enter'd Northumberland, whilst King H. 3 was busy in his Wars in France. At Flodden-Field both Armies engaging, Sir Thomas behav'd himself with great Valour; and to the Lancashire Archers, the Fame of that great Victory is generally own'd, wherein the King of Scotland was slain; and the principal of his Nobility and Gentry had the same

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Fate, or were taken Prisoners.

This Sir Thomas, by Margaret his Wife, Daughter of Sir Edmund Trafford of Trafford, in Com. Lanc. Kt. Widow first to —— Longford, secondly, to Sir John Port; had Issue by her Thomas, his Son and Heir, and sour Daughters, Margaret, Wife

to Peter Legh of Lyme, in Com. Cestr. Catharine, Wife to Thomas Houghton of Houghton-Tower; Elizabeth, Wife of Richard Bold of Bold; and Wife to Richard Ashton of Middleton, in Com. Lanc. Esquires.

Thomas, Son and Heir of the last Sir Thomas, receiv'd also the Honour of Knighthood; was Knight of the Shire for Lancashire, 8th and 9th Years of Q. Eliz. and one of the Principal of the Committee of 30 Members, to confult with a Committee of 30 Lords, (\*) to make Suit to her Majesty, touching her Marriage and Declaration of a Successor. He marry'd Jane, Daughter of Sir Peter Legb of Lyne, and was High-Sheriff A. D. 1548. They left Issue Sir Thomas Gerard, Kt. who was High-Sheriff of Lancashire 1553 and 1558; and was one of the Commissioners for the Subsidy in the Year 1553, with Edward Earl of Derby, Sir Richard Molineux of Sefton, Sir Peter Legb, Sir John Holecroft, Sir John Atherton, and Sir William Norris: He marry'd Elizabeth, eldest Daughter of Sir John Port of Etwall, in Derbyshire, Kt. Earl of Huntington, marry'd Dorothy the second. Daughter; and Sir Thomas Stanbope (Ancestor to the present Earl of Chestersield) Margaret, the third Daughter, at Bryn, Co-heiresses to the said Sir John Port, who was Founder of the Hospital of Etwall, and the Free-School of Repton in the said County; of which faid Hospital and School, worth above 5001. per Ann. the said three Families are Governours, by the last Will and Testament of the said Sir John Port, and by Letters Patent granted by King Jam. 1. The faid Sir Thomas Gerard was cast into the Tower twice, being accus'd of a Design to deliver the Queen of Scots out of her Confinement; and was forc'd, to procure his own Liberty, to give the noble Estate of the Bromley's, descend-H 2

descended to him by his Great Grand-mother, to his Kinsman, then Attorney-General, Sir Gilbert Gerard, afterwards Master of the Rolls, and give away and Mortgage feveral Lordships in Leicestershire, Derbyshire, Cheshire, and Torkshire, besides Brindall, Scormensdale, and half Kirkby in Lancashire. The said Sir Thomas Gerard left Issue Sir Thomas Gerard, Kt. and John Gerard, who was several Times tortur'd in the Tower; out of which he made his Escape, and was chiefly instrumental in building the College at Liege, where he dy'd in Opinion of great Sanctity. The faid Sir Thomas Gerard, Kt. was created a Baronet at the first Institution of that Honour, Anno 1611, 9 Fac. The 1000l. which he was to have given for it, was return'd, in Consideration of his Father's great Sufferings upon the Queen of Scots Account, Mother to the faid King, a Grant for perpetuating the Sheriffdom of Lanc. in his Family, and some other beneficial Grants were promis'd him; but not perform'd, being alledg'd to be against the Liberty of the Subject. He marry'd Cecily, Daughter of Sir Walter Mainey of Kent, and had Issue Sir Thomas Gerard, Kt. in his Father's Life-Time, who marry'd Frances, Daughter of Sir Richard Molineux of Sefton, Kt. and Bart. and a Daughter, Frances, Wife to Ralph Standish of Standish, Esq.; The last Sir Thomas Gerard had Issue Sir William Gerard, Bart. Richard Gerard, Gilbert, Peter, Thomas, and John, with a Daughter Frances, who took a religious Habit at Graveling in Flanders.

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Sir William Gerard marry'd Flizabeth, Daughter of Sir Cuthbert Clifton of Lytham, Kt. and just before the unfortunate breaking out of the Civil Wars, he fold Etwall in Derbyshire, the only remaining Part of his Great Grand-mother Elizabeth Port's large and fair Estate, for an intended Purchase of the whole Manour of Newton in Lancabire;

cashire; but the Sum design'd for that End, being 10000 l. was spent in the King's Service; the greatest Part of which was given to the Marquess of Worcester, and the Earl of Desby, for that Use; the said Sir William Gerard was Governor of Denby Castle, one of the last in the Kingdom which held out for the King; his Estate was sequester'd, which he was forc'd to purchase from the Parliament.

Richard Gerard, the second Son, born in Offober 1613; at the Age of twenty one, was one of those that went first into Maryland with Mr. Calvert, the Lord Baltimore's Uncle, Lord Proprietor thereof, where he continu'd 'til the latter End of the Year 1635, and then return'd for England, where he then continu'd 'til the Year 1638; at what Time he rais'd a Company of Foot, with which he went into the Service of the King of Spain in the Low Countries, and continu'd in that Service 'til the breaking out of civil Wars in England; when the then Queen of England coming over into Holland, to her Son-in-Law the Prince of Orange, to obtain some Succours from him, he then quitted the Spanish Service, and came to the Queen at the Hague, where her Majesty was pleas'd to order him to raise a Regiment of Foot Guards, whereof he was to be Lieutenant Colonel; and coming over into England with her said Majesty, landing at Burlington-Bay, he immediately repair'd to the then Earl of Newcastle, from whom he received his Commission as Lieutenant Colonel of the said Regiment, dated the 16th of March 1642; and then marching with her Majesty to Oxford, in his Way was order'd to attack the Town of Burton upon Trent, then garrison'd by the Parliament; and being join'd by a Party of Horse, under the Command of Sir Thomas Tyllesy, the Town was attack'd by the Horse over the Bridge, and H 4

by the Foot thro' the River, in which he receiv'd a Shot thro' his Thigh, notwithstanding the Town was carry'd: After which, he continu'd his March to Oxford, where a long Time he lay ill of his faid Wound, so that he was not able to take the Field again 'til the second Newbery-Battel, where he then commanded the Reserve, consisting of the Regiment of Guards and Hawkins; and upon the Surrender of Oxford, he had the Benefit of those Articles. Waiting upon his Majesty when he was Prisoner at ——, he was the last Person sent by his Majesty to his Queen, then in France. Upon the happy Restoration of King Charles 2, in May 1660, the first of January after, he was fworn Cup-bearer in ordinary, and Waiter to the then Queen-Mother, in which Office he continu'd 'til her Majesty's Death. He departed this Life the 5th of September 1686, at Ince, which Estate he had purchas'd, and lies bury'd in the Parish-Church of Wigan, in the Chancel belonging to the Family. He marry'd two Wives, 1. Frances, Daughter of Sir Ralph Hanfly of Tickebill Castle, in the County of Tork, Kt. by whom he had a Son, who dy'd in his Infancy. 2. Fudith. Daughter to Sir Nicholas Steward of Pateshall, in the County of Northampton, Esq, by whom he had fix Sons, Thomas and Richard living; William, Nicholas, John, and Charles dy'd: And three Daughters. Frances dy'd Abbess of Gaunt in Flanders; Anne a Nun, at Liege; and Julima dy'd in her Infancy.

Thomas Gerard of Ince, and Aspul, his eldest Son, has six Daughters and four Sons now living; and Richard Gerard, his second Son, has Issue one Son

and two Daughters.

Sir William last mention'd had Issue Sir William Gerard; Thomas Gerard, who was a Captain, and asterwards religious; John Gerard, who marry'd the Heiress of Ince, and Frances, Wise to Frances Howard of Corby, Esq. Sir

Sir William Gerard, the eldest Son, marry'd Anne Presson, eldest Sister of Sir Thomas Presson of Mannor, (whose eldest Daughter and Coheir Mary, marry'd the Lord Montgomery; and Anne, the second Daughter, is Wise to the Lord Clissord) and by her had Issue the present Sir William Gerard, Thomas, John, and Francis, who dy'd young: And six Daughters, Mary, Elizabeth, Anne, (who marry'd Charles Waterton of Walton, in the County of Tork, Esq.) Bridget, Frances, and Winifred. The second Wise to the late Sir William Gerard, was Mary Mostin, Sister of Sir Edward Mostin of Talacre, Bart. and Widow of James Pool, Esq. she is now living.

The present Sir William Gerard, marry'd Mary, second Daughter of John Cansfield of Cansfield, Esq, and Elizabeth his Wife; she (by the Death of her elder Sister Anne, Widow and Relict of Richard Sherburn of Stonyburst, Esq.) became sole Heiress to her Father's Estate, as also to her Mother's, who was Daughter to James Anderton of Bireblay, Esq. Her Grand-father, Sir John Cansfeld, hehav'd himself with great Courage and Bravery in the late Civil Wars; and King Charles Lowns the Prefervation of his own Life, and that of his Son the Prince of Wales, at the second Newbery Battel, in a great Measure due to his Valour. as appears from a Testimonial in Latin, under the Hand of that pious King, now in the Cuftody of the faid Sir William Gerard. Which Sir William and his Lady, were both born the 22d of Tune: he in 1662, and she in 1671. They had first three Daughters, Anne, Mary, and Elizabeth; and fince, three Sons, William, John, and Thomas.

Astons of Cheshire, or whether they were originally of the County of Stafford, and took their Name from the Town of Aston, or Astony, in that County, is not determin'd; Camden mentions them, for Kindred and Antiquity, to be one of the best in Staffordshire. (a) Another Author (b) gives this Account of them; A more noble Family, (says he) measuring on the Level of stateand inadvantag'd Antiquity, is not to be met with; they have ever born a good Respect to the Church and learned Men, and not without suff Reason, seeing Roger de Moland, Bishop of Litchfield, in the Reign of King H. 2, gave Heywood in this County, to Roger de Aston. (c)

The said Roger was Son of Ralph de Astona, or de Æstona, as written 28 E. 1 (d); to which Roger, Son

Son of Ralph de Asson of Heywood, John the Son of Thomas Boxland, pass'd one Tenement in Blythbury with the Homages, Rents, Warenties, Scruices, Suits of Court, Reliefs, Wards, and Eschaets. (e)

Mr. Erdswick mentions another good proper House in Longdon, usually employed to the Use of the younger Brothers of Aston of Heywood; for in that Name (saith he) it hath continued ever since E. 1, or longer, and divers of the younger Brothers there dwelt. (f)

Sir John de Aston, Kt. Son of that Roger, (by Sibyl his Wife, Daughter of Sir James de Launda) was return'd one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Stafford, 7 E. 3. having with Sir Richard de Falede, the other Knight, Allowance of Expences for eighteen Days Attendance on the Parliament; (g) Anno 18 E. 3, he was High-Sheriff; in which Year his Son Roger de Alton was return'd one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Stafford at the Parliament then held at Westminster; and, with John de Draycot, the other Knight, had Writs of Expences isfu'd out for twenty eight Days Attendance. This Sir Roger was also Knight of the Shire 32 E. 3, with John de Draycot, and their Expences were allow'd for thirty Days Attendance. (a)

Son and Heir to Sir Roger, was Sir John de Asson, Kt. 24 E. 3, whose Mother Isabel was living,

and in Widowhood 43 E. 3.

After him succeeded Sir Thomas de Asson of Heywood, Kt. who serv'd in several Parliaments, from the 3d to the 12th of R. 2, for the County of Stafford, as he did also Anno 1 and 8 H. 4. (c) After which, viz. in the 10th Year of that King's Reign, he was constitued High-Sherist of the said Coun-

ty. He marry'd Elizabeth, Sister and Heir of Reginald de Leigh, that dy'd Issuels Anno 33 E. 3, Son of Richard, Son of Reginald Lord of Parkhall, 10 E. 2. By this Inter marriage, a good Estate accru'd to him, and Sir Roger Asson, Kt. his Son and Heir, marrying Joyce, Sister and Co-heir to Sir Baldwin Frevile, who dy'd 6 H. 5, had a third Part of that Inheritance. The Ancestors of the Freviles had been Barons of Parliament, and were the Heirs-general of the noble Families of Marmion and Montfort de Beaudesort, of whom Sir William Dugdale has written largely in his Baronage.

The faid Sir Roger de Asson, 10 H. 6, executed the Office of High-Sheriss for Staffordshire, and was one of the prime Gentry return'd by the Commissioners for that County 12 H. 6, A. D. 1433. He dy'd in the 25th Year of that King's Reign, leaving Issue a Daughter Joan, Wife of Sir Roger Draycot, Kt. and a Son, Sir Robert Asson, Kt.

Which Sir Robert was High-Sheriff of Staffordshire, Anno 31 H. 6, and was living 1 E. 4. He
marry'd Isabel, Daughter to Sir William Brereton
of Brereton, in Com. Cestr. Kt. and had Issue two
Daughters, Pretronel, Wife of Richard Bidulf; and
Isabel, of Richard Bagot, Esqs, and John, his Son
and Heir.

Which John was High-Sheriff, Anno 16 E. 4, and dy'd 1 R. 3, having by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter to John Delves of Doddington, Esq. two Sons, Six John and Richard Aston of Wharecross, and many Daughters, viz, Elizabeth, marry'd to John Basset of Blore; Isabel, to Humsiy Okeover of Okeover; Catherine, to Thomas Blount of Burton; Margaret, to Thomas Kynardsley of Lokesley, afterwards to Ralph Wolsay, all in Com. Staff. Alice, to John Dodd of Chorley; and Rose, to Thomas Cludd of Ormesby, in Com. Salop, Esquires; also one to Sir Andrew Colvicts

wich of Colwich; another to — Dudley of Sedglev; and a third to — Bradock of Eghafton.

John, eldest Son and Heir of the last John, made a considerable Figure in the Times he liv'd. In the 11th Year of the Reign of King H. 7, the Bishop of Linchfield disputing his Title of hereditary Master and Ruler of the Game of Caukwood, the principal Gentlemen of Staffordshire sign'd the following Certificate, which, with another sign'd the 6th of October, 36 Eliz. are in the Possession of the present Lord Asson; and on Occasion given, were produc'd and read in the Chancery Court in Hillary Term, 1712; which Certificates, by Reason of their Antiquity, and the Eminency of the Persons certifying, may not be improper to insert.

understand that the Inheritance of Caukewood
and Bewdexert Park, with many other Things,
are come to the Hands of our most gracious Soversigne

veraigne Lady Queen Elizabeth, upon the Attaynder of Thomas Lord Paget: And therefore in that her Majesty's Officers should be truly inform'd what Interest any Man hath, or continually hath used or enjoyed there. testifie thus much upon our Knowledges, and upon a true and certain Information, that Sir Edward Afton, Kt. now presently living, Sir Walter Afton, Kt. his Father, and Sir Edward Afton, "Kt. his Grand-father, and all his Ancestors, since the 19th Year of K. E. 1, have exercised, used, and enjoyed the Office of Master of the Game, in the Caukewood and Bewdezert Park, as in punishing such as do offend, in taking Bonds of fuch as hunt unlawfully there, for there good Behaviour to the Game in appointing a Keeper to walk, and have care of the Game in " Caukewood; in serving many Warrants, in taking as his Fee Deer one Buck and one Doe \* yearly, in Bewdezert Park; and also your Um-' bles of all Deere, killed either in Caukewood or Bendezert Parke, by taking, as his Fee, all Deer killed by Casualty or Mischance, and other 'Things belonging to that Office. And that these Things above-written have been admitted and allow'd, without Contradiction, by William Lord Paget, during his Life, and by "Thomas Lord Paget, until five or fix Years before his Departure out of England; at which Time, upon some other Controversies betwixt the said Thomas Lord Paget, and Sir Walter Afton, he did not willingly allow of his Office of Mafter of Game: Yet notwithstanding that he did not allow thereof, yet Sir Walter Aston did use and enjoy his Office until his Death, and Sir " Edward Afton doth presently enjoy it, even until this Day. And thus much for the certifying a Truth.

Truth, we all are ready to Witness; that is to fay, William Lord Bishop of Coventry and Litchfield, Christopher Blunt, Kt. Henry Griffith, Liq, High-Sheriff of the County of Stafford, John Bowes, Kt. Ralph Egerton, Kt. Edward Lyttleton, Kt. Ruder of Caukewood, Walter Harcourt, Kt. Thomas Grefley, Esq., Ralph Sncyde, I fc; Richard Bagot, Esq. her Majesty's High-Steward of all Liberties of Caukewood, Edward Leigh, Esq., Robert Stamford, Esq., Francis Biddulph, Esq., Walter Fowler, Esq. Borderer and Commoner in Caukewood, Thomas Wolfeley, Esq. Borderer and Com-" moner in Caukewood, Walter Povye, Gent. Borderer and Commoner in Caukeword, Authory Gowre, Gent. Bayley to her Majesty of the Manour of Heywood, Parcel of the Liberty of Caukewood, 'Thomas Hand, one of the Keepers of Caukewood, " John Osbourne, one other of the Keepers of Cauke. wood, and John Allyn, sometimes a Keeper of 'Caukewood. Given under our Hands and Seals the fixth Day of October, in the xxxvith Yeare of the Reigne of our Sovereign Lady Elization beth, by the Grace of God, of England, France, and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c. 1594.

Underneath their feveral Hands and Seals

were set.

The said John Asson, Esq. was made Knight of the Bath, at the Marriage of Prince Arthur, eldest Son of K.H. 7, with the Infanta of Spain; and in the 24th Year of his Reign, was High-Sheriss of the County of Stafford. He embark'd in the Expedition into Britany, 3 H. 8, and assisted that King at the Sieges of Terovin and Tournay; and for his Conduct and Bravery at the Battel of Spuris; (b)

was then made Knight Baneret in the open Field. He was again High-Sheriff of the aforesaid County 5 H. 8, and in the 17th of that Reign,

(Son and Heir to the famous Lawyer) (a) and Heir to her Mother (his first Wife) Helena, Daughter and Co-heir to Robert Waleys, Lord of Wanlip in Com. Leic. and of Margery his Wife, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Richard Byron, Kt. On which Marriage the Manour of Tixhall, or Tickfall, came into this Family. The first Possefsor of it after the Conquest, was Roger de Montgomery. In the Time of H. 2, Paganus de Gastenoys, or Wastenoys, had it, in which Family it contimu'd several Generations, 'til the Daughter and Heir marry'd Sir John Monston. (b) Rose, the Wife of that Sir John, fold it to the Littletons. In the Deed (c) the fets forth who the was, and adviseth with her Council, whether she could fell the same without Peril of her Soul.

the Sides of the Monument are the Figures of their Children, and round the Verge is this Infeription, in the Characters and Abbreviations of that Age.

Sir Edward Affon, Kt. his eldest Son and Heir, succeeded to the Estate; and by Descent from his Ancestors, had Lands at Estede, Mitchel, Herlavesson, and Landesthorp, in Com. Staff which Radulphus silius Willielmi Cameracii, immediately after the Conquest, gave to William de Mara, whose Heir general Sir Edward was; but these Lands he exchang'd with King H. 8, upon the Dissolution of the religious Houses, for Mathersield, commonly call'd Massield, belonging to the Priory of Tuthus, the Site of the Abbey of Hilton, Brodnoppe, and divers other Lands. (a)

He built a fair House at Tixball, the first Heighth from the Ground very well wrought of Stone, the rest of Timber and Plaister, where afterwards he resided (b); and by that Denomination I find him High-Sherist of the County of Stafford, Anno 20 H. 8, as also 3 and 4 Phil. and Mary. He dy'd there Anno 10 Eliz. having had Islue, by Joan his Wife, Daughter to Thomas Bowlesz, Esq, one of the Barons of the Exchequer, and afterwards a Knight, divers Sons and Daughters, viz. Catherine, marry'd first to Stephen Slaney of London Esq, secondly to William Chetwind of Ingestree, in Com. Staff. and lastly to Sir Edward Cope of Canons Ashby, in Com. Northamp. Knights, which Lady was interr'd

in the Parish-Church of St. Giles's in the Fields, Middlesex, to which she was a Benefactress; and her Arms impal'd, with those of her Husband's, are in the Windows of the said Church. Mary, marry'd to Simon Harcourt of Stanton Harcourt, Esq, and Frances to Robert Needham of Shenton, in Com. Leic. Esq, The Sons were, 1. Walter. 2. Leonard.

And 3. Anthony.

Sir Edward and his Lady were bury'd in St. Many's Church at Stafford, and a costly mural Monument of Alabaster standing upon Columns, was erected to their Memory; whereon are two principal Figures representing them both lying under a Canopy; and the Images of their several Children are carv'd round the Sides of the Tomb. At the Foot of the Monument is a large Latin Inscription, which, for Brevity, is here omitted.

Walter Asson, Esq, eldest Son and Heir of Sir Edward, succeeded his Father at Tixball, &c. He, with William Levereux, was Knight of the Shire for the County of Stafford, 6 E. 6, and was knighted by Queen Eliz. soon after her Accession to the Crown. In the 12th and 22d Years of her Reign, he was High-Sherist of the said County, not dying til A. D. 1589. He built a very goodly Gatehouse of Stone, before the Mansion-house, which, Mr. Erdswick saith, was one of the fairest Pieces of Work in those Countries. (a)

He had in Marriage Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir James Levison, by whom he was Father of six Sons, 1. Sir Edward. 2. Robert, who marry'd Joan, Daughter to Judge Dallyson of Parkhall, and had Islue. 3. Richard. 4. William of Middlewich, who left Posterity. 5. Hastings Aston. And 6. Deve-

reux.

reux. The Daughters of Sir Walter, were Joan, Wite of William Crompton of Stone; Margery, of Thomas Affley; Eleanor, of William Peyto, Liquires; Mary; and Elizabeth, marry'd to Bafil Fielding, Elq, Progenitor of the Earls of Denbigh and

Desmond.

Edward Asson, eldest Son and Heir of Sir Walter, was under Age at his Father's Decease, and was in Ward to her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, (a) and afterwards receiv'd from her the Honour of Knighthood; and in the 36th Year of that Queen's Reign, was High-Sheriss of his County; an Office which every individual Ancestor had before underwent, from the Time of King E. 3. He built a very fair Lodge in Tixhall Park, being five Heighths of Stone, and cover'd it with Lead, but liv'd not to finish it. And he purchas'd of Sir Thomas Greseley, the Manour of Kingson in Grotwick, which had for many Ages remain'd in that Family.

Walter, eldest Son and Heir of Sir Edward, was

in Ward to Sir Edward Cook; and foon after he came of Age, was invested Knight of the Bath at the Coronation of King James 1; and in the eighth Year of the same King, coming to Standon in Hertfordshire, to furnish himfelf with Horses against the Time that Prince Henry was to be created Prince of Wales. \* he was so taken (as 'tis reported) with the Beauty and Deportment of Gertrude, fole Daughter, and (after the Death of her only Brother Ralph, without Isiue,) Heir of Sir Thomas Sadler of that Place, that he shortly after made her his Wife. He was created a Baronet with the first promoted to that Dignity, and was fent Embassador by King James, A. D. 1620, to manage the Proposal of a Match between Charles Prince of Wales, and the Infanta of Spain. He proceeded in that nice and difficult Treaty with great Prudence and Wariness, and with a fincere Zeal to have ferv'd his Prince, yet was a true and fast Friend to the then Duke of Buckingham. He return'd into England just upon the Expiration of King Tames, and was created by Letters Patent, dated 28 Nov. 3 Car. 1, A.D. 1627, Baron of Forfar in the County of Angus, in the Kingdom of Scotland, with all Privileges belonging to a Peer of that Realm, for the good Service he had done in Spain. At which Time of his Embassy he was feiz'd of divers Manours and Lordships in the Counties of Stafford, Warwick, Derby, and Leicester, to the Value of 10000 l. per Annum and upwards; the greatest Part of which, he fold and dispended in that Service, to Support the Glory of his Country, whilst his Family remain'd at Tixball; where that pious Poet Michael Drayton confesfeth,

feth, that his Muse oft found safe and sweet Retreat, and thus windeth up his well-wishing to this Family:

This Lord dy'd A. D. 1629, and was bury'd in the Church of St. Mary at Stafford. By the said Gertrude, his Lady, he had five Sons, and as many Daughters, 1. Walter. 2. Herbert. 3. John, who marry'd Catherine, Sister to Sir John Thimelby, Kt. 4. 5. Walter, who both dy'd in their Infancies. The Daughters were Gertrude, who dy'd an Infant. Honoria, who dy'd at Victoria in Spain, and was brought over and interr'd at St. Martins in the Fields, in the Suburbs of London. Frances, Wife to Sir William Pershall of Canwell, in Com. Staff. Kt. Another Gentrude, Wife to Henry Thimelby, third Brother of the faid Sir John, afterwards vail'd at Lousine, and Constance, to Walter Fowler, of St. Thomas, near Stafford, Esq. He was succeeded in Honour and Estate by Walter his eldest Son.

Which Walter, Lord Affon, adher'd constantly to the King's Party in the great Rebellion; had a Commission for the raising of a Regiment in the Beginning of the War; but being suspected of inclining too much to the Roman Catholick Relizion, he found Discouragement and did not proceed in it, yet his Affection never waver'd in the Royal Cause. He liv'd in the King's Garrisons all the Time of the War; was in that memorable Seige of Litchfield in Staffordshire, which lasted 19 Weeks, and was one of the last Garrisons that held

held out for the King, and was one of the last Garrisons that held out for the King, and did not then surrender, but with his Majerty's Approbation. My Lord Aston, who was then join'd in Commission with Sir Thomas Tildesley, the Governor, sent a trusty Servant, in the Habit of a labouring Man, with a Letter to the King; and in that Disguise he got safe to him at Newcassle, and brought back the following Answer:

Newcastle, 6 June 1646.

My Lord Aston and Tildesley,

"THE greatest of my Missortunes, is, that

"I cannot Reward such gallant and loyal Subjects as you are, as I ought or would;

for the present I must deal freely with you,
and give you my Directions; which is, that I

can give you no Relief, but I desire you to
hold out 'til Oxford be render'd; which will be
rank'd amongst the rest of the good Services,
done by you to

Tour most affur'd Friend,

For the Lord Aston, and Sir Tho. Tildesley.

Charles R.

When Oxford was surrender'd, and no Conditions made for them in the Articles, as was suppos'd, they made the best they could for themselves, and were only permitted to go to their own Habitations, and compound for their Estates. He liv'd retir'd 'til the Restoration of his Majesty King Charles 2; and in 1660, succeeding to his Mother's Brother's Estate at Standon, where the Family now usually resides. He had no farther Reward for his loyal Services and Sufferings, but the obtaining Letters Patents, Anno 1663,

1663, to him and his Heirs, for a Market (\*) to be held on Friday in every Week, and two feveral Fairs every Year, in the Town of Standon; each respective Fair to continue for two Days, without any Accompt to be render'd into the

Exchequer.

He had to Wife Mary, second Daughter to Richard Weston, Earl of Portland, Lord High-Treasurer of England; and had Issue sour Sons, 1. Walter, the next Lord. 2. Thomas, who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter to James Ogle of Dissington, in Com. Northumb. Esq. 3. Charles, dy'd an Insant. And, 4. William, who dy'd without Issue. His Daughters were Elizabeth, Wife to Sir John Southcote of Messbam, in Com. Surr. Kt. Frances to Sir Edw. Gage of Hengrave, Bart. Gertrude and Mary, who dy'd unmarry'd; and Anne, the Wife of Hen. Sumerset, Esq. Son and Heir to John, second Son to Henry, late Marquess of Worcester.

This Lord Walter dy'd in the 69th Year of his Age, 23 of April, A. D. 1678, and was bury'd in the Church of St. Mary at Stafford. Walter, his eldest Son, succeeding him in Honour and Estate.

Which Walter, Lord Asson of Forsar, was born in the Year 1632, had two Wives, first, Eleanor, Daughter of Sir Walter Blount of Sodington. Bart. Widow and Relict to Robert Knightly of Offchurch, in Com. Warw. Esq. which Lady departed this Life the 3d of Dec. A. D. 1674, having been the Mother of five Sons, viz. 1. Edward-Walter, five Years old, A. D. 1663, who dy'd at Clermont-Colledge in Paris. 2. Francis, dy'd 1694, both without Issue. 2. Walter, the present Lord. 4. Charles, born A. D. 1664, and Capt. of the Band of Pensioners, temp. Jac. 2; but following that unhappy Prince into Ireland, was kill'd in the Battel at the River Boyne,

Boyne, unmarry'd. The 5th and youngest Son William, dy'd an Infant. He had two Daughters, Mary, who dy'd unmarry'd, and Catherine, that dy'd an Infant. By his second Wife Catherine, (who survives him) youngest Daughter to Sir Thomas

Gage of Ferle, Bart. he had no Issue.

Walter, the present Lord Asson, marry'd Mary, sole Daughter to the Lord Thomas Howard, second Son to Henry Duke of Norfolk, and Sister to his Grace the present Duke, and hath Issue two Sons, Walter and Edward, now living A. D. 1714; and one Daughter, Catherine-Elizabeth, now living; and three others, Mary-Anne, Mary, and Anne, who dy'd Infants.

# PHILIP KNEVIT of BUCKEN-HAM, Esq; Norf. No 16.

(22 May, A. D. 1611. R. Jac. 9.)

Amden makes this Name a Corruption of Dun-nevit; and Leland (a) derives it from Dunnevit, a Town in Cornwall, on the River Tamar. The Family is said to be of Danish Extraction, and that Othomarus de Knyvèt, Lord of the Castle and Borough of Launceston, was outed of it at the Norman Invasion, for taking up Arms against the Conqueror; but inter-marrying with Emme, Daughter to William Dammartin, one of the Followers of the aforesaid Prince, was restor'd to his Possessions. From this Othomarus, after four Descents, descended Sir John de Knevit, Lord of Southwick, in Com. South. Great Grand-father to Sir John Knevit, Father of Richard, who had Issue by Joan his Wife, Daughter and Co-heir to Sir Robert Wourch, Kt. Sir John Knevit, Lord Chancellor of England; all which is testify'd by several Pedigrees, relating to this ancient and renown'd House, as Mr. Camden (b) terms it, in his Description of Norfolk, where they have flourish'd ever since Sir Febre Knevit was Lord Chancellor of England.

This Sir John studying the Law, acquir'd the Dignity of the Coif 31 E. 3, (c) and was Justice of the Bench 35 E. 3: He attain'd to be Lord Chief Justice 39 E. 3, and was constituted Chancellor of England in the 46th Year of that Reign. He marry'd Eleanor, Daughter to Sir Ralph Basse of Weldon, a Baron in Parliament, by which Lady

he had several Children.

John, his eldest Son, was found by Inquisition 10 H. 4, to be Co-heir to the Family of Basset, on the Extinction of the Heir-Mails, with Sir John de Ailsbury, who had marry'd Joan, the other Daughter of the said Ralph Lord Basset. This John Knevit serv'd in Parliament 21 R. 2, as one of the Knights of the Shire for Huntington; (c) and by Joan his Wife, Daughter of Sir John Botetort of Mendlesham, in Com. Suff. [a Descendant by an Heir-Female, from Otes Fitz-Otes, Lord of Mendlesham, temp. E. 1.] left Issue John, an only

Son, and two Daughters.

Which John receiv'd the Honour of Knigthood. and by Marriage with Elizabeth, Daughter and Heir of Sir Conflantine Clifton, Kt. a Baron in Parliament, became possess'd of a fair Inheritance. and inter alia of the Castle of Buckenham, in Com. Norf. Her lineal Ancestors on the Female Side. were, the Lords Cailli and Cromwell, and collaterally the noted Families of Bernake, Driby, and Tatshall, Baron of Tatshall, in Com. Linc. by Tenure whereof Robert de Tatshall had Buckenham Castle. temp. H. 3. by his Wife, eldest of the four Daughters, and Co-heirs to William de Albini, fourth of that Name, Earl of Arundel and Suffex, the first Lord of Buckenham after the Conquest. This Sir Fobn Knevit was High-Sheriff of Norf. and Suff. 15 R. 2. and, I presume, was bury'd at Buckenham; in which Church, many old Monuments. erected for the Knevits, (\*) are yet remaining, known only by their armonial Ensigns, the Inscriptions being worn out.

John, only Son of the last Sir John, was knighted by King E. 4, (†) and dy'd 7 H. 7, leaving, by his first Wife, Alice, Daughter to Reginald Lord Grey of Ruthyn, Edmund, his Son and Heir, by

Edmund, the eldest Son, by the first Wife, had the Estate at Buckenham; receiv'd the Dignity of Knighthood; and taking to Wife Eleanor, Sifter to Sir James Tyrell, Kt. had Issue a Daughter Anne. Wife to Sir George St. Leger, and five Sons, Thomas, Edmund, Anthony, James, and William. Edmund, second Son. was Serjeant-Porter to the

King; and marrying Jane, Daughter and Co-heir to John Bourchier, Lord Berners, the (1) Demesne and Manour of Ashwelthorp accru'd to him, with other good and ample Possessions. She lyes bury'd in the Church of Ashwelthorp; and her monumental Epitaph is copy'd by Mr. Weaver.

Thomas Knivet, eldest Son, succeeded his Father Sir Edmund, at Bucknam; and on the 23d of June, 1509, was made Knight of the Bath, at the Coronation of H. 8. After which, farther improving in the Favour of his Sovereign, he was by the said King made Master of the Horse. He underwent the Office of High-Sheriff for the County of Norf. 21 Eliz.

21 Eliz. and having marry'd Muriel, Widow to Fobil Grey, Viscount Lifle, and Daughter to I bomas Howard, Duke of Norfolk; from them proceeded two Daughters, viz. Catherine, marry'd first to Sir William Farmer of Barkam, in Com. Norf. Kt. fecondly, to Nicholas Mynne, Esq. and Anne, Wife to resby; likewise 3 Sons, viz. Sir Edmund, Ferdinando. and Henry, on whom Queen Elizabeth, Anno 1574. conferr'd the Honour of Knighthood. This Sir Henry marry'd Anne, Daughter and Heir to Sir Christopher Pickering; and by her descended, among other Sons, 1. Sir Henry Knivet of Carleton, in Com. Wilt, whose Heirs generally are the Earls of Suffolk and Lincoln. And, 2. Sir Thomas Knivet, who was of the Bed-Chamber to Queen Eliz. and next of Council to Queen Anne, Wife to King James 1; to which King he became one of the Gentlemen of the Privy-Chamber, and was entrusted to discover the Powder-Plot, which he happily effected, apprehending the notorious Guy Faux, ready prepard, with his dark Lanthorn in the Cellar, for perpetrating that most horrid Design; for which, and other his Services to the Crown, the King was pleas'd to create him Baron Knivet of Escrick; but dying without Issue, the Barony expir'd.

Sir Edmund Knivet, Uncle to the Baron, and eldest Son and Heir to Sir Thomas, was aged seven Years, 8 H. 8; and in the 1st of Ed. 6, with Nicholas L'Estrange, were Knights of the Shire for Norfolk. He had Issue by Anne, his Wise, Daughther to Sir Thomas Shellon, Kt. four Sons, Thomas, Edmund, Henry, and Anthony, whereof Thomas, his eldest Son and Heir, possess'd Bucknam, and was knighted by King James 1, at the Charter-House, 11 May, 1603. He was succeeded by Philip his Son and

Heir.

Which Philip Knivet of Buckenham, Esq, was advanced to the Dignity of a Baronet, at the first Insti-

Institution; but for want of Heirs Male, the said Dignity is now Extinct in this Family.

THIS Family is paternally descended from the Ports, Lords of Basing in Hampshire, who were great Barons at the Time of the Conquest; and, by maternal Descent, derive their Sirname of St. John, in lineal Succession, from William de St. John, who enter'd England with the Conqueror, and attended the Army as Grand Master of the Artillery, and Supervisor of the Waggons and Carriages; for which Reason, the Horse Hames or Collar was born for his Cognizance.

John de St. John, Son of the said William, eminently distinguishing himself with Robert Fitz-Hammon, in the Conquest of Glamorgan; \* and being

being one of the twelve Knights Associates with the said Robert, had, for his Share, the Castle and Manour of Fonmon, Falmont, or Faumont, (as severally written) which remain'd in the Family of the Earls of Bullingbroke, 'til the Middle of the last Century. This John was Heir to his Brother Thomas, and enjoy'd the Lordship of Stanton, in Com. Oxon. since call'd Stanton St. John, and had Issue two Sons, Roger and Thomas; the latter was Progenitor to the St. Johns, ancient Barons of Stanton; of whom Sir William Dugdale has

treated in his Baronage of England.

The aforesaid Roger marry'd Cicely, Daughter and Heir to Robert de Haya of Halfrac in Sussex, and had Issue two Sons, William and Robert de St. John; the former is mention'd among the Barons and Knights that paid Scutage in Suffex, (a) is likewise Witness to his Father's Donation of the Church of Cothon, to the Priory of Lewes; (b) and to a Charter of King R. 1, to the Priory of Godestow in Com. Oxon. (c) neither of them leaving Issue, their great Inheritance devolv'd on Mabel, Daughter of Muriel, Wife of Reginald de Aurevall, and Sister to the said William and Robert; which Mabel marry'd Adam de Port, Lord of Basing in Hampshire, Son of John, Son of Henry, Son of Hugh de Port, Lord of the said Place, and Proprietor of fifty five Lordships in that County, temp. W. 1, a Person of such ample Revenues, that among the Chartularies of Hide Abby, he is call'd Hugo Portuensis Comes. (d) Notwithstanding the Greatness of this Family of Port, the Children of the said Adam de Port, by Mabel aforemention'd, assum'd the Name of St. Fohn from '

rom their Grand-mother above cited, as is evident from feveral Charters.

William de St. John is stil'd Son and Heir of Adam de Port, confirming to the Monks of Boxgrave, what Robert de Haya, Roger and William, and Robert de St. John, his Predecessors, Lords of Hannac, had given them. (e) William and Robert, Brothers to his Grand-mother, having augmented the Number of Monks at Boxgrave, from three to sisteen, William adding ten, and Robert two; the other three were first instituted by Robert de Haya aforesaid, Founder of that Priory, which he

made a Cell to Effay in Normandy.

The said William de St. John enjoy'd the Barony of Basing, and likewise gave to the aforesaid Monks of Boxgrave, eleven Virgates of Land in the Town of Walborneton, and Pasture for twelve Oxen and as many Cows, &c. and in the Town of Concone, (f) two Virgates of Land, and Pasture for Sheep, Part also of his Wood near Boxgrave; and likewise a Virgate in Halnac, to the Church of Boxgrave, for the Souls of William and Robert de St. John, and Adam de Port, his Father, and Mabel his Mother; witness'd (g) Geffry Peverell, Roger Hay, and Geffry de St. John, under the Seal of his Arms, upon a Chief two Mullets (as now borne by his Descendants.)

Having thus clear'd up the Descent, in which Sir William Dugdale agrees, (b) all that I shall farther observe is, that the elder Line of this Family expir'd in an Heir Female, from whom the Title of Baron St. John of Basing, came to the Family of Poynings, and from Poynings, by Patent, is now enjoy'd by the Dukes of Bolton, as is mention'd at

large in the Baronage of England.

From the remaining Stock descended Sir Oliver de St. John, who came to posses the Lordship of Bletsho, in Com. Bedf. in the Reign of H. 6, by Marriage with Margaret, Sister and sole Heir to Sir John de Beauchamp (a Cadet of the Lord Beauchamp's of Powick,) which Estate came to the Beauchamps by Inter-marriage, temp. E. 3, of Roger Beauchamp, with Sibil, eldest Sister and Co-heir to Sir William de Patishull of Patishull; which Sibil likewise brought her Husband the Lordship of Lidiard Tregoze, that came to the Family of Patishull by Marriage with a Co-heir of the Lord Grandison, to whom it descended from a like Vicissitude, temp. E. 1.

This Margaret Beauchamp had, by her Husband Sir Oliver St. John, several Daughters and two Sons, Sir John and Sir Oliver, and surviving him, was afterwards Wife of John Beaufort, Duke of Somerset; who had Issue by her, Margaret, Mo-

ther to H. 7, King of England.

From Sir John St. John, the eldest Son, the St. Johns, Barons, St. John of Bletsho, and Earls of Bullingbrook descended, which Earldom expired Anno 1711; but the Barony of Bletsho descended

to a younger Branch now existing.

Sir Oliver St. John, second Son of Sir Oliver, had the Lordship of Lidiard Tregoz, Part of his Mother's Inheritance, and was, as Leland writes (in his Itinearry) a stout black Man, and dy'd at Fonterabia in Spain. He lest Issue, by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter to Henry Lord Scroop of Bolton, a Son John, and three Daughters; Elizabeth, marry'd to Fitz-Gerald Earl of Kildare; Eleanor, to Thomas Grey Marquess of Dorset; and Margaret, Lady Abbess of Shafton.

Which John, his only Son, had to Wife Jane, Daughter and Heir to Sir John Ewarby, by Catherine his Wife, Daughter and Co-heir to Sir Hugh

Annesley of Maple Durham, from whence proceeded

two Sons, John and Oliver.

John St. John, Esq, the eldest Son, enjoy'd his Patrimony of Lydiard Tregoze, and marry'd twice; the last Wise was Elizabeth, Daughter to Sir Richard Whetell, Knight of the Marches at Calais; his first Wise was Margaret, Daughter to Sir Richard Carew of Bedington, Kt. by which Lady he had three Sons, Nicholas, William, and John; whereof the eldest, Nicholas St. John of Lydiard Tregoze, Esq, had to Wise Elizabeth, Daughter to Sir Richard Blunt of Maple Durham, in Com. Oxon. Kt. and by her had Issue two Sons, John and Oliver, and sive Daughters.

Of John, the eldest Son, Mention will be made

hereafter.

Oliver the second Son, was sent to study the Law in the Inns of Court; and happening into a Quarrel with one Best, Captain of the Guard to Queen Elizabeth, and Champion of England, kill'd him in fingle Duel; for which he was forc'd to leave the Kingdom. He first serv'd in the Army of the Lord Vere, and Sir Horace Vere in Flanders, in the Reign of Queen Elizabeth; and in King James's Reign went into Bobemia, and serv'd in that War, and the Palatinate, 'til it was subdu'd by the Emperor; when he return'd to Flanders, and continu'd some Years in the Service of the States of Holland, against the Arch-duke of Austria, 'til the Truce happen'd: He then went into France, where he grew into Acquaintance with the Duke of Buckingham, who was then fent to treat of a Marriage for the Prince of Wales, with a Daughter of Henry the Fourth of France; and a particular Friendship ensu'd, which lasted as long as they both liv'd. The Duke brought Mr. St. John to England with him, and by his Favour procur'd him, first to be knighted, and the 3d of June, 18

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James 1, created a Peer of Ireland, by the Title of Viscount Grandison of Limerick (by Reason of his Descent from an Heir Female of that House) with Limitation, for want of Issue-Male, to the Issue of Sir Edward Villers, (Half-Brother to the Duke of Buckingham) whose Son, Sir George Villers, accordingly enjoy'd the Honour, and was Father of Barbara Villers, Dutchess of Cleveland.

He was after fent into Ireland, where he had the Honour to command as General, and was some Time Master of the Ordnance, and Aid-Deputy of that Realm, President of Munster, and Vice-President of Connaught. Whence returning, was by other Letters Patent dated May 21, 2 Car. 1, advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baron of this Kingdom, by the Title of Baron Tregoze of Highworth, in Com. Wilts. and made one of the Privy-Council to that King, who granted him the Manours of Battersea and Wandsworth, in the third Year of his Reign. He marry'd Joan, Daughter and Heir to Henry Roydon of Battersea Esq. and Widow of Sir William Holdcroft, Kt. and departing this Life without Issue, his Honours were extinct, and his Brother's Son, Sir John St. John, Bart. was Heir to his Estate.

Which Sir John, his Brother, had the Estate at Lydiard; and having marry'd Lucy, Daughter and Heir to Sir Walter Hungerford of Farley, in Com. Wilts; (afterwards the Wise to Sir Anthony Hungerford) had Issue by her, one Son, John, and several Daughters, viz. Barbara, marry'd to Sir Edward Villiers, Kt. by whom she was Parent to three several Villiers, all Viscounts Grandison, Lucy, marry'd to Sir Alan Apsley, Kt. Lieutenant of the Tower; Jane, to—Atye; secondly to Sir Charles Pleydell; Catherine, to Sir Charles Mompesson of Sarum, in Com. Wilts; Anne, to Sir George Ayliff of Gretenbam, in that County; Eleanor, to Sir

Sir William St. John of Heighley, in Com. Gla-

morg.

Fohn, the only Son of the last Sir Fohn, succeeded at Lidiard Tregoze, and was created a Baronet at the first Institution of that Order, the 22d of May, 1611: His Uncle, the Lord Grandison, gave him his Estate at Battersca and Wandsworth, &c. He was zealously attach'd to the Interest of the Royal Party in the Civil War, and had three of his Sons flain in the King's Service; William, the second Son, was kill'd at the taking of Cirencester in Gloucestersbire, under Prince Rupert; Edward, the third Son, at the Battel of Newberry in Berkshire; and John, the fifth Son, in the North. He marry'd first Anne. Daughter to Thomas Leighton of Feckingham, in Com. Wilts; secondly, the Widow to Sir Richard Grubham, Kt. He left Iffice by the former, a Daughter Anne, marry'd to Sir Henry Frances Lee, Bart. secondly, to Hen-Wilmot, Earl of Rochester. And seven Sons: Oliver, the eldest, dy'd in the Life-Time of his Father, having marry'd Catherine, Daughter and Co-heir to Horatio Vere, Baron of Tilbury, and had Issue Sir John St. John, Bart. who dy'd three Months before he came of Age, unmarry'd; William, Edward, Nicholas, and John, who marry'd the Daughter of Sir George Ayliff; all dy'd without Issue. Sir Walter succeeded to the Baronet-Thip and the Estate. Henry, the youngest Son, marry'd Catherine, Daughter to Oliver St. John, Lord Chief Justice of the Common-Pleas; and left Issue only a Daughter Anne, marry'd to Anthony Bowyer of Camberwell, in Com. Surr. H.fg;

Walter, the fixth Son, succeeded at Lydiard Tregoze, and to the Estates at Battersex and Wandsworth, (where, for the most part, he resided) on the Death of his Nephew Sir John. He serv'd in Parliament for the County of Wilts, and for

the Borough of Wooton-Basset. He dy'd Anno 1708, at his Seat at Battersea, in the eighty seventh Year of his Age, and was interr'd in the Parish Church there, leaving Issue by his Wise Johanna, another Daughter of the Lord Chief Justice St. John, an only Son, the present Sir Henry St. John, Bart.

Which Sir Henry serv'd in Parliament the space of twenty one Years, and has been twice marry'd; first, to Mary, second Daughter and Co-heir to Robert Rich, Earl of Warwick, by whom he had only one Son, Henry, late Viscount Bolingbroke.

By his second Wise, Angelica-Magdalena, Daughter of George Pellesary, Treasurer-General of the Marines, and Super-Intendant of all the Ships and Galleys of France, under Lewis 14; he had Issue three Sons, George St. John, who dy'd in Italy; John, and Hollis St. John; and one Daughter, Henrietta.

THE Difficulty of tracing the Original of a Family, before Sir-names were us'd, is allow'd by all our Genealogists; but by the Similitude of Arms, I conjecture this may be deriv'd from the Eschalers, an old Norman Family, that enter'd England with William the Conqueror, (a) and were Barons of Parliament soon after; for Thomas Shelle, as the Name was antiently written, temp. E. 1, (b) bore for Arms, Azure three Eschalops Sable, which are différent only in Colours from those born by the Eschalers, modernly call'd Scales. The faid Thomas de Schottis and Oekholt, in the County of Kent, had Issue two Sons, John and Thomas; the latter left one sole Daughter and Heir, Alice, Wife of Sir William Brampton, Kt. The former marry'd Margaret, Daughter and Heir of John Rolfe, and had Issue three Sons, William, Thomas, and John, who were all eminent in their Time, and all of them receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood. Sir Thomas serv'd as Knight of the Shire for the County of Bucks, (c) 21 Ric. 2, and with Sir Thomas Ailfbury, the other Knight, had 11 l. 12 s. allow'd for 24 Days Expences. He was attainted, with Sir John Shelley, his Brother, for endeavouring to re-throne King R. 2; they were both fast Friends to that Prince, and had perform'd considerable Services in France, under that eminent Commander Sir Robert Knowles. (d) They bore for their Cognizance, Sable a Fess, engrail d be-K 4

tween three Whelks [Feriwinkles] Or; and Sir William, their Brother, bore the same, waveing his an-

cient Bearing, the Escalops.

This Sir William had Itiue two Sons, Robert and Richard; the former marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter and Co-heir of John Petit, who brought him two Sons, John and Thomas. The latter was of Hunsdon; and his Posterity, to distinguish themselves from the Family at Michelgrove, bore for their Arms, Argent a Cheveron between three Escalops Sable.

John, the eldest Son, was a Burgess in Parliament for the Town of Rye in Sussex, 5, 8, and 9 H. 5, and 1 H. 6; (e) and having marry'd Beatrix, Daughter and Heir of Sir John Hawkwood, was succeeded in his Estate by John his Son and Heir, who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter and Heir of John Michelgrove of Michelgrove and Fauconburst, in Com. Sussex, by Mary, his Wife, Daughter of William Sydney of Penshurst; by whom he became posses'd of those Lordships, the first of which has been the Residence of the Family to this Time.

The faid John had Issue a Daughter, Elizabeth, who was veil'd, and became Abbess of and several Sons, William, hereafter-mention'd, Edward Shelley of Warminghurst, in Sussex; Richard of Patcham, in the same County; and John, who was a Knight of Rhodes, and lost his Life at the

taking that Island by the Turks.

William, the eldelt Son, succeeded to the Estate at Michelgrove, &c. and having been educated in the Study of the Laws, was constituted one of the Justices of the Common-Pleas; (f) and Fines were levy'd before him, from the 18th H. 8, to 2 E. 6. He was knighted, and possess'd a good Estate in Warwickshire, in Right of his Wife Alice, Daughter of Sir Henry Belknap, and Co-heir to her Brother Sir Edward Belknap, viz. the Manours of Under-Wethele,

Wethele, Woolston, and Marston, &c. (g) in the said County. He had Issue three Daughters and five Sons. John, who succeeded to the Bulk of his Estate; Richard and James, who were elected Knights of Maltha, 21 Nov. 1557; Edward, slain at the great Battel of Muscleborough in Scotland; and Thomas Shelley of Mapledurham, in Com. South. Ancestor to those of the Name at that Place.

John, the eldest Son before-mention'd, took to Wise Mary, Daughter of Sir William Fitz-Williams of Gajus Parkhall, in Esex; (who surviv'd him, and was afterwards the Wise of Sir John Guilford, Kt.) and dying 16 Dec. 4 E. 6, A. D. 1550, lest Issue by her six Daughters and two Sons, William and John; of the Daughters, Elizabeth marry'd Sir Thomas Guilford, Kt. Eleanor, who dy'd 9 March, 1556, and was bury'd in St. Magnu's Church, London, was Wise to Thomas, Son of John Norton of Norwood in Kent; Margaret marry'd Edward Gage, Esq. Mary, Sir George Cotton of Warblington, in Com. South. Bridget, Sir Anthony Hungerford of Downamney, in Com. Wilts, Kt. and Anne, to Sir Richard Shirley, Kt.

William Shelley, eldest Son and Heir, was twelve Years old at his Father's Death; and succeeding to the Estate, marry'd two Wives, Jane, Daughter and Heir of ——Lingen of Sutton, in Com. Heref. and Mary, Daughter to Thomas Wriothsley, Earl of Southampton, Widow and Relict of ——Lister, Son and Heir of Sir Martin Lister, Kt. He lest no Issue by either of them; and was attainted for Treason committed 15 Dec. 25 Eliz. (i) whereby his Estate was forseited to the Crown, during his Life; for he did not die 'til 15 April, 39 Eliz, when, by Virtue of the Entail, the Estates, both in Sussex and Warwickshire, descended to his Brother,

John Shelley, Esq, who marry'd Eleanor, Daughter to Sir Thomas Lovell of East-Harling, in Com-Norf. Kt. by whom he had Issue a Daughter, Elizabeth, marry'd to Sir Thomas Timperleigh, in Com. Suff. Kt. and two Sons John and Henry.

The said John succeeded to the Inheritance at Michelgrove. He sold the Estate in Warnicksbire, and purchas'd in Sussex, where he liv'd in Honour and Esteem. At the first Erection of the Dignity of Baronets, by King James I, he accepted of that Title; and having marry'd Jane, Daughter to Sir Thomas Reresby of Thriberg, in Com. Ebor. Kt. had Issue by her two Sons, William and John; the latter dy'd without Issue; the former was knighted, and having marry'd Christiana, Daughter of Sir James Vantelet, Kt. was succeeded

by his Son and Heir

Sir Charles Shelley, Bart. who took to Wife Elizabeth. Daughter to Benjamin Weston, Esq. fourth Son of Richard Earl of Portland, by whom he had Issue four Sons, Benjamin, Charles, John, and William; and two Daughters, Elizabeth and Christiana. Benjamin and Charles dying young, the Estate and Title came to Sir John, who marry'd Bridget Nevil, only Daughter of my Lord Abergavenny, and had one Daughter by her, Frances, who was marry'd to the present Lord Viscount Fitz Williams. Fobn marry'd a second Wife, Mary, Daughter of Sir John Gage, Bart. and Co-heiress with her Sister, the Viscountess Faulconberg. He dy'd 25 April, 1703, leaving, by his fecond Wife, three Sons, John, Walter, and Richard; and three Daughters, Mary, the eldest, marry'd John, eldest Son and Heir of Sir Henry Lawson of Brough, in Com. Ebor. Bart. Elizabeth marry'd Edward, Son and Heir of Ralph Sheldon of Weston, in Com. Warw. Esq. Catherine marry'd - Matthews of the Kingdom of Ireland, Esq.

THIS ancient Family was existing in England before the Conquest. Mr. Giles Firmin, a Gentleman of Verity, asserting, (\*) That they have been

been posses'd of Barington-Hall for above 1200 Tears; and Camden voucheth, (a) That a vast accession of Revenues accru'd to them in the Right of

King Stephen, from the Barons Montfitchet.

Sir Odynell Barrington, or Barenton, as the Name was anciently written, descended from Barrington, that serv'd Queen Emme, Wife of King Etheldred, Father of Edward the Confessor, was Baron of Wegon, (b) and incurr'd the common Fate of his Country, becoming subject to the Normans; which may be the Reason that none of the Name, either as chief Lords, or Sub-Tenants, in Essex, are mention'd in Doomsday-Book; yet Selden finds (c) Radulphus de Barentona to be sworn among others in the Hundred of Trepessan, in Com. Cantab. to take the Conqueror's Survey; and the Town and Parish of Barrington, near Cambridge, is said to take Name from him.

Sir Eustace de Barrenton (d) had a Grant from
—Son of William the Conqueror, to hold in
Peace all his Lands in Ramelden, Hatfield, Peverell, Writy, Ravensfield, Haring, Berking, Shyford, Cher-

well and Splow.

Humphrey, his Son and Heir, had a Grant from Albery de Ver (who came in with the Conqueror) by Charter, Omnib. Hominibus suis Francis & Anglis, &c. to hold Lands in Chirwell, which Eustace de Barenton held of him in Fee and Inheritance; and that he the said Humphry should hold it, as well and honourably, with all incident Customs, as ample, or better than his Father ever held, and by the same Service; Witnesses, Albery de Ver, Robert de Ver, his Sons, Robert Fitz Williams, &c. He had also a Grant from King Stephen, and Henry Fitz-Empres, of the aforesaid Lands in

in Ramelden, &c. and all his Lands in Bilchanger. Humpry de Barenton is likewise a Witness to the Foundation-Charter of Woodham-Priory in Essex, temp. H. 2; (e) and was also a Benefactor to the Abbey of Waltham St. Cross. Terram quam dedit

Hunfridus de Barenton (f) ipsi Ecclesia.

The faid Humphry, in Right of Grifilde his Wife, Sister to Sir Ralph de Mercy, had the Manour of Kelvedon in the County of Effex; and Sir Humphry de Barenton, their Son and Heir, was High-Sheriff of Essex and Hertfordshire, 9 R. 1; (g) (an Office in those Days of great Authority) and by his Wife Auda, or Eve, the only Daughter of Sir William, third Son of Sir Jeffery de Mandivile, Earl of Esfex, Founder of the Abbey of Walden, he had a Son Nicholas, who was knighted, and held the Offices of Woodwary, and cheif Forester of Hatfield-Forest, and summon'd before him the Regarderers, Verderers, and Agistors in the Forest of Essex. He took to Wife Mary, Daughter of John Bovile, and also Maud, Daughter of Sir Ralph Mortoft, Kt. He had no Issue by the first; but by the latter several Sons, whereof Nicholas, the eldest, succeeded to the Inheritance, was knighted; and by Agnes his Wife, Daughter and Heir to Sir William Chetwynde, was Father of another Sir Nicholas, John, and Philip, which latter, by Computation of Time, may be that Sir Philip de Barington, Kt. of the County of Leicester, who ferv'd King E. 1 in his Wars, and was of the Retinue of the Earl of Lancaker. His Arms (b) were, Argent, a Lyon rampant, queve fourchee Sable, charg'd on the Shoulder with a Flower-de-Lis, Or.

Sir Nicholas, Son and Heir of the last Sir Nicholas, marry'd Alice, Daughter and Heir of Sir Ri-

chard,

Rent in Westball, of the Gist of her Father, on a Settlement by his Father of the Manours of Taplow, Hatfield, Wristell, Chigwell, Ramelden, Bullingbatch, and Springwell. From the said Alice proceeded sour Sons, Nicholas, Thomas, Roger, and Sir Philip, who marry'd Margaret, Daughter of Sir William Tey, Kt. of whom descended the Baringtons of Raleigh-Park, in Esex; the Heir-Male of which, in the sourth Generation inclusive, lies bury'd with his Wise, under a Marble-Tomb, in Raleigh Church, with this Inscription in Brass:

Orate pro Animabus Johannis Barington, Armig. & Thomazine Uxoris ejus—Expectantium Misericordia Dei, qui quidem Johannis; obiit 8° die Mensis Novembris, Anno Dom. 1416. Et predicta Thomazina obiit 5° die Mensis Septembris, Anno Dom. 1420, quorum Animabus propitietur Deus. Amen.

Which John was knighted, and had the King's Letters Patents, 49 Ed. 3, which confirm'd to him in Fee all his Lands at Hatfield. Solut. pro Custodia Foresta Terra qua suit Ada—at the Rent of 17 s. and the Land of Writele, necnon à minisserio Patris sui de Foresta Regis tenend. The said Ministerium, or Office of William de Montischet, in

in Com. Effex; and that all Foresters, and Officers of the faid Forest, should be observant to the said John [Barington,] to hold of the King, in capite, referring to the Charters of King H. 2.

Steph. and H. 2.

This Sir John had in Marriage Margaret, Daughter and Heir to Sir John Blomvile, Kt. whereof proceeded two Sons, John and Edward; the latter was possess'd of the Manour of Gravein Com. Hertf. (i) and held a Court there on Monday next after the Feast of Easter, 12 H. 4. A. D. 1411.

John, the eldest Son, was living, tempt. H. 5: and by his Wife Alice, one of the Daughters and Heirs of Thomas Battle, younger Son of Sir John Battle, of Castel-Anger, or Onger-Parke, in Essex, Kt. by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter and Heir of Sir Richard Ennefield, Kt. had Issue Thomas, Humphry, and Elizabeth, marry'd to John Sulyard.

Thomas, the eldest Son, was the Inheritor of his Father's Lands; and after the Death of his Uncle Edward Barrington, was seiz'd of the Manours of Chevesfield, (k) Graveley, Lecheford, and Lands in Weston; at the first of which Places he held a Court, 16 H. 6, 1438; was High-Sheriff of Essex and Hertford, 30 H.S. He marry'd Anne, the second Daughter, and one of the Heirs of Sir John Holbeach, Kt. and of his Wife, the Daughter and Heir of Sir John Rochford, Kt. He had to his first Wife, Margaret, who, together with him, held the Manour of Little Chigwell, call'd Barrington's Manour, (1) of Anne, Dutchess of Buckingbam, as of her Hundred of Aungre, by the Service of Suit, at the Court of the Sheriffs Turn for the faid Manour, and 6 d. Rent annually. He lives bury'd

Humphry Barington, Son and Heir to the faid Thomas, marry'd Margaret, Daughter of --Bretton, and had Issue Nicholas, who took to Wife Anne, Daughter of Thomas Darcy of Tolston-Darcy, in Com. Effex, (as faid by some) and left two Sons, Richard and Sir Nicholas; which Richard was aged twenty Years at his Father's Death, 27 Sept. 21 H. 7. (n) The said Nicholas had a Wife. nam'd Elizabeth, that surviv'd him (but whether she was the Daughter of Thomas Darcy, I can't affirm.) The Manours of Chiversfeild and Gravely were fetled on her before 8 H.7, (o) in which Year, Trustees held a Court for the said Manours, in the Names of the said Nicholas and Elizabeth; and she, surviving him, held a Court in her own Name, 22 H. 7; and on her Death, both those Manours descended to Sir Nicholas Barington, Kt.

Which Sir Nicholas, Son to Nicholas aforesaid, dy'd about the Year 1521; for in October that Year his Will was prov'd, which bore Date 22 July, A. D. 1515, wherein he dispos'd of all his Lands

The faid John Barrington succeeding to the Inheritance, was living 25 H. 8, 1534, with Elizabetb his Wife, Daughter of Thomas Bonham, by Catherine his Wife, Sister to John, Baron Marney. He had by her a Son, Thomas, whom he left under Age; for, during his Minority, his Mother, being Guardian, held a Court at Graveley cum Chevesfeild, A. D. 1546, 38 H. 8, in her own Name; which he afterwards did himself, and sold them to George Clerk. He was High-Sheriff of the Counties of Hertford and Essex, 4 Eliz. and for his Services to the Crown, had a Grant of the Manour of Bushey, in Com. Hertf. by Letters Patents dated at Westminster, Nov. 22: 8 Eliz. by the same Services as it was holden before the Attainder of the Countess of Salisbury. He had two Wives, Alice, Daughter of Sir Henry Brooke, Kt. (by whom he had Issue Elizabeth, marry'd to Edward Harris of Southmaster) and Winifrid, Relict to Sir Thomas Hastings, a younger Son of George Earl of Huntington, and Daughter and Co-heir to Henry Pole, Lord Mountague; which Henry was Son to Sir Richard Pole, Knight of the Garter, by Margaret his Wife, Countess of Salisbury, Sister and Heir to Edward Earl of Warwick, and Daughter to George Duke of Clarence, younger Brother to King E. 4. D. 1603; and by the said Prince farther advanc'd to the Degree of a Baronet, at the first Institution of that Dignity, A.D. 1511. And Joan, to Sir Richard Everard of Much Waltham, in Essex, Bart. Sir Francis dy'd 3 July, 4 C. 1, and was succeeded by his eldest Son, Sir Thomas, who receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood in his Father's Life-Time

Which Sir Thomas Barrington, Kt. and Bart. marry'd first Frances, Daughter and Co-heir to John Gobart of Coventry, Esq, by whom he had a Daughter, Lucy, Wife to Sir Toby Tyrrel of Thorndon, in Com. Bucks, Bart. and two Sons; John, who succeeded him; and Sir Gobart Barrington of Tosts, in Little Badow in Esfex, Kt. who marry'd Lucy, Daughter of Sir William Wiseman of Tirrells Hall,

in

in Com. Effex; and had, among other Children, Colonel Oliver Barrington. His second Lady was Judith, Daughter to Sir Rowland Lytton of Knebworth, in Com. Hertf. Kt. and Widow of Sir George Smith of Annabals, in the same County; which Judith dy'd without Issue, A. D. 1657, aged sixty five Years; and Sir Thomas, A. D. 1644, and was succeeded by his eldest Son,

Sir John Barrington, Kt. and Bart. who marry'd Dorotby, Daughter to Sir William Lytton of Knebworth, by whom he had five Sons; 1. Thomas. 2. Francis, who dy'd unmarry'd. 3. John, who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter to Edward Hawkins of Bishop Stratford, Gent. and had Issue John, his Son and Heir, the present Bart. 4. Francis, and 5. William, who dy'd without Issue. Also nine Daughters; Winifrid, Wife to-Wiseman, Son to Sir Richard Wiseman of Tirrell Hall, in Esfex, Kt. and Lucy, Wife to Walter of Chepflow, in Com. Monmouth, Esq.

Thomas Barrington, Esq. Heir apparent of Sir John, marry'd the Lady Anne, Daughter and Coheir to Robert Rich, Earl of Warwick; and had by her three Sons, John, Charles, and Rich; and two Daughters, Mary, living unmarry'd; and Anne, Wife to Mr. Charles Shales, Goldsmith to her late Majesty Queen Anne. The said Thomas dying in his Father's Life-Time, the Dignity and Estate descended to his eldest Son John, as Heir to his Grand-father; which Sir Fohn, dying unmarry'd, was succeeded

by his Brother

Sir Charles Barrington, Bart. who was feveral Times elected one of the Knights of the Shire for Esfex, in Parliament against powerful Opposers, and was made by Queen Anne, Vice-Admiral of the faid County, was a fast Friend to the Church and Monarchy, and a courteous affable Gentleman, as much esteem'd as any of the County he liv'd in, · and

and dy'd generally lamented by all his Friends, January 29 1714 at a Time when they ardently wish'd his Health, in order to his Election as Knight of the Shire in the present Parliament. He marry'd Bridget, sole Daughter to Sir John Munson of Burton, Bart. and after her Decease, Anna-Maria, Daughter to William Lord Fitz-Williams of Merion, in the Kingdom of Ireland; but by neither of them had any Issue. The greatest Part of his Estate he left by Will to his only Sister, the Wise of Mr. Shales; the Title descended to John, Son and Heir of John Barrington, third Son of Sir John Barrington, Grand-sather to the late Sir Charles.

Which Sir John, the present Baronet, is possest of an Estate at Dunmow, and having marry'd Susan, Daughter of George Draper of Hitchin, Gent. hath Issue two Sons, John and Charles, and—Daughters.

THAT this Family was denominated from the great Manour of Berkley, in the County of Gloucester, all our Genealogists agree; as also that it descended from Harding, a younger Son of the King of Denmark; or, as others write, a Son of Ednotbus, of an ancient and noble Family of the Saxons, eminent in the Days of Edward the Confessor, who marry'd a Daughter of the King of Denmark, by whom he had this Harding, who dy'd at Bristol, 16 H. 1, 1116, and was bu-

ry'd there.

Robert Fitzbarding, his Son, was Mayor and Governor of Brifol, as his Father had been; and affifting King H. 2 with great Supplies of Money in his Wars against King Stephen, had, in Reward for his Services, the Barony of Berkley, by Gist from that King, who took it from Roger Lord of Dursley and Berkley, who affisted King Stephen against him. This Robert Fitzbarding, or Robert Lord Berkley, took his Place as a Peer, 1 H. 2, from whom descended the Barons Berkley, of whom the present Earl of Berkley is descended, as may be seen at large in Sir Robert Atkins's History of Gloucestershire, and Sir William Dugdale's Baronage of England, fol. 349, and is well warranted by authentick Records.

Thomas de Berkley second Son of Thomas Lord Berkley, and Brother to Maurice Lord Berkley, became posses'd of the Manour of Wimondham, by Marriage with the Heir general of Hamelin, who were posses'd of it temp. E. 1, as Mr. Burton affirms

in his Description of Leicestershire.

John

John de Berkley, Son of the said Thomas, was seiz'd of the same 21 E. 3, and in the said Year had Liberty of Free-Warren there granted him by the said King. Lawrence de Berkley his Son, was a Knight, and dy'd 1485, 37 H. 6, and was succeeded by his Son, Sir Thomas Berkley, Kt. who marry'd Petronel, Daughter of William Brookesby, and dying 1488, 4 H. 7, a Monument is erected to his Memory in the Church of Wimondham; as also for Maurice Berkley his Son, who dy'd 1522, 14 H. 8; he was succeeded by William de Berkley his Grand-son, Thomas his Son dying before him.

Which William, by Mary his Wife, Daughter to Thomas Band of Somerby, in Com. Linc. Esq, had Issue Maurice Berkley. Esq, who, by Mary his Wife, Daughter of John Hall of Grantham, was Father of

Maurice Berkley of Wimondham, Efq, who was created a Baronet, and no Male Issue existing from him, by his Wife Catherine, Daughter of Nicholas Beaumont of Coleorton, Esq, the said Dignity became extinct.

THIS Family is of great Antiquity and Re-1 putation; their Name implies some Office or Command, which they might have upon the Marches or Mosses towards Scotland, so that Musgrave fignifies as much as Grave or Prefect of those Marches which anciently divided the two Kingdoms, equivalent to the Markgrave or Palsgrave among the Germans. Others, with more Probability, think the Sir-name taken from the Manour or Lordship of Musgrave, a Town in Westmoreland, the old paternal Estate of the Family. For it appears by old Monuments and Evidences, that they were stil'd de Musgrave, as from a Place, not le Musgrave, as it would have been, had it been assum'd from an Office or Qualification. \* Brompton makes Musgrave to be the fame as Musard, so as to be interpreted a grave, musing, thoughtful, politick Person. The L 4

The first of that Name who occurs, is Adam de Musgrave, Kt. temp. K. John, about the Year 1204; he was in great Favour with Robert de Vipont, unto whom the King gave the Barony of Appleby, and the perpetual Sheriffdom of Westmoreland, and held Mulgrave (a) of him in Cornage, as Part of the Barony. Thomas de Musgrave, (Son of Adam) Kt. is mention'd 40 H. 3; and 6 E. I, (with Ramilph de Dacre) obtain'd the King's Charter of a Market every Week upon the Wed-. nesday, at Overton in Com. Westm. (b) As also for a Fair yearly on the Eve, Day, and Morrow of St. Simon and Jude. He was one of the Executors of Robert de Vipont, that powerful Baron, and having marry'd Margaret, Daughter and Coheir to William Ross of Velton, was Father of Sir Thomas de Musgrave, who in 4 E, 2, was in the Scotch Wars, (c) and was return'd to serve in Parliament for the County of Westmoreland, Anno 14, 15, 17, and 18 E. 3. (d) He marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter to Sir William Fitz-Williams of Sprotborough, and had Issue

Thomas de Musgrave, his Son and Heir; which Thomas Anno 20 E. 3, upon the Invasion in the North, made by David Bruce, King of Scotland, joining with the Barons in those Parts, was one of the Commanders in the Van of that Army, which gave him Battel near Durham, utterly routing his Forces, and taking the King Prisoner. The same Year he was associated with the Bishop of Carlisle, and others, in guarding the Marches; and Anno 21 E. 2, was made Governor of Berwick, and sole Justicier throughout all the King's Lands in Scotland, and afterwards accompa-

ny'd

Anno 30 E. 3, he receiv'd Command to reside upon his Lands in the Marches towards Scotland, for the Defence of the Country against any Incursion. 32 E. 3 he obtain'd a Charter for Free-Warren in all his Demesne Lands at Muserave and Souleby, in Com. Westmor. with Power to impark his Woods, call'd Hevenings in Musgrave, containing two hundred Anno 33 E. 3, he was made Sheriff of . Torkshire, and Governor of Tork Castle. 42 E. 3, he was constituted Eschaetor for the Counties of Tork. Northumberland, Cumberland, and Westmoreland; and for his good Service had a Grant of one hundred Marks per Annum out of the Exchequer. he was affociated with the Bishop of Carlifle, and others, in the Office of Warden of the West Marches. At length, after many fignal Services. and continual Trusts, he had the hard Fate to be taken Prisoner by the Scots, Anno 2 R. 2, with Thomas his Son; but procuring John Lord Nevil of Raby, and others, to be Sureties for ten thousand Marks, they were fet at Liberty. This Thomas, for his undoubted Loyalty to his Prince, and upon some other Terms and Considerations, had given him, by King E. 3, Harcla or Hartley Castle, the forseited Estate of Sir Andrew de Harcla, Earl of Carlifle (who suffer'd for Treason 15 E. 2.) He was also, for his signal Knowledge in national Affairs, fummon'd by Writ, amongst the Barons of this Kingdom, from 24 to 47 E. 3 inclusive. He dy'd 8 R. 2, A. D. 1384, (a) having marry'd Isabel, Daughter to Thomas Baron Berkley, Widow to Robert Lord Clifford; by whom he had Issue a Daughter, Ellen, marry'd to Henry Wharton, and two Sons, Thomas, taken Prisoner with his Father, and William.

The said Thomas, the Son, was return'd to serve in Parliament, as one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Tork, (b) 37 and 43 E. 3; was Sheriff of Cumberland, 16 R. 2, and Knight of the Shire for Westmoreland, 1 H. 4, but dying without Issue 10 H. 4, A. D. 1409. (c) Hartley Castle with Musgrave, the ancient Inheritance devolv'd on Sir Richard Musgrave, Kt. Son to his Brother William.

Which Richard was born 2 H. 6, 1423, and marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter to Thomas Betham of Betham-Hall, Kt. by whom he had five Daughters; Elizabeth, Wife to Thomas a Garth; Elizabeth, to Thomas Middleton; Mary, to Tomlin Warcopp; Margaret, to Thomas Elderton; and Eleanor, to Thornborough, Esqs, and three Sons, John, who dy'd without Issue, Thomas and Richard. The Lady Elizabeth Musgrave dy'd 12 Feb. 3 H. 5, A. D. 1419, and Sir Richard, 9 Nov. 5, E. 4, 1464, leaving a Grand-son of his own Name Heir to the Estate, viz. Son of his eldest Son Thomas:

Which Thomas was a Knight, and had in Marriage Jane, Daughter and Co-heir to William de Stapleton of Edenhall, (d) in Com. Cumb. Efq, in whose Right he had, among other Lands, the Manour or Lordship of Edenhall. He dy'd 3 Jan. 26 H.6, A. D. 1447, having had Issue by his Wife, besides Daughters, sour Sons, Sir Richard, Sir John, Nicholas and William.

Sir John Musgrave, second Son, was knighted at the Battel of Newark upon Trent, by King H.7, (e) and was Sheriff of Cumberland, 7 H.7, he seated himself at Fairbank, Com. Cumb. marry'd twice, and had Posterity by both Wives.

Sir Richard Musgrave, eldest Son and Heir to Sir Thomas, as also to his Grand-sather Sir Richard, took to Wise Jane, Daughter to Thomas Lord Clifford; and had Issue three Daughters, Margaret, Wise to John Heron of Chipchase; Mary, to John Markindale, Esqs, and Jane, who dy'd unmarry'd. He had also as many Sons, Edward, Thomas, and

Edward, the eldest Son, in the Life-Time of his Father, was written of Caterlane, in Com. By his Wife Joan, Daughter and Coheir to the famous Sir Christopher Ward, Kt. Standard-bearer to King H. 8, at the Siege of Bulloign. (a) He had Issue, Elizabeth, marry'd to John Latimer, Esq. Joan and Magdalen, and three Sons, 1. Sir William, Sheriff of Cumberland 24 and 33 H. 8, Father of Sir Richard Musgrave, Kt. which Sir Richard enter'd his Lands of full Age at Martinmass 37 H. 8, A.D. 1545, and dying 10 Sept. 1555, 2 Phil. and Mar. was bury'd at Edenhall. having had Issue by Agnes his Wife, Daughter to Thomas Lord Wharton, a Son Thomas, who dy'd on Sunday, 3 March 7 Eliz. without Issue; (b) and only one Daughter Eleanor, marry'd to Sir Robert Bowes of Ash, Kt. whereupon the chief Heir Male remaining was Simon, second Son of Sir Edward last mention'd.

Which Simon was Sheriff of Cumberland, 11 Elizand the next Year, for his Courage and Fidelity to the Crown of England, had the Honour of Knighthood conferr'd on him at Carlifle, by the Earl of Suffolk. He marry'd Julian, Daughter to William Ellerker of Ellerker, Esq. and was Father to Christopher, Thomas, Sir Richard, and John.

Christopher Musgrave, Hsq. succeeded his Father. and by Joan his Wife, Daughter to Sir Hemy Cur-

wen. Kt. left Issue

Sir Richard Musgrave, who was made Kt. of the Bath at the Coronation of King 7. 1, and afterwards was advanc'd to the Degree of Baronet, A.D. 1611, by Letters Patent bearing date the 29th of June, in the 9th Year of that King's Reign. He enlarg'd and beautify'd his Castle of Hartley, and being desirous to see foreign Countries, travell'd abroad, and dying at Naples, 6 Nov. 13 J. 1, lies bury'd in the Cathedral Church there; leaving Issue by the Lady Frances his Wife, third Daughter to Philip Lord Wharton,

Sir Philip Musgrave, Bart. his Son and Heir, aged then seven Years. He was committed to the Tuition of his Uncle Philip Lord Wharton; and when adult, espous'd in Marriage Juliana, youngest Daughter to Sir Richard Hutton, Kt. one of the Judges of the Common-Pleas. On the Irruption of the great Rebellion, A.D. 1641, he afferted the Royal Cause with all Courage and dutiful Allegiance; he was made Colonel of a Regiment of Foot, and Governor of the City and Citadel of Carlifle. When the King was at Nork he waited on his Majesty there, and afterwards at Oxford. To the Marquess of Newcastle at Tork, he sent first six hundred Soldiers, then eighteen hundred, and afterwards to Prince Rupert a thousand more, whom he rais'd and listed in the Counties of Cumberland and Westmoreland. After the Battel at Marston-Moor.

Moor, he, with Sir Thomas Glenbam, retir'd to Carlifle; upon the Surrender of which Garrison, (the last that yielded to the Rebels) he attended the King at Cardiff in Wales. At the Desire of some loyal Gentlemen, a new Regiment of Foot being rais'd in Cumberland, he was appointed Colonel of it by the King; but in September following, A. D. 1645, they were all defeated at Rowton-Moor, by Poinz a Rebel-Officer, and either kill'd or taken Prisoners, Sir Philip was among them, and was fent to Tork; but had some Fayour shewn to him, by Means of his Uncle the Lord Wharton, engag'd on the other Side. When King C. 2 came with his Army out of Scotland, A. D. 1651, Sir Philip did his Majesty all the good Services he could. After the fatal Battel of Worcester he went into France for some Time, but returning from thence, he liv'd privately at Oxford, and where else he could with most Safety. til the Cloud of the Usurpation was over. At the Restoration of King C. 2, A. D. 1660, he was made Governor of Carlifle, and had fome other Reparation made him by the Crown, for the Sufferings of his Family. He had a Warrant to be Baron Musgrave of Hartley Castle, but never took out the Patent. He departed this Life at his Seat at Edenhall, Feb. 7. A.D. 1678, aged 70 Years; in great Honour and Esteem, for a wife, loyal, and brave Man. He lies interr'd under a Monument of white Marble, in the Chancel of the Parish-Church of Edenball, the burial Place of this Family, fince that Estate came into it.

He had by his Lady six Sons; Sir Richard, Philip, who dy'd in France; Sir Christopher, William, and Simon, who was unfortunately drown'd; and Thomas, Dean of Carlisle, and Prebendary of Dur-

bam; also one Daughter, Frances.

Richard

Richard Musgrave, eldest Son and Heir to Sir Philip, succeeded him in Title and Estate; he was of an infirm Constitution, and did not concern himself in any publick Affairs, and having marry'd a Daughter of—Harrison, in Com. Ebor, Esq, he lest only one Daughter, Mary, marry'd to Thomas Davyson of Blackston, in Com. Dunelm. Esq, whereupon

Sir Christopher Musgrave, Kt. Brother to Sir Richard, and third Son to Sir Philip, succeeded in the Dignity and Estate. While he was young he was very active for the Royal Cause, and suffer'd much by Imprisonment, and otherwise; towards the End of the Usurpation) being found to be concern'd in Sir George Booth's Rising. After the Restoration he had a Commission as Capw tain of the Guards, and was knighted; made Governor of Carlifle, and Lieutenant-General of the Ordnance; and in the first Year of her Majesty Queen Anne, made one of the four Tellers of the Exchequer. He was twice marry'd, his first Lady was Mary, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Andrew Cogan of Greenwich, Bart. by whom he had two Sons and one Daughter, viz. Philip Musgrave, Esq; hereafter-mention'd; Mary and Christopher. This Lady dy'd in Child-bed at Carlifle Castle, 8 July, A.D. 1664, in the 28th Year of her Age, and lies bury'd in the Chancel of Eden-bal. His second Lady was Elizabeth, Daughter to Sir-Franklyn, Bart. by whom he had fix Sons, viz. John, Richard, who dy'd young; Joseph, (Burgess for Cockermouth, Com. Cumb. A. D. 1713,) Simon, who dy'd in the East-Indies; Thomas and George, and fix Daughters: Elizabeth, marry'd to John Wyneve of Brettenham, in Suffolk, Esq. Dorothy, Frances, Mary, marry'd to John Hawley of Brentford, Com. Midd. Esq; Anne, and Barbara. He serv'd in Parliament for many Years, and, on all Occasions, demonstrated himself a loyal Subject, an able Statesman, and fingular

fingular Patriot to his Country. He dy'd at London of a Pally, 30 June, A. D. 1704, in the feventy third Year of his Age, and lyes bury'd near his eldest Son Philip aforesaid, who dy'd before him.

Which Philip born May 21, A. D. 1660, was a Gentleman of great Hopes, and had all the Advantages of Education, both at Home and Abroad: He marry'd 12 November 1685, Mary, eldest Daughter to George Legg, Lord Dartmouth, then Master-General of the Ordnance. He was Clerk of the Council in the Reign of King James the IId, and Clerk of the Deliveries in the Ordnance, and dying 2 July, 1689, much lamented by all that knew him, was bury'd in the Chapel of the Minories; (where his Father-in-Law, the Lord Dartmouth, was afterwards bury'd, Anno 1691) and lest a Son and a Daughter; Christopher, now living, and Barbara.

Christopher Musgrave, youngest Son of Sir Christopher, was born at Carlisle, and bred to the Law; and, upon the Death of his elder Brother, succeeded him as Clerk of the Council: He hath serv'd the City of Carlisle as their Representative in Parliament, and is at present Clerk of the Ordnance.

Christopher, only Son and Heir of Philip, on his Grandfather's Death, succeeded in the Fstate and Dignity. As soon as he had pass'd thro' his Education at Eaton, and Christ Church, Oxon, and was come of Age, his Uncle Christopher, by Leave of the late Queen resign'd to him the Place of a Clerk of her Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, which his Father had enjoy'd but sew Years. He has serv'd in Parliament for the City of Carlisle, and, by his Majesty King George, has been continued in his Post: He marry'd 21 June, Vol. I.

A. D. 1711, Julia, Daughter to Sir John Chardin Kt. hath Islue one Son and a Daughter; Philip born April 23, A. D. 1712, and Mary, born 16 April A. D. 1713.

# EDWARD SEYMOUR of BERRY-POMEROY, Esq; Devon. Nº24.

A Mong others who enter'd England with the Conqueror, or soon after, were those of the Name of Seymour, as the learned Camden and other Genealogists agree, and that they were anciently written St. Maur; (a) and in old Latin Records, D.S.

(h) Camden's Remains, p. 113 6 151.

D. S. Mauro, deduc'd from a Place of the same Name in Normandy. Milo de St. Maur, was one of the Barons (b) of the Realm in the Reign of King John, as his Descendants were till the Reign of King Henry the Vth, when Richard de St. Maur left an only Daughter and Heir, the Wife of Sir William le Zouch, Kt. But there were several junior Branches of this Family; and the Name I find written Semere, Semor, and Seymour, in the Reigns of King Henry the HIId and Edward the Ist.

Nicholas de Semere (c) is mention'd in a Charter of Nefta de Cokefeld, in the Reign of K. Hemy IIId, and in 25 Ed. 1. one of the same Name (d) was summon'd among the principal Persons of Note, that held Lands to the Value of 20 l. or more, in the Counties of Somerset and Dorset, to attend the King at London, with Horse and Arms, the Sunday after the Octaves of St. John Baptist, to go with him beyond the Seas. At the same Time, and on the same Occasion, (e) Ralph de Seymour had Summons among those of the County of Northampton; and in 29 Ed. 1. he was (f) requir'd to appear with Horse and Arms to attend the King in his Expedition against the Scots.

William de S. Mauro, (lineal Ancestor (g) of the Seymours now existing) by the Aid of Gilbert Lord Marefal, Earl of Pembrook, recover'd Wendy and Penbow, (Parts of Monmouthshire) from the Welsh Nation in 22 H. 2. 1240, and was succeeded therein by Sir Roger, (\*) his Son and Heir, living in the Reign of King Edward the Ist, who was succeed-

by a Son of his own Name, Sir Roger, L. of Penbow, in 8 Ed. 2. who had Islue 2 Sons, John, Lord of Penhow, and Sir Roger Seymour, Kt. Lord of Wendy or Woundy, by the Gift of his Brother, and feated at Evinswinden, in Com Wilts, who made a great Addition to his paternal Fortune, by marrying Cicely, 2d Daughter of John Lord Beauchamp of Hacche, and Sitter and Coheir to John her Brother, who dy'd in 35 Fd. 3, for the had atlign'd for her Share on the Partition (b) of the Inheritance of the Beauchamps, the Manours of Hacche, Shepton. Beauchamp, Murifield, and the 3d Part of the Manour of Shepton-Malet, in Com. Somers. certain Lands in Sturminster-Marshal, in Com. Dors. the Manours of Boultbury and Haberton, in Com, Devon. the Manour of Dourton, in Com. Bucks; Little-Haw, in Com. Suff. and two Parts of the Manour of Selling, in Com. Kanc.

This Sir Roger Seymour had feveral Sons, whereof William inherited the Estate; and in 30 Ed. 3. (\*) attended the Prince of Wales into Gascoigny, having the King's Letters of Protection, dated at Bamburgh the 8th of February the same Year. had to Wife Margaret, Daughter and Heir of Simon de Brockburne, of the County of Hereford, by Joan, Sister and Heir of Sir Peter de la Mare, Kt. and dving in 15 R. 2, was succeeded by Roger, his Son and Heir, who marry'd Maud, Daughter and Coheir to Sir William Esturmi of Chadham, in Com. Wilts, Kt. Lord of Woolphall, in the same County. Which Family of Esturmis, were Bailiss and Guardians of the Forest of Savernake, by Right of Inheritance, from the Time of King Henry the IId; in Remembrance whereof, their Hunters Horn, of a mighty Bigness, and tipp'd with Silver,

is

is kept in the Family of the Duke of Somerfet (i) as a Monument of their Descent from such worthy Ancestors. This Roger dy'd in 8 H. 5, and was succeeded by John, his Son and Heir.

In this Reign was also Sir Edmond Seymour, Kt. Lord of St. Brigid, infr. Wens, and of Chelney, in Com. Somers. whose last Will (k) and Testament bears Date in the Year 1421, (10 H. 5) wherein he mentions Foan his Wife, Margery his Daughter, and Richard his Brother, and orders his Body to be bury'd in the Church of St. Brigid of (helney, if he dies in England, but if in Wales, then in the

Church of St. Brigid of Wens.

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John Seymour, Son and Heir of Sir Roger, made Woolphall the Inheritance of his Mother, his capital He was a very noted and active Perfon, having been Sheriff of several Counties, and in other publick Offices. In 9 H 6, he was Sheriff (1) of the County of South.impton, and the Year following for Wiltsbire. (m) Also in 12 H. 6, when the Title of the House of Tork was set on Foot, and all Persons of Note in the several Counties of England, were summon'd to take the Oaths, to preferve the Peace, for themselves and Retainers, he appear'd in Wiltsbire, and is the first mention'd in the List after the Knights in that County. He was that (n) Year Sheriff of Dorset and Somersetfire, and knighted before the 15th Year of King Henry the VIth, when he was again Sheriff of the County of Southampton. He was likewise in the fame Office for Wiltsbire, in 29 H. 6 and one of the Knights (o) for the faid County in the Parliament held at Reading, in 31 H. 6. also the Year follow-[m 3]

ing was a third Time Sheriff of Southampton, and departed this Life in the 4th Year of the Reign of King (\*) Edward the IVth. He had Issue by Isabel his Wife, Daughter and Heir of William Mack Williams of Gloucester shire, who dy'd in 1. R 3. John Seymour, Esq, his Son and Heir, Sheriff of Wiltshire (p) in 36 H. 6. and dy'd before his Father in 3 Ed. 4. leaving, by his Wife Elizabeth, Daughter and Heir of Robert Coker of Lawrence Lydiard, (who deceas'd in 12 Ed. 4) two Sons, John and Humphrey Seymour of Evinswinden, who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter and Heir of -Winflow of Burton, in Com. Oxon, and left Posterity; whereof, I presume, the Seymours of Oxfordshire descend, and those of Hanford, in Com. Dorset; who have a Chief charg'd with three Martlets, as an additional Distinction in their Arms.

John Seymour, Esq. eldest Son of Sir John, took to Wise Elizabeth. Daughter to Sir George Darell, and had Issue four Sons, and as many Daughters; Margaret marry'd to Sir William Wadham; Jane, the Wise of Sir John Huddlesson of Warlesson, in Com. Cumber. Elizabeth espous'd to John Crosts, Esq. and Catherine, who dy'd a Maiden. His Sons were Sir John, hereafter mention'd, Sir Robert Seymour, 2d Son, Sir George Seymour, Sherist of Wiltshire in 14 H.7, and Sir William Seymour made Knight of the Bath at the Marriage of Prince Arthur, eldest Son to King Henry the VIIth.

John Seymour, the eldest Son, was one of the Commanders of those Forces that vanquish'd the Lord Audley and the Connish Rebels at Blackbeath, in Kent, in 12 H. 7. (q) and, for his valiant Deportment in that Engagement, was knighted by the

the King in the Field of Battel. He ferv'd King Henry the VIIIth in his Wars in France and Flanders; and in the 5th Year of his Reign, for his gallant Behaviour at the Siege of Therowene; and the Battel that ensu'd, call'd by our Historians the Battel of Spurrs, had the Honour of Knight Banneret (r) conferr'd on him. In-7 H 8. he was Sheriff of Dorfetsbire and Somersetsbire; as also in 18 H. 8. (s) and was twice Sheriff for Wiltshire in 10 & 16 H. 8. In 9 H. 8. being then one of the Knights for the Body of that King, (t) he obtain'd a Grant of the Constablewick of Bristol Castle, to himself, and Edward his Son, in as ample Manner as Giles Lord D'Aubeen, held the same. In the Year 1520, he attended on King Henry the VIIIth (u) at the great Interview with Francis the French King, between Guisnes and Ardres, having in his Retinue I Chaplain, 4 Servants, and 8 led Horles

When the Emperor, Charles the Vth, came into England in 14 H. 8. 1522, he (w) was appointed to attend the King at Canterbury, the 27th of May, in order to his Reception. In 22 H. 8. he was one of the five of the County of Wilts (x) who were appointed to enquire into the Possessinos of Cardinal Wolfer; and at the 2d Interview with Francis, the French King at Bulloign, in the Year 1532, (24 H. 8.) he was one (y) of the Grooms of the Cham-

ber, and waited on his Sovereign.

He had the Honour of having his eldest Daughter, Jane, marry'd to King Henry the VIIIth, who was not only inclin'd to this Marriage by his own Affections, but by the bumble Petition and Intercession of

of most of the Nobles of this Realm, mov'd thereunto, as well by the Conveniency of her Tears, as in respect that by her excellent Beauty and pureness of Flesh and Blood, (as is worded (z) in the Act of Succession)

she was apt (God willing) to conceive Issue.

This Sir John Seymour departed this Life in the Year 1526, (28 H. 8) in the 60th Year of his Age, and had Sepulture in Easton Priory Church, in Com. Wilts. but on the Dissolution thereof, his Remains were remov'd, and bury'd, the 30th of Sept. 1590, in the Chancel of the Parith-Church of Great Bedwin. His Lady (who was Margaret, Daughter of Sir John Wentworth of Nettlested in Com. Suff) furviv'd him, and dv'd in the Year 1550, as her last Testament, and the Probat thereof, shews: "Wherein (a) she bequeaths her "Body to be bury'd as her Executors think fit; " and leaves divers Legacies of Plate, Jewels, &c. " to her Relations; and mentions Edward Seymour " and Henry Seymour, Sons of the Duke of Somer-" fet, as her Godfons; and constitutes her Son " Sir Henry Seymour Executor.

Their Issue were six Sons and sour Daughters:

1. Jane, marry'd (as before was said) to King Henry the Eighth, and Mother to the pious King Edward the Sixth, of whom she dy'd in Childbed, greatly lamented by the whole Realm, being (b) reputed, (as our Historians relate) not only the sairest, but the discreetest of all the King's Wives, and her Death so much afflicted the King, who always sound her humble and loyal, that, notwithstanding several Offers made to him, he continu'd a Widower more than two Years. Elizabeth, second Daughter, was marry'd to Sir Antho-

on Oughtred, 2dly, to Gregory Lord Cromwell, and adly, to John Lord St. John, of Basing, afterwards Marquels of Winchester. Margery, third Daughter, dy'd an Infant; and Dorothy was wedded, first to Sir Clement Smith, of Little Badow in Effex, Kt. and, after his Decease, to Thomas Leventhorp, a vounger Brother of Edward Leventborp of Shingey-Hall in Com. Hertford, Esq. The six Sons were, 1. John, who dy'd unmarry'd the 15th of July 1520; Edward Seymour, 2d Son, Duke of Somerset; Sir Henry, 3d Son, possess'd of the large Manours of Marvel and Twyford in Com Southamp. knighted at the Coronation of King Edward the Sixth, being one of the Forty in Substitution of Knights of (c) the Bath, that were not created, for want of Time to perform the Ceremony. He was one of the Knights for Wiltshire, in the Parliament (d) call'd by that King, and left a Family, which is now extinct, at Marvel aforesaid. Sir Thomas Seymour, 4th Son, distinguishing himself in several military Commands, was, at length, in 35 H. 8. Marshal of the Forces under Sir John Wallop, that were fent in Aid of Maximilian the Emperor. against the French King, as also of those Forces, fent into France, under the leading of his Brother Edward Earl of Hertford. In the 1st Year of King Edward the Sixth, he was advanc'd to the Title of Lord Seymour of Sudley, elected (e) one of the Knights Companions of the most Noble Order of the Garter, and made Lord High Admiral of England; but having marry'd Catharine Parr, the Widow of the deceas'd King, he grew turbulent, (f) and full of ambitious Designs. which occasion'd his fall, and Death; the Circum**ftances**

stances whereof are too long to relate. John and Anthony, 5th and 6th Sons of Sir John Seymour,

dy'd young.

Edward Seymour, eldest Son, was educated, first at Oxford, and after some Stay there, remov'd to Cambridge (g) (whereof he was Chancellor in the Reign of King Edward the 6th) from whence returning to his Father at Court, when martial Atchievements were encouraged by King Henry the Eighth, he took early to Arms, spent his Youth in the Wars, and landing at Calais, with the Duke of Suffolk, the 24th of August, 1523. (15 H. 8.) was in the Expedition, and at the Taking of Bray, Roye, and Montdidier in France: and therein shewing a prudent Conduct, and valiant Behaviour, he had the Honour of Knighthood conferr'd on him by the Duke of Suffolk at Rose, (b) on Alhallows Day, the same Year. 24 H. 8. being 'Squire for the Body (i) to the King, he was in that gallant Train, which attended on their Sovereign at Bulloigu, at his Interview with Francis the French King. At the Time of his Sister's Marriage with King Henry the Bigbth, he was one of the Knights for the Body; (k) but on that Solemnity, he had the Title of Viscount Beauchamp conferr'd on him, by reason of his Descent from an Heir Female of that House, as before is shewn; and the same Year, (with Sir Richard Buckley, Kt.) had a Grant of the Office of Chancellor (1) and Chamberlain of North Wales for Life, as also made Captain of the Isle of Ferfey, upon the Surrender of that Command by Sir Thomas Vaux Lord Harrowden.

On the 18th of Od. 1537 (29 H. 8.) he was (m) created Earl of Hartford. In 32 H. 8. he was fent

fent over to France to dispute the Limits of the English Borders, and the same Year (n) elected at Hampton Court (9 Jan.) one of the Knights Companions of the Most Noble Order of the Gar-As Cousin and Heir to Sir William Sturmy, Knight, viz. Son of Sir John Seymour, Kt. Son of John Seymour, Fig, Son of Sir John Seymour, Kt. Son of Maud, Daughter and Heir to Sir William Sturmy, Kt. he had Livery of Sturmy's Lands. In 22 H. 8. the Scotch denying their Homage, (o) he accompany'd the Duke of Norfolk, in his Expedition into Scotland. In 34 H. 8. he was made Lord Great Chamberlain of England for Life; and the same Year, (p) being made Lieutenant-General of the North, he, with an Army well furnish'd, march'd into Scotland, when Leith and Edinburgh were taken and plunder'd. In 36 H. 8. the King being then at the Seige of Bulloign, (q) he came to him with several Troops of Almains, French, and others; and after taking thereof, routed an Army of 14000 French, who lay encamp'd hard by.

In 37 H. 8. the Scots making several Incursions on the Borders, in Conjunction with 5000 Auxiliaries from France; he being sent against them; (r) destroy'd all the Towns upon the middle Marches, and passing towards the West, made great Spoil in those Parts. Soon after, the French endeavouring to regain Bulloign, he forc'd their Retreat; and, pursuing the Enemy, besides the Slaughter, gain'd several Trophies of his Success. (s) The next Year, the Earl of Surrey, Governor of Bulloign, being laid aside, he was put in his Stead, and sent over, with the Lord Admiral,

and

and an Army of 9300 Men, to oppose the French, then making Head. Soon after, upon Propofals of Peace, he was constituted the Chief of the English Commissioners for that Treaty, when a Peace was happily concluded. And now the King lying upon his Death-bed, he was (t) appointed one of his Executors; after whose Decease, (Fan. 28. 1547) he immediately repair'd to the young King (u) at Hertford; and conducting him to London, was, by the Council, (1 Feb.) unanimoully elected Protector of the Realm, and Governour of the King's Person, until he should accomplish the Age of 18 Years; to which Office he was deem'd most fit, in that he was the King's Uncle by the Mother's Side, very near to him in Blood, but yet of no Capacity to succeed; by Reason whereof, his natural Affection and Duty was less easy to be sway d by Ambition. On the 70th of February following, he was chosen Lord Treasurer; and being no Baron, on the 15th of February. (x) was advanced to that Degree, with Limitation to the Heirs Male of his Body, by Anne his Wife, remainder to Edward Seymour his Son, by Catharine his first Wife: The next Day he was created Duke of Somerset, (y) and to the Heirs Male of his Body by Anne his Wife, who was Daughter to Sir Edward Stanhope (z) of Rampton in Com. Nott. Kt. and Heir to her Mother Elizabeth, Sister to John Bourchier Earl of Bath, and Great Grandaughter of William Bourchier Earl of Ewe in Normandy, (a) by Anne his Wife. Daughter and sole Heir of Thomas of Woodstock, Duke of Gloucester, seventh and youngest Son of King Edward the Third.

From which Sir Edward Stanhope, (b) (who was knighted with Sir John Seymour in the Field of Battle at Black Heath, for his valiant Behaviour against the Cornish Rebels; as also made Knight for the Body to King Henry the 7th, (c) Constable of Sandale Castle, Steward of the Honour of Wakefield, &c. and dy'd the 6th of June, (d) in 3 H.8.) are descended the present Larls of Chester field and Stanhope; as also, those of the Name at Mainsfield in Com. Note. and (e) at Elvaston in Derbyshire; whereof Charles Stanhope, Esq. is Joint-Secretary of the Treasury; and his Brother William Stanhope a Colonel of Dragoons, has eminently distinguish'd himself, both in the Camp, and as Envoy Extraordinary to the present King of Spain.

The said Edward Duke of Somerset, on the 17th

The said Edward Duke of Somerset, on the 17th of February, was created Earl Marshal of England for Life; the 12th of March following, he was, by Patent, made Protector and Governour of the King and his Realms; and on the 27th of May, (f) had License to retain and keep 200 Persons; as also, a Grant, the 9th of July, of 8000 Marks #Ann. during the Time he should be Protector, &c. He had likewise a special Grant, that he should sit alone, and be placed at all Times, as well in the King's Presence in Parliament, as in his Absence, on the Middle of the Bench or Stool, standing next on the Right Hand the King's

Royal Seat in Parliament.

In the first Year of his Ac

In the first Year of his Administration, he warily made a Peace with France, turning all his Thoughts to bring about the Match of Mary Stewart, sole Daughter and Heir to James V. King of Scotland, (g) with his Nephew King Edward the

the Sixth, and to that End first assail'd the Scotch Nobility by friendly Letters, remembring them of the Promises, Seals, and Oaths, which, by publick Authority, had pass'd, for concluding the Marriage, as also, that the two Princes were agreeable, both for Years and princely Qualities, to be join'd together, and thereby knitt both Realms into one, which would be profitable as well as honourable to both Kingdoms. these, and many other Reasons, that were enforc'd by the Protector, taking no Effect, he prepar'd an Army, and invading Scotland, fought the memorable Battle at Musselborgb; wherein his undaunted Courage, as well as Conduct, were the principal Means of gaining that fignal Victory, which put an End to the Scots ever making Head again (to any Purpole) against the English.

But this good Duke, (for so he was commonly (b) stil'd) after all the great Services he had done his Country, fell by the Stroke of the Ax, the 22d of January 1552, the Power of the King, his Nephew, being not able to save him, his Ruin being projected and perfected (as our Historians agree) by the subtil Artifices of that haughty Man, John Dudley Earl of Warnick, (afterwards Duke of Northumberland) to make Way for his own ambitious and aspiring Designs.

His Character is much impeach'd, by Sir John Heyward, in his History of the Life of King Edward the VIth, but the Notes thereon, fully manifest the Errors of that Author, who in many Particulars consutes himself. He says of him, (i) "That he was a Man little esteem'd, either for Wistam dom er Personage, or Courage in Arms. Yet, in these

these Words directly following, recites, " being in Favour with King Henry, and by him "much employ'd, he was always observ'd to be both Faithful and Fortunate, as well in giving " Advice as in managing a Charge: That being "Warden of the Marches against Scotland, the "Invasion of James the Vth, was by his Direction, " encounter'd and broken, at Solome-Mosse, where-" of divers of the Scotch Nobility were taken Prisoners: That he and the Earl of Warnick, " with a Handful of Men, to speak of, fir'd Leith and Edinburgh, and return'd, by a leifurely " March 44 Miles thro' the Body of Scotland. "The next ensuing Year, he invaded the Scotch Borders, wasted Tivedale, and the Marches: "That the Year following being fent to view the "Fortifications upon the Marches of Calais, he " did not only that, but with the hardy Approach of 7000 English, rais'd an Army of 21000 French, encamp'd over the River before " Bulloign, won their Ordnance, Carriage, Trea-" fure, and Tents, with the Loss only of one Man, " and return'd from thence, by Land, to Guefner, " won, in his Way, within Shot and Rescue of " Arde, the Castle of Outing, commonly call'd " the Red Pile: That he invaded and spoil'd " Picardy, began the Forts of Newbaven, Blackness, " and Bullingberge, and so well apply'd his Endea-" vours, that in a few Weeks, and before his Departure, they were made Tenable: That upon these, and other like Successes, his succeeding "Fortunes were esteem'd, always rather new " than strange, and his only Presence was repu-" ted a sufficient Surety for an Army. And yet " did he never rife thereby, either into Haughtiness in himself, or Contempt of others, but remain'd Courteous and Affable, choosing a Course " least Subject to Envy, between stiff Stubborn-" ness " ness and filthy Flattery, never aspiring higher than to be the 2d Person in State.

This Author (k) giving an Account of Muscleborough Battel, relates, also, several Acts both of Wisdom and Courage in the Duke, so that 'tis wonderful he should so far contradict himself: but it appears, that what he afferts, is from Saunders a Jesuit, whose Pen was not directed so much by Truth, as Malice to the Duke, who was a zealous Encourager of the Reformation. He was certainly faithful to his Country, studious of its Safety and Honour, and never entertain'd Hopes prejudicial to either. He was Generous, Bountiful, and ready to do good Offices to all that stood in Need; to which Purpose he erected an Office [Master of Requests] for the better taking Care of poor Men's Suits, (1) and for the more effectual speeding them, without the Delays and Charges of the Law. Secretary Cecil was the first Mafter thereof, and Sir Thomas Smith the 2d; both Persons sam'd for their great Knowledge and excellent Accomplishments, who ow'd their Rise principally to the Duke's Goodness; as did several, whose Families are remaining at this Day. He fuffer'd with great Constancy and firmness of Mind, and an entire Refignation to the Will of God, and Charity to all Mankind: Professing, (m) that he had never offended against the King, either by Thought, Word, or Deed, but had alway been as true and faithful to the Realm as any Man His Death was very much lamented, People dipping their Handkerchiefs in his Blood, and laying them up as facred Relicks.

This great Duke had two Wives; 1st, Catherine, Daughter and Coheir of Sir William Fillol of Woodlands, in Com. Dorset, Kt. by whom he had Issue a Son, Edward, of whose Posterity I am principally to treat; and by Anne, his 2d Lady, Daughter to Sir Edward Stanbope, as before was said, had Issue Edward his Son and Heir, who, by his Father's Attainder, lost the Title of Duke of Somerset. but was created Baron Beauchamp and Earl of Hertford in the first Year of the Reign of Oueen Elizabeth; to which Dignities succeeded William. his Grandson, who was restor'd to the Title of Duke of Somerset, by Repeal of the Attainder: and those Honours are now enjoy'd, by the Most Noble Charles Seymour, Duke of Somerset, Great, Grandson of Edward Lord Beauchamp, Grandson of the first Duke of Somerset, and Anne his Wife, before-mention'd.

Which Anne, Dutchess of Somerset, dy'd at Hanworth on Easter Day, the 16th of April, 1587, in the 90th Year of her Age; and, by Order of Queen Elizabeth, the prime Officers of, State attended at her Funeral, which was very magnificently folemniz'd (w) in Westminster-Abby. the 4th of July, in 30 Eliz. and being very memorable, is worthy relating.

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two, with their Hoods on their Shoulders; then another Officer of Arms, and after him Gentlemen in black Gowns, two and two, with their Hoods on their Shoulders; then ano-"ther Officer of Arms, who was follow'd by the Steward, Treasurer, and Comptroller, with " white Staves in their Hands, and their Hoods on their Shoulders; after whom came the " Preacher; and after him an Officer of Arms; " then proceeded the Body, born by 27 Gentlemen, under a Canopy, carry'd by four Eiquires. The Affistants to the Body, were the Earls of " Ormand and Lincoln, the Lord Henry Seymour, and the Lord Edward Seymour; between them proceeded Garter-Principal King at Arms and two Gentlemen Ushers, who were follow'd by the Lord Treasurer, leading the Countess of " Hertford, chief Mourner, the Earl of Hertford " being Assistant to the Lord Treasurer, and the " Train of the Countels of Hertford was born by "the Lady Burleigh; then follow'd the Lady Mary and the Lady Elizabeth Seymour, the Lady " Audley and the Lady Willoughby, the Lady " Dacres and the Lady Cobbam, the Lady Stafford " and the Lady Bourchier, the Lady Walfingham and the Lady Cheke, the Lady Throgmorton and the Lady Gerrard. Then went Gentlemen in " black Gowns, French Hoods, and other Hoods, " follow'd by waiting Gentlewomen in black "Gowns, two and two, and Yeomen in black "Gowns, two and two; then came Gentlemen " and Gentlewomen without Mourning, all in convenient Order.

I now return to Edward Seymour, eldest Son of the Duke by his first Wife. Which Edward posfels'd a good Estate at Berry-Pomeroy in Devonshire, purpurchas'd by his Father (y) of Sir Thomas Pomeroy, and was likewise (z) posses'd of the Manour of Mayden-Bradley, in Com. Wilts, which he purchas'd himself, of the Commissioners appointed by Queen Mary, to dispose of Church Lands. He receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood, was Sheriss of Devon, (a) in 25 Eliz and having taken to Wise Margaret, Daughter to John Welsh, one of the Justices of the Common-Pleas, had Issue one Son, Edward, his Successor.

Which Edward Seymour of Berry-Pomeroy, was one of the Knights of the Shire in Parliament for the County of Denon, (b) in 35 & 43 Eliz. as also in the first Year of the Reign of King James the Ist, and was advanced to the Dignity of a Baronet on the 29th of June, A. D. 1611, in the 9th Year of the Reign of that King. He marry'd, in Anno 1570, Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir Arthur Champernon, and departing this Life in the Year

1612, had Issue several Sons and Daughters.

Edward, his eldest Son, knighted at Greenwich the 22d of May 1603, was (c) sent by King James the Ist, on an Embassy to the King of Denmark, and succeeding his Father in Title and Estate, was elected one of the Knights for Devon-shire in the Parliament held in the Year 1619, (18 Jac. 1.) and for Kellington (d) and Totnes in two other Parliaments, whereof the last met at Westminster the 6th of February 1625, by the Appointment of King Charles the Ist; but, on the Dissolution thereof, being in an advanced Age, he lived retired at the Castle of Berry-Pomeroy, (e)

which he made a stately House: This Seat had a fine Prospect, being situate upon a Rock, on a rising Ground, from the East and North over a pleasant Rivulet, (f) running thro'a Deer-Park, which emptieth itself into the Hemms at Little Hemston; as that doth into the Dart, half a Mile from Totnes, and the Parish of Berry conjoins to that of Totnes, by a fair Bridge of about eight Arches,

standing over the River Dart.

This Castle of Berry, the ancient Seat of the Pomeroys, was a great and noble Structure; but in those miserable Times of Confusion, during the Civil Wars in the Reign of King Charles the Ist, was demolish'd, and now lyes in Ruins. Additions this Sir Edward Seymour made thereto, is, by Mr. Prince, (g) (who relates, that upwards of 20000 ls. were bestow'd thereon) thus set forth: "Before the Door of the Great Hall was a " noble Walk, whose Length was the Breadth of " the Court, arch'd over with curiously carv'd " Free-Stone, supported in the fore Part by se-" veral stately Pillars of the same Stone of great " Dimenfions, after the Corintbian Order, stand-" ing on Pedestals, having Cornices or Friezes " finely wrought; behind which were plac'd in "the Wall, several Seats of Frieze-Stone also, " cut into the Form of an Escallop-Shell, in which " the Company, when a weary, might repofe " themselves. The Apartments within were " very splendid, especially the Dining Room, which was adorn'd, besides Paint, with Statues " and Figures cut in Alablaster, with admirable "Art and Labour; but the Chimney-piece of po-" lish'd Marble, curiously engraven, was of great " Cost and Value. Many other of the Rooms "were well adorn'd with Moldings and Fretwork;

"fome of whose Marble Clavils were so delicate"ly fine, that they would reflect an Object true
and lively from a great Distance. In short,
the Number of the Apartments of the whole,
may be collected hence, if Report be true,
that it was a good Day's Work for a Servant
but to open and shut the Casements belonging
to them.

At this Seat the said Sir Edward Seymour dy'd, about the Year 1641, very much lamented, having, by an obliging Temper, attracted the Love of his Country; and, by a prudent Management, gain'd the Character of a Person of Honour, Condust, and Experience. He had by Dorothy, his Lady, Daughter of Sir Hemy Killigrew of Lathbury, Kt. several Sons and Daughters: Elizabeth was marry'd to Sir William Courtney of Powderam, in Com. Devon, Kt. Mary was wedded to Sir Jonathan Trelawny, Bart. Father of the present Bishop of Winchester; another was espous'd to \_\_\_\_\_\_ Trelawney, Brother to the said Sir Jonathan; and Amiz was Wife to Dr. Stourton.

Of the Sons, Edward, the eldest, will be mention'd hereafter; Hemy, 2d Son, born in the Year 1612, was a Gentleman vallu'd and esteem'd by Persons of the greatest Note in the Reigns of King Charles the Ist and IId. He was, in his Youth, Page of Honour to King Charles the Ist; and, on the Irruption of the Civil Wars, went with the Marquel's of Hertford into Somersetsbire, and was with that noble Peer at Sherburn, (h) who with only two Troops of Horse and 400 Foot, they couragiously withstood the whole Force of the Earl of Bedford, confifting of above 7000 Foot, besides Horse, with Cannon, &c. and the Marquess sending the Earl of Bedford a  $\begin{bmatrix} \mathbf{n} & \mathbf{a} \end{bmatrix}$ Chal-

Challenge, Mr. Seymour was (i) chose to carry it. His Behaviour, in all Respects, won him the Esteem of the whole Court; so that when it was thought necessary for the Prince of Wales, afterwards King Charles the IId, to have Servants peculiar to himself: He was then nominated one of

the Grooms of the Bed-chamber.

When all was lost in England, he went with his Royal Master abroad, and was entrusted with the last Letter and Message that the Prince (k) fent to his Father under Confinement by the Rebels, (dated from the Hague 23 Jan. 1648) and delivering it the 27th of the same Month, in the Evening of that Day the Sentence of Death was pass'd on his Majesty, was, on that melancholly Ocfion, in the deepest Sorrow. He kiss'd the King's Hands, (1) clasp'd about his Legs, and mourn'd in a most lamentable Manner, wherewith his Majesty was very much affected; who, after reading the forrowing Letter he brought, and heard what he had to fay, imparted to him his Answer, the last he sent the Prince. He afterwards attended King Charles the IId into Scotland, and was one of the few English Servants permitted to be near his Perfon: Also when the King got safe to Paris, after the Battel of Worcester, Mr. Seymour was one of the first his Majesty took Notice of there, and was fent to the Earl of Clarendon at Brussels, to require his Attendance when all his other Servants were order'd not to repair to him till farther Orders. His Courage and Integrity were so well known and approv'd, that he was employ'd in Negotiations between his Majesty and his Friends in England, in those perilous Times during the King's Exile, and trusted by the Marquess of Hertford, the

the Earl of Southampton, and others of Honour and Note, with their fecret Correspondence, as a Perfon whom they knew, (as my Lord (m) Clarendon relates) the King and Council would believe.

In the Year 1660, he was chosen (tho' Abroad) a Member for Eaflow, in the Parliament that brought about the Restoration of the Royal Family, and continually ferv'd for that Borough till the Time of his Death. The King, as a Reward for his faithful Services, besides continuing him in his Post of Groom of the Bedchamber. constituted him Comptroller of the Customs, (n) during his own Life, and that of his Brother John Seymour, Esq; and also gave him a Patent of Clerk of the Hanaper, for three Lives, and when one of them dropp'd, he got the Patent re-He came to reside at Langley, in Com. Bucks, (near to Windsor) in the Year 1666, renting the House (o) and Park of the Trustees of Sir William Parsons, (then deceas'd) and about the Year 1669 purchas'd the said Estate, and got a Grant from the King of the Manour of Langley, under a reserv'd Rent of 431. 81. 10d. # Ann. At this Seat he had the Comfort of living in Ease and Quiet the latter Part of his Life, in the general Esteem of all that knew him, being a Gentleman of great Honour, Generolity, Affability, and Charity. He built and endow'd, in his Life time, an Alms-House at Langley for six poor decay'd People; and, by his last Will and Testament, gave 400 l. to put out poor Boys Apprentices, besides other charitable Legacies to parti-cular Persons.

He dy'd the 9th of March 1686, in the 74th Year of his Age, and was bury'd the 18th following in the Vault, adjoining to the Parish Church of Langley. He took to Wife, 1st, Elizabeth, Daughter of - Killigrew, and Widow of William Basset of Claverton, in Com. Somers. Esq. and she dying without Issue in June 1671. He marry'd, 2dly, Ursula, Daughter of Sir Robert Austin, Bart. and Widow of George Stowel, Esq. Brother to Ralph Lord Stewel. She hore to him an only Son, Henry, born the 20th of Odober, 1674, who, at 7 Years of Age, in Consideration of his Father's approv'd Loyalty and Services. (and while he was living) was, by King Charles the IId, created a Baronct by Letters Patents dated the 4th of Fuly 1681.

Which Sir Henry Seymour, Bart. after the Advantage of a Learned Education, at Home, travell'd Abroad for his farther Improvement; and, on his Return, was elected to Parliament for the Borough of Eastlow, in 10 W. 3. (q) as also to six other Parliaments, till the Time of his Death.

In the Year 1710, he was prevail'd on to stand for Knight of the Shire for the County of Bucks, in which numerous Election, tho' the first Time of his appearing, he lost it only by a few Votes, [under 20] and that was owing, as 'tis said, to the Nicety of his Honour, in making all his Friends vote for his Collegue, when the like Care was not taken to do him the same Justice. He dy'd at London in the Year 1714, unmarry'd, and was bury'd by his Father at Langley; and leaving no Will, his personal Estate (that was very considerable) fell to his Sister; and the Inheritance at Langley devolv'd on the present Sir Edward Seymour.

I now return to Sir Edward Seymour, Bart. (eldest Son of Sir Edward Seymour, Kt. and Bart.) Which Sir Edward, born in the Year 1611, was elected one of the Knights for Devonshire, (r) during the Life of his Father, in the two last Parliaments call'd by King Charles the Ist, and adhering to his Sovereign, in the Times of the Rebellion, had his House of Berry Castle, in Devon-Thire plunder'd and burnt. He sat at Oxford among those Members the King conven'd in the Year 1643; and shewing a ready Concurrence in the Measures for establishing Monarchy and Episcopacy, he endur'd many Hardships, till such Time as the Constitution was restord by the Establishment of King Charles the IId, on the Throne of his Ancestors. (s) He was Vice-Admiral of the County of Devon, and a Member in all Parliaments in the Reigns of King Charles the IId and King James the IId, being elected thereto for the Borough of Totness; and departing this Life about the Year 1689, had Sepulture at Berry-Pomeroy, leaving Issue by Anne his Wife, Daughter to Sir John Portman, Bart. (who furviv'd him fix Years, and was interr'd by her Husband) a Daughter, Elizabeth, wedded to Sir Fo-Jeph Tredenham of Tregony, in Cornwall, and five Sons; Edward, his Successor, John, a Colonel in the Army, Hugh, kill'd in the Dutch Wars, William, 4th Son, who dy'd unmarry'd, Henry Seymour, Esq, 5th Son, now living, and Heir to his Uncle, Sir William Portman, Bart. whereby he is possess'd of the large Inheritance of the Portmans, at Or-

Sir Edward Seymour, Bart. fifth of that Name in lineal Succession, and eldest Son of the last Sir Edward, made a confiderable Figure both in Court and the House of Commons, in four several Reigns. He constantly serv'd in Parliament, after his first Election, to the Time of his Death, mostly for the City of Exeter, and once for the County of Devon, and hardly any were better heard, or brought over more to his Opinion, than he did; and to him was owing the Security-Act, as also the Act for Liberty of the Subject. In the Year 1667, he promoted the Impeachment of the Earl of Clarendon, and was the first that motion'd it. and carry'd it up to the Lords. On 25 Febr. 1672. he was unanimously chosen Speaker of that call'd The Long Parliament; and the ninth of April following, was fworn of the Privy-Council, and foon after made Treasurer of the Navy. The 6th of March 1679, he was again elected Speaker; at which Time he was of the Privy-Council, and Treasurer of the Navy; yet the King refus'd his Approbation, notwithstanding the Commons made three Representations in his Favour; which occasion'd their Prorogation to the 15th, when they elected Serjeant Gregory. The next Year they were so disgusted at his Behaviour, that they carry'd an Impeachment against him, and a Motion

was made to remove him from his Majesty's Council and Presence for ever; but that was dropp'd, and no Articles were ever exhibited against him.

When King James the 2d ascended the Throne, he was a sedulous Opposer of Mommouth, and his Adherents; and afterwards, no less warm in opposing arbitrary Power, and a standing Army. He was one of the first Gentlemen in the West of England, that went in to the Prince of Orange, Anno 1688; and the Association that follow'd, was owing to his Proposal In the Convention-Parliament at the Revolution, he oppos'd the declaring the Prince of Orange King of England; nevertheless, in the Year 1691, he was sworn of the Privy-Council, and constituted one of the Lords of the Treasury, in which he continu'd about two Years; and on his Refignation, had afterwards no Employment during that Reign. Upon the Accession of her late Majesty Queen Anne, he was admitted again of the Privy-Council, and conflituted Comptroller of the Houshold; and had an Offer of a Patent for a Baron of the Realm, which he declin'd, and got it conferr'd on Francis, the eldest surviving Son of his second Marriage: Being warm in his Adherence to those stil'd the Church-Party, and stickling for passing the Bill to prevent Occasional Conformity, he continu'd but two Years in his Post of Comptroller of the Houshould, and afterwards constantly oppos'd the Measures of the Court, as indeed he had done the most Part of his Life. He dy'd 17 Febr. 1707, in the 76th Year of his Age, and was bury'd at Maiden-Bradley. He was endow'd with great natural Parts, which, together with his long Experience in Parliamentary Affairs, gain'd him the first Place among the leading Members of his Party,

Party, by whom he was much regretted. His first Lady was Margaret, one of the Daughters and Co-heirs to Sir William Wale of London, Kt-(who was bury'd in the Vault at Maiden Bradley) by whom he had Issue Sir Edward Seymour his Successor, and William, General of the Marines, Lieutenant of the Band of Pensioners, and Lieutenant-General under her late Majesty Queen Anne.

By his fecond Wife Letticia, Daughter to Francis Popham of Littlecote in the County of Wilts, Efq, he had one Daughter Anne, unmarry'd 1710, and

HIS ancient Family descends from John Cope, Esq. a very eminent Person in the Reigns of King Richard the 2d, and Henry the 4th. The former King, in the 22d Year of his Reign. grants in Fee to his trulty and well-beloved Servant John Cope, Esq, the Scite and Manour of Denshanger, (a) in Com. Northamp, and divers other Lands and Rents in Wickden, Wickbamman, Pefenbam, Stony-Stratford, Pokesley, Witefield, and Moghemoncotes. Which Manour of Denshanger, K. Henry the 4th confirm'd to him, in the first Year of his Reign, to hold by the fourth Part of a Knight's Fee; (b) and four Years after, grants unto John Cope, (his Esquire and belov'd Servant) for Reward of his good and faithful Service, (c) the Manour of Westbury, in Com. Bucks, of the Value of 20 Marks a Year, forfeited by the Attainder of Sir Thomas Shelly, Kt. He was elected one of the Knights for Northamptonshire, (d) in the Parliaments from the 1st to the 9th Year of King Henry the 4th, and was succeeded by John Cope, Esq; his Son and Heir, who had Issue Alexander Cope of Denshanger, Father (e) to William Cope, Esq, who was in the Esteem and Favour of King Henry the 7th.

Which William had a Grant from the Crown (7 Maii, 13 H.7.) when he was Cofferer of the Houshold

Houshold to the King, (f) of the Lordships and Manors of Wormleighton, and Fenny Compton, in Warwickshire; (Part of the Inheritance of Sir Simon Mountfort, Kt. attainted 10 H.7.) which Lordships he kept till 22 H.7. when he fold them to John Spencer, Esq. (Ancestor to the present Earl of Sunderland) having purchas'd the Manor of Hanwell, and a good Estate in Oxfordshire. He dy'd in the 5th Year of the Reign of King Henry the Sth, and had Sepulture in the Church of Banbury, as appears by this Memorial on his Monument.

Drate pro Anima Millielmi Cope, Armigeri Cofferarii Hospitii Ercellentissim Regis Henrici Septimi qui obiit .... Aprilis 1512. E Jana Axor epus obiit, 12 Februarii 1525.

He left the paternal Coat of his Family, (which was on a Feß Argent, a Boar pullant, Sable) and us'd sometime Three Coffers, Sable, Keyholes, Harps, &c. Or, as a Badge of his Office; but afterwards he had affign'd to him, Argent, on a Cheveron Azure, between 3 red Roses slipt proper, as many Fleurs de Lis Or, alluding to the Royal Badges of the Crown; which the Family now bear. He marry'd two Wives, and had Issue by both of them.

By his first Wife, he had Issue

Stephen Cope, Esq. Serjeant of the Poultry to the Houshold of King Henry the 8th, (from whom the Family at Bedhampton in Hampshire, descended, that extinguish'd in Daughters.) And

By his 2d Wife, Jane, Daughter of Sir John Spencer of Hodnell, (and Heir to her Mother, Anne, N 2 Sifter

Sifter and Co-heir to Sir Richard Empson, Kt.) he had 3 Sons; Anthony, hereafter-mention'd; William, who dy'd without Issue unmarry'd; and George, who was knighted and seated at Copes-Ashby, in Com. Northamp. having wedded 3 Wives, but had Issue only by his 1st Marriage, viz. 2 Sons; Esrasmus, (Father to Sir Edward Cope of St. Edmundsbury in Com. Suff. Kt.) and George, who was bury'd in Trinity Church London, 1572, and

left 3 Sons, George, John, and Erasmus.

Anthony (eldest Son and Heir of William Cope, Esq; the Cofferer) had the Estate at Hanwell in Oxfordshire; was bred in Oriel College, and having excellent Parts, improv'd and cultivated by a learned Education, was foon distinguish'd among his Neighbours, and esteem'd by the most learned Men of that Age, both at Home and Abroad. His Appetite after Knowledge was not confin'd to his own Country only, but by travelling into France, Germany, Italy, and other Parts of Europe, he sought the Acquaintance of the most considerable Persons Abroad fam'd for Learning, contracted an Intimacy with many of them, and wrote feveral Things whilst beyond the Seas as well as at Home; which appears from feveral Authors, (g) and from an Epigram in his Praise, written by John Bapt. Mantuan. He was Vice-Chamberlain to Q. Catharine, Wife of King Henry the 8th; had the Honour of being made one of the Knights of the Carpet (\*) in 1 Edward 6. was High Sheriff of Oxfordshire and Berks 2 Edw. 6. and was bury'd in the Chancel of the Church of Hanwell four Years after, Anno 1551, leaving by Jane his Wife a Son. nam'd Edward, Heir to his Estate, and a Daughter, Anne, Wife to Sir Kenelm Digby of Drystoke, in Com. Rutl. Kt. Which

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Which Edward marrying Elizabeth, Daughter and Heir of Walter Mobun of Wollaston, in Com. Northamp. Esq. (who surviv'd him, and afterwards marry'd George Carlton of Walton upon Thames in Surrey, 2d Son of George Carlton of Baldwin-Brightwell, in Com. Oxon. Esq.) had Issue, besides Daughters, 2 Sons, Anthony and Walter, who was Master of the Court of Wards in the Reign of King James the 1st, and left a great Estate to his sole Daughter and Heir Elizabeth, marry'd to Henry Rich, Earl of Holland, Great Grandsather to the present Earl of Warwick and Holland.

Anthony Cope, (eldest Brother to this Walter) succeeded his Father in the Estate at Hanwell; was High Sheriff of Oxfordshire in the 24th and 33d Years of Oueen Elizabeth; received from her the Honour of Knighthood; and, in his own Country, was one of the superior Rank in all publick Employments, and serv'd for the Borough of Banbury in five several Parliaments during her Reign. (b) He had by many worthy Acts acquir'd much Reputation, and the Esteem of all that knew him; and no doubt his Character and Interest in the Country induc'd King James to appoint him his first High Sheriff of Oxfordshire after his Accession to the Crown. That Prince likewise knighted his eldest Son William among the first he conferr'd that Honour upon; and when he erected the Degree of Baronets, advanc'd this Sir Anthony to that Dignity, (by Letters Patents, bearing Date 29 June, 1611.) He kept an hofpitable House in the old English Way, and Integrity and Virtue shin'd in all he did. Desiring Retirement in the latter Part of his Life, he recommended to his Country-men his eldest Son, Sir Ňз William

William Cope, for their Knight of the Shire in Parliament, and they manifested their Love, by choosing him in the three last Parliaments of King James the 1st. He dy'd, full of Honour, in the 66th Year of his Age, A. D. 1615, and was bury'd in the Chancel of the Church of Hanwell, under a fair Marble Tomb, against the North Wall, the Figure of a Knight in full Proportion, lying on his Back, with his Wife by him; at his Feet his Crest, viz. a Fleur-de-Lis, with a Dragon's Head is suited wings display'd; and over all, this Inscription:

This Sir Anthony Cope, by Frances, his 1st Wise, Daughter of Sir Robert Lytton of Knebworth, in Com. Herts. Kt. had 3 Daughters; Anne marry'd to Sir John Leigh, Kt. (Ancestor to the present Lord Leigh of Stonley) Elizabeth to Sir Richard Cecil, Kt. (from whom the present Earl of Exeter is descended) and Mary, to Henry Champernown of Devonshire, Esq. Also 7 Sons; 4 of which liv'd to Mens Estate; William, Anthony, Richard, and John.

Anthony and Richard went into Ireland, and left Families in that Kingdom; the former had 3 Sons, Henry, Anthony, and John; and the later, who was of Wicklow, (by Anne his Wife, Sister to Sir William Walter of Wimbleton, Kt.) had Issue, amongst others, I. Walter Cope, (who marry'd 2 Wives, —— Daughter of the Bishop of Kilmore, and —— Daughter of Henry Lord N 4

Blany, Baron of Monaghan, and left Issue Walter, his Son and Heir) Richard, who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of John Pate of Leicestershire.

3. Anthony. 4. William Cope of Icombe, in Com. Gloucest. who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of Francis Earl of Westmorland, Relict of Sir John Cope, Bart. hereaster mention'd, and had Issue 2 Sons, Henry and William, and 2 Daughters; Elizabeth, marry'd to Thomas Whitney, Esq. Sir William Cope, Kt. and Bart. (eldest Son and Heir of Sir Anthony) was elected in the 1st Parliament call'd by King James the 1st, a Burgess for Banbury, (m) and for the County of Oxon, one of the Knights of the Shire in three other Parliaments, viz. 12, 18, and 21 of that Reign, and was High Sheriff of Oxfordshire 17 Jac. 1. which sufficiently testifies he was a Gentleman of Worth and Interest in his Country. He dy'd the 2d of August 1637, and was bury'd the 22d of the same Month, in the Chancel of the Church of Hanwell. By Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter and sole Heir of Sir George Chamorth, Kt. he had 2 Sons, John, his Successor, and Jonathan; and 3 Daughters, Frances, who marry'd Robert. Son and Heir of Sir Robert Lee of Billeslee, in Com. Warw. Kt. Mary and Ursula, who dy'd unmarry'd.

Jonathan, 2d Son, marry'd Anna, Daughter of Sir Hatton Farmer of Eston, in Com. Northamp. was seated at Rawton-Abbey in Staffordsbire, and less Issue Jonathan, his Son and Heir, Father to the present Sir Jonathan Cope, who was created a Baronet by her Majesty Queen Anne, and is a

Sir John Cope, Bart. (eldeft Son of Sir William) marry'd first Mary, Daughter of Sir John Walter, Kt. Lord Chief Baron of the Exchequer, who dy'd, leaving him an only Daughter, Anne: He afterwards marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter to Francis Earl of Westmorland, and had Issue 3 Sons: Anthony, William, who dy'd young, and John: Also 2 Daughters; Mary, who dy'd an Infant, and Elizabeth, marry'd to Thomas Estcourt of Shipton-Estcourt, in Com. Glouc. Esq.

Sir Anthony Cope, Bart. (eldest Son of Sir John) marry'd Mary, Daughter of Dutton Lord Gerrard, of Gerrard's-Bromley, in Com. Staff. and had Issue a Daughter, Mary, and 3 Sons, John, Anthony, and Henry, who all dy'd young; the later lyes bury'd at Hanwell, with this Inscription to his Memory:

This Sir Anthony was bred in Oriel College, Oxon, and ferv'd for Banbury at the Restoration of King Charles the 2d; and the next Year, in the first Parliament call'd by that Prince, was chose Knight of the Shire for the County of Oxford.

In which Parliament he fat till he dy'd, Anno 1675, when, for Want of Issue, the Title and

Estate devolv'd on his Brother the present

Sir John Cope, Bart. who was bred up at Queen's Coll. Oxon, and having travel'd into France, Italy, and Germany, at his Return, had an honourable Command in Dankirk, when that Fortress was deliver'd to the French; and on the Death of his Brother, was chose in his Room, Knight of the Shire for the County of Oxford, and was likewise elected for the same County in two other Parliaments, in the Reign of King Charles the 2d, and also in the 1st Year of King William and Queen Mary, and in the 10th of William the 3d, for Banbury. (n) He took to Wife Anne, Daughter of Mr. Philip Booth, by whom he had Issue a Daughter, Elizabeth, who dy'd young; and after her 7 Sons successively, of whom John, Anthony, and Charles, and Gallen, a Captain of Horse, are now living; and Daniel, Albian, and William, are deceas'd; the later was a Captain in the Royal Regiment of Foot-Guards.

John, his eldest Son and Heir apparent, now residing at Branzell, in the County of Southampton, had his Education in Oriel Coll. Oxon, and Anthony at Cambridge; and about the Year 91 they both travel'd Abroad, and spent about 2 Years in the Academy of Wolfenbuttle, from whence they pass'd by most of the Courts in Germany into Italy; and at their Return Home, John, the eldest Brother, was knighted by King William the 9th of January, 169½, who in the 4th of Queen Anne, serv'd in Parliament for the Borough of Plympton, and has been elected in all Parliaments since, for the Borough of Taveslock, in Com. Devon.

THE first of this Family that resided at South-Carlton, was Sir John Monson, Kt. Son and Heir of John Monson, Esq. and Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter of Sir William Hansard, Kt. Son and Heir of John Monson, an eminent Merchant of the Staple, in the Beginning of the Reign of King Henry the 6th, (denominated of East-Reson, in Com. Linc.) who was Son and Heir of another John, mention'd 2 R. 2. (1378.)

The faid Sir John Monson, Kt. lyes bury'd in South-Carlton Church, under a Marble Tomb, whereon is the Effigies in Brassof a Knight and his Lady, and the Arms of Monson impaling

Gules, 3 Water-hudgets Erm for Meers, with this Inscription:

He had by a former Wife Beattrix, Daughter of —— Thurst, Merchant, a Son Thomas, (who was of South-Kelsey, and had many Children, but left no Issue Male.) By the Lady mention'd in the Inscription, Daughter of —— Meer, of the Marsh: He had 2 Sons, William and Robert Munson of Belton.

William, the eldest Son and Heir, was High Sheriff of Lincolnshire, I Edw. 6. and, with his Wise, lye bury'd at Carlton, with the following Inscription to their Memory:

George Monson of Southam, who, by Eleanor his Wife, Daughter and Co-heir of —— Farmer, lest Posterity; and 4. William. A Memorial in the said Church of Carlton, gives this Account of his Death.

John Munson, 2d Son of the said John, (and eldest surviving) succeeded in the Inheritance at Carlton; was knighted at Greenwich in 28 Eliz. and likewise lyes bury'd with this short Memento:

# Johannes Munson Wiles obijt 20 die Decembris Anno Domini 1593.

The Crest to his Arms, is a Moon griping the Sun; and his Motto, Prest pur mon pais. He had Issue by Anne his Wise, Daughter of Robert Dighton of Stanton, Esq. 5 Sons, 3 of which were knighted, Sir Thomas, Sir William, and Sir Robert.

Sir William Monson, 2d Son, was, from his Youth, in the Sea-Service, and early distinguish'd himself, serving many Years in several Capacities, till Merit rais'd him to the Degree of an Admiral, by Commission from Queen Elizabeth. In the Expedition under the Earl of Effex on the Spanish Coast, in 1536, when Cadiz was fack'd and taken, he, with many more, for their Valour, (b) were knighted. The next Year being likewise in Commission under the said Earl, in order to intercept the Spanish Plate-Fleet, this · Sir William, and the Earl of Southampton, had their Station on the West Side of Gratiora, and were the first Discoverers (c) of that Fleet; but the Earl of Effex, and most of the Ships, being at some Distance, the Spaniards escap'd into Tercera.

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eera, all but 3 Ships that were taken: He was afterwards employ'd in several Stations; and in the Year 1602, had, with Sir Richard Levison, the principal Command of a Royal Fleet, to annoy the Coasts of Spain. This Service they perform'd so effectually, that for many Days together no Vessels dar'd to go in or out of their Harbours; but their chiefest Glory, was the taking a vast Carract of 1600 Tuns, just arriv'd from the Indies at Sesimbra, a small City in Portugal, fortify'd with a Castle of 12 great Guns, under which the Carract lay; and on the West Side had 11 Gallies, each of them with 5 Guns mounted, and their Stems foremost. These Advantages of the Enemy did not deter the Admirals from venturing on her; and after 7 Hours Dispute, the Marquess of Santta-Crus, (who was on Board with 300 Spanish Gentlemen) capitulated, delivering the Carract and Cargo, worth a Million of Ducats. (d)

These Services recommended Admiral Monson to the Favour of King James and King Charles the 1st; for he liv'd'till the Civil Wars (e) with an untainted Reputation, for Conduct and Bravery, and settling in Surrey, lest Posterity.

He compil'd large Tracts of naval Affairs in 6 Books, publish'd in a Collection of Voyages, printed Anno 1703, wherein his Capacity in Maritime Business, and the excellency of his natural Parts, sufficiently appear; the whole being written with a true Zeal for the Publick, and without Prejudice or Affectation.

The excellent Advice he gives to his eldest Son, is likewise a good Instance of his virtuous

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Inclination; and the small Estate, he declares he leaves him, after to many Toils and Dangers. plainly shews the Honesty of his Life. first Book of his Tracts, is chiefly a Collection " of every Year's Actions in the Wars against " Spain, on our own and the Spanish Coasts, and " in the West-Indies. A brief Narrative; for no " more is faid, but the Force they were under-" taken with, and the Success of the Enterprize; " yet the Defign is to shew the Reasons, either " why they miscarry'd, or why so little Advan-"tage was made where they succeeded. " some he is more particular than in others, and " what perhaps may be still of Use, he at last " fets down the Abuses in the Fleet, and the " Methods for sedrefling them. His 2d Book, continues somewhat of the Method of the First. " beginning with Fatherly Instructions to his "Son; whence he proceeds to the Peace with " Spain, which puts an End to the warlike na-" val Actions, yet not to his Command, being " employ'd against Pirates: He inveighs against " the Dutch, shews the Ill-managment of a De-" fign against Argier, and makes very notable " Remarks on the Attempt upon Cadiz, by King " Charles the 1st; proposing Methods how Spain " might have been much more endanger'd with " other Particulars, about the Shipping of Eng-" land, and Sovereignty of the Seas. The 3d " Book only treats of the Admiralty; that is, " of all Things relating to the Royal Navy, " from the Lord High Admiral to the meanest " Person employ'd Ashore, and to the Cabine-" Boys at Sea; and from a compleat Fleet to the " smallest Vessel; and Part of it; with Instructi-" ons for all Officers, the Size of all Sorts of "Guns, all Sorts of Allowances on Board the "King's Ships, and excellent Directions for fighting

ing at Sea; an Account of all the Harbours in these three Kingdoms, with many more curious Matters accurately handl'd. The 4th Book is of another Nature from any of the rest, being a brief Collection of Spanish and Portuguese Discoveries, and Conquests in Africk, Asia, and America, with some Voyages round the World, and somewhat of English and French Plantations. The 5th Book, is full of Projects and Schemes for managing Affairs at Sea to the best Advantage for the Nation. The 6th and last treats of Fishing, to shew the infinite Addition of Wealth and Strength it would bring to England, with all Instructions necessary for putting such a Design in Execution.

Sir Robert Monson, (3d Son of Sir John) serv'd in two Parliaments for the City of Lincoln, in the Reign of Queen Eliz. and left Issue Sarah, his Daughter and Co-heir, who marry'd Sir Vincent Corbet of Morton-Corbet, Bart. and was created (for Life) Vicountess Corbet of Lynchdale, in Com. Bucks, by Letters Patents, bearing Date 23 Off. 1679.

Thomas Monson (eldest Son and Heir of Sir John) had his Education in Magdalen College in Oxford; serv'd in Parliament for Great Grimshy in Lincolnshire, 27 Eliz. was knighted, and 3 Years after was High Sheriff of the said County; and in the 39th of that Reign, serv'd in Parliament for the City of Lincoln. (f) About the Year 1605, when he took the Degree of Master of Arts at Oxford, he was Master of the Armory, and Master Falconer to his Majesty King James

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the 1st; and in Truth, (fays my Author) (g) fuch a one as no Prince in Christendom had the He had the Dignity of a Baronet conferr'd on him, 29 June, 1611; was afterwards twice brought to his Trial on Suspicion of being concern'd in the poisoning of Sir Thomas Overbury, (b) but his Innocency clearly appearing, he was discharg'd. He was a Person of excellent Breeding, and a great Lover of Ingenuity, especially of Musicle, which he much delighted in, as being himself an excellent Master in the Profession. which made him bountiful to the Practifers thereof. He liv'd to a very advanc'd Age, even to the Time of the Civil Wars, the sad Effects whereof he very much lamented; and during those Troubles, wrote a Book by Way of Advice to his Grandson, (i) entitled, An Essay on Affictions, which was printed 1661, with another (he had also written) concerning Adoration, Alms. Fasting, and Prayer. He marry'd Ann, Daughter to Sir Edmund Anderson, Lord Chief Justice of the Common-Pleas, and had Issue 3 Daughters and 4 Sons; 2 of which liv'd to Maturity, Sir John and Sir William; the later was created by King Charles the 1st, Viscount Casslemain in the Kingdom of Ireland, but unmindful of the Favours of his Sovereign, and his own Allegiance, fided with the Rebels; for which he was degraded of his Honours soon after the Restoration. He had 3 Wives: 1. Margaret, Daughter to James Stewart Earl of Murray, Widow to Charles Howard, Earl of Nottingham. 2. Frances, Sister to Sir Thomas Alston, Bart. (by whom he had Issue Alston Moun-

fon, Esq.) and the 3d was Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir George Reresby, Bart. Widow and Relict of Sir Francis Foljamb, Bart. and also of Capt. Horner.

Sir John Munson, Bart. (eldest Son and Heir of Sir Thomas) was born in the Parish of St. Sepulchre's, London, and spending some Time in one of the Inns of Court, made fuch Proficiency in the Study of the Law, that his Opinions therein was much esteem'd; and had he thought fit to have been of the Long Robe, would have been much follow'd. He was invested Knight of the Bath at the Coronation of King Charles the 1st, and ferv'd in the two first Parliaments call'd by that King; (k) in the later, as one of the · Knights of the Shire for the County of Lincoln: and in the other, for the City of Lincoln. the breaking out of the Civil Wars, he retir'd to Oxford, and was there created Doctor of the Civil Laws, in the Year 1642, being at that Time universally esteem'd; and Mr. Wood, in his Athena Oxonienses, says of him, That he was as wife a Man as any of his Cotemporaries in Oxon, and assisted in all Councils, and was at all Treaties, particularly in that concerning the Surrender of the Garrison of Oxford to the Parliament, A. D. 1646, and afterwards suffer'd much for his Loyalty; but at length was permitted a quiet Retirement. Having marry'd Ursula, Daughter and Heir of Sir Robert Öxenbridge, Kt. (by his Wife Elizabeth, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Henry Cock of Broxburn, in Com. Hert. Kt.) he came possess'd (Anno 1645) of the Manor of Broxburn, &c. at which Seat he afterwards refided, for the most Part of his Life, having made a fair Park about the Manor House, keeping a free

free and bountiful Table, very hospitable to his Neighbours, and very charitable to the Poer. He was qualify'd with excellent Parts, both natural and acquir'd, which render'd him a great Patriot to his Country, (1) being endow'd with a rare Spirit, a wife Understanding, and a fingular Judgment, which naturally led him to a ftrict Observance of all moral Duties, and made him somewhat severe in Acts of Justice. He was exemplary in his Devotions, firm to his Church. and loyal to his Prince; and having liv'd to the Age of 84 Years, departed this Life A. D. 1684. He was bury'd with his Ancestors in South-Carlton, leaving Vrfula his Wife furviving, by whom, he had Issue a Daughter, Elizabeth, marry'd to Sapcot. Lord Viscount Beaumont, of the Kingdom of Ireland, and an only Son, John Monson, who dy'd in his Life-time.

Which Folm serv'd for the City of Lincoln in the Parliament that restor'd King Charles the 2d. (m) was made Knight of the Bath at his Coronation. and was a Justice of Peace and one of the Deputy-Lieutenants for Hertfordshire. He was admir'd by all that knew him, (n) being a Gentleman of a chearful Temper, ready Wit, quick Apprehension, good Elocution, free from Partiality, of great Prudence and Moderation, and in all Things well accomplish'd for Business, which made him acceptable in all Companies, and his Death generally lamented. He deceas'd in the Lifetime of his Father, (as before was faid) 14 Off. A.D. 1674, having had by Judith his Wife, Daughter of Sir Thomas Pelham, Kt. and Bart. (Great-Grandfather to Thomas, the present Duke  $0 \times 2$

of Newcastle) a numerous Issue, 10 Sons; whereof 5 liv'd to Mens Estate, and a Daughter, Bridget, marry'd to Sir Charles Barrington, Bart. Of which Sons, George (the youngest surviving) hath taken to Wise Anne, Daughter of Charles Wren in the Isle of Ely, Esq. and hath Issue now living, 5 Sons, viz. John, George, Charles, Henry, and William.

James, 9th Son, dy'd in the 28th Year of his Age, A.D. 1683; and Philip, 10th Son, dy'd at the Age of 22, the Year after; and a Monument is erected to their Memories; but the Inscription thereon being long, and printed in

Chauncey's Hist. of Hertfordshire, I omit.

Sir Henry Mounson, Bart. (Successor to his Grandfather) was elected for the City of Lincoln in the two last Parliaments call'd by King Charles the 2d, and in that Parliament call'd by King Fames the 2d. He was a Gentleman much esteem'd for all the good Qualities of a Christian, Friend, and Benefactor, were inherent in him. He marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of Charles Lord Cheyney, Viscount Newhaven, and dy'd without Issue, the 6th of April, 1718, William, his Brother, succeeding him.

Which Sir William serv'd in Parliament for the City of Lincoln, (7 W. 3.) and is at this Time a Member for Aldborough in Com. Ebor. He marry'd Leticia, Daughter of John Lord Paulet; (Sister to John the present Earl Paulet) but as yet hath no

Issue.

THE Original of this Family, (denominated from Greseley, in Com. Derb.) anciently written Gresele, Greselei, Greselea, Gresely, &c. I find to be from Malabulcius, Unkle to the famous Rollo, sometime Duke of Normandy, and Progenitor to William the Conqueror. From which Malabulcius, descended Roger de (a) Toeny, Standard-Bearer of Normandy, whose younger Sons, Robert and Nigell, accompany & William the Conqueror into England; O \* 3 and

and the former, at the Time of the general Survey, (14 W. 1.) posses d near 150 Lordships, whereof Stafford being his Residence, he thence sir-nam'd (b) himself, and was Ancestor to the noble Race of the Staffords; of whom Humpbrey was created Duke of Buckingham by King Henry the 6th, with Precedency before all Dukes, both in England and France, the Blood-Royal excepted.

Nigell, aforesaid, held Drachelawe, and 11 other Lordships, in Derbyshire, as appears by Doomsday-Book, and is the direct Ancestor to this Family of Greseley, still possessing that Lordship; (c) and William, the Son of this Nigell, was Founder of the Monastery of Greseley, now in Ruins; (d) (but the Estate and Manor still remains with the Family) Robert de Greslei, (whom I take to be Son and Heir of the said William) in Anno 1134, (35 H. 1.) founded an Abbey of Cistercian Monks at Swineshed, in Com. Linc. (e) and (inter alia) gave thereunto his Mill at Mancestre, in Com Lanc. having his principal Seat at that Lordship. Robert de Gresleia, and Henry his Brother, are likewise mention'd in Sir William Dugdale's Monasticon, as Witnesses to a Deed of Robert, Abbot of Burton on Trent, and in a Charter of K. John, confirming Grants to the Knights Hospitalers of St. John of Jerusalem; for therein Ralph de Grifleia, by the Concession of his Brethren, Robert Nigell, Henry, and William, and of William, Earl Ferrars, their Lord, gives to those Knights all their Fee and Tenement in Hedria and in Raveston, with all the Appurtenances.

From this Robert descended the Greseley's that had Summons to Parliament among the Barons

of the Realm, (f) whereof Thomas de Greslei having Summons to Parliament from 1 'till 4 E. 2 inclusive, dy'd without Issue; and Joan, his Sister, became his Heir, who marry'd John, the Son of Roger de la Warie, and brought a fair Inheritance to that noble Family, from whom the present Lord de la Warr is descended.

William de Greslei of Drachelawe, (Brother or Son to the aforesaid Robert) had Issue Sir Geffery de Greseley, who was return'd with Robert de Freichville, Knights of the Shire for Derby, at the Parliament held at London in 28 Ed. 1. and in the same Year and the following, return'd for the same County with Ralph de Frechville, in the Parliaments held at Lincoln. (g) This Sir Geffery had Issue by his Wife Margaret, (Daughter of Matildis de Somerville) William, his Son and Heir, who, by his Charter, (stiling himself William de Gresselee, (b) Son and Heir of Geffery de Gresselce) gave Land in Kingeston to the Priory of Roucester, in Com. Staff. and, by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter of John Bakepaiz, Lord of Benton, left Issue Geffery de Grelley, Father to Peter, (i) who had to Wife Joan, Daughter of Robert Lord Stafford of Eggington, and was succeeded in his Estate by Geffery, his Son and Heir, who marry'd Margaret, Daughter of John Gornon of Lovington, and left Issue 2 Sons, Sir John and Sir Nicholas Grefeley; the former was High Sheriff of Staffordhire 46 Ed. 3. and took to Wife Alice, Daughter of - Swynerton of Swynerton, but dy'd without Issue Male.

Sir Nicholas was living in 3 R. 2. and having marry'd Thomazine, Daughter of Thomas Gwaste-O\* 4

ness of Staffordshire, and the Heir of that ancient Family, a great Addition was made to his Estate, which descended to Thomas his Son and Heir.

Which Thomas de Greseley was return'd one of the Knights for Derbyshire in the Parliament held 2 H. 4. (k) and before that Time had receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood. He was likewise elected for the said Shire in the Parliaments held in 2 and 5 H. 5. serv'd High Sherist of Staffordshire 1 H. 6. and was return'd among the Knights of the said County in 12 H. 6. (l) He marry'd Margaret, Daughter of Thomas Walsh of Walsh, in Leicestershire, and left Issue John, his Son and Heir.

Which John marry'd (in the Life-time of his Father) Margaret, Daughter of John Claret, de Com. Ebor. and had by her a Daughter, Catherine, marry'd to Sir William de Peto, Kt. about the 4th of H. 6. for which he, Sir William, (with others) stood engag'd (24 H. 6.) in a Statute-Merchant for large Sums of Money taken up by him for the King's Service. (m) This Sir John Greisley was elected one of the Knights for Stoffordshire, in the Parliament held in 31 H. 6. and one of the Knights for Derbyshire (n) in 39 H. 6. and was succeeded by a Son of his own Name. Grelley, who likewise serv'd in Parliament in 17 Ed. 4. for Derbysbire, and afterwards receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood. He left Issue by Anne his Wife, Daughter of Sir Thomas Stanley of Elford, Kt. a Son Thomas, Heir to his Estate.

Which William serv'd King Henry the 8th in his Wars of France, and was with him at the Siege of Teroven and the Battle of Spurrs, and receiv'd from him the Honour of Knighthood the 14th of Oct. at Liste.(\*) He marry'd Benedict, Daughter of Henry Vernon of Haddon, but dy'd without Issue, so that George, his Brother, became Heir to the Estate.

Which George Gresley was leated at Colton, in Com. Staff. was made Knt. of the Bath at the Coronation of Q. Anne Bullen 25 H. 8. and having marry'd Margaret, Daughter of John Mulsho of Northamptonshire, and Catherine, Daughter of Edward Lord Dudley; had by the former an only Son, William, who succeeded to the Fistate; and, by the later, 2 Sons, Edward and Thomas, and a Daughter, Catherine.

The faid William was High Sheriff of Staffordfhire, in 4 Eliz. and afterwards received from that Queen the Honour of Knighthood. He left Issue by Catherine his Wife, Daughter of Sir Edward Asson, Kt. Ancestor to the present Lord Asson) a

Son Thomas, his Successor in the Estate.

Which Thomas Greseley resided at Drakelow, and likewise possess of the Estate in Staffordshire; of which County he was High Sheriff, in 25 Eliz. and in the 33d and 45th of that Queen's Reign, High Sheriff of Derbyshire. He was knighted at Worsop, in Com. Nott. (20th April 1603) having met King James in his Journey from Scotland to take Possession of the English Crown. (0) He marry'd Catherine, Daughter of Sir Thomas Walsingham, Kt. and had Issue 5 Sons and 3 Daughters; Henry, the eldest Son, dy'd A.D. 1583, at. 4; and George, his Brother, succeeded to the Estate.

Which George Grefeley, Esq. residing at Drakelow, in Derbyshire, (the ancient Possession of his

Ancestors from the Conquest) was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet June 29, A.D. 1611. He was a Gentleman of good Parts, an Encourager of Learning, and Sir William Dugdale owd (in some Measure) his Rise to him; for Sir George being well known to Thomas Earl of Arundel. Earl Marshal of England, introduc'd him to his Acquaintance (p) on his first Coming to London. He serv'd in Parliament 3 Car. 1. for Newcastle-Underline, in Staffordshire, and having marry'd Susan, Daughter to Sir Humphry Ferrers, of Tamworth-Castle in Com. Warw. Kt. had Issue an only Son, Thomas Grefley, Esq, who marry'd Bridget, Daughter to Sir Thomas Burdet of Bramcot, in Com. Warw. and Formark, in Com. Derb. Bart. and dy'd in the Life-time of his Father, having had 10 Children. 1. Jane, 2. Henry, 3. George, who dy'd Infants; 4. Thomas, Successor to his Grandfather; 5. Frances, the Wife of John Whitehall of Pipe-Ridware, in Com. Staff. Lig; 6. Bridget, marry'd to Thomas Brome; 7. George, who marry'd Jane, Daughter of Thomas Nelson of Northampton, and dy'd without Isiue; 8. Catherine, wedded to Rich. Dyot of the City of Litchfield, Esq. 9. Elizabeth, Wife to Philip Trafford of Swithamly, in Com. Staff. 10. Mary, marry'd to John Harpur of Little Over, in Com. Derb.

Sir Thomas Gresley, Bart. who succeeded in the Estate and Title, took to Wise Frances, Daughter and Co-heir of Gilbert Morewood of London, and afterwards of Netherseale, in Com. Leic. Esq, and had Issue 3 Sons and 11 Daughters: 1. Frances, Wise of William Inge of Thorp Constantine, in Com. Staff. Esq, 2. Bridget, 3. Elizabeth, who dy'd Insants; 4. Dorothy, marry'd to Thomas Ward; 5. Arry, wed-

Letitia, living unmarry'd; 11. Thomas Gresley of Netherseal, in Com. Leic. Esq; (who hath taken to Wife Elizabeth, Daughter of John Lee of Ladyhole, in Com. Derb. Gent. and Heir to her Brother, and hath Issue now living Lee Gresley, William, John, and Elizabeth) 12 Isabel, who dy'd unmarry'd; 13 Charles Gresley of Dunstall, in Com. Staff. (who by Anne his Wife, Daughter and Co-heir of John Bot of Dunstall, aforesaid, hath Issue 3 Daughters, Elizabeth, Frances, and Anne) 14. Sarah, marry'd to Paul Balladon of Stapenbill, in Com. Derb. Esq;

This Sir Thomas Grefley had Sepulture in Grefley Church, in Com. Derb. and his 2d Son, Thomas Grefley, of Netherfeal in the County of Leicester, Esq. (his Executor) hath erected to his Memory a noble Monument, with a Bust as big as the Life, kneeling in an Arch, and all the Matches of the Family, according to the Pedigree, in proper Shields round it, and his Off-spring and their Matches underneath it; also the proper Atchievements of the Family, with the Motto, Meliore side quam fortuna; and this Inscription:

died the 5th of June 1699,

Sir William Gresley, Bart. (Son and Heir of Sir Thomas) marry'd Barbara, Daughter to John Walcot of Walcot, in Com. Salop, Esq., and Relict of Richard Okeley of Okeley in the said County, Esq., and had Issue 2 Sons, Thomas, and (William, who dy'd

dy'd an Infant) also a Daughter, Bridget, mar ry'd to Adam Ottley of Pichford, in Com. Salop, Esq, and dying 17 Oct. 1710, in the 48th Year of his Age. His only Son, Sir Thomas Gresley, succeeded in Title and Estate, who is now under Age, and of Baliol College in Oxon.

THE Sir-name of Tracy accrew'd to this Family from a maternal Ancestor, descended from the Tracy's (Barons of Barnstaple, in Com. Devon.) that came in with the Conqueror, and were denominated from the Town of Traci, (a) in Normandy; but by paternal Descent, this Family is lineally descended from Goda, Daughter to King Etheldred; and Walter de Maunts, or de Maigne, a noble Norman, whose Son Ralph was Earl of Hereford in the Time of Edward the Confessor.

Which Ralph, Earl of Hereford, A.D. 1051, join'd with Leofrick, Earl of Mercia, and Siward, Earl of Northumberland, against Goodwin, Earl of Kent, then in Rebellion against King Edward the Confessor, and afterwards with Earl Odo, and above 50 Ships, was fent against Harold, who then infested the English Coast with Pyracies; (b) but when King William the Conqueror was possess'd of this Realm, he was displac'd by him of the Earldom; and his Son Harold succeeded only as Lord of Sudely and Todingtune, in Gloucestershire. (c) The Castle of Ewyas, and other Lands, secur'd (doubtless) by his Intermarriage with Maud, Daughter to Hugh Lupus, Earl of Chester. Which Harold founded the Priory of Ewyas, and left 2 Sons, John de Sudley, his Successor in that Barony, (d) and Robert, sir-nam'd from his Possession Emyas; from which Robert many honourable Houses de**s**cend.

John, aforesaid, by Marriage with Grace, Daughter to Tracy, (of the Family of the Barons of Barnsaple, in Com. Devon) had Issue 2 Sons, Ralph, Baron of Sudley, Progenitor to the Sudleys, Barons of Sudley: The Heirs Male of which Line, sail'd about the Reign of King Edward the 3d, and the Title convey'd, by an Heir Female, to the Boteler's; thereupon summon'd Peers of the Realm; and is now Part of the Title of James Brydges, the present Farl of Carnarvon. (e)

William, 2d Son, was, from his Mother, firnam'd Traci; (f) and he,or his Posterity, differenc'd their Coat? Armour from the elder Hense of Sudley, by adding an Escallop Sable, between the Two Bendlets, as now us'd. This William de Tracy,

liv'd

liv'd in the Reign of King Hen. 2. and held Lands of his Brother, Ralph de Sudley, by one Knight's Fee; (g) which in all Likelihood was the Manor of Todington; for it appears by Doomsday-Book, that it was held by the Lord Sudley, of the Manor of Sudley; and in the Reign of King Edward the 1st, the Tracy's are expresly said to be possess'd of it; and this William, in a Deed of Otwell, Lord of Sudley, (Son and Heir to the faid Ralph) is call'd his Unkle; but that this is the same Sir William Tracy that was one of the Four concern'd in the Assassination of that turbulent and ambitious Prelate, Becket of Canterbury, for his violent Invasion of the Royal Prerogative of his Sovereign, King Hen. the 2d, does not appear, tho' Fuller, in his Worthies of England, makes him to be Sir William Tracy of Todington, whom he characterizes for a Man of high Birth, State, and Stomach, a Favourite of the King's, and his daily Attendant; but I am not of his Opinion, and 'tis evident there were others of the same Name living at that Time. Oliver Tracy (Son and Heir of William) is mention'd among the Knights in Gloucestershire, that paid Scutage (b) the 2d of King John; and his Son William is recorded among the Knights of the same County in 17 Ed. 1. and, with Ralph de Sudley, his Kinsman, is faid to command under King Edward the 1st, in his victorious Expeditions into Scotland. left Issue a Son of his own Name.

William Tracy, of Todington, in Glowcestershire, who was in Wardship to Laurence Tresham 27 Ed. 1. at which Time he is certify'd to hold 40 l. Lands; and in the Beginning of the Reign of King (i)

Fedward

Edward the 2d, was at the Turnament at Dunstable, as appears by an old Draught of a Knight in Armour, bearing a Standard with the Arms of the Family, Two Bends, and an Escallop in the chief Point. In 17 Ed. 2. he was jointly, with John Bermansel, High Sheriff of Gloucestershire; which Office, in those Times, was of great Authority. He lest Issue a Daughter, Margery, Wife of John, (k) Son of John Archer, (of the ancient Family of the Archers, in Com. Warw) and a Son,

Henry Tracy.

Which Henry had Issue a Son of his own Name, Henry Tracy, whose Son Thomas was High Sheriff of Gloucestershire, in 33 or 34 of Edw. 3. and continu'd 4 Years fuccessively, says Sir Rob. Atkins; (\*) but Fuller (1) makes it to be John Tracy, his Son, whom he fixes for High Sheriff in 38 Edw. 3. [1363] and for 5 Years after. This John Tracy was Knight of the Shire for Gloucester shire in 32. 37, 40, and 43 Edw. 3. (m) in the Parliaments held at Westminster those Years; and both Authors agree, this John, then a Knight, was High Sheriff again 45 Edw. 3. A. D. 1366: He was living 37 Edw. 2. and gave the Advowson of the Church of Toding, and an Acre of Land to the Abbey of Hales; and left Issue Henry, Father to John Tracy of Todington, who was High Sheriff 2 R. 2. A. D. 1379, and left Issue William Tracy, who was High Sheriff 18 R. 2. A.D. 1395, Father to another

William Tracy, who marry'd Alice, Daughter and Co-heir of Guy de la Spine, Great-Grandson to William de la Spine, who marry'd Joan, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Simon de Coston, [now Coughton] Knt. in Com. War. who were all Persons of

great Account, and flourish'd at that Place before the Reign of King Hen. 2. (0) so that the Arms of de la Spine, viz. A Cheveron between Three Crescents, and Collon, may be quarter'd by this Family: This William was High Sherist 5 H. 5. and one of those Persons of Quality in Com. Gloucest. who bearing ancient Arms from his Ancestors, and holding by Tenure, had Summons in 7 H. 5. (p) to serve the King in Person for Desence of the Realm; and was succeeded by a Son of his own Name, William, who was High Sherist of his County in the 22 and 23 Hen. 6. and lest his Estate to a Son of his own Name.

A fourth William, who was High Sheriff of Gloucestershire 29 H. 6. A. D. 1449, and a Commissioner to array Soldiers in the said County, 36 H. 6. (q) and having marry'd Margery, Daughter to Sir John Pauncesoot, left Issue 2 Sons, Henry

and Richard.

Which Henry marry'd Alice, one of the Daughters and Co-heirs of Thomas Baldington of Adderbury, in Com. Oxon, Esq. and had Issue 2 Daughters and 3 Sons, William, Richard, and Ralph, a Monk, who dy'd A. D. . . . . and was bury'd in Tomaington Church near the Pulpit, as is express'd

by a Brass Inscription.

William Tracy, as eldest Son and Heir of his Father, enjoy'd the Lordship of Todington, and having had the Honour of Knighthood conferr'd on him, was High Sheriss of his County 5 H.8. A.D. 1512: He was a Gentleman of excellent Parts and sound Learning, and is memorable for being one of the first that embrac'd the Reform'd Religion in this Kingdom, as appears by his last Will, dated 22 H.8. which was condemn'd in the

the Bishop of London's Court after his Decease, and an Order sent to Parker, Chancellor of Worcester, to raise his Body; but he too officiously burning the Corps: (the Recorder only warranting him to raise the Body according to the Law of the Church) He was 2 Years after succeeded by the Heirs of the said Sir Wiliam Tracy, fin'd 400 l. and turn'd out of his Chancellorship. This his last Testament being very curious, it's not, I hope, improper to incert.

The Maine of Son Amen. I William Tracy of Todington, in the County of Gloucester, Esq. make my Testament and last Will, as hereafter followeth:

"First, and before all other Things, I com"mit my self to God, and to his Mercy, be"heving, without any Doubt or Mistrust, that
"by his Grace, and the Merits of Jesus Christ,
"and by the Virtue of his Passion and Resur"rection, I have, and shall have, Remission of
"all my Sins, and Resurrection of Body and
"Soul, according as it is written: I believe that my
"Redeemer liveth, and that at the last Day I shall
"rise out of the Earth, and in my Flesh shall see my
"Saviour. This, my Hope, is laid up in my
"Bosom.

"And touching the Wealth of my Soul, the Faith that I have taken and rehears'd, is sufficient, (as I suppose) without any other Man's "Works or Merits. My Ground and Belief is, that there is but one God, and one Mediator, between God and Man, which is Jesus Christ, fo that I accept none in Heaven or in Earth, to be Mediator between me and God, but only Jesus Christ, all others to be but as Petitioners in receiving of Grace, but none able to give

"Influence of Grace; and therefore will I bestow no Part of my Goods for that Intent, that " any Man shall say or do to help my Soul, for "therein I trust only to the Promises of Christ. " He that believeth, and is baptized, shall be sav'd; and he that believeth not, shall be damned.

" As touching the burying of my Body, it availeth me not whatsoever be done thereto; " for St. Augustine saith, De Cura agenda pro Mor-" tuis, that the Funeral Pomps are rather the " Solace of them that live, than the Wealth " and Comfort of them that are dead, and there-" fore I remit it only to the Discretion of my

" Executors.

" And touching the Destribution of my tem-" poral Goods, my Purpose is, by the Grace of "God, to bestow them to be accepted as the " Fruits of Faith; so that I do not suppose that " my Merit shall be by the good bestowing of " them, but my Merit is the Faith of Jesus Christ " only, by whom such Works are good; accord-" ing to the Words of our Lord: I was bungry, " and thou gavest me Meat, &c. and it followeth, " That ye have done to the least of my Brethien; ye " have done it to me; and ever we should consider " that true Saying, That a good Work maketh not " a good Man, but a good Man maketh a good Work; " for Faith maketh a Man both good and righteous; "for a righteous Man liveth by Faith, and what soever Springeth not of Faith, is Sin. For my temporal Goods, &c.

The faid Sir William marry'd Margaret, Daughter of Sir Thomas Throgmort in of Corfe Court in Com. Gloucest. and had Issue by her 2 Daughters and 2 Sons, William, Richard, hereafter-mention'd. and Robert, who dy'd without Issue.

William, the eldest, succeeded at Todington; and, by ---- his Wife, Daughter of Sir Simon Digby of Coleshill, in Com. Warw. Knight, was Father to John Tracy, who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of John Lord Chandos, of Sudley, who had Issue by her a Daughter, Elinor, Wife of Anthony Kington of Quenington, and 5 Sons, John, Giles, Edward, Frances, and Nicholas; whereof Fobn, the eldest, succeeded to the Estate, and receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood (\*) from Queen Elizabeth, in her Progress to Bristol, in the Year 1574, and was afterwards High Sheriff of the County of Gloucester in 20 Eliz. and one of the Knights of the Shire in the 39th of that Reign, (r) and having marry'd Anne, Daughter of Sir Thomas Throgmorton, Kt. had Issue 5 Sons, Thomas, John, William, Anthony, and Henry; likewise 2 Daughters, Mary, the Wife of Horace Lord Vere, of Tilbury; and Dorothy, marry'd first to Edward Bray, and afterwards to Edward Conway, Esq.

John (eldest Son of Sir John Tracy) was knighted by King James the 1st; and, for his great Merits and Accomplishments, rais'd by King Charles the 1st to the Dignity of a Peer in Ireland, by the Title of Viscount and Baron Tracy of Ratchcol, by Letters Patents, bearing Date 12 Jan. (1642) 18 Car. 1. He marry'd Anne, Daughter of Sir Thomas Shirley, of Isfeild, in Com. Suff. Kt. and was succeeded in his Honours by Robert, his eldest

Son.

Which Robert Viscount Tracy, had 2 Wives; from his first Marriage descends Thomas-Charles, his Grandson, the present Viscount Tracy, now Lord of the Manor of Todington, who took to \*P 2 Wise

Wife (Dec. 27, 1712) Elizabeth, eldest Daughter of William Keyt, Elc; (who dy'd in the Life-time of his Father, Sir William Keyt. Bart.) and hath Issue 1 Son, William, and a Daughter, Jane; and, by the 2d Venter of the faid Robert Viscount Tracy, (Son and Heir of John, the first Viscount) who was knighted by King James the 1st, and serv'd in the Life-time of his Father in several Parliaments, as Knight for Gloucestershire, is descended Mr. Justice Tracy, deservedly made one of the Court of Common-Pleas by his Majesty King William, and continu'd by our present Sovereign King George, who hath now living (by Anne his Wife, eldeft Daughter of William Dowdeswell of Pool-Court, in Com. Wig. Esq; ) 3 Sons, Robert, Richard, and William, and 2 Daughters: Anne marry'd to Charles Dowdeswell of Frtbampton-Court, in Com. Glouc. Esq. deceas'd, and Dorotby unmarry'd.

I now return from whence I digrest, to Richard Tracy, (2d Son of Sir William who dy'd in the Reign of King Hen. 8.) of whom, and his Lineage, I am principally to treat. This Richard had, by Gift of his Father, the Manor of Stanway, in Com. Glouc. Part of the Possessions of the Abbey of Tenk/bury, that came to him by a Grant from the Crown, on the Dissolution of the Monastick Livings: He was well educated, and wrote learnedly of his Father's Faith several Treatises in the English Tongue, and that most remarkable one, entitled Preparations to the Cross, written experimentally; (as the Decem Scriptores mentions) (s) having suffer'd much in his Estate for his Father's reputed Heretical Will: He also wrote prophetically, Anno 1550, (few Years before the Beginning of Queen Mary) another Treatife, To teach

one to die, which is annex'd to his Preparation to the Cross, which was re-printed, and falsely ascrib'd by the Editor, to be compos'd by John Frith's being one of the Three that was found in the Belly of a Cod brought into the Market to be sold at Cambridge, A. D. 1526, wrapp'd about with Canvas, very probably what that voracious Fish plunder d out of the Pocket of some shipwreck'd Sea-man. In the 2d of Eliz. this Richard bore the Office of High Sherist of Gloucestershire, and having marry'd Earbara, a Daughters and 3 Sons, Paul, Nathaniel, and Samuel.

Paul Tracy, the eldest, succeeded his Father, and having serv'd the Office of High Sheriff of his County, in 20 Eliz. also in the 8th of K. James the 1st, had the Dignity of a Baronet conferred on him A. D. 1611, by Letters Patent, bearing Date the 29th of June. He marry'd Anne, Daughter of Ralph Shakerley, and had a numerous Off-spring, 10 Sons, Richard, Paul, Shakerley, Alexander, William, Nathaniel, Thomas, Nathaniel, and John, who hath dy'd Issules; and a 10th Son, who, at his Baptism, receiv'd the Name importing his Birth, Vicesimus; and 10 Daughters, Anne, Wife of Edward Hall, in Com. Wigoin; Lucia, Wife of Bray Ailrorth of Ailworth, in Com. Glouceft. Esc. Alice, Hesther, Elizabeth, 2 Susans, Barbara, Margaret, and another.

Sir Richard Tracy, eldest Son, succeeded in the Title and Estate: He receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood in the Life-time of his Father, and was High Sheriff of Gloucestershire 4 Q. Mary and had Islue by Anne his Wife, Daughter to Sir Thomas Coningsby of Hampton, in Com. Heref. 2 Sons Humphry, Richard, and John, that liv'd to Maturity; whereof the eldest,

Sir Humphy Tracy of Stammay, Bart. was High Sherist of his County 15 Car. 1. and suffer'd much for his Loyalty; having been sequester'd in the Great Rebellion, and paid 1500 L for Composition, as appears by the List of Compounders. He dy'd 1651 without Issue; and

Sir Richard Tracy, Bart his Brother, became feiz'd of his Title and Estate; and he likewise dying without Issue, was succeeded by his Brother John, the 3d and youngest Son of Sir Richard

Tracy, Bart. before-mention'd.

Which Sir John Tracy of Stanway, Bart. departing this Life without Children, A. D. 1677, the Title of Baronet ceas'd in this Family: He left the Manor of Stanway, and other his Inheritance to Ferdinardo Tracy, (Unkle to the present Lord Viscount Tracy) 2d Son of John, Viscount Tracy, Son and Heir of Robert, Viscount, Son and Heir of John Tracy, Son and Heir of John Tracy, Son and Heir of John Tracy, Fsq. Son and Heir of William Tracy of Todington, Esq. who marry'd the Daughter of Sir Simon Digby of Coleshill, in Com. Warw. Kt. and was elder Brother to Richard Tracy the first, who was seated at Stanway.

Which Ferdinando Tracy of Stanway, Esq. marry'd ——— Daughter of Sir Anthony Keck, Kt. and left Issue John Tracy of Stanway, Esq. who hath taken to Wise Anne, Daughter of Sir Robert Atkins, late Lord chief Baron of the Exchequer, and hath Issue several Sons and Daughters.

AFTER the Norman Invugion in the Sur-names accru'd to Families by Little FTER the Norman Invasion of this Realm. and Little, so were they not fully settled, till the Reign of King Edw. 2. and as some were denominated from their Possessions, and others from the Places their Ancestors were born at; so likewise divers Families had Names from Offices, as by many Instances might be produc'd; whereof the learned Cambden has observed, (a) That the distinct Families of the Constables, in the County of Tork, took the Name from some of their Ancestors, which bore the Office of Constables of some Castles. And our Genealogists agree, that Robert, a younger Son of the Lacy's, (Barons of Halton, and Constable of Chester) (b) took his Sur-name from his Father's Office.

John de Lacy, Baron of Halton, Constable of Chefter, and Lord of Flamburgh, in Com. Ebor. gave to the aforesaid Robert (Sur-nam'd Constable) his Lordship of Flamburgh, which descended to William Constable his Son, or Grandson, who is commemorated 4. H. 3. A. D. 1260; and, by Julian his Wife, left Issue Robert, his Son and Heir, who was, Knighted, with three hundred more, at a grand Festival at Whitsontide, in the 34th Year of the Reign of King Edward the 1st, at the same Time that the Honour of Knighthood was conferr'd by the King, (c) on Edward Earl of Carnarvon, his eldest Son, which was to adorn the Splendour of his Court, and augment the Glory of his intended Expedition into Scotland. He was living 13 Edw 2. and was Father to Sir Marmaduke Constable, Kt. Sheriff of the County of Tork in the 40th Year of the Reign of King Edw. 2. who had Iffue Sir William Constable, Kt. who, by his Wife, the Daughter of the Lord Fitz-Hugh, had Issue Robert, his Son and Heir, who was High Sheriff of Torkshire in the 8th, 9th, and 18th Years of King Richard the 2d. He had in Marriage — Daughter of William Skipwith. and was succeeded by his Son, Sir Marmaduke Constable, Kt. who took to Wife Catherine, Daughter and Heir of Robert Cumberworth, (by Sibil his Wife, Daughter and Heir of Richard Argum) and had Issue 4 Sons, whereof Robert, the eldest, succeeded at Flamburgh.

Which Robert was a Knight, before the 16th of King Henry the 6th, in which Year he was High Sheriff of Torkshire, and likewise in the 2d and 3d Years of King Henry the 4th. He took to

Marmaduke Constable, Ancestor to the Family at Everingham; (whereof Marmaduke was created a Baronet July 20, 1642.) 3. William Constable of Hatfield, in Holderness: 4. John Constable of Knowlton, in Com. Nott.

Robert Confiable (eldest Son and Heir of Marmaduke) was knighted on the 17th of June, A.D. 1497, in 12 Hen. 7. (\*) at the Battle of Blackbeath in Kent, having valiantly behav'd himself against the Lord Audley and the Cornish Rebels. He was afterwards concern'd in the Risings about Religion, in the 28th of the Reign of King Henry the 8th, and pardon'd for the same; but being in the Commotion in Lincolshire with John Lord Hussey, and others, occasion'd by the Assessment of a Subsidy, was attainted, and hang'd in Chains at Hull. (e) He lest Issue by Jane his Wise, Daughter of William Ingleby, Esq.

Which Marmaduke serv'd King Henry the 8th in his Wars; was with him at the Siege of Teroven, and the Battle that enfu'd thereupon, and afterwards had the Honour of Knighthood conferr'd on him (14 Od.) at Lifle, when the King and Court was there; and growing into his Esteem and Favour, was a Servant to that King, as appears by Letters Patents, dated 29 Man, 32. of his Reign, wherein he had a Grant of the Monastery and Manor of Neneuton, (f) in Warwickshire, with all the Lands in that County thereto belonging. He was afterwards (in the first Year of King Edward the 6th) made a Knight-Banneret in the Camp of Roquelborough. by the Earl of Smry, General of the Army. refided mostly at Nunceaton, in Com. Warw. whereof he dy'd (g) seiz'd 28 April, 2 Eliz, leaving Robert, his Son and Heir, 20 Years of Age. This Sir Marmaduke lyes bury'd on the North Side of the Chancel of that Church, under a fair Tomb, whereon is the Effigies of a Knight in Armour, lying on his Back, his Head refting on a Pillow, his Hands conjoin'd in Prayer, and at his Feet a Lion Couchant; and round the Verge, is this following Inscription:

bere lyeth Sir Warmaduke Constable, knyght, which doed the xx daye of Aprill, 19 yere of our lood, W.D. & threscore, Sone and hepre to Sir Robartt Constable, knyght, lood of flambourghe and home. .... Spaldyngmaze, and the sayd Sir Warmaduke hadde too Misse, Elezabethe, dawghter

to the lord Darse, by hur he hadde too Sons, Robert and Marmaduke, and viii Dawghters; the second Alyss, Margaret Bootlir Dawghter of Alistiam Bootlir, Sent.

Robert Constable (eldest Son of Sir Marmaduke) sold the said Monastery and Manor of Nuneaton, in 6 Eliz. to Sir Ambrose Cave; (b) and, by Dorothy his Wife, Daughter of Sir John Widrington, Kt. Reliest of —— Fenwick, lest Issue William, his Son and Heir. The said Robert was knighted by the Earl of Sussex A. D. 1570, (i) being with the said General in the Expedition that Year into Scotland, when they march'd to Edinburgh in Aid of the young King, safter James the 1st of Eng-

land against the Hamilton Faction.

William Confiable (Son and Heir of Sir Robert) had the Estate at Flamborough in Torkshire, and embarqu'd with the Earl of Essex (A. D. 1599.) in his Expedition (k) against the Rebels in Ireland, and for his Services, was there knighted: The next Year being concern'd with the said Earl in his Rising, in order, as was pretended. to remove the evil Counsellors of the Queen: He was arraign'd for High Treason; but, on a special Letter from the Queen, that he, and others, were unwittingly drawn in, was remanded without Trial; (1) and, on the 20th of March following, had her Majesty's Warrant to Sir John Popham, Kt. Lord Chief Justice, to be admitted to Bail. He was created a Baronet by Letters Patents dated the 29th of June, A. D.

1611, 9 Jac. 1. and having ferv'd in Parliament for the Borough of Knaresborough, in the 21st Year of that King's Reign, and Knight of the Shire (m) for the County of York, I Car. 1. and for Knarelborough, in all succeeding Parliaments, to the Time of his Death; became a great Stickler for the Liberty of the Subject; and having been imprison'd on Account of Ship-Money, was fo imbitter'd, that he went in with all the Extravagancies of those malignant Persons that brought King Charles the 1st to the Block; and was among those that fign'd the Warrant for his Death; but, during the Usurpation, departing this Life, escap'd the Punishments of his Crimes, which he would undoubtedly have undergone, had not his Death prevented the Execution of the Law; for in the General Pardon that pass'd after the Restoration of King Charles the 2d, this Sir William Conflables Lands, &c. were excepted; as likewise all Pains, Penalties, and Forfeitures, as tho' that Act had never pass'd; so that his Dignity expir'd with him.

A LL Authorities agree, that this ancient Family (to which the learned World is so much indebted) is descended out of Cheshire, where there are two Towns of the same Denomination, one in the hundred of Northwich, the other in Broxton, the neither of them mention'd in Doomsday Record. The first of the Name we find in those Parts was John de Cotun, Son of Matildis de Lache, who was the Daughter of Gralam de Lostock; which John had Lands in the Manour of Lachemanbank, which he gave to the Abbey of Vale Royal, temp. E. I. (a)

Co-temporary with this John was Simon, the Son of William de Coton, who had Issue another William, who was twice marry'd, to Isabel and Joar. Edmund was his Son and Heir, living 16 E. 3, who by his Wife Catherine had Issue Robert and

William.

Robert was of Coton near Hanbury, in Com. Staff. and is mention'd in Deeds, 30 E. 3; but this Line determin'd in Daughters and Heirs Females, about

the Time of H. 5. (b)

William Cotton aforesaid, about the latter End of E. 2, marry'd Agnes, Daughter and Heir of Walter de Ridware of (c) Hampstall Ridware, in Com. Staff. by Joan his Wife, Daughter and Heir of Walter Walbeif, and his Wife Juliana, Daughter and Heir of John Basyng, by which Marriage that Manour and other Possessions accru'd to him.

John Cotton, Son and Heir to the said William, bore the Arms of Ridware, making Hampstall Ridware his chief Residence; and having marry'd Isabel, Daughter and Heir of William Fawconer of Thurcaston, in Com. Leicest. had Issue

Sir Richard Cotton of Ridware, Kt. who marry'd Elizabeth, Sister, and afterwards Heir of Sir Hugh Venables, Baron of Kinderton, from which Marriage

proceeded two Sons, John and William.

From John, the eldest, who enjoy'd the Estate at Ridware, and was living 35 H. 6, and 2 E. 4, descended the Cottons of Ridware, in Com. Staff. and the Cottons of Bould and Cruckmarsh, in the same

County.

William, the Brother of the said John, was slain at the Battle of St. Albans, 23 May, 33 H. 6, in those satal Contentions between the Houses of Tork and Lancaster. (d) He marry'd Mary, Daughter and Heir of Robert Wesenbam, Son of Hugh Wesenbam, by Agnes, Daughter and Heir of John Bruce, Lord of Connington in the County of Huntingdon, and Exton in Com. Rutl. By which Marriage he came possess'd of the first of those Lordships, the Seat of his Posterity to this Time.

It was once the Seat of Turketile, or Turchil, the Dane, Earl of the East Angles, who invited over Swaine, King of Denmark, to invade England; and he, with most of that Nation, being exil'd by King Edward the Consessor, this Seat, with other large Possessions, were given by the said King to Waltheof, Earl of Northumberland and Huntingdon, to whom King William the Conqueror gave in Marriage his Sister's Daughter. (e) Afterwards Connington, and the Earldom of Huntingdon, came to David King of Scotland, (Son of King Malcolm 1,

and Margaret, Sister and Heir to Edgar Etheling,) partly by Inter-marriage with Earl Waltheof's Daughter, and the like Vicissitudes, brought that Manour into the Family of Bruces; for Robert Bruce of Annandale, (Brother to Malcolm, William, and Alexander, successively Kings of Scotland,) having marry'd Isabet, Daughter and Heir of David Earl of Huntingdon, acquir'd this Lordship of Conmington, and leaving 2 Sons by her, Robert and Bernard.

Robert Bruce, the eldest, had a just Claim to the Crown of Scotland, and his Son Robert the 3d, obtain'd the full Possession of that Kingdom, in Right from whom his Majesty King George now

possesses the Crown.

Bernard Bruce, Brother to the aforesaid Robert, and Uncle to Robert the first King of Scotland, had the Lordship of Counington, with other sair Manours in England; which Lordship came by Marriage to Wesenbam, and from thence to Cot-

ton, as aforefaid.

The said Lady Mary, Daughter of Robert Wefenham, having bury'd her Husband William Cotton was marry'd 2dly to Sir Thomas Billing, Kt.
Chief-Justice of England in the Reign of King E. 4;
and 3dly to Thomas Lacey of Grancestre, near Cambridge, and dying 14 March, A. D. 1499, was bury'd in the South Isle of the Church of St. Margaret Westminster, by her 1st Husband; (which Isle
in that King's Time she had piously repaird.)

His eldest Son and Heir, who succeeded him, was Thomas Cotton of Connington, Esq, High-Sheriss of Cambridge and Huntingdonshires, 15 H. 7; who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter to—Knightley of Falvesly, in Com. Northamp. and had Issue 3 Daughters, Eleanor, Wife to Robert Mulsho; Mary, to—Grantost of Stanton, in Com. — and Margaret, a Nun at Barking, in Com. Essex. Also 5 Sons, Thomas, William, George, Anthony, and Richard.

Thomas succeeded to the Estate; was likewise High-Sheriff of the Counties of Cambridge and Huntingdon, 4. H. 8; and departing this Life about the 10th Year of that King's Reign, lest his Wise a Widow, and his eldest son in Ward, and was bury'd in the Abbey of Saltry, in Com. Hunt. as we are inform'd from a Cenetophial Inscription set up by his great Grand-son Sir Robert Cotton, Bart. in the Church at Connington, viz.

His Wife therein mention'd was Joan, Daughter of John Paris of Linton, in Com. Cantab. Esq. by whom he had Issue a Daughter, Eleanor, and 2 Sons, Thomas, and Richard Cotton, Clerk.

Thomas Cotton, Esq, was High-Sheriff of Huntingdon and Cambridge, Anno 1 E. 6, and having marry'd Lucia, Daughter and Co-heir to Thomas Harvy of Elmestoke, in Com. Linc. Esq, had Issue Thomas, Robert, Philip, Lawrence, John, Kivilioc, and

Fane.

Thomas, the eldest Son, succeeded to the Inheritance, and marry'd 2 Wives, 1st. Elizabeth, Daughter to Francis Shirley of Stanton, in Com. Leicest. Esq. by whom he had I Son, Sir Robert, hereafter mention'd, and 5 Daughters, Lucy, Wife to-Talcarne, of Ashton in Essex; Dorothy, to Maurice Baude of Somerby, in Com. Linc. Johanna, to John Baude of the same Place; and Rebecca, to William Mulso of Thingdon, in Com. Northamp. Esqs; said Thomas took to his second Wife Dorothy, Daughter of John Tamworth of Hawsted, in Com. Leicest. Esq, by whom he had three Daughters, Catherine and Rebecca unmarry'd, A. D. 1613, and Frances, marry'd to Sir Edward Montagu of Boughton, in Com. Northamp. Kt. and 4 Sons, viz. Thomas Cotton of Gedding-Abbey, in Com. Hunt. who marry'd Mary, Daughter of Robert Price of Washingly; and had Posterity Henry Cotton of Broughton, in Com, Northamp. Ferdinand, and John, both Merchants.

Robert, only Son by the 1st Wise, was born 22 Jan. A. D. 1570, \* in the Village of Denton, near Conington, (part of his Ancestors Inheritance) his Parents having remov'd thither, not long after their Marriage, as well for the Splendor of his Birth, as to be more at Liberty from the Incommodiousness of their own Seat, arising from

a great Accession of new Domesticks. He was no less illustrious in his Descent from his Mother, a Shirley (whose chief is the present Earl Ferrers.) than from his Father. But he render'd his Family more Eminent by his own Life, his sublime Disposition, strong Judgment, excellent Endowments of Mind, and other Qualifications, that makes his Name shine to Posterity. After King James 1 came to the English Crown, who by reason of his Descent from the Bruces, acknowledg'd him his Cousin, he wrote himself in his Books Bruceus, not in Arrogance and Ostentation, but in Distinction to those of the Name of Cotton, of other Families; and as my Author observes, in a grateful Sense of the divine Favour for that Extraction, and to excite an Emulation in his Issue, to follow the Virtues of such glorious Ancestors. It is not doubted, but being the Firstborn, he had an Education agreeable to the promising Hopes of his suture Accomplishments. After his juvenile Studies, he was sent to Trinity-College Cambridge, where he thought it not sufficient to be register'd among Academicks, and wear the Habit only, unless by his Studies he could be a Benefit to his Prince and Nation. This he made good on leaving the University, not suffering his Nature to flag, nor the Vigour of his Mind to be emasculated by pleasure and domestick Delights; Queen Elizabeth then reign'd, whose Favour was only to Men of Desert, which so inflam'd her Subjects, especially such whose happy Birth had rais'd them above the Vulgar, that in divers Capacities; some in maritime Affairs, either in new Discoveries, or in Hostility against an Enemy, or planting new Colonies; others in military Matters, others in Embafsies, &c. and such as staid at Home sedulously apply'd themselves in Business of the Court, in the the Law, Mathematicks, Mechanism, and in national History and Antiquities, of fingular Use in civil Affairs; which last, Sir Robert, at the Age of 18 Years made Choice of, and at length above the Reach of any private Purse, acquir'd such a Library of rare and exquisite Manuscripts, that Britain, as long as Britain, nay, the whole Christian World is his Debtor. He maturely began his great Collection, A. D. 1588, when finding his residing at Home not altogether adequate to his Purposes, he came up to London, associated himself with Camden, and became a Member of the Society of Antiquaries. That learned Man had such an Esteem for him, that he dedicated his Remains to him, and when he dy'd was a Benefactor to his Library. He travell'd into the North with Mr. Camden, Anno 1599, to view the Pies Wall, and other Northern Antiquities: Those Parts being plentifully flor'd with the Roman Relicks, occasion'd thro' their long Residence there to repress the Barbarities of the Pids; and by this Means, and the Affinity of their Faculties, he came acquainted with the Lord William Howard of Naworth, and other Nobles; which being cultivated and maintain'd, introduc'd the Marriage between his Son, and a Daughter of that noble House.

The Reputation he attain'd, when young, by his Learning and Industry, increas'd with his Years, in solid Erudition and Prudence; the same Tenour and Mode of Life, without Idleness or Luxury; the same Ardency and Diligence to obtain antique Books continu'd; but not for the sake of Pomp or Shew, or by reading them to find Discourse for vain Speculations, but to fit him for more arduous Enterprizes.

Upon

Upon the Peace intended between Queen Elizabeth and King Philip of Spain, he furnish'd England with Arguments for its Precedency before that Realm, which was foreseen would be a Pre-

liminary, and contested at the Congress.

A.D. 1603, he receiv'd knighthood from King 7. 1, being one of those many he conferr'd that Honour on before his Coronation. (a) During this Reign, and in the many and various Disficulties arising in State-Points, Sir Robert was look'd upon, by common Suffrage, one of the best in-Structed therein; hence Henry Earl of Northampton, and Lord Privy-Seal, 1608, became his familiar and perpetual Friend, confulted him in what he publickly deliver'd, made him his Confident, and found a Return of Wisdom and Fidelity.

He became foon after known to Hemy Prince of Wales, who requir'd his Information in reference to his Court and Palace. He was advis'd withal in the Case of the Union of the two Kingdoms, by Robert Earl of Salisbury, and the aforefaid Earl of Northampton. The Commissioners of the Earl Marshalship referr'd to his Arbitration the different Judgments of the Heralds concerning Precedency among the City Magistrates; and his Opinion was likewise desir'd by several others in many different Cases of Moment.

The same Year, 1608, he is nominated, with the Earl of Northampton and others, in the Commission for better ordering and providing for the Navy; render'd almost useless by Inactivity and Neglect, and affifted in composing a Treatise on

that Subject.

A. D. 1609, he wrote upon Duelling and fingle Combat, us'd before either King, High-Constable, and Marshal.

About the Years 1609 and 10, the Nation being weak in Treasure, Projects were set on soot to replenish the same without Burthen to the Subject, and Danger to the Laws, Sir Robert, among others, had this Province, being a Person whose Judgment had sifted the Deeds of past Ages. They pitch'd on a new Order of hereditary Knighthood, call'd Baronets, propos'd for the Fine of 1000 l. each, which would raise annually 100000 l. and this at last was accepted, and Sir Robert himself dignify'd with the same,

in the 9th Year of King Ja. 1.

About the 14th Year of this Reign, he compendiously wrote the Life of King Hen. 3, for the expeditious reading of King Jac. 1, that he might use it as a Mirrour; and that King designing a Marriage with Spain for his Son Prince Charles. which the English dislik'd, Sir Robert had the Honour to manage this Affair, representing the History of the Austrian Leagues, Truces, &c. Anno 1625, and stood in Defence of the Duke of Buckingbam, when the Spanish Embassadors endeavour'd to displeasure the King against him. whom they conceiv'd broke off the intended Match. Neither was he a less Patron to Ecclesiafticks, afferting their Cause against the Puritans, from the Constitutions of the Empire, and the Laws of our Saxon Kings. He wrote many other Tracts, some of which were publish'd after his Death. During the Reigns of King Jac. 1, and Car. 1, he was frequently a Member of the House of Commons; none more judicious and intelligent of our Constitution, where he behav'd himself as a loyal Subject to his Sovereign, and an honest Representative to his Country: But whilst the Constitution of his Body promis'd long Life, a sudden Feaver seis'd him; labouring under which, and foreseeing his Death, he prepar'd

himself for it like a true Christian, and made his Will, (a) leaving his only Son Thomas his Heir and Executor, fetling the great beneficial Treafore of his Library, which he had been 40 Years collecting, at a valt Expence, upon the faid Thomas, and after him, upon his Grand-son John, therein express'd, aged at that Time, 10 Years, and afterward to his right Heirs never to be alienated.

. He dy'd, after two Days Sickness, on the 6th of Man A. D. 1621, aged 60 Years, 3 Months, and a few Days, at his House in Westminster, whence, with folemn Pomp, he was carry'd to Comington, as he appointed in his Will; and was interr'd on the South Side of that Church, under a fair Monument erected by the Piety of his Wife and Son; Which Lady was Elizabeth, Daughter and Co-heir of William Brocas of Thedingworth, in Com. Leiceft. Esq. whereon is this Inscription:

Sir Robert Cotton of Hatley St. George, in Com. Canteb. Nott. and by Deed bearing Date 23 June, 15 E. 4. (a) entail'd the said Manour, for want of Heirs Male of his own Body, on Thomas Molineux of Seston, Esq. Son and Heir of Richard, Brother of him the said Thomas, and his Issue-Male lawfully begotten. He was one of the Privy-Council to King E. 4; and behaving himself valiantly in the Expedition into Scotland, Anno 1482, was made a Knight Banneret, by Richard Duke of Glouster, at Berwick; (b) and in the said Year he built

Derb. Esq. 3 Sons; Thomas, who dy'd without Issue; Richard and William, and 4 Daughters.

The said Richard, 22 H. 8, had Lands in Hamton, &c. settled on him, in Consideration of a Marriage between him the said Richard; and Margaret, Daughter of Edmund Buffy of Hatber, in Com. Linc. which Marriage took Effect, and he had Issue by her a Son and a Daughter;

Francis and Mary.

Which Francis marry'd Elizabeth, eldest Daughter and Co-heir of Thomas Greenbalgh, Son of Roger Greenbalgh of Tiversal, in Com Nott. Esq, by whom he came possessed of the Manour of Tiversal. He was

was High-Sheriff of the County of Nottingham

24 Eliz. and had Issue 5 Sons, whereof

Thomas, the eldest, succeeded to the Manours of Hawton and Tiversal; and by his Wife Alice, Daughter and Co-heir of Thomas Cranmer of Aslatton, in Com. Nott. Esq. had Issue 2 Sons, John and Thomas, and a Daughter Alice, who had for 2d Husband Sir John Thorold. This Thomas, dying Anno 1597, was succeeded in the Estate by John, his eldest Son.

Which John was knighted by King James the 1st at Whitehall, Nov. 10 1608, and the next Year was advanc'd to the Degree of a Baronet. He liv'd in great Splendour, beyond the Income of his Estate, (tho' large) and was forc'd to sell Part of it. He mortgag'd his Manour of Hawton to Sir John Leek, which afterwards became the Inheritance of the Earl of Scarsdale. He marry'd 2 Wives, 1st, ——Daughter of John Markham of Sedgbrook, in Com. Linc. Esq. by whom he had Francis his Successor. 2dly, Anne, Daughter of Sir James Hanington of Ridlington, in Com. Rutl. Kt. Widow of Thomas Foljamb, by whom he had a Son Roger, who marry'd a Daughter and Coheir of Robert Monson.

Sir Francis Molineux, Bart. Son and Heir of Sir John, made Tiversal his principal Residence for some Years, 'till he setled it on John his eldest Son, having made Keeton a fit Habitation, where he dy'd 12 Octob. 1674, aged 72 Years. He marry'd Theodocia, Daughter of Sir Edmund Heron, Knight of the Bath, by whom he had Issue John his Successor, and Francis of Mansseld, in Com. Nott. who marry'd ——Daughter of Lord Darcy of Hornby-Castle, Torksbire, by whom he had Issue 2 Sons, Darcy Molineux, the eldest, took to Wife Elizabeth, Daughter of Mr. Basset of Doncaster, in Com. Ebor. and lest Issue 2 Sons, William and John.

Francis,

Francis, 2d Son now living, marry'd Mary, Daughter of Charles Tanckred of Wbaksley, in Com. Ebor Esq; and hath Issue 4 Daughters, of whom Dorothy marry'd Lucius Henry Lord Falkland, who

hath by her 2 Sons and one Daughter.

Sir John Molyneux, Bart. was born in the Year 1623; and taking to Wife Lucy, Daughter of Alexander Rigby, and Widow of Robert Hesketh of the County of Lancaster, had Issue 3 Sons, Francis, John, who dy'd unmarry'd; Thomas, formerly a Turkey Merchant, but now of Preston in Lancashire, who marry'd Mary, Daughter of-Mundy of Allestree, in Com. Derb. Esq; and hath Issue Sons now living, Rigby and Thomas. had likewise several Daughters, of whom Mary marry'd the Honourable Rich Leek, Esq. Father of the present Earl of Scarsdale; and Elizabeth, Edmond Jodrell of Erdsley, in Com. Cestr. Esq.

Sir Francis Molyneux of Teversal, Bart. now living, succeeded his Father Anno 1691; hath serv'd in Parliament, as one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Nottingham; and having marry'd Diana, Daughter of John How of Langor-Caftle, in Com. Nott. Elg. and Sifter to the late Scroop, Lord Viscount How, had Issue 7 Sons, 1. John, 3. Scroop, 4. Charles, and 6 William, all deceas'd; Francis, 2d Son, Charles and William, 5th and 7th Sons, are now living; and 3 Daughters, Annabella, who marry'd John Plumptre, Esq. Member in the present Parliament for the Town of Nottingham, Lucy, who marry'd Charles Croke Lifle of Moyles Court, in Com. South, Esq. and Diana unmarry'd.

# Sir FRANCIS WORTLEY of WORTLEY, Kt. Ebor. Nº 39.

(ead. Die præd.)

HIS Family, according to the Custom of ancient Times, is denominated from their Possessions in the Wapentake of Staincross, in the West Riding of Tork. The 1st mention'd is Ralph de Wortley, Lord of Wortley, (a) who by Winifred his Wife, Daughter of John Fleming of Wathe, had Usue Sir Nicholas Wortley, Kt. 1 H. 3, 1217; who marry'd Rosamund, Daughter of Eustice Lord Veseie, from whom, after 6 Generations, descended John de Wortley, mention'd 10 R. 2, who marry'd 2 Wives; by Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir Peter de lay Haye, Kt. he had Sir Nicholas Wortley, Kt. who likewise marry'd 2 Wives, and was succeeded in his Estate by Nicholas his Son and Heir, who by Isabel his Wife, Daughter of William Tunstall of Thurland, in Com. Lanc. Hig; was Father to

Sir Thomas Wortley, Kt. who was of great Note in the Reigns of E. 4, Ric. 3, H. 7, and H. 8. He was one of the Knights for the Body to all those Kings, as we are inform'd from a Memorial engraven in Roman Capitals, on a great Stone, near a Lodge that he built in Wharneliffe Chace. (b) He liv'd in such Grandeur, that King H. 7 sent him a Letter, requiring him to provide 100 of his Servants to be in Readiness for War, on a Day's Warning, when the Capt. of Berwick should send for them. (c) He was High-Sheriff

Sheriff of the County of Tork in 6 and 17 of tha King's Reign; and having marry'd 3 Wives, had by Elizabeth, his 3d Lady, Daughter of William Fitz-Williams of Aldworth, Esq. Thomas, his Son and Heir.

Which Thomas Wortley, Esq. had, by Margaret his Wife, Daughter to Sir Thomas Savile of Thornbill, Kt. Francis Wortley, Esq. who was Custos Rotulorum, Justice of the Peace, &c. in 22 Eliz. and

was succeeded in his Estate by his Son,

Sir Richard Wortley. knighted by K. James the Ist at Tork, the 17th of April, 1603, and departing this Life the 25th of July following, was bury'd in St. George's Chapel at Windsor, and a Monument is erected to his Memory. He had, by Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter of Edward Boughton of Cawston, in Com. Warw. Esq. 2 Sons, Francis, Edward, and Ibomas, who were all knighted, and 4 Daughters; Mary marry'd to the Baron Hilton of Hilton, in Com. Dur. Anne, to Sir Rotheram Willoughby. Kt Elizabeth to Sir Henry Crofts, Kt. and Fleanor to Sir Henry Lee, Kt. and Bart. Ancestor to the present Earl of Litchfield. The above mention'd Lady surviv'd Sir Richard, and was, in 2d Marriage, Wise to William Cavendish Earl of Devonshire.

Sir Francis Wortley of Wortley, eldest Son and Heir of Sir Richard, was knighted at Theobalds, 15 Jan. 1610, and advanc'd by King James to the Dignity of a Baronet 29 June the Year following. He had all the Advantages of Education, and was well learn'd in the Greek and Latin Authors, of a ready quick Wit, a good Speaker, and was well seen in Poetry, as appears by several of his Compositives in Print and Manuscript. He was loyal to his Majesty King Charles the Ist; and laments, in his Poems, the Deaths of several slain in that

King's Service. He left an only Son,

Sir Francis Wortley, Bart. who ferv'd Deputy-Lieutenant, Justice of the Peace and all other Offices suiting his Condition, in the West Riding of Torkshire, in the Reign of K. Cha. 2; but leaving no Issue Male, the Title is extinct. He settled his Estate on the Honourable Sidney Mountague, Fsq. 2d Son to the Rt. Hon. Edward Earl of Sandwich, (he having marry'd Anne, his only Daughter) on Condition he chang'd his Name to Wortley; which was comply'd with by the said Mr. Mountague, who has two Sons by her, Edward Wortley alias Mountague, and Sydney Wortley alias Mountague, Esqs.

Sir GEORGE SAVILE of THORN-HILL, Kt. Ebor. N°40.

[29 Junii, A. D. 1611. R. Jac. I. 9.]

Some imagine those of this Name to be descended from the Family of Savelli in Italy, accounted one of the ancientest in the World; whereof some were Consuls before and after the Time of our Saviour, as Mr. Wood (a) has observed; and Mr. Richardson, giving an Account of Sir John Savile, Lord Chief Baron of the Exchequer, (before his Reports of Law Cases in the Reign of Q. Elizabeth) mentions the

the Duke de Savilli to own as his Relation. John 2d Son of that Sir John, when he made him a Visit in Italy. How this is made out I can't conjecture; but that the Name and Family were numerous in Torkshir's, and came into England out of the Province of Anjou in France, several Pedigrees testifie; having match'd with the Heirs of Rockley of Rockley, Golker of Golker, Tankersley, Rochdale, Copley, and other worthy Families, before the Reign of King R. 2. About which Time Sir John Savile, the lineal Heir-Male in the oth Generation, marry'd Isabel, Daughter and Heir to Thomas Eland of Eland, in the said County; by whom he came posses'd of that Estate, which for some Time was the principal Residence of his Descendants. He had several Sons:

Henry, 2d Son, (and on Failure of the Issue of his Brother, chief Heir-Male,) marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter and Heir of Simon Thornbill of Thornbill, in Com. Ebor. Esq. Son and Heir of Sir Bryan Thornbill, Kt. a Person of great Note, temp. E. 3, having serv'd in several Parliaments as Knight of the Shire, and was descended from Jordan de Thornbill, who had great Possessions in Ovenden, Skircoate, Rishworth, Norland, Barkisland, &c. as by Evidence sans Date; to which Jordan Hamlin Plantagenet Earl Warren, Owner of the Manour of Wakesield, consirm'd his Inheritance in Sowerbyshire, (circa 1169.) (b)

The said Hemry Savile by this Match became possessed of a great Inheritance, as the Manour of Thornbill, and great Royalties in Sowerbyshire, which were confirmed to Edward Savile, Esq. by Decree in the Dutchy Chamber in Michaelmas Term, 6 and 7 Eliz. He left Issue Sir Thomas Savile, of Thornbill, Kt. from whom proceeded Sir John Savile, Lord of Thornbill, Eland, and Tankersley, who,

by Alice his Wife, Daughter of Sir William Gascoign of Gawthorp, in Com. Ebor. Kt. had Issue 3 Sons, John, William, and Thomas. From John, the eldest, descended (by a natural Son of Henry, his Grand-son) the Saviles Earls of Sussex, William, 2d Son, dy'd without Issue.

Thomas, 3d Son was of Lupset, and had Issue John Savile of the said Place, Father of Henry Savile who was Sheriff of Torkshire, and one of the Council for the North, temp. Queen Eliz. and by Johanna his Wife, Daughter and Heir of William Vernon of Barrowby, in Com. Leic. Lsq. had Issue

Sir George Savile of Thornbill, Kt. who was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet, A. D. 1610, and lies bury'd in Thornbill Church, under a curious Monument, with a Knight's Statute to the Life in Marble, and this Inscription in Gilt Letters.

Here lyeth the Body of Sir George Savile, Kt. and Bart of Thornbill, in the County of York, who had first to Wife the Lady Mary, Daughter of George Earl of Shrewsbury, by whom he had Issue one Son; and afterwards he took to Wife Eliz. Daughter to Sir Edward Anscough of South Kelsey, in the County of Lincoln, Kt. by whom he had Issue 3 Sons and 4 Daughters. He departed this Life the 12 Day of Nov. 1622, in the 72d Year of his Age; to whose Memory the said Dame Eliz. Sav. by her last Will and Testament appointed this Monument to be erected, who is likewise interrid in the Chappel of Herbury.

George, only Son by the first Marriage, resided at Sootbill, in Com. Ebor. was knighted, and marry'd

2 Wives, Sarah, Daughter and Co-heir to John Rede of Cotesbrook, in Com. North. and Anne, eldest Daughter of Sir William Wentworth of Wentworth Woodhouse, Kt. and Bart. by the former he had no Issue, by the other he lest 2 Sons, George and William, and deceasing in his Father's Life-Time, Anno 1618, was succeeded in the Estate by his eldest Son

Sir George Savile of Thornhill, Bart. as Succeffor to his Grand-father, and he dying unmarry'd, the Title and Estate fell to William his Brother.

Which Sir William Savile, Bart. flood firm in his Allegiance to King Cha. 1, advanc'd his Interest all he could, and was a great Sufferer in his Cause. He fortify'd his House at Thornbill, and made it a Garrison for the King, which being afterwards taken by the Rebels, was demolish'd. He marry'd Anne, Daughter to Thomas Lord Coventry, Keeper of the

Great Seal, and left Issue

Sir George Savile, Bart. fam'd for several miscellaneous Tracts, which he wrote with great Judgment, was one of the greatest States-men in his Time, and contributed all he could to bring about the Restoration of the Royal Family; which being effected, he was, in Confideration of his own and his Father's Loyalty to King Ch. 1. as also his own Deserts from King Ch. 2, created Baron Savile of Eland, and Viscount Halifax; and afterwards, Anno 1682, advanc'd to the Titles of Marquess and Earl of Halifax, and in the same Year constituted Lord Privy Seal. He was likewife President of the Council in the Reign of King Cb. 2; and dying in the Year 1695, left behind him a great Character for his Wisdom, Integrity, Conduct, and many other excellent Qualifications. The Reigns of King Charles and King James 2, when the Councils often chang'd, prov'd the Integrity of the Courtiers, and very few but P 4 went

went in too much, either to the Prerogative of the Crown, or the Rights of the People; yet this Lord demean'd himself so well, that he was look'd on by common Suffrage as a true Patriot, both to his King and Country, and very few were they that spoke ill of him. He left Issue William, who succeeded to his Honours, and marry'd two Wives; but leaving no Issue by either of them, the Titles of Marquess, Earl, and Viscount Hallifax, and Baron Savil of Eland. expir'd; but the Dignity of Baronet descended to a colateral Branch, as I shall hereafter shew; viz. to the Heirs of Sir George Savile, Kt. and Bart. first mention'd, by his Wife Elizabeth, Daughter to Sir Edward Ascough, Kt. Relict to Sir George Savile of Wakefield, Kt. by whom he had 3 Sons and 4 Daughters, as express'd on his Monument; which were,

1. Sir John Savile of Lupsete, in Com. Ebor. who marry'd two Wives; Elizabeth, Daughter to John Armitage of Kirklees, Esq; (by whom he had only a Daughter, who marry'd William Huster of Cleveland, Esq;) and Anne, Daughter of Sir John Soame, Kt. by whom he had 2 Sons, John and Thomas; and 2 Daughters, Many, Wife of — Jennison of Newersselle, Esq; and Anne, of John Harris of London, Esq, John and Thomas, the Sons, dy'd without Issue; the former succeeded William Marquess of Hallisax in the Baronetship, and dy'd unmarry'd about the Year 1704; whereupon that Title descended to the Heirs of Henry Savile of Bowling, in Com. Ebor. Esq; 2d Son of Sir George Savile, Kt. and Bart. and Brother to Sir John of Lupsete before-mention'd; who had likewise a Sister Mary, marry'd to John Archer of Grays-Inn, Esq;

Which Henry was 67 Years old Anno 1666, and had Issue, by Anne his Wife, Daughter of Robert Crewse of London, Merchant, several Sons and Daughters; of whom Elizabeth marry'd the Count

Montfelto,

Montfelto, and Anne, Sir Robert Forbes of the Kingdom of Scotland. Of the Sons, George, who was 22 Years old 1666, dy'd unmarry'd; as did likewise Henry, Edward, Robert, and others; none leaving Issue, except John Savile, his 2d Son, a reverend Divine, who was Rector of Thornhill, in Com. Ebor. and dying? Anno 1701, had by Barbara his Wise, Daughter of Thomas Jennison, Esq. one Son George the present Baronet, and 2 Daughters; Anne, who marry'd Sir Nicholas Cole, Bart. and Gertrude.

Which Sir George Savile, Bart. now living at Rufford, in Com. Not. succeeded his Cousin Sir John in the Dignity, Anno 1704; and was before that Time seiz'd in Possession, or Reversion, of most of the ancient Estate of the Family, by Virtue of a Settlement made by the Marques of Hallifax; and as yet is unmarry'd, 1714.

WILLIAM

WILLIAM KNIVETON of MIR-CASTON, Esq; Derb. N° 41. (29 June, A. D. 1611. R. Jac. 9.)

F this ancient Family, in the Reign of King E. 1, were 2 eminent Branches, both of which may claim Seniority by the bearing of Arms, one having a Bend vair, the other a Cheveron, alike in Tinctures; but I rather think this of Mircofton,

or Mercaston, the younger House.

Matthew de Kniveton was possessed of Bradley, in Com. Derb. temp. E. 1, and left Issue Henry, of the same Place, cited in Charters 23 and 27 E. 1, Ancestor to the Knivetons of Bradley, of which House I take John to be, who was one of the Knights of the Shire for Nottingham, 1 H. 4; and by a natural Son of that House the Knivetons of Woodthorp, in Com. Derb. descend, which had its Beginning from Francis Kniveton, about the Chose of Queen Elizabrib's Reign. They took their Name (I suppose) from Kniveton, in Com. Not. some of them having Possessions there before the Keign of King E. 1. (b)

Matthew de Kniveton, Brother to the said Hemy, and Son of the said Matthew, by Matildis his Wife, had Issue two Sons, Thomas, commemorated is E. 2, and William de Kniveton of Ashborne, mention'd in Charters 15 E. 2, 5 and 7 E. 3; (a) who, by his Wife Margery, had Issue Nicholas, William, Thomas, Henry, Rector of Norbury, A. D. 1390, 14 R. 2. John, Robert, Vicar of Darbrug, and Founder of a Chantry there, who dy'd 16 R. 2. Nicholas de Kniveton was of Mercaston, in Com. Derb. and deceas'd 46 E. 3, leaving Issue by Joan, his Wife, Nicholas Kniveton of Underwood, and Thomas de Kniveton of Myrcaston, 14 R. 2, who marry'd Mar-

garet, Daughter of—Curson, Widow and Relict of Okeover, and dy'd 25 H. 6, leaving several Sons, of whom John, as eldest enjoy'd the patrimonial Inheritance at Mercaston, Anno 25 H. 6; but having no Issue by Margaret his Wise, Nicholas, his Brother, as next Heir, succeeded.

This Nicholas, in 7 E. 4, and 5 H. 7, underwent the Office of High-Sheriff of the Counties of Nottingham and Derby; and by Joan his Wife, left Issue

a Son of his own Name.

Which Nicholas was one of the Esquires of the Body to King H. 7; was twice marry'd; by his first Wise Joan Maliverer, he left Issue

John Knyveton of Mercaston, Esq. who marry'd Joan, Daughter to Sir Nicholas Montgomery of Cubley, Kt. from whom proceeded 2 Sons, John and Nicholas.

John, the eldest Son, was denominated of Harteshorne and Underwood; and dying in the Life-Time of his Father, left Issue by Anne his Wife, Daughter to Thomas Dethick of Newball, in Com. Derb. Esq. Thomas, Heir to his Grand-sather.

William Kniveton, eldest Son and Heir, succeeded his Father at Mircasson, and was High-Sheriss of Derbyshire 29 Eliz. and Knight of the Shire in Parliament 1 Jac. 1, and by that King was advanced to the Degree of a Baronet 1611, and served again

## 220 Sir Philip Woodhouse, Bart.

High-Sheriff of the said County, in the 12th Year of his Reign. He marry'd Matildis, Daughter and sole Heir to John Rollesty of Rollesty, Esq. by whom he had Issue 3 Daughters, Elizabeth, Wife to Thomas Kniveton of Moginton; Margaret, to—Davenport of Henbury, Esq. and Joan, to—Greves, Rector of Brailesford; and 3 Sons, Gilbert, Rollesty, and William.

Gilbert, his eldest Son, was knighted at Greenwich, 29 May 1605, and being upon the Death of his Father, a Baronet, and inheriting Mircaston, was constituted High Sheriss of Derbyshire, Anno 21 Jac. 1. By his Wise Mary, Daughter and Co-heir to Andrew Grey of the County of Hertford and Essex, he had (I presume) Sir Thomas Kniveton, Bart. one of the Gentlemen-Pensioners to King Charles the 2d and King James the 2d; in whom, I am inform'd the Title became extinct.

OF this Sirname are several Families of antient Extraction, that have been denominated (according to the Custom of former Ages) from their Possessions. Possessions. This in the County of Norfolk, has also been very eminent, and were Gentlemen of

good Rank in the time of King John. (a)

John de Woodhouse, Son of John de Wodehouse, or Woodbouse, of Kimberley, Esq. (by Margaret his Wife, Daughter to Sir Tho. Falftaff, Kt.) was Gentleman of the Privy-Chamber to H. 4, & in great Favour with K. H. 5; having ferv'd under him in his Wars, in France, and behaving himself with great Bravery at the Battle of Agincourt, had a Grant from the said King, in the 5th Year of his Reign, of the Manor call'd the Priory, or House of Welles, in Com. Norf. (b) an alien Priory to Caen in Normandy; with all the Rents, Services, Knights Fees, and Advowsons of Churches, with other Ecclesiaftical Benefices thereunto belonging in England; to hold in Capite, at the Rent of a Rose, payable at the Feast of St. John Baptist, for all Services, Demands, &c. He ferv'd in 4 several Parliaments, (c) as Knight of the Shire for the County of Norfolk, from 11 H. 4, to the End of the Reign of K. H. 5; and was so well respected, and in such Trust with the last Prince, that he was, with Henry Lord Fitz Hugh and others, left one of his Excutors. (d) And departing this Life the 9th of H. 6. Henry was found his Son and Heir, aged 24 Years, and upwards; at which Time a Writ was Issued out to the Escheator of Norfolk, (e) requiring him to take Fealty and Relief, for the Manor of Welles, &c. and to give him Possession. This Henry dying without Issue, John, his Brother, was Heir to the Estate.

Which John, 12 H. 6. (f) upon Commissioners being appointed to Summons all Persons of best Note, and tender them an Oath for the keeping the

Esq. and had Issue, Edward, John, Bertram, Jerom, and a Daughter Eleamor; 1st married to Edmund Hastings, 2dly to— Bosone, 3dly to—Cresnor; Esqs, She dy'd 1487. (b) and hes bury'd by her first Husband, in the Black Fryers at Norwich.

Edward, eldest Son to the last John, succeeded to the Estate at Kimberly, &c. receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood, and marry'd 2 Wives; by the 1st he had no Issue, by the latter, a Daughter and Heir of——Swathing, Esq, he had a Son, Thomas,

who inherited his Estate.

Which Thomas was made Knight of the Bath, at the Marriage of Prince Arthur, eldest Son of King H. 7, (i) with the Infanta of Spain; and having espous'd Thomasine, Daughter to Sir Roger Townshend, Kt. had Issue 3 Sons, Roger, John and Richard, with two Daughters, Catharine, marry'd to Sir Thomas Lovell of Barton-Bendish, Kt. and Elizabeth, to Thomas Wingsield of Dunham Magna, both in Com. Norf.

Roger succeeded to the Estate; was knighted by K. H. 8; and having marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter and Co-heir to Sir Robert Ratcliff, had Issue 4 Daughters, and as many Sons, Thomas, William, George, and John. William, the 2d Son, was knighted, and was Vice-Admiral of the English Fleet (k)

at Muscleborough in Scotland.

Thomas, the eldest Son, was posses'd of the Estate; was High-Sheriff of Norfolk and Suffolk, (1) 1 Ph. and Mary, having before that Time receiv'd the Honour

Honour of Knighthood. He serv'd in Parliament for Tarmouth, 4 & 5 Ph. and Mary, and also I Eliz. was again High-Sherist' 5 Eliz. and by Margaret his Wife, Daughter to Sir John Shetton, Kt. had Issue 2 Daughters, Amy and Elizabeth, and 4 Sons, Roger. Loy, John, and Thomas: He was succeeded by Roger his eldest Son.

Which Röger serv'd in Parliament for the Borough of Aldborough in Suffolk, 13 Eliz. was knighted by that Queen at Sir Edward Clere's House in Norfolk (m) 27 August 1578. and in the 28th of that Reign serv'd again in Parliament with Philip his eldest Son; the former for Thetford, the latter for Castlerising: Having marry'd Mary, Daughter to John Corbet of Sprouston, Esq. (who surviv'd him, and afterwards marry'd George Kemp, Esq.) he had Issue a Son and a Daughter, Philip and Catharine.

The said Philip was also knighted by Queen Elizabeth; and on the Accession of his Majesty King James the 1st to the Crown of England, went with Thomas, his eldest Son to meet that King, in his Way from Scotland to London; and at Sir George Fermoux's House, in Northamptonshire, his Majesty conferr'd the Honour of Knighthood on his Son; and on the 1st Frection of Baronets, Sir Philip accepted of that Title. He departed this Life An.—and had Sepulture with his Ancestors; leaving by Grisila his Wife, Daughter of William Telverton, of Rougham, and Widow of Hamon L'Estrange of Hunston, Esgs, Sir Thomas aforesaid, Heir to the Title and Estate.

Which Sir Thomas serv'd for Thetford, in 2 Parliaments, in the Reign of King Charles the 1st; and having marry'd Blanch, Relict of Christopher Peyton, Esq; and Daughter of John Cary Lord Hunsdon,

his Son and Heir, who succeeded him.

This Sir Philip Woodhouse. Bart. was one of the Burgesses for Thetford, in the Parliament that Restor'd King Charles the 2d; and by his Wife Lucy. eldest Daughter of Sir Thomas Cotton of Connington. Rart. had Iffue Thomas, Heir to the Estate and Title.

Which Sir Thomas Woodhouse, Bart. marry'd Ann. Daughter and Co-heir of Sir William Airmin of Olgodby, in the County of Lincoln, Bart. whom he left a Widow, and had by her the now Sir John Woodboule, Bart. She afterwards marry'd Thomas Lord Crew. who had by her 4 Daughters, the eldest of which marry'd the present Duke of Kent; and the youngest the present Earle of Arran, Brother to James, late Duke of Ormond.

Sir John Woodhouse of Kimberly, in Com. Norf. Bart. now living, hath ferv'd as Knight of the Shire for the faid County in Parliament; and having been Twice marry'd, first to Elizabeth Benson. Sister of the present Lord Bingles, by whom he had no Issue, secondly to Mary Farmor, the Daughter of William Lord Lempster, by Catharine Paulett, Half-Sister to the present Earl Paulett; hath Issue Two Sons, William and Airmine, and One Daughter named Sopbia.

DEscended from Sir Thomas Pope, Kt. living in the Reign of King Edward the 4th, whose Son, William Pope, was seated at Doddington in Oxfordsbire; and by Margaret his Wise, Daughter of Edward Tate of Stanlack in the said County, Esq. left Issue John Pope, who resided at Rockeston (now written Wroxton) near Banbury; who by his Wise Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir John Brocket of Brocket-Hall, Kt. was Father of

Sir William Pope aforesaid, who was made one of the Knights of the Bath at the Coronation of King James 1; advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet by the said King, 29 June, A. D. 1611; and created Baron of Belturbet, and Earl of Downe in the County of Cavan in Ireland, by Letters Patent bearing Date at Westminster, 15 Oct. 1628, in the 4th of

King Charles 1.

Thomas Pope, his Grandson, Earl of Down, &c., was left under Age, in the Guardianship of John Dutton of Sherburn in Gloucestershire, F.sq., who took great Care of his Education; so that he became a learned and accomplish'd Gentleman: He dy'd in St. Mary's Parish in Oxon, 28 Dec. 1660, aged 38 Years, leaving behind him only a Daughter, nam'd Elizabeth, begotten on his Wise Elizabeth, Daughter and one of the Heirs of William Dutton of Sherburn, Fsq., which said Elizabeth, his Daughter, was first marry'd to Sir Francis-Henry Lee, Bart. and was Mother to the present Earl of Litchfield; and 2dly, to Robert Earl of Lindsey. The Earldom of Down. &c. descended to

Thomas Pope, Esq, his Unkle; whose Male Issue also dying, the Title of Baronet expir'd with the Earldom, and the Estate went away among three Daughters. The eldest, Beata, marry'd William Some of Suffolk, Esq, Frances, 2d Daughter, marry'd Sir Francis North, afterwards Lord North of Guilford, whose Son, the present Lord Guilford, is now in Possession of Wroxton, a very fine Seat, Part of the Possession of the Earl of Down. Finetta, youngest Daughter, marry'd Robert Hyde, Esq, Son of Alexander Hyde Bishop of Salisbury.

THIS Family, anciently written Haverington, is denominated from their Possession, a Lordship of the same Name in Com. Cumbr. yet their chiefest

chiefest Seat and Residence was, from King E.

1st's Time, at Aldingham, in Com. Lanc.) a Manour
that came to Robert de Haverington, or Harington, by the Marriage of Agnes, Sister and Heir to
William de Cancefeld, Son and Heir of Richard de
Cancefeld, (a) by Alice his Wife, Sister and Heir
of Michael, Son of William, Son of another Michael
Flameng, all Lords of Aldingham; alluding to which
Marriage of Cancefeld, Harrington bore Arms a
Field cancellata, or clathrata, lattesed, as the Cancefeld's themselves originally did in Equivocation

of their Name, or Right of Flaming.

The Sons of this Robert and Agnes, were John Harrington, and another Robert, who by a Daughter and Heir of ---- Banister, had Sir Nicholas, Father of 3 Sons, 1. Sir William Harrington of Hornby, Knight of the Garter, temp. H. 5; and Founder of that knightly Line, that opposed the House of York; a Branch of which was those of Stepney, in Co. Mid. temp. E. 6. 2. Sir James who gave Beginning to the Wolfage Race, whose Heir Females, Sifters and Co-heirs of Urwich, Bradshaw, and Verdon, being 10 in Number, about the Reign of King Henry 8, were marry'd to Stanley of Hoton, Ashton of Ashton, Under-line, Tresham, Myrfield, Norris, Standish, Hilton, afterwards to Pilkington, Ashton of Chatterton, Leicester of Toft, and Lumley of Clipsam, dividing a fair Inheritance between them. And, 2d, Sir Nicholas Harrington of Heyton, whose Posterity resided there in the Beginning of the last Century, enrich'd by two Inter-marriages with the Daughters and Heirs of Lathom and Twyford.

John, the eldest Son of the said Robert and Agnes, in the 34th of E. I, attending the King in his Expedition into Scotland, received the Honour

of Knighthood with Prince Edward, by bathing and other Ceremonies; and 4 E. 2, had Summons to fit himself with Horse and Arms, to appear at Carlisle, and march against the Scots. 12 E. 2, he obtain'd a Charter of Free-Warren in all his Demesn Lands within his Lordship of Austwyke, in Com. Ebor. and Thirnam, in Com. Lanc. and 14 E. 3, had the like Charter for Free Warren at Wyther flack, in Com. Westmorl. with License to impark 600 Acres of Wood in Moor and Marift, within the Precincts of his Lordship of Aldingham. 20 E. 3, being of the Retinue of William d' Eincourt, he assisted him in the Desence of the Marches towards Scotland, and was fummon'd to Parliament amongst the Barons of the Realm, from 18 E. 2, 'till 21 E. 3, (a) in which Year he dy'd, having had Issue by his Wife Margaret, Daughter of Sir Richard Barlingham, Kt. a Son.

Robert Harrington, who dy'd in the Life-Time of his Father, leaving Issue by his Wife Elizabeth, Daughter and Co-heir to John de Multon, Baron of Egremond, 1. John 2. Robert. And, 2.

Simon.

John, the eldest, was Baron Harington, upon his Grand-sather's Death, being summon'd to Parliament Anno 22 E. 3, and dy'd the 37th of that King's Reign, seiz'd of a third Part of the Manour of Multon, in Com. Linc. also of the Manours of Aldingham, Thirnum, and a Moiety of the Manour of Ulveston, in Com. Linc. Likewise of the Manour of Austwyke, in Com. Ebor. and of those of Millum, Mosearghe, Haverington, with its Members, and a third Part of the Manour of Egremond, in Com. Cum. from whom descended the Barons Harrington, terminating in an Heir Female

Of Simon, the 3d Son, who marry'd Alice, Daughter and Heir of John Bilhton of Bilhton, in Com. Salop, proceeded Simon Harrington, Treasurer of the Middle-Temple, temp. H. 6; and Edmond Harrington of Bilhton, Progenitor to the Harrington's of that Place, living A. D. 1631, and bearing for a Distinction, an Addition to their Arms of a chief Argent, charg'd with 3 Trefoils proper, quartering, Warren and Cuts, Heirs of which Families this Branch had match'd withal.

Robert Harrington, the 2d Brother to John and Simon, was a Knight, and dy'd 22 R. 2, leaving Issue Sir John Harrington, Kt. who by Marriage with Agnes, Daughter and Heir of Lawrence Fleet of Fleet in Holland, in Com. Linc. was possess'd of that Inheritance, which he left to his Son John de Harrington, (c) who had in Marriage a Daughter of Sir John de la Launde, who had Issue

John, his Son and Heir, who chose for his Refidence Exton, in Com. Rutl. which he acquir'd by his Wife Catharine, Daughter and Heir to Sir Tho-

mas Colepeper, which descended to

Robert de Harrington, their Son and Heir, who was Anno 7 and 13 H. 7, High-Sheriff for the County of Rutland, and dy'd feis'd of Exton, with the Appurtenances in Gretham, Cotsmore, Whitwell, and Barnardshill, 12 Feb. 16 H.7; (d) after whose Death all the said Lands descended to John Harrington,

This John was also High Sheriff of Rutland, 8 and 13 H. 8, and having by his Will, dated 13 April, 15 H. 8, devised all his Lands and Tenements in Cotesmore and Gretham, to Robert his younger Son, departed this Life on the 5th of Novem. in the 15th Year of King H. 8, and was bury diat Exton, in the Body of the Church, towards the South Side, under an ancient aral Monument erected for him and his Wife, with the cumbent Statues of a Man in Armour, with a Lyon at his Feet, and his Wife by his Side, both with elevated Hands conjoined for Prayer, Round the upper Rim of the Stratum is,

Drate pro animatus Johannis Harington Alicia utoris eius, qui quidem Johannes obit v. die mentis Robeind, Anno Dom. MCCCCCXXIIII, & praedita Alicia phitipie Weitis MCCCCC, quorum &c.

This folm, by Alice his faid Wife, Daughter of Henry Southell, in Com Line had Issue two Sons, Sir folm and Robert; from the latter the Harringtons of South Witham are descended. Another Son I take to be Sir fames Harrington, who temp. H. 8. purchas'd the Manour of Kelston, with the Appurtenances, and all that Grange call'd Ketelthorn Grange, in Com. Rutl. and from him is branch'd out the Harringtons of Kelston; and by a younger Son of them, the Harringtons of Compton, in Com. Somers.

But I return to Sir John Harrington, the eldest, who was posses'd of Exton, to which he added Lands at Burley on the Hill, purchasing a third Part of that Manour 3 E. 6; and having executed the Office of High-Sheriss for Rutland, 12 H. 8, his Father then living, and asterward, viz. 25 and 32 H. 8, between which Years he receiv'd the

the Honour of Knighthood. He also underwent the same Shrievalty in the 6th of E. 6, wherein he departed this Life; for 1 Q. Mary, it was then found by Office, that he held the Manour of Exton of the Queen, as of her Honour of Huntingdon by Knight's Service, and the Rectory of Exton, of the Queen in capite, by Knight's Service.

This Sir John betroth'd Elizabeth, Daughter and Heir of Robert Moton of Peckleton, in Com. Leic. had Issue by her four Sons, James, Edmund,

Robert, and John, whereof

Fames succeeded his Father at Exton, and was High Sheriff for the County the latter Part of 6 E. 6, and again 3, 8, 20, and 28 Eliz. He dy'd A. D. 1591, and was bury d at Exton. having a curious Monument erected for him and his Lady, in the North Wall of the Chancel, standing upon 3 Steps; upon which is a Basis fustaining two vaulted Niches, wherein the Effigies of a Knight and his Lady kneeling, opposite to each other, at Prayer against an Altar. whereon lye Books; over each of their Heads is their gentilitial Arms, and upon the Summit of the Whole the grand Escotcheon of Harrington, quartering 23 Bars, Cancefeld, Flaming, Culpeper, Hardreshall, Mussenden, Green, Irby, viz. a Fret without the Fess, and a Mullet on a Cauton, Bruce of Annandale, Scot Earl of Huntington, Waltheof Earl of Northumberland, the 3 Garbs of Chester, and Hugh Lupus, Moton, &c. from all which Families he was deriv'd. The Inscription under the said Monument exhibits his Lady and Children.

and Heir, who is said to have marry'd the Duke of Feria, and by him to have had one Daughter, who marry'd a King of Portugal, (a) and, in general, that from the abovemention'd Sir James Harrington and his Lady, have been and are descended, or nearly ally'd to their Descendants by Collaterals, no less than eight Dukes, three Marquesses, seventy Earls, nine Counts, 27 Viscounts, and 36 Barons, of which Number 16 were Knights of the Garter (b).

Sir John Harrington, the eldest Son, stil'd sometime of Burley, was High Sheriff of Rutland 36, 40, and 44 Eliz. and 1 Jac. advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baron, by the Title of (c) Lord Harrington of Exton: The same Year he had the Tuition of the Lady Elizabeth, Daughter to King James, 'till her Marriage with Frederick Count Palatine of the Whereupon, 11 Jac. he attended her into that Country; but, in his Return thence, dy'd at Worms in Germany, 24 Aug. 1613, leaving Issue by Anne his Wife, Daughter of Robert Kelway, Esq. (d) John Lord Harrington, his only surviving Son; who dying without Issue at Kewe in Surry, the 27th following, the Title became extinct; and his two Sisters were Heirs to his Estate; Lucy, then the Wife of Edward Russel Earl of Bedford, who had two third Parts; and Frances, who became the Wife of Sir Robert Chichefter of Ralegh in Com. Dev. Knight of the Bath, had the other third Part: whose Daughter and Heir, Anne, was marry'd to Thomas Bruce Earl of Ailesbury.

Sir Henry, the second Son of Sir James Harrington, marry'd Cicely, Daughter and Heir of Francis Agar, Esq, of the King's Privy Council in Ireland, and of Elmestborp in Com. Leicest. having Issue two

Sons by her; Sir John, who leaving only a Daughter, Sarah, marry'd to John Fretchevile, afterwards Baron Fretchevila.

Jacob, the second Son, succeeded at Elmsthorp.

But Sir Henry had also a 2d Wife, Ruth, Daughter to James Pilkington Bishop of Durham; by whom was a Son, Sir William, whose Heir-General is

Dingly of the Isle of Wight.

Sir James, the third Son of Sir James by the Lady Lucy, was of Ridlington in Com. Rutland, for, which County he was High Sheriff 37 Eliz. (the next Year after his Father's Death) being then a Knight; and by his Majesty King James, was afterwards advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet, 29. June, A. D. 1611; having espous'd Francis Daughter and Co-heir of John Sapcoat of Elton in Com. Bedford, he had Issue three Sons, 1. Sir Edward, 2. Sir Sapcoat Harrington, Kt. who marry'd, 1. Jane, Daughter of Sir William Sampell of Upton in Com. Northampton, Kt. by whom he had the famous James Harrington, Groom of the Bed-Chamber to King Charles I, and Author of the Occana; he dy'd without Issue, and was bury'd at St. Marganet's Westminster, A. D. 1677. Sir Sapcoat marry'd, secondly, Jane, Daughter of Sir John Woodward, by whom he had feveral Children.

John Harrington, third Son of Sir James, marry'd Frances, Daughter of ——— Norwood, by whom

he had Issue.

Sir Edward Harrington, eldest Son of Sir James, succeeded to the Title of Baronet, he had before receiv'd the Honour of Knighthcod; for 14 J. 1. A. D. 1616. he is so stil'd in a Deed with Sir Edward Noel. He was High Sheriss of the County of Rutland, 19 Jac. 1. and in the same Post 12 Car. 1. He marry'd Margaret, Daughter and Heir of John Doyly, Esq. of Merton in Com. Oxon, by whom he had that Seat and Estate, now in the Family. He

had by her a Daughter, Bridget, Wife of Sir John

Gors, of New Place in Com. Hertf.

Sir James Harrington of Ridlington and Merton, Bart. Son and Heir of Sir Edward, (whom he succeeded in Dignity and Estate.) Abetting the fatal and unjust Sentence: pass'd by rebellious Subjects upon King Charles I, was, after the Restoration of the Royal Family, degraded of his Dignity and Estate by Act of Parliament. He marry'd Catherine, Daughter and Co-heir of Edmund Wright, afterwards Knight, and Lord-Mayor of the City of London, by whom he had a numerous Issue: But by Reason of the aforesaid Degradation, the Title expir'd; tho' his Descendants are yet possess'd of Merton in Com Oxon.

Henry Savile, the other Son of the said Thomas, having marry'd Eleanor, Daughter and Heir of Thomas Copley of Copley, posses'd that Lordship, and a fair Inheritance in her Right, a Fine being levy'd thereof 4 H. 4. (b) He had Issue 3 Sons, John, Thomas, and Nicholas; from John the Line of Copley descends, as I shall further shew in the Baronets created by King Cha. 2.

Thomas, 2d Son, marry'd Anne, Daughter of John Stansfeild of Stansfeild, and had Issue 4 Sons, 1. John Savile of Hullingridge near Eland, who marry'd Alice, Daughter of Ralph Lister of Hallifax, whence are descended that Line. 2. Thomas, who marry'd Elizabeth Lady Waterton of Walton, but had no Children. 3. Henry. And 4. Nicholas, of New-

ball, near Eland; which

Nicholas by his Wife Margaret, Daughter of William Wilkinson, had Issue 4 Daughters and 2 Sons, John and Thomas, Ancestor to the Saviles of Well-

borne.

John Savile of Newhall, Esq, eldest Son and Heir of Nicholas, marry'd Margery, Daughter of John Gleadbill, and had Issue, I. Nicholas, who marry'd Jennet, Daughter of Thomas Foxcroft, and had Posterity. 2. John, who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of Thomas Frigot of South Kirby, Esq, 3. Henry, of whom hereaster. 4. Thomas, who marry'd Jennet, Daughter of Nicholas Boothroyd; from him descend the Saviles of Watergate near Hallifax; and a Daughters, Agnes, Wife of Thomas Harrison of Woodbouse; Alice, of Robert Holt of Stubley, in Com. Lanc. Esq, Jane, of Thomas Gleidbill of Barke-sland;

fland, and Elizabeth, of John Blythe of Quarn-

Henry, the 3d Son, seated himself at Bradley near Hallifax, in Com. Ebor. and having in Marriage Ellen, Daughter of Robert Ramsden, had Issue 3 Sons, Sir John, Sir Henry, and Thomas, a Student in the University of Oxford, where he was elected Proctor, A. D. 1592, but dy'd unmarry'd.

Sir Henry aforesaid, born at Bradley, on the last of Nov. A. D. 1549, was enter'd in Oxford Anno 1561, (a) and admitted Batchelor of Arts in Lent 1565; and growing famous for his Learning in the Greek Tongue and Mathematicks, (in which last he voluntarily read a Lecture for some Time to the Academians) he was, about the Year 1570, elected Proctor of the University for 2 Years together. In 1578 he trayell'd into France, and other Countries; and improving in Learning, Languages, and the Knowledge of the World and Men, became an accomplish'd Person; and on his Return was instituted Tutor to Queen Elizabeth for the Greek Tongue, who taking a Liking to his Parts and Personage, got him elected Warden of Merton College, and in the Year 1596. Provost of Eaton, which College he made his chief Endeavour to improve with Riches and Literature. He was afterwards imploy'd by Queen Elizabeth. as her Resident in the Low-Countries. When King James 1 came to the Crown, he had a great Respect for Mr. Savile and his Learning, and would have advanc'd him to a higher Place, either in Church or State; but he refus'd it, and only accepted of the Honour of Knighthood, at Windsor, 21 Sept. 1604; and soon after Henry, his eldest Son, dying, and no hopes of fettling a Family, he bestow'd much of his Wealth

Wealth in publishing Books. He collected the best Copies of St. Chrysoftom, and imploy'd learned Men to transcribe and make Annotations on them, which he fairly fet forth at his own Cost (computed at 8000 l.) in a most beautiful Edition; but the Papists at Paris had their Emisfaries in England, who surreptitiously procur'd this Knight's learned Labours, and fent them over weekly by the Post into France, schedatim, Sheet by Sheet, as here they pass'd the Press; and Fronto Duceus, a French Cardinal, printed them as receiv'd out of England, only joyning thereunto a Latin Translation, and some other inconsiderable Additions, infomuch that there were two Editions of St. Chrysoftom at the same Time. He was an excellent Mathematician, witness his learned Lectures on Euclid; for which Science he founded two Lectures in Oxford, allowing a liberal Salary to the Protessors. He was admir'd by all the learned Men Abroad, of different Perswasions, and the Encomiums given him by divers Authors, would make a Manual, as Mr. Wood observes. He dy'd in Eaton College, 19 Feb. 1621, and was bury'd in the Chapel there, under a black Marble, and the University of Oxon erected in Merton College a sumptuous honorary Monument to his Memory. Elizabeth, his Daughter and sole Heir, became the Wife of Sir John Sidley of Ailesford in Co. Cantii, Bart.

Sir John Savil, the elder Brother, was bred to the Profession of the Law, and so profited therein, that he was call'd to the Dignity of the Coif, being made a Serjeant at Law, 29 Nov. 26 Eliz. and afterwards one of the Barons of the Exchequer, by Patent, 1 July, 40 Eliz. and King James continued the same Favour, by Patent, 4 April, in the first Year of his Reign. He imitated that excellent Person his Brother, Sir Henry Savile, in publick

Charities, there being scarce a Manour of his in Torkshire, that is not beholding to his Munificence. There is extant of his, Cases in his own Court, and those of the Common Pleas, in the Reign of Q. Elizabeth. He marry'd four Wives: 1. Jane, Daughter of Richard Garth, of Morden in Co. Surrey, by whom he had Sir Henry Savile, who was created Baronet; and two Daughters, Elizabeth, Wife of Sir Fobn Jackson of Hickleton, Kt. and Jane, of Sir Henry Goodrich of Ribston, Kt. 2dly, Elizabeth, eldest Daughter of Thomas Wentworth of North-Elmsall, Widow and Relict of Richard Tempest of Bowling, Esq: by whom he had a Son named John, of whom hereafter. 3. Dorothy, Daughter of the Lord Wentworth of the South, Widow and Relict of Sir William Widmerpool, Kt. and Sir Martin Forbisher of Altofts, Kt. And, 4th, Margery, Daughter of Ambrole Peate Citizen of London, and Widow of Sir Ferom Weston; but by these last Wives he had no Islue.

Henry, the eldest Son of Sir John, was of Methlev in Co. Ebor. and receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood at the Coronation of K. James, and was created a Baronet A. 1611. He was several Times Vice-President of the Council establish'd in the North Parts of the Kingdom of England, Deputy-Lieutenant and Colonel of a Militia-Regiment of Foot in the Wapentake of Agbig and Morley in the County of Tork: and ferv'd in Parliament as one of the Knts. of the Shire. He marry'd Mary, Daughter and Co-heir of Fobn Dent Citizen of London, who surviv'd him. and was marry'd a second Time to Sir William · Sheffield, Kt. He had Issue several Sons and Daughters that dy'd young, and a Son John who just arrived at Years of Age, dy'd in France in the Life-Time of his Father, who dy'd 23 June 1632, in the 53d Year of his Age; so that the Dignity became extinct, and the Estate descended, to Folin Savile, Esq, his half Brother, who also inherited

herited the same by Conveyance from Sir Henry. This Fobn was an ingenious Gentleman, travell'd into France and Italy, where he was received with great Civility by feveral Princes. He was High-Sheriff of Torkshire, 24 Car. 1, and dy'd about the Year 1651; he marry'd first Mary, Daughter of John Robinson of Ryther, near Selby in Com. Ebor. by whom he had Issue 2 Sons and 4 Daughters that dy'd in their Infancy: He had to Wife, 2dly, Margaret, Daughter of Sir Henry Garraway, Kt. Lord Mayor of London, who bore him 2 Sons, Hemy, born 30 Dec. 1641, and dy'd 20 Dec. the Year following; and John, born Anno 1644: Also 6 Daughters, Margaret, Wife of Sir William Ingleby of Ripley, Bart. Elizabeth, of Leonard Wastell, Esq. Catherine, of Sir William Cholmley of Whitby, Bart. and afterwards of Sir Nicholas Stroud, Kt. Anne, Mary, and Dorothy, who was Wife of John Clavering of Newcastle upon Tyne, Esq. Son and Heir of Sir James Clavering of Axwell, Com. Pal. Dunelm.

John Savile of Methley, Esq. now living, his only surviving Son and Heir, is possessed of a great Estate, and by Sarah, Daughter of Peter Tryon of Harringworth and Bulwich, in Com. Northamp. Esq. hath Sons and Daughters, whereof John Savile, his eldest Son and Heir, marry'd one of the two Daughters and Co-heirs of Sir John Banks of Alessord in Kent, Bart. who dy'd about 2 Years ago, leaving 2 Sons, the eldest John Savile, was unfortunately drown'd in May 1712.

## HENRY WILLOUHBY of RISLEY, Esq; Derb. No 46.

THIS Family, anciently sir-nam'd Bugg, have been seated in Nottinghamshire for many Generations, and took the Name of Willoughby from their Possessin in that County. Ralph Bugg had 2 Sons, Richard and Ralph, to whom King H. 3, in the 50th Year of his Reign, granted the Manour of Bingham; whose Son Richard sirnam'd himfelf from his Manour, was knighted, and left Issue, from whom the Binghams descended (a)

Richard before-mention'd, the other Son of Ralph Bugg, was possessed of the Lordship of Wilugby, which gave Denomination to his Posterity. Sir Richard Wilugby, his Son, (b) purchas'd the Manour of Wollaton of Sir Roger de Mortein, 11 E. 2, and increas'd his Patrimony very considerably. He purchas'd a 3d Part of the Manour of Rifely, in Com. Derb. and several other Lands, and dying

18 E. 2, left Issue

Sir Richard Willoughby, one of the Judges in the Reign of King E. 3, who by his 1st Wise Isabel, Daughter to Sir Roger de Mortein, had several Sons that dy'd without Issue; so that Risely, by Entail, came to Hugh Willoughby, Clerk, who dy'd 7 H. 4, and is Ancestor to the Willoughbys of Riseley, as Dr. Thoroton writes in his Nottinghamshire; but I rather think them descended from Sir Henry Willoughby, Kt. Banneret, who was posses'd of Wollaton by lineal Descent from the said Sir Richard, was Knight for the Body to King H. 8, and dy'd 20 May, 1528, as I am inform'd from R

the Inscription on his Monument at Wollaton, in an Arch between the South Isle and the Chancel, whereon is the Essigles of a Knight in Armour, with 2 Wives by his Side, and underneath 2 Sons in Armour, and 2 Daughters in the Dress of the Times.

Which Sir Henry had 2 Sons, Sir Henry Willoughby of Wollaton, Kt. (whose Grand-son, Sir Frances, left 6 Daughters his Co-heirs, the eldest of which brought that Inheritance by Marriage to the Great-Grandfather of the present Lord Middleton,) and William Willoughby, who dy'd in his Father's Life-Time, (c) having marry'd Helena, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir John Egerton of Wrine-hill, in Com. Cest. Kt. (who dy'd 9 H. 8) by whom he had Issue

Sir Hugh Willoughby of Rifley, in Com. Derb. Kt. whom I take to be the famous Navigator (for he was of this Family) who was fent out with a Ships in the Reign of King E. 6, A. D. 1553, (d) to discover Cathay, and other Northern Parts: He fail'd in May, and having spent much Time about the Northern Islands, subject to Denmark, where he found no Commodity but dry'd Fish and Train-Oyl, was forc'd, about the Middle of September, to put into a Harbour of Lapland, call'd Aizina, where they could find no Inhabitants, and thinking to winter there, was froze to Death: However, Richard Chancellor, who commanded the 2d Ship in this Expedition, having lost Sir Hugh, made his Way for Wardbonse in Norway, the appointed Place, if parted by Storms, and after 7 Days Stay, proceeded on his Voyage fo fortunately, that within few Days he arriv'd on the Coasts of Muscovy, where he was friendly received by the Natives, and John Bazilowitz, the Great Duke.

Duke, or Czar, with whom he fettled a Trade, and was the first Discoverer of Russia. The said Sir Hugh Willoughby left Issue by Johanna his Wife, Daughter of Sir Nicholas Strelley, Kt. by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter of Sir John Spencer, Henry (e) his Son and Heir.

Which Henry Willoughby of Rifley, Esq; was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet by his Majesty King James A. D. 1611; and dying, without Issue-Male, the Title became extinct.

Anne, his fole Daughter and Heir marry'd Sir Thomas Aston of Aston, (f) in the County Palatine of Chester, Bart. by whom he had Sir Willoughby Aston, Bart. and other Children.

Sir Thomas Tresham, Son and Heir of Sir William, settled himself at Rushton, in Com. Northamp. and was Comptroller of the Houshold to King H. 6; he marry'd Margaret, Daughter to the Lord Zouch, and was succeeded by his Son and Heir John Tresham of Livedon and Rushton, who had to Wise Elizabeth, sole Daughter and Heir to James Harrington of Hornby and Wolfage, Esq, of whom

proceeded

Thomas, their Son and Heir, who was High-Sheriff of Northamptonshire, 16 H. 8, and being afterwards knighted, serv'd the same Office in the 31st Year of that King's Reign, having marry'd Anne, Daughter and Co-heir of William Parr, afterwards Lord Parr of Horton; he had Issue John, that dy'd in his Father's Life-Time, leaving Issue by Eleanor his Wife, Daughter to Anthony Catesby of Wishton, 2 Daughters, viz, Muriel, Wife to the Lord Vaux, another marry'd to George Walton; also 2 Sons, Sir Thomas and William. Which Sir Thomas was a Person of great Command in his County, and was zealous (against the

the Court-Faction) in proclaiming and promoting Queen Mary's Pretentions to the Crown; the therefore contituted him High-Sheriff in the 2d and 3d of her Reign, and likewise the first and last Prior of the re-erected Order of St. John of Jerusalem. Dying without Issue, his large Lands descended to his Kinsman and Heir, Thomas Tresham, Son to his Brother William.

Which Thomas was knighted 18 July, A. D. 1575, at Killingworth, in Com. Warw. by Queen Elizabeth. (a) Fuller, in his Worthies, gives this Character of him, "Hard to fay, whether greater "his Delight or Skill in Buildings, tho' more for-ward in beginning, than fortunate in finishing his Fabricks, amongst which the Market-house at Rothwell, adorn'd with the Arms of the Gentry of the County of Northampton, was highly commendable, who was zealeus in the Romish Perswasion, which afterwards cost him a long "Confinement in Wishich Castle.

He marry'd Muriel, Daughter to Sir Robert Throckmorton of Coughton, in Com. Warw. Kt. having by her many Daughters, and being a great Housekeeper, match'd most of them into worshipful and wealthy Families, viz. Frances, to Edward Lord Stourton: Elizabeth, to William Lord Monteagle: Catherine, to John Webb of Oldflock, in Com. Wilts. Hig. Mary, to Thomas Lord Brudenel of Dene: Anne, to William Fletcher of Suffex; and Bridget, to Edward Parham of Somes soffise, Figs, He had also 3 Sons, 1. Sir Francis, who marry'd Anne. Daughter of John Tufton, by whom he had no Issue-Male, and falling into the Gunpowder Conspiracy, was attainted of High Treason. 2. Lewis. 2. William, who marry'd the Daughter to-Reed of Cotesbrook, in Com. Northamp.

white Alablaster; (d) upon the Flat whereof. about a Yard high, lieth in full Proportion, the Effigies of a Knight, in compleat Armour, with his Wife on his left Side, their Hands elevated, his Head girt with an Oaken Wreath, and under his Feet an Ape Guardant. Under her Head a Pillow, and at her Feet a Lion. On the Sides. in a Border, between two Verges, above the Podestals that sustain a Canopy, is the 128th Pfalm in Metre; and below, in another Border, are the Statues of 21 Children, Sons and Daughters, four of them Infants in Swathing-Clothes: and under them in another Border, the several Escutcheons of their Arms differenc'd. On the Wall Side adjoining, is rais'd another Quadrate, supported by two Columns, the Sides hollow'd and adorn'd with carv'd Work, the Edges garnish'd with Gold. On the Top, in the Middle, is a Death's Head; and at one End, Fame with her Trumpet; under which is written, Fame foundeth on Hye. At the other End, Time wing'd, with a Forelock, holding in one Hand a Sickle, in the other an Hour-Glass; under which is write ten. Time Truth doth Trye. In a Quadrate are Eschutcheons of the Arms and Quarterings of him and his Lady empal'd, supported by two Savages, with Clubbs in their Hands, mantl'd Gules doubled Or; the Crest, a Lapwing's Head eras'd; and the Motto, Temps Esprova Verite. Within & Square, is a Table with this Inscription:

From this Sir Robert, notwithstanding he had so many Children, none are existing of the Male Line as I can hear of; so that the principal Branch remaining, is from Philip Tirwitt, third Son of Sir Robert, by his Wife the Daughter of Sir Gilbert Taylboys, who was likewise Father to Sir William Tyrwhit, before-mention'd, and to Robert, who was knighted, and left only a Daughter and Heir.

Which Philip Tirwitt was seated at Barton upon Humber, in the County of Lincoln; and by Margaret his Wise, Daughter and Co-heir of Edward Barnaby, had Issue Edward, his Son and Heir, who settled himself at Stainseild, in Com. Linc. and by Anne his Wise, Daughter of William Dallyson of Laughton, and Sister to Sir William Dallyson, one of the Justices of the King's-Bench, had Issue two

Sons, Philip and Roger.

Philip, the eldest Son, succeeded to the Estate at Stainseild; and with his eldest Son Edward, waiting on his Majesty King James the 1st at Belvoir Castle, when he lay there in his Ways from Scotland, to take Possession of the Crown of England, had the Honour of Knighthood conferr'd both on himself and his said Son, by that King, who likewise conferr'd on the said Sir Philip the Dignity of Baronet, A. D. 1611. He marry'd Martha, Daughter of Sir Anthony Thorold of Marston, in Com. Linc. Knight, and dving the 5th of February 1624, was succeeded in Title and Estate by the said Sir Edward, his Son and Heir.

Which Sir Edward Tyrmbitt of Stanfeild, Kt. and Bart. marry'd 2 Wives, Faith, Daughter of Tho-

mas, and Sister and sole Heir to Sir George St. Paule of Snarford, Bart. by whom he had Issue 2 Sons, Philip and Edward, and 3 Daughters; 1st Martha, who marry'd Sir William Helwish, Kt. 2d Mary, Wite of Charles Pelham of Manton, in Com. The 3 eldest of the Sons mention'd in the said Inscription, George, Robert, and William, (who was knighted) left no Issue Male, except George, whose Son Robert dying an Infant, the Estate descended to Edward Carr, 4th Son.

Which Edward was knighted at Castle by King James the Ist, when he lay there in his Way from Scotland, to take Posseision of the Crown of England, and was afterwards advanc'd by him to the Dignity of a Baronet 29 June, A.D. 1611. His Death, Marriages, and Issue, appears from the following Inscription on a Monument in the Church of Sleford.

" Here lyeth the Body of Sir Edward Carre, " Knt. and Bart. who marry'd two Wives, " the first was Katherine, Daughter of Charles " Bolle, Esq; by whom he had no Issue; his " second Wife, was Anne, the Daughter of " Sir Richard Dyer of Stoughton, in the Coun-

"ty of Huntingdon, Knt. by whom he had " Iffue two Sons and one Daughter, viz. Sir " Robert Carre, Bart. Rochester, and Lucy. He

" departed this Life the 1st Day of Odob.

" Anno Domini 1618.

His Lady surviv'd, and dy'd Anno 1639.

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Sir Robert Carre, of Sleford, Bart. marry'd Mary, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Richard Gargrave of Nosthall, in Com. Ebor, Kt. He dy'd in the Year 1667: His Lady surviving him 'till the Year 1675. They had Issue one Son, Robert, and three Daughters; Lucy, who dy'd Anno 1667, and was marry'd to Francis Lord Holles; Mary, who dy'd Ann. 1685, and was the Wife of Sir Adrian Scroop, Kt. Father of Sir Carr Scroop, Bart. and wedded to Sir Thomas Trollop, Bart.

Robert, only Son and Heir of Sir Robert Carr, was knighted; and succeeding in the Baronetship and the Estate, was constituted Chancellor of the Dutchy of Lancaster, by King Charles the IId, and Sworn of his Privy-Council: He dy'd in Novemb. 1682, leaving Issue by his Lady Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir John Bennet, Kt. and Sister to Henry Earl of Arlington, principal Secretary of State to King Charles the IId; one Son, Edward, who fucceeded him in the Estate and Title; and dying the Year after, in the 21st Year of his Age, the Title became extinct, and the Estate devolv'd on his Sister and sole Heir Isabella, who afterwards marry'd the Right Honourable John Harvey. the present Earl of Bristol, who had Issue by her the Right Honourable Carr Lord Harvey, and 2 Daughters, Isabella, and Elizabeth, of whom she dy'd in Child-bed the 7th of March, 1692.

# Sir Edward Hussey of Ho-NINGTON, Kt. Linc. Nº 53.

(29 June, A. D. 1611. R. Jac. 9.)

THIS Name in Registers, Records, Histories, and other Memorials, is variously written, as Hussey, Husse, and anciently Huse, Husse, Husse, Husse, Hose, Hose, Hose, Hose, and Hosatus; yet the Persons and Family must be understood the same, as will appear also by some Inscriptions produced in this Account; and, as Mr. Camden has ob-

ferv'd. (\*)

A Family under one of these Names, descended from Geofry de Hoese, (one of King Hen. Ild's Justices-Itinerant for the Counties of Cambridge, Huntingdon, &c.) divers of whose Posterity had Summons to Parliament, as Barons of this Realm. in the Reigns of the 3 Edwards, (a) chiefly residing at Harting in Com. Suff. and bore the Barry Coat of Arms. Likewise Temp. E. 1, was Sir John Huse, who bore for Arms the green Cross, with a Label of 3 Points Gules; and had Issue a Son Roger, who was Baron of Beechworth; and left a Son, John Huses 40 Years old at the Death of his Father, An. 35 There were also of this Name, afterwards, **E**. 3. Hussee Barons of Galtrim in Ireland (b). And the Hullees of good Possessions and knightly Dignity in Com. Not. (c) But whether this, under our Consideration, owes its Original to those of Beeche worth, or the other Barons, can't so well be made out, tho' by their Arms they appear to be descended from those of Beechworth.

Our Historians in later Times mention several other of the Name, and doubtless of the same Blood; Temp. E. 4. we find Sir Thomas Huffey rank'd among the Lords, (d) taken Priloners in the Battel at Levells Plain, near the River Dowele in Hexhamshire, where H. 6th's Forces were surprized and routed by the Lord Montacute, A. D. 1463: (e) But whether he be the same Thomas, who was Brother to Sir William Huffey, Lord Chief Justice, I can't determine. An. 12 E. 4, Gilbert Huffey was one of the Burgesses for Grantham, in the Parliament then held at Westminster (f). And Sir Edward Huffey attended King H. 8. at the Siege of Terouenne, in 1512 (g).

The first Person I can with any Assurance fix on, as Ancestor to this Branch, is Sir William Hussey, who had Issue John Hussey, of Old Sleeford, in Com: Linc. Father of Sir William Hussey, Kt. and Thomas Hussey, (a) who was Father of Gilbert and

Peter Hussey.

Sir William, An. 7 E. 4, was one of the Commissioners of Sewers, for the Parts of Kesteven in Communication. (b) and in the same Year, was one of the Burgesses for Grantham, in Parliament held at Westerminster, (c). After which, on June 16, 11 E. 4. was constituted Attorney-General, with Power to depute Clerks and Officers under him in each Court of Record (d). On Ostob. 14, 17 E. 4. he was call'd by Writ, to take the Degree of Serjeant at Law June 9 following (e). And lastly, made Lord Chief Justice of the Court of King's-Bench, May 7, 21 E. 4. (f) wherein he was continu'd by Patent, 1 R. 2. He was living Temp. H. 7. as

John Huffey was in Arms 2 Hen. 7. for that King. at the Battel of Stoke, against John Earl of Lincoln, (r) and his Adherents. Anno 9 Hen. 7. he was High Sheriff of Lincolnshire, Anno 12 Hen. 8. being then a Knight, he ferv'd in Parliament for the County of Lincoln: Anno 13 H. S. A. D. 1922. he went over with Cardinal Wolfey into France, and the same Year he was made chief Butler of England: Anno 21 H. 8, he was one of the Knights for that King's Body, and that Year was fummon'd to Parliament as a Peer of the Realm. bearing the Title of Lord Huffey of Sleeford. 22 H. 8. he was one of the Lords who subscrib'd that Declaration then writ to the Pope, whereby they intimated to his Holiness, that unless he did S 2 comply

comply with King Henry in that Cause of his Divorce, his Supremacy would not much longer be own'd in this Realm. (s) But in the 28 H. 8. being in the Commotion in Lincolnshire, with the Prior of Barlings, and others, occasion'd by the Assessment of a Subsidy, he was attainted of High Treason: His Manor of Sleeford, with Lands to the Value of 5000 l. per Ann. adjacent, confiscated, and he beheaded at Lincoln in Juns, A. D. 1537. This Attainder was revers'd in Parliament 5 Eliz. but neither the Estate or Honour restor'd.

His first Wise was Anne, Daughter to George Earl of Kent, by whom he had Issue 2 Sons, who dy'd without Issue, and 5 Daughters; his 2d Wise was Margaret, Daughter and Heir to Sir Simon Blont, of Mangerfield, in Com. Gloucest. as appears by his Arms impaling hers, in the said Chapel of Gray's Inn, (t) by whom he had Issue Sir William Hussey, Sir Giles Hussey, and Sir Gilbert Hussey, all

Knights.

Sir William was apointed to go to the Wars of France, Anno 3 H. 8. A. D. 1512, and knighted by that King (u) the following Year, upon the taking of Tournay. Anno 1524, he was sent with the Order of the Garter to Ferdinand, Arch-Duke of Austria; and in the 22 H. 8. he was High Sheriff of Lincolnshire; and dying 3 and 4 Philip and Mary, left by his Wife, the Daughter, and at length sole Heir to Sir Thomas Lovell, Kt. only 2 Daughters, Nella marry'd to Richard Disney of Norton Disney, Esq. and Anne, to William Gell of Darley, in Com. Derb. Esq.

Sir Giles Hussey was of Caythorp, in Com. Linc. and knighted by the Earl of Surrey, who was Admiral upon the sacking of Morlaix, on the Coast of

France, 1522.

William Hussey, youngest Son of Sir William Hussey, Lord Chief Justice, and Brother to the Baron, marry'd Anne, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir John Salvaine, Kt. of whom descended the Husseys of Com. Ebor, which Line terminated in one Daughter and Heir, marry'd to Sir John Ryther of Ryther, and afterwards to Robert Constable of Flamborough, in the same County.

Sir Robert Hussey, second Brother of the Baron, had a Seat at Halton in Lindsey, near Spilesby; and at Linwood, in the Parish of Blankney, in Com. Linc. Anno 17 H. 7. he was a Commissioner of the Sewers (w) for the Parts of Kesteven. He was afterwards knighted, and executed the Office of High Sheriff for that County Anno 34.

By Anne, his first Wife, Daughter and Co-heir to Sir Thomas Say of Lyston-Hall, in Com. Essex, Kt. he had Issue Thomas, who dy'd Childless 2. Q. Eliz. and 5 Daughters, viz. Edward, the eldest Son and Heir, was knighted at White-hall the 26th of March A. D. 1608, and was created a Baronet A.D. 1611: He was High Sheriff of the County of Lincoln 16 Fac. 1, and 12 Car. 1, and serv'd as Knight of the Shire in the Parliament call'd to meet at Westminster the 12th of April 1640, which was dissolved the 7th of May following, commonly stil'd the short Parlia-After this, he was in Arms for King Charles Ist; and, upon that Account, was a very great Sufferer in the Civil Wars: Being plunder d at feveral Times to the Value of 10000 l. His Lands were likewise sequester'd, and a Fine of 2000 l. set upon him for his Composition, as appears by an Acquittance for one Moiety thereof the Original of which, is still in the Hands of the Family; and that which follows, is a true Copy. from it.

D Eceiv'd by us Richard Waring and Michael Herring, Treasurers (of the Moneys to be paid into Goldsmiths-Hall) of Sir Edward Hussey of Honington, in the County of Lincoln, Kt. and Bart. the Sum of four thousand five hundred Pounds, in Part of nine thousand Pounds, impos'd on him by the Lords and Commons, as a Fine for bis Delinquency to the Parliament. We say received this 13th Day of Dec. 1647, in Part,

Richard Waring, Michael Herring.

For

For raising this Sum, he sold 500 l. per Aun. in Lincolnsbire; and was so remarkable for his Loyalty and Zeal for Monarchy and Episcopacy, that in the Propositions from the Parliament at the Treaty at Uxbridge, 20 Car. 1. A.D. 1644, (amongst many others) was to be remov'd from his Majesty's Councils, and be restrain'd from coming within the Verge of the Court, (a) and from bearing any Office, or having any Employment in the State without the Consent and Advice of both Houses. He dy'd Anno 1648, having marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter to George Auton, Esq. and sole Heir apparent [Sisters Daughters] to Thomas Taylor of Doddington-Piggot, in Com. Linc. Esq; by whom he had Issue 5 Daughters: Jane, marry'd to Sir Thomas Williamson, Bart. Mary, to Sir Robert Bolles, Bart. Rebecca, to Sir Robert Markbam of Sedgbroke, in Com. Linc. Kt. Bridget, to Sir Thomas Clifton of Lytham, Bart. and Anne, to Charles Pelbam of Brocklesby, in Com. Linc. Esq. Also four Sons, 1st Thomas, 2d John, a Captain, who was flain at Gainsborough, in Behalf of the Royal Cause, unmarry'd; 3d Charles, who was created a Baronet, as will hereafter appear; and Edpard, who dy'd unmarry'd A. D. 1650.

Sir Thomas Huffey of Honington, Bart. and of Doddington-Piggot, in Right of his Grand-Mother, succeeded his Grand-sather in Dignity and Estate. Linc. ferv'd for the said County in the first Parliament call'd by King Charles the IId after his Restauration; and by that Prince, in Consideration of the eminent Loyalty and Sufferings of his Family, was created a Baronet July 21, This Dignity he enjoy'd but a short Time, dying A.D. 1664; having had Issue by his Wife Elizabeth, Daughter to Sir William Brownlew of Humby, Bart. 3 Sons and 3 Daughters; Mary marry'd to Thomas Powchin of Barkby, in Com. Leic. Esq. Fane, to Thomas Hatcher of Carby, in Com. Linc. Esq. and Anne remaining unmarry'd. His Sons, were Charles, Edward, and John.

Osberto dicto le Mordaunt, fratri meo, pro bomagio & servitio suo, terram meam de Radwell, cum omnibus pertinentiis & libertatis suis, sibi & Hareditrus ejus, tenendum de me & Haredibus meis libere & quietè, bonorificè & bareditariè, sicut illum Ego inter alia recepi ac tenui de Donatione & Munificentia Willielmi Illustrissimi Regis Anglia, pro servitiis qua Pater meus in Conquestu & Ego sibi fecimus, per Servitium dimidie Partis Feodi unius Militis pro omni Servitio seculari. Ego verò pradictus Enstacihus de Sau-cto Ægidio & Haredes mei pradictam terram pradi-Eto Osberto & Haredibus ejus contra omnes homines & fæminas parrantizabimus. His Testibus, Ranulpho filio Thoma Herveo, filio Richardi, Willielmo. Jobanne Calvo. Rogero le Puer, Jobanne Pippard, Richardo le Mole, & multis aliis.

He had Issue 2 Sons, Osmund and Baldwin, as I find by Charters of the said Osbert and his Son Osmund; the former giving Land in Radwell to his younger Son Baldwin, which his Brother confirm'd to him.

Eustach le Mordaunt, Son of the said Osmand, by Marriage with Alicia, eldest Daughter and Co-heir of William de Alno, became possess'd of the

the Lordship of Turvey, in Bedfordshire; a Moiety of which he had in the Life-time of her Father, as appears by his Charter without Date, wherein he gave to the said Eustach and his Heirs, a Moiety of all his Lands in the Vill of Turvey, by the Service of half a Knight's Fee. Robert to Mordaunt his Brother, being a Witness (among others) to the Charter.

Several Deeds of this Euflach are extant, by the Name of Euflachius Mordaunt de Wahull. He gave in free Alms to the Canons of St. John the Evangelist of Caudewell, for the Health of his own Soul, his Wives, and the Souls of his Ancestors and Successors, the Church of St. John Baptist of Batonenci, and 10 Acres of Land in Turvey; and a Fine was levy'd 9 R. 1, between the said Euflach and Gilbert, Son of William, concerning one Virgate of Land, with the Apurtenances in Radwell, which Osmond, Father of the said Euflach, held.

William Mordaunt, Son and Heir of the said Enstach, was Lord of Turvey, Radwell, Astbull, and other Lands, and was succeeded therein by William, his Son and Heir, who was likewise possess of Chicheley, and had License from King Edw. the 1st, in the 25th Year of his Reign, to enclose his Pasture of Wolescy, his Field call'd Turvey-Lees, his Pasture of Manselgrove, and other his Lands in Turvey, to form a Park. He had Issue by Rose his Wise, Daughter of Sir Ralph Wake,

Robert, his Son and Heir, mention'd in Charters 16 Ed. 2 and 7, and 29 Ed. 3, and in that Reign was Knight of the Shire for Com. Bedf. He had Issue Edmund le Mordaunt, who added to the Possessions of his Ancestors Clifton and Shephaell, and liv'd in the Reign of King Edw. 3, as appears by his Charters. He was succeeded by Robert, his Son and Heir, mention'd 49 Edw. 3, and 14 R. 2, who had Issue by Agnes, his Wife, Daughter and Heir of

of John Strange of Ampton Tudworth, in Com. Suff. by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter and Heir of William Butler of Walden, a Son of his own Name, Robert, at Man's Estate 13 H. 4, and was living 27 H. 6, having served in Parliament for Bedfordshire, 19 H. 5. He marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of John Holdenby of Holdenby, Esq, and was succeeded by William, his Son and Heir, who was living 11 Edw. 4, and having marry'd Margaret, Daughter to John Pecke of Topbill, in Com. Staff. had Issue 2 Sons, John and William; John, the eldest Son, was Chancellor of the Dutchy of Laucaster, from whom the present E. of Paterborough, is lineally descended.

William Mordaunt, 2d Son, covenanted 14 Feb. 10 H. 7. to marry Anne, 2d Daughter and Coheir of Thomas Huntington of Hempsted in Esex, 5 June, 10 H. 7, which was consummated, accordingly, his Brother John Mordaunt settling on her, as a Jointure, the Manor of Woodend, with the Appurtenances, and several Lands and Tenements in Rocksden, Bareford, Chalnestre, Colmouth, and Collesden, in Bedfordshire; and all his Lands and Tenements in Tychmerch, and Clopton in Northamptonshire; and the said Thomas Huntington, her Father, settled on them after, his Death, and on John Paris of Linton, in Cambridgeshire, Fsq. (who had marry'd his other Daughter) all his Manors and Lands in Cambridgeshire and Esex. From which Match proceeded

Robert Mordaumt, their Son and Heir, who was feated at Hempsted in Essex; and by Marriage with Barbara, Daughter and Heir of John L'Estrange of Massingham, in Norfolk, by Anne his Wife, Daughter and Co-heir of Thomas L'Estrange of Walton in Warwickshire, became possess of both those Estates. He had Issue several Sons: Henry Mordaunt, one of the youngest of them, had Lands at Grimston and King's-Lynn, in Com. Norf. and lyes interr'd

Interr'd in St. Margaret's Church in that Town. King's-Lynn with Anne his Wife, Daughter of-Poley, in Com. Bedf. by whom he had Issue

L'Estrange Mordaunt, born at Lynn about the Year 1572, who was bred to Arms in his Youth, and fignalized himself in the Low-Country Wars. between the Spaniards and the States of Holland in the Reign of Queen Eliz. and during his Stay there, marry'd Margaret, Daughter of -Charles, of the Dutchy of Brabant. He was afterwards call'd into the Service of the said Queen ag ainst the Rebels in Ireland, where he remain'd several Years, 'till he succeeded to the Estate of his Ancestors at Massingham, &c. by the Death of his Father and his Uncles; when he return'd into England, and was created a Baronet 29 June, A.D. 1611. He departed this Life in the Year 1627, and was bury'd at Massingbam, leaving 2 Sons, Robert and Henry; the latter was Father to L'Estrange Mordaunt, who marry'd Barbara. Daughter of Richard, and Sister of Sir Nevil Catlin, of Kirby-Cane, Kt. by whom he had Mire Henry Mordaunt, now of Congbam in Norfolk; and Barbara, marry'd to Capt. Brown of Scarning in the same County.

Robert was knighted in the Life-time of his Father, and succeeded him in the Title and Estate. He resided for the most Part at Hempsted in Esex; at which Seat he dy'd, Anno 1638, and had Interment there, leaving by Amy his Wife, Daughter of Sir Austin Southerton, in Com. Norf. Kt. 3 Sons, Charles, William, and Robert, who liv'd to Mens Estate, and all of them left Issue now living.

Charles, the eldest, succeeded in the Baronet-Thip and the Estate, resided at Massingham, and. during the Civil-Wars, teftify'd his Loyalty to King Charles the 1st, had his Estate sequester'd,

and was one of those shut up in Lynn, when it was besieg'd by the Rebels. He dy'd at London July 10, A. D. 1647, and was bury'd at Massingham, as we are inform'd from the following Inscriptions:

### On a Grave-Stone is this:

Hic Sublicantur Reliquia Domini Caroli Mordaunt de Massingham, Militis & Baronetti, Filii & havedis Roberti Mordaunt, Militis item & Baronetti; qui silius suit, itidem, haresq, Domini L'Estrange Mordaunt. De quo Domino Carolo plura ad murum prientalem legantur. 1648.

And on a Marble Monument, in Golden Letters,

Six Charles Mordaunt, Kt. and Barones, dy'd at London, July the 10th, 1648, aged 23. He was marry'd to Catharine, the Daughter of Sir Lionel Talemache of Helmingham, in Suffolk, Knight and Baronet, by whom he had Sir Charles, his eldest Som, Catherine, Talemache, (dying before his Father) John, Henry, (departed also) Elizabeth, Amy,

Here remains in civil Trust,
His below'd bewailed Dust;
Whose Goodness is secur'd from Fedr
Of sinding any Sepulchre.

For Sir Charles, his eldest Son, (who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of —— Johnson, and Neice to Sir William Turner, Kt. Lord Mayor of London, and dy'd without Issue) is this Epitaph:

Carolus Mardannt, Baronettus, Caroli Mordannt, Baronetti, & Catharina Talamach, Filius, Inmanitatis & virtutis Exemplar, obiit Anno 1664 Die 24 Aprilis Anno Ætatis 25, in eternum doloris & amoris Monumentum Elizabethatori integerritua Marmor boc posuit.

Talemache, the next Brother, dying before his Father, as is mention'd on the Monument, John, his Brother and Heir now living, succeeded in the Title and Estate.

Which Sir John Mordaunt, Bart. residing at Walton in Warwickshire, has been chose one of the Knights of the Shire for that County, in several Parliaments. He took to Wise Anne, Daughter of John Risley, of the Friery in Bedford, Esq, who deceased, leaving one Daughter that dy'd young, and having afterwards marry'd Penelope, Daughter of Sir George Warburton of Areley in Cheshire, Bart. Aunt to the present Sir George, had Issue 6 Children, of whom, 2 Sons and 2 Daughters are now living.

Charles, and John.

Penelope, marry'd to Joseph Herne, Esq. Member in the present Parliament, and Catherine, unmarry'd.

Weftley, which it exchang'd for that of Bendish, the Name of a Lordship in Radwinter, of considerable Note, in the Reigns of Edw. the Confessor and Will the Conqueror, of which this Family was posses'd soon after the Conquest, and made it the chief Place of their Residence for several Ages past.

The first of this Family, that occurs in the ancient Records, is Peter de Westley, alids Bendish, (a) who slourish'd in the Reign of H. 3d, and left a

Son and Heir,

Gerard de Westley, aliès Bendish, who marry'd Margaret, Daughter and Heir of Richard de Burgh-

well; and by her, had Issue

Ralph de Westley, alias Bendish, of Radwinter, who liv'd in the Reign of Edw. the 2d; and by Agnes his Wife, Daughter and Heir of John de Grauncetre,

had Issue 2 Sons, Ralph and Thomas.

Which said Ralph de Westley, alids Beudish, of Radwinter aforesaid, had for Wise Jemima, or Jacoba, Daughter and Heir of Henry Griggs, by whom he had 3 Sons; John Bendish, his eldest Son and Heir, that dy'd sans prole, Thomas, and Richard, who marry'd Margerey, Daughter of John Bullen, alids Butler, of Walden, in Essex; and by her, had Agnes his sole Daughter and Heir.

Thomas Bendish of Radwinter, aforesaid, Esq. 2d Son of the said Ralph, succeeded, and was the first of this Family who purchas d Lands in Steeple-Bumsed, by the Name of Thomas Fitz-Ralph, in the 3d Year of Edw. the 2d. His Wife was Alice, Daughter of William Helyon, descended from William de Helyon, who, in the Reign of King Stephen, held 10 Knights Fees in Bumsted Helyon, which were given by Maude, the Empress, to Albeey de Vere, the first Earl of Oxford of that Family. This Gentleman dy'd 16 Edw. 2, having by his Wife aforesaid, John, Edmund, and Robert; both of which, viz. John and Robert, dying Issue less,

Edmund, the 2d Son, was Heir, who espous'd Alice, Daughter of John Benyngton, Esq. and Isabel, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir John Reauchamp of Hertfordshire, Kt. This Alice, was Sitter and

Heir to William de Benyington.

This Edmund being a martial Man, accompany'd King Edw, the 3d at the famous Siege of Calais, in the — Year of his Reign; and to furnish himself for the same, mortgag'd the Manor of Bendisb-ball, in Radwinter, to the Monks of Fever ham, in Kent; but staying somewhat longer than he thought of, he came over (b) before the Mortgage was laps'd, to confer with his Creditors. who commending his Care, defir'd him not to suspect any hard Dealing from them, considering his being in the King's Service, was of it self, sufficient Cause to excuse his Delay of Payment on the Day assign'd; upon which he return'd to the Siege again; but when the Day came, the Monks. for all their good Words, made fure of this Ma-- nor, and held it continually, without any farther Recompence, maugre all the Friendthip this Gentle-

Gentleman could make: He took this cousening in such Disdain, that he lest this Caution (in Writing) to Posterity, to beware how they trusted either Knave Monk or Knave Fryer. Thus this noble Lordship was extorted from the Family.

This Gentleman, with John Wythorne, Rector of Halfted, gave one hundred Pound Sterling to the University Chest of Cambridge, sounded by Walter Neel, about 1-9 Edw. 3, 1345. He had Issue Thomas and Edmund, and dying 16 Rich. 2, was suc-

ceeded by

Thomas Bendish, Esq, his eldest Son and Heir, who had two Wives: First, Margaret, Daughter and Co-heir of Thomas Bradfeild of Barrington, in the County of Cambridge, Esq. by whom he had Iffue 2 Sons, Edmund and Thomas; and two Daughters; Foan, the eldest, marry'd to John Wilford of Crocheston, in the County of Southampton, Esq. Alice, the 2d Daughter, to Walter Gerard of Steeple-Bumpsled: She had 40 l. for her Portion. Edmund Bendish, the eldest Son, was of Barrington aforesaid, and marry'd Flenor, Daughter of John St. George, Esq. Son and Heir of Sir Baldwin St. George, of Hatley in Cambridgeshire, Kt. He was return'd for a Gentleman of that County the 12th of Hen. 6, 1433. From him are descended the Bendishes of Barrington, still living in an honourable Degree.

His 2d Wife was Alice, sole Daughter and Heir of Sir Walter Clopton of Topssfeld-Hall, in Hadley in Suffolk, Kt. of Rhodes, by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter of Sir Baldwin Figott, Kt. by whom he had Issue 2 Sons and 2 Daughters. Thomas Bendish of Hadley, Esq. who dy'd without Issue: And another Thomas Bendish, Founder of the Suffolk and Norfolk Branch of this Family, who dy'd the 15th Hen. 7. Alice was marry'd to Richard Ongar of Teld-

Teldbam; and Elizabeth, to John Huntingdon. In the 3d of Hen. the 4th, he founded an Obite for the Souls of Edmund Bendish and Alice his Wife, and for the Souls of all the faithful deceas'd: He was return'd as a Gentleman of Essex, the 12th of H. 6, 1433, and dy'd the 26th of that Reign, 1448, leaving Edmund Bendish his Son and Heir, of the Age of 40 Years: He was seiz'd of the Manors of Bendishe's-Bloys and Lacheleys; of Lands and Tenements call'd Reyles, and Rapcotes, and Fitz-Aleyns in Steeple-Bumsted, with a Tost call'd Baylours; and the Manors of Mortisfawe, and Bendishes in Radwinter.

Thomas Bendish, his 2d Son by the first Venter, succeeded him in the Essex Estate, and was seated

at Steeple-Bumpsted.

He had two Wives: By Joan, the Daughter of — Fitz-Williams, his first Wise, he had Richard and Fbomas; and by Joan, the Daughter of John de Throgbill, he had 2 Sons, Ralph and John, and an only Daughter nam'd Mand: He purchas'd the Manor of Bour-hall, which afterwards became the Seat of his Family. He dy'd 2 R. 3,(c) seiz'd of the same Estate with his Father, leaving Richard his Son and Heir.

Which said Richard Bendish of Boure-ball, Esq. marry'd ————— sole Daughter and Heir T 2 of

of John Newport of Pelham, in Hertfordsbire, Efg. and by her, had John Bendish, his Son and Heir. He dy'd the 27th of Sept. 15 H. 8, 1523, and was

bury'd by his Father.

John Bendish of Steeple-Rumsted, Esq; was of the Age of 7 Years at his Father's Death. He had for Wife Margery, Daughter of Thomas Crawley of Loughts, in Com. Effex, Esq; He dy'd the 20th of August 1585, and lies interr'd near his Father.

His Son and Heir was

Thomas Bendish of Steeple-Bumpsted, Esq; who had four Wives; Elenor, the Daughter and Co-heir of John Ford of Fratring, in Com. Essex, Esq, the next was - Daughter of - Fincham, - the Name of the third we cannot reco-Margery, Daughter of Rook Green of Little-Samford, Esq. was the fourth and last Wife: He had no Issue but by his first, which were three Sons, viz John, that dy'd unmarry'd before his Father; Thomas; (and Richard, who had two Wives, Elizabeth, Daughter and Co-heir to Edmund Swannington in Norfolk, by whom he had an only Son of both his Names; and Margaret, Daughter of Thomas Golding of Foenham in Suffolk, Esq; by whom he had 3 Sons, John, Richard, William, and one Daughter Elizabeth) and three Daughters; Barbara, marry'd to Tho. Smith of Walfoken, in Norfolk; Elizabeth; to John Pepps of Cottenham, in Cambridge; and Elenor, to Robert Bryan of Bolingbrook Lincolnshire.

This Gentleman dy'd the 24th of Feb. 1603,aged 63 Years, and lies bury'd at Fratring, near Colchester, with the following Inscription on his Tomb:

Hic jacet Thomas Bendish, Armiyer, Filius & Hares Johannis Bendish de Bumsted; ad Turrim in Comitatue Essexia; duxit in Uxorem Elinoram.

Elinoram Filiam & Cohoredem Johannis Ford de Horkesty Magna, Armigeri, per quam Terras ad Fratring Halle pertinentes, aliasq, alibi jacentes habuit. Mortuus est xxiii Feb. Anno Domini 1603. Ætatis sua lxii. reliquit Filios Thomam & Richardum, Filiasq, Barbaram, Elizabetham & Elinoram.

Besides the Estate already mention'd, he dy'd seiz'd of the Manor of Waltons in Bumpsted ad Turrim. Turbuts in Stamborne; Hayes-Crost and Isgreenes, in Finchingseild. The Reversion of the Manor of Crawly-Bury. A Farm call'd Marwood, in Elmedon. The Rectory of Haverbill. The Reversion of the Manor of Chawreth. The Manor of Fratring, and several considerable Farmes in Fratring, Bentley, and the Parts adjacent: Seggesball in Over-Teldam. The Moiety of Dangewell-ball, and the Manor of Blunt's-ball, in Great Oakley and Wikes. Bowerland in Wikes. The Moiety of Spoon's-ball, a Manor in Pebmersh, Lands lying in Wethersfeild and Haverbill.

Thomas Bendish of Steeple-Bumsted, Fig. his 2d Son, succeeded, being 35 Years of Age at his Father's Decease; he was, by the Favour of his Prince, created a Baronet of England Anno Dom. 1611, the third of the County of Essex. He was twice High-Sheriff of the said County, viz. the 16th of King James and the 6th of King Charles the Ist, and dy'd at Bower-hall in Bumpsted, the 26th of March 1636, aged 71 Years, and was there bury'd with his Ancestors. He marry'd Dorothy, Daughter of Richard Cutts of Arkesden, in Essex, Essex, by whom he had two Sons; Thomas, his eldest Son and Heir, of the Age of 29 Years, at the Time of his Father's Death; and John, that dy'd an Infant; and 2 Daughters, Dorothy, mar-

ry'd to Sir Thomas Harton of Burtop-Lazers, in the County of Leicester, Kt. and Elenor, to Miles Feruely in Suffolk, Esq. He was succeeded in

Dignity and Estate by

Sir Thomas Bendish; who, by his Lady Anne, Daughter and Co-heir to Henry Baker of Shobery, in the County of Essex, Lsq, had a numerous Posterity. Thomas Bendish, that dy'd unmarry'd in the Life-time of his Father, John, Richard, Robert, Henry, and Andrew, and six Daughters; Dorothy, first marry'd to —— Williams, 2dly to —— Bowyer; Abigal to Edwards, Anne to Sir Jonathan Dawcs, Elizabeth to Mr. Cartwright, Merchant of London, Diana to Sir Strensham Masters, and Susan, to Sir William Hooker, Kt.

This Gentleman was a notable Instance of Loyalty to his Prince, having suffer'd very much in

the Civil Wars.

He had a chief Hand in drawing up and prefenting the Effex Petition to the King and Parliament, in order to reconcile them; for which good Office, he was, by the said Parliament, imprison'd in the Tower 22 Months, and his Estate sequester'd for Malignancy.

He sent three thousand Pounds of his own proper Money to his Royal Master, when under Restraint at New Castle. A great Sum of Money in those Days, to come from the Purse of a pri-

vate Subject.

Notwithstanding, he fell under the Displeasure of the Parliament, yet several Years after, they would have made Choice of him to be their Embassador Extraordinary to the Ottoman Porte; but no Argument of theirs could prevail with him to enter on this honourable Employment without the King's Commission, which the King readily granted, and therein gave him Liberty to use the Seal of the Parliament of England.

He enter'd on his Embassy 1647, being the 23d Year of his Majesty's Reign; and he resided at the Turkish Court about 14 Years. He was a Person every Way equal to such a Province, and fill'd that great Post with admirable Sufficiency. Never any Embassador acting more for the Honour of his Prince, and Benefit to the Turkey Company. Tho' his great Services to the latter were rewarded with Calumny and Reproach.

Besides his Skill in Languages, he was a Person of consummate Prudence, and invincible

Courage.

How well he understood his Character, and how jealous he was of the Honour of his King and Country, will appear by the following Instances.

The Grand Visier would have publickly affronted him at an Audience, in causing the Chairs to be remov'd out of the Room; Sir Thomas made one of his Gentlemen kneel, and lean upon his Hands, and then sat down on him, before he would deliver his Embassy.

At another Audience, when the Grand Visier would have plac'd the *French* Embassador above him, he justl'd him from his Chair, and took his Place; telling him, that he was Embassador from a crown'd Head, who was King of *France*, as

well as England.

Some Time after, some Disputes happening between the Grand Visier and Sir Thomas, the latter rose up, and kicking the Stool from him whereon he sat; said his Master was dishonour'd, and he would have Reparation for the Affront.

The Grand Visier, after this, admir'd his Gal-

lantry, and was very Civil to him.

King Charles the first, had such a Sense of his gallant Behaviour, and the eminent Service he had done the Levant Company, that he wrote T 4

him a Letter of Thanks from the Isle of Wight, a

little before his Decollation.

Upon that King's Death, he vigorously espous'd the Interests of the King his Son, and renew'd the Capitulation between the Grand Seignior and the King, by the Title of Charles the IId, King of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, &c.

In the Year 1649, he was confirm'd in his Commission of Embassador Extraordinary by King Charles the IId. And in 1653, when the Protector sent Mr. Richard Lawrence to Confiantinople, with Letters of Revocation to Sir Thomas Bendish, from that his said Embassy. Thew'd the Value he had for the King's Commission, by telling Lawrence that he was sent by the King, and would not deliver up his Commillion without his Majesty's Order. Upon which, Articles of High-Treason were presented against him by Paul Haget, before the Rump-Parliament, wherein the chief Crime set forth, was, the Zeal and Affection he bore to his Majesty's Person and Government; and that by his Authority he acted. But in Confideration of the eminent Services he had perform'd, he was suffer'd to live in Retirement at his own Seat: And the Restoration ensuing soon after, King Charles the IId gave him a very honourable Testimonial of his great and good Services.

He gave Way to Fate about the Year 1674, it his Seat in the County, the Place of his Nativity, aged 60 Years, and more, and was interr'd at Bumpfled amongst his Ancestors. His Lady, the faithful Companion of his Travels, dy'd before him at Constantinople, but was sent over, and likewise bury'd at Bumsfled. He was succeeded in

Sir John dy'd 1706, aged 78, and was bury'd at Bunfled with his Lady, who dy'd the Year before.

Sir Henry Bendish, the youngest of 5 Sons, is the present Baronet, and last Male of this ancient Family of the Bumsted-Line: One of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Essex, and Deputy-Lieutenant.

He marry'd Catharine, Daughter of Sir William Golling, Sheriff of London, and hath Issue one Son,

Henry.

OUR British Genealogists deduce this Family from Owen Gwineth, Prince of North-Wales, (a) Son of Griffith ap Conan, King of the said Country, the 7th in lineal Descent from Roderick, the Great King of all Wales, who began his Reign Anno 843, and was slain by the English in the

Year 877. (b)

The before-mention'd Owen Gwineth made many victorious Expeditions against the Normans in South-Wales, defeated the Earl of Cheffer, and repuls'd King Henry the IId. His Life is written at large in the History of Wales, publish'd by What I shall farther add of him is, that he rul'd 52 Years, and marry'd 2 Wives; Gladis, Daughter to Traborn ap Cradock ap Gwyn, and Christian. Daughter to Grono ap Owen ap Edwin; by Cladis, his 1st Wife, he had Issue Jerweth, from whom descended Lewellin, the last Prince of Wales, who left only a Daughter, Catherine, who marry'd Philip ap Ivor; and the said Philip having Issue by her only a Daughter, Eleanor, the Wife of Tho. Lhyuellin ap Owen ap Meredith ap Owen ap Griffith ap Rys, Prince of South-Wales, who had likewise only Daughters; Margaret, one of them, marry'd Sir Tudor ap Grono, Kt. Grandfather to Sir Owen Tudor, Kt. who marry'd Catharine. Daughter to Charles, the simple King of France, and Widow to H. 5, King of England, by whom he had Issue Edmund, Earl of Riebmond, and Jasper Earl of Pembroke, and Duke of Bedford. The

The said Edmund Earl of Richmond, by Margaret his Wife, Daughter to John Beaufort, Duke of Somerset, was Father of H. 7, King of England.

The said Prince Owen Gwideth, by his 2d Wife Christian, Daughter of Grono ap Owen ap Edwin, Lord of Englefeild, had Issue David, Roderick, and Cadwallon, Abbot of Bardsey; and by other Women, Conon, Lewelyn, Meridith, Howel, Ririd, Lord

of Clochran in Ireland, and several others.

David usurp'd the Government of Wales after his Father's Death, pretending that Jerwith, his half Brother, was unfit to reign, by Reason of the Deformity of his Face, having broken his Nose; and strengthening himself by Alliance, in marrying Emma, Sister to King H. 2, of England, banish'd his Brethren, imprison'd his Brother Roderick, and kept in Confinement Lewellin, Son of his Brother Ferwith, but Roderick breaking Prison, enter'd the Isle of Anglesey, and was receiv'd of the People as Sovereign Lord thereof; and foon after, recover'd all that Part of Wales lying above the River Conway; leaving his Brother David no other Part than Ruddlan-Castle, and the Territory adjacent, which he held with a Garrison of English.

Giraldus Cambrens, who travel'd thro' Wales with Baldwin, Arch-bishop of Canterbury, preaching the Christian Doctrine among the People, relates (in his Book Itenerarium Cambria) that the Arch-bishop lodg'd one Night with the said David at Ruddlan-Castle; and that Roderick was Prince at such Time as the Arch-bishop was in Anglesey, and had in his Court Lewellin, his Nephew, Son of Jerwith, who afterwards was Prince; and for

his many Victories, stil'd the Great.

The said Roderick, to strengthen himself with the Power of South-Wales, marry'd Agnes, his own Cousin, Daughter to the Lord Rys, Prince of South-Wales, Wales, and had Issue Griffth, Thomas, and others; which Thomas, was Lord of Brin-Lbuyd on Rhiwluyd, and marry'd Morret, Daughter to Eenion ap Seijylt, by whom he had Issue Cariadoc ap Thomas, Lord of the same Place, who had Issue by Eva his Wife, Daughter to Gwin ap Griffth, Lord of Kagidfay, 2 Sons, Einion ap Cariadoc, Lord of Penychen, in Com. Carnarv. (a Manor to this Day call'd Llyr-Eirigan ap Cariodoc) and Griffth ap Cariadoc, Lord of Friwlwyd, (where the Ruins of his Manor-House doth likewise appear) Thrad Escobion, and other Possessing. He marry'd Lbeky, Daughter to Lbuarch Vychon, ap Lbuarch Goch, and had Issue a Son, David, and a Daughter, Grervil, marry'd to Irion

ap Einion.

David ap Griffith, marry'd Eva. Daughter and Heir of Griffith Vychan ap Griffith, and had by her that Land, which, in the Extent of North-Wales, is call'd Gwely Griffry, in Penyve, in Evioneth, in Carnarvoushire; he had Issue by her 3 Sons, David, Meredith, and Howel, as appears by the Record of the Extent of Denbigb, temp. Ed. 1. Henry Lacy, Earl of Lincoln, having the Gift of it from that King on the Conquest of Wales, and minding to make a princely Seat of the Castle of Denbigh, compell'd the Children of David ap Griffith, to exchange their Possessions about Denbigh for other Lands of less Value. From this David and his Brother Meredith, are no Issue remaining in Credit, their Posterity, by Division and Subdivision of Gravel Kind, [the Destruction of Wales] being brought to the Estate of mean Precholders, and their Descent forgotten.

From Howell ap David, the other Brother, the Lineage continu'd in Wealth and Credit. He marry'd Eva, Daughter and Heir to Fevan ap Howell ap Meredith, and had large Possessions with her in Evioneth, that to this Day remain to his Possessiy.

He had Issue by her several Sons; Meredith, Robert, Tudor, Griffith, and David, seated at Henblas in Maethebrwyd, in Denbyshire, whose Issue terminated in Heirs Female.

Morfydd, Daughter to Evan ap David ap Trahayarn Goch, of Llun, descended of the House of Rys ap Tewdor, and in the Extent of North-Wales, 26 E. 3, is found to be one of the Heirs of Gwely Griffri. He had Issue 2 Sons, Robert and Evan; and a Daughter, nam'd Marsh, marry'd to Jenkyn Conway of Ruddand, of whom the Conways of Ruddan and Botrithan, descend.

From Jevan ap Meredith, the younger Son, who was Constable of Crikeith, and stood fast to the English in the Time of Owen Glondor's Rebellion, and for that Reason, had his Houses at Keven y Vann and Kefelgyfarch, burnt, descended several worthy Families, viz. Sir William Morris of Klyneney, Kt. the Annylls of Park in Merionethshire, the Lloyd's of Rhewedock in the same County, the Brinkers of Brinker, and the Madrins of Madrin,

both in the County of Carnarvon.

Robert ap Meredith, elder brother to the faid Evan, embark'd with Gwen Glender in his Rebellion; for which Reason, in the 9th Year of King Hen 4, (c) he had his Pardon. Rus Goch, or Tri, a Bard, of that Time made a Song on him, shewing what notable Qualities he had, and yet durst not name him therein, for that he was an Out-law when he made it, but sheweth in the Song his Descent from Griffith ap Conan, King of Weles, and that he was the Hope of the Stock. The Curious in that Language may be desirous of seeing a Specimen of the Poetry of those Times, which I hope will excuse my inserting it.

## Rys Goch or Yri ai cant.

It was the Custom of the Welsh Nation, to have the chief Actions of their Ancestors, and their Pedigrees, set forth in Songs; but from the Reign of King End. 1, they were disus'd, that King having caus dall the Welsh Bards to be hang'd by martial Law, as Stirrers of the People to Sedition, and the Example was follow'd 'till the Reign of King Hen. 4, when farther Liberty was given to sing, as heretofore.

The said Robert ap Meredith, liv'd to be very aged before he marry'd, near 80 Years old, as appears partly by Record, and partly by Tradition, and then took a Liking to Anguarod, Daughter to David ap Lhyuellen ap David ap Enion Vychan, whom he marry'd, and had Issue by her an only

Son, Jevan, and Daughters.

Which Jevan, being a Child of tender Age at the Death of his Father, was under the Guardian-ship of John ap Meredith ap Jevan, his next Kinfman, viz. Grand-son to this Father's Brother, who cross marry'd him and his Sister with Howel ap Rys ap Howell Vaughan, of the House of Bron-y-Foel, in Evinneth. The said John ap Meredith, (being Cousin to Sir Owen Tudor, who marry'd Catharine, Widow of King Hen. 5) went with 100 Gentlemen of North-Wales, his Kinsmam, to visit the said Sir Owen, who was in Trouble at Rwsg-Castle, call'd Brynbyga, on Account of that Marriage; and the Queen having it objected to her, that the Kindred and Country of the Husband she had marry'd, were

were vile and barbarous, was afterwards defirous of seeing some of his Kinsmen; for being a French Woman, she knew no Difference between the English and Welsh Nation; upon which, Sir Owen sent for, and brought into her Presence the said John ap Meredith, and Howell ap Llewelyn ap Howell, his near Cousins, Men of goodly Stature and Personage, but destitute of all Learning; for when the Queen had spoken to them in divers Languages, they were not able to answer a Word, which caus'd her to say, they were the goodliest Dumb-Creatures she ever saw.

But to return to Jewan ap Robert ap Meredith, he was a Man of great Stature, comely Personage, and hardy Courage, as appears by the Wellh Songs made to him; and behav'd himself valiantly in the Lancastrian Interest, and stood so firm to that Cause, with his whole Kindred, David ap Jenkin, and other Captains, that even in the 6th of Edw. 4, they were in Arms, and wasted with Fire and Sword, the Subburbs of the Town of Denbigh, and kept that Country in Subjection 'till the Arrival of William Herbert, Earl of Pembroke, with a great Army, who executed his Charge with great Rigor, wasting the mountainous Countries of Carnarvon and Merionethshire, and took in the Castle of Hardlech, held by David ap Jevan ap Eingan, for the two Earls, Henry Earl of Richmond, and Jasper Earl of Pembrook; which forc'd the said Jevan to leave his own House, and conceal himself the best he could: He lay at Night in a Rock, call'd Ogofilen, in Bethkelert; and in the Day which the Lancastrians his Friends and Followers, skirmish'd with the adverse Party in the straight and rough Passage of Nanhwynen, which oblig'd the Earl to send him an Offer of Protection, which he accepted, as appears by the Earl's Deed, under his Hand and Seal. After

After this, on a private Feud with Howel ap Rys ap Howell, (who marry'd his Sifter) there grew such Animosities, that each other assembled his Relations and Friends, and endeavour'd to mischief one another all they could: The said Jevan narrowly escap'd with his Life, in two Snares laid for him; yet he nevertheless generally got the better of his Adversary, 'till in the End, a Plague, which frequently sollows Wars and Desolation, and happen'd soon after the Earl of Pembroke's Expedition, took him away, at his House in Keselgysarch, in the Flower of his Age, being one and thirty Years old. He left 3 Sons by Catharine his Wise, Daughter of Rbys ap Hoel Vycan.

Meredith ap Jevan, the eldest, was in the Lifetime of his Father, at Nurse with a Free-Holder, in the Hundred of Moorum, Owner of the Creige in Kanvair, two Miles from Carnarvon, and the best Man in the Parish. Carnarvon, in those Days, grew great as well by Trade of Merchandize, as also for that the King's Exchequer, Chancery, and Law-Courts, for all North-Wales, was held there, whereby Civility and Learning flourish'd in that Town, and thither was Meredith ap Jevan sent to School by the Free-Holder beforemention'd, who gave him all his Lands, having no Children of his own, and took such Care of his Education after the Death of his Father, that he learned the English Tongue, Latin, and other Languages, which his Brothers wanted, that were at Evioneth, near their Father's House. Having liv'd at Creige 'till the Age of 20 Years, he took a Liking to a young Woman in that Town, Alice, Daughter of William ap Griffith. Sheriff of the County of Carnarvon, and Daughterin-Law to one Spicer, whom he marry'd; and while he liv'd there, had by her 2 Daughters; Jonell, first marry'd to Edward Griffith, and afterwards

wards to Sir John Puleston; and Catharine, marry'd to Rowland Griffith of Plas Newydd: Being likely to have more Children, and his House proving too streight, he had Intentions of returning to his Inheritance in Evioneth, but alter'd his Resolution, on Consideration of Quarrels between his Kindred and Neighbours in that Country, whereupon he purchas'd a Leafe of the Castle and Fiess of Dolwyddelan, of the Executors of Sir Ralph Berkinet, which was excepted out of the Act of Refumption of King Richard's Grants, made in the 3d Year of King H. 7. Removing hereupon to Dolwyddelan-Castle, in the 24th Year of his Age, he first took Care to secure himself against Thieves and Robbers that infested the Hundred of Nancony, and were harbour'd in a Lordship belonging to the Knights of St. John of Jerusalem, call'd Spytty Jevan, that had large Privilege of Sanctuary, a peculiar Jurisdiction not govern'd by the King's Laws. These kept the Country about almost desolate, which had been thinly inhabited for some Time, and over-grown with Woods, from the Time Owen Glendour's Wars began, Anno 1400, which continu'd 15 Years, (it being his Policy to bring all Things to Waste, that the English should have no Resting-Place in the Country) it was therefore much wonder'd why Meredith ap Jevan should choose to reside there and leave his own Inheritance? But he answer'd his Friends, that he should find Elbow-room in that waste Country; and he had rather fight with Outlaws and Thieves, than with his own Blood and Kindred: for there were such Dissensions and Striving for the Master of the Country, that much Blood was spilt. After he had liv'd some Years at Dolwyddelan-Castle, he built a House in Penanmen, the best Ground in Dolwyddelan; and likewise remov'd the Church from a Place call'd Bryny Bedd,

to the Place it now standeth, being Part of the Possessions of the Priory of Betbkelert, which by the Glass-Windows, appears to be finish'd in the Year 1512. This Church, which is very strongly built, the Castle, and the House of Penanmen, fland three Square, a Mile distant from each other; for he remov'd the Church, which stood in a Thicket. that he might have divers Places of Retreat, and might not be furpriz'd by those Robbers aforemention'd, who had to their Back-Stay, Friends and Receptors in all the County of Merioneth and Powysland. Upon which Account, when he went to Church on a Sunday, he was forc'd to leave his House under a Guard of Men, and have the Doors well fasten'd, with a Watch-man to look out, who stood on a Rock, whence he might see both the Church and the House, and raise the Country, if Necessity requir'd. In his first Coming there, tho' he had 20 tall Archers that went with him to Church, and elsewhere, yet he never dar'd to make known when he went Abroad, or go or come the same Way.

To strengthen himself, he provided out of Countries adjacent, the tallest and strongest Men he could hear of, and planted Colonies, filling every empty Tenement with a Tenant; most whereof were on the King's Land, and many of their Posterity now remain. This drew divers able Men to dwell in the Country, looking on him as their Defender and Captain; and after some Years, he was able to bring 140 tall Bow-Men (of his Followers) that were ready on all Events; each of them had a Jack, or Molett-Coat, a good Steel Cap, a Sword and Dagger, Bow and Arrows, Horses, and chasing Slaves; and, with the Inhabitants of the Country, he was at last able to curb that Sanctuary of Thieves and Robbers. which at all Times were above 100, well hors'd

and

and appointed. He dy'd Anno 1525, having marry'd 5 Wives, and been Father of 26 Children; 10 by his 1st Wise, 2 by the 2d, 9 by the 3d, and 5 by the 2 later: Amongst his Sons, John Wynne ap Meredith, the eldest, had the Estate at Gwedir.

Humphry Meredith had the Estate at Keselgysarch, from whom the Wynns of the said Place, and o-

thers, are descended.

Cadwalladar, another Son, had likewise Poste-

rity. Both these were by the 3d Wife.

By the 4th Wife, was John Coetmor, Father of William, Father of John Williams, Goldsmith of London, who had Issue Sir John Williams, of the Isle of Thanet, Bart. Sir Edmund Williams, Bart. and Sir Maurice Williams, Kt. are likewise descended from him.

John Wynne ap Meredith, of Gwedir, dy'd 1553, and by Ellen Lloyd, his Wife, Daughter of Moris ap John ap Meredith, of Ruedoc, had Issue 5 Sons and 2 Daughters: Morris Wynne of Gwedir, Griffith Wynne of Berthdda; Robert Wynne of Conwey; Owen Wynne of Carmelwr, who had all Posterity: And 5 John Wynne, Doctor of Laws, who dy'd Issueles, and left 401. per Annum to St. John's

College in Cambridge.

Maurice Wynne, of Gwilder, in the County of Carnarvon, Esq; marry'd Jane, Daughter of Sir Richard Buckley of Beaumorris, Kt. and had Issue 4 Sons and 3 Daughters; of which, the eldest Son, John, succeeded to the Estate at Gwilder, receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood, and was afterwards advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet, A. D. 1611: He was a sober discreet Gentleman, addicted to Reading, and an Encourager of Learning: He collected from Chronicles and Records, a History of his Family, which I have seen, and from whence this Account is for the most Part extracted

tracted, which shews he had examin'd the several Histories of his Country, and was well vers'd in the Laws and ancient Customs thereof; and throughout the whole, an Air of great Probity appears, and an Exactness in collecting many minute Particulars of Quarrels and Divisions, as well of other Families related to him, as his own. He marry'd Sidney, Daughter of Sir William Gerrard, Lord Chancellor of Ireland, by whom he had 9 Sons and 2 Daughters: Mary, Wife of Sir Roger Mostyn, and Elizabeth, Wife of Sir John Bodvil. Of the Sons, John, the eldest, succeeded to the Title and Estate, and dying unmarry'd, was succeeded by Richard his Brother, who likewisedying Issueless, the Title and Estate fell to Owen, another Brother.

Which Sir Owen Wynne of Gwidder, Bart. marry'd Grace, Daughter to Hugh Williams, and was succeeded in Title and Estate by Richard his Son and Heir, who left Issue an only Daughter, Mary, Ist Wife of Robert, the present Duke of Ancaster, who hath Issue by her Peregrine, Marquess of Lindsey: The said Lady was a noble Fortune to the Duke, the Estate at Gwidder, and other her Inheritance, being computed at 6 or 7000 l. per Ann. The Title descended to the present Sir John Wynn, eldest Son and Heir of Henry Wynn, Esq. 6th Son of Sir John Wynn, Kt. and Bart. William, 4th Son, leaving only a Daughter, Sidney, Wife of Edward Thelwall, Esq. and Morris, 5th Son, dying without Issue.

Which Sir John now living, is posses'd of a good Estate at Walstay in Right of his Lady, the Daughter and Heir of - Walstay of Walstay afore-

said, who deceas'd without Issue.

# Sir WILLIAM THROCKMORTON of TORTWORTH, Kt. Glou. Nº 57

(eadem Die prad.)

Throckemertona, Throckmorton, or the Rockmoor-Town, from whence this Family is denominated, is fituated in the Vale of Evefham, in the Parish of Flatbury, anciently written Flandenburgh, in Pershore Hundred, Com. Wigorn. a Manor containing two Hamlets, Hull, alias Hill, and Moor.

Johannes de Throckmertona was Lord thereof about 60 Years after the Norman Conquest, A. D. 1130: (a) Which leaves no Room to doubt, but that this Family possess d it at the Entrance of the Normans, or long before, the Etymology of the Name being either British, or, as more probable, Saxon.

From this John descended Henry de Throckemerton, who made a Grant of a Yard of Land in

Hulla, temp. H. 3. A. D. 1220. (b)

Robert de Throckemerton, (his Son, I presume) A. D. 1252, 36 H. 3. gave the King half a Mark

for a Writ, &c. brevi Vi & Armis babendo coram Justic. ad primam Assissam, &c. (c) and Mandat thereupon was to the Sheriff of Worcester, &c. A Pedigree of this Family made circa 1580, begins with him, mentions also one Adam de Throckemerton; and that the said Robert had Issue Simon de Throckemorton, who, with Isabel his Wife, 50 H. 3. A. D. 1266, paid half a Mark to have a Writ of Oyer and Terminer ad banum; and a Mandat thereupon was directed to the Sheriff of Worcestershire. (d) He had Issue two Sons, John and Giles; which last had an annual Revenue out of the Manor of Throck-

morton, A. D. 1330.

John, the eldest, was posses'd of Throckmorton 13 E. 3. A. D. 1339, and had in Marriage (e) Agnes, or Anne, Daughter and Heir of Sir Richard Abberbury of Abberbury in Com. Oxon. and was fucceeded in the Lordship of Throckmorton, &c. by Thomas, his Son and Heir, who was of the Retinue of Thomas Beauchamp, Earl of Warwick, 20 R. 2, (f) Escheator to the King for the County of Worcester 3 H. 4. (g) Constable of Elmley Castle 6 H. 4. (b) and having had to Wife Agnes, Daughter and Heir of ——— Besford, was the Father of John Throckmorton of Throckmorton, who was employ'd in the Service of Richard, (Son of Thomas) Earl of Warwick, at Caen in Normandy, 5 H. 5. and being brought up in the Study of the Laws, was afterwards of his Council. In 4 H. 6. he was a Commissioner, with sundry other Persons of Eminency, for proposing a Loan of Money from the King's Subjects in the County of Warwick, and 9 H. 6. one of the general Attorneys, constituted by U 4

Eleanor his Wife furviving, by whom he had two Sons, Thomas and John, and fix Daughters; Eleanor marry'd to Richard Knightly of Fawesley in Com. Northamp who dy'd 1477; Matilda to Sir Thomas Green of Greens-Norton, Kt. Margaret to John Row, Agnes to John Winslow, Elizabeth to Robert Russel,

Their Mother Eleanor was Daughter and Coheir of Sir Guy de la Spine, or de Spineto, Lord of Coughton in Com. Warw. whose Father William held notable Employments in the said County temp. E. 2. and was Grandson to another William de Spineto, by Idonea his Wife, Daughter of Simon de Coston, Kt. the lineal Heir Male of Ralph, Son of Willi-

am de Cocton, Lord of that Manor before the Reign of H. 2.

By the aforesaid Marriage, Thomas Throgmorton, her eldest Son, became possess'd of the said Manor of Coughton, the Seat of his Posterity for many Generations, and the present Possession of Sir Robert Throgmorton of Weston in Com. Bucks. Bart. chief Heir Male of this Family in lineal Succession from the said Thomas; and Sir Nicholas Carew of Bedington, Bart. is paternally descended from him, with several other Branches, as I shall sarther demonstrate when I come to treat of them in their proper Places.

John Throgmorton, second Son of Sir John and the said Eleanor, became possess of fair Possessions in the County of Gloucester, by Marriage with Isabel, Daughter and Coheir of Edward Bruges of Lone in the said County, Esq. and dying 16 H. 6,

John Throgmorton, who marry'd two Wives, Anne, Daughter of Thomas Scargill, and ———— Daughter of ———— Nanfan. By the first he had Christopher Throgmorton, who marry'd a Daughter of Sir John Harley of Herefordshire, was High Sheriff of Gloucestershire 5 H. 7, and had three Sons and five Daughters.

William Throgmorton, eldest Son and Heir, was High Sheriff of Gloucestershire 21 H. 8, and by Margaret his Wife, Daughter and Coheir of Sir David Matthew of Ruyder, Kt. had three Sons and three Daughters; and by this Marriage the Manor of Totworth came to the Family. From Anthony, his second Son, are descended the Throgmortons of Cheson in Com. Hertford.

The eldest Son and Heir was Sir Thomas Throgmorton, who was High Sheriff of Gloucestershire 5 Phil. and Mary, and resided at Coss-Court in that County. He marry'd Margaret, one of the six Daugh.

Daughters and Coheiresses of Thomas Whittington of Pauntley. He dy'd 1586, leaving two Sons and two Daughters, one the Wife of Sir John Tracey of

Sir Thomas Throgmorton, Kt. eldest Son of the last Sir Thomas, was High Sheriss of the County of Gloucester 30 and 43 Q. Eliz. and dy'd in the Year 1607, having marry'd two Wives, Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir Richard Berkeley of Stoke, and a Daughter of Sir Edward Rogers. By the first he had Issue

William Throgmorton, Esq. of Tortworth, who was first knighted by King James, and afterwards created a Baronet 9 Jac. 1. He marry'd Ciceley, Daughter and Coheiress of Thomas Baynam of Clewerwall in the County of Gloucester, with whom he had that Manor; which, with the Dignity, descended to his Son and Heir.

Sir Baynam Throgmorton, Bart. who made his Refidence at Clowerwall, marry'd Margaret, Daughter of Robert Hopton, Esq. and one of the 4 Sisters and Co-heirs of Ralph Lord Hopton, sam'd for his great Service against the Rebels, in the Reign of King

Charles the Ist, by whom he had Issue

Sir Baynam Throgmorton, Bart. in whom this Title became extinct. He marry'd 2 Wives; by the 1st he had only a Daughter, marry'd to Capt. Crimbaw; by his 2d Wife, Catharine, Sister of Sir Richard Edgcomb of Mount-Edgcomb, in Devonshire, he had likewise an only Daughter, Catharine, marry'd to Thomas Wyld, Esq, a Member in the present Parliament for the City of Worcester, and one of the Commissioners of the Revenue in the Kingdom of Ireland.

From the before-mention'd Robert de Workesley, who was twice Kt. (c) of the Shire for the County of Lancaster, temp. Ric. 2, is lineally extracted Thomas Worstey of Hovingham, in Com. Ebor, Esq.

now the chief Branch.

Jordan de Workesley, a younger Brother of this Stock, about the Time of King Hen. 4, chang'd the paternal (d) Coat of Arms, from Argent, a chief Gules; to Argent, a Cheveron between three Ger Falcons close Sable, beak'd, member'd, and jeffed, Or: a Practice not unusual in those Days, as by many Instances (well known to the Curious) might be shewn, tho' the Reasons for such Alterations are not at this Distance so easily discover'd or explain'd. Which Jordan was the direct Ancestor to Hugh Worsley (as the Name was then wrote) of Worsley-Hall and Worsley-Mains, near Wigan in Lancashire, whose younger Son, Sir James Worsley, Kt. being bred up by King Hen. 7. as Page of his Chamber, and by King Hen. 8, made Yeoman of his Wardrobe, was afterwards advanc'd by the faid King to the Government of the Isle of Wight; in which Post he dy'd, Anno . (e) 1538. And having marry'd Anne, the only surviving Daughter of Sir John Leigh of Flamberdflon, in Com. Dorset. Kt. (by his last Wife Agnes, the Heiress of Hackett) had by that Match the Manor and Lordship of Appledorecombe, (in the Parifh

Lanc. the fixth Male Heir, in an immediate Descent from Robert de Workesley aforemention'd) did by Deed (f) of Settlement, made the 16th Day of April, in the 5th Year of the Reign of Queen Elizabeth. entail his Estate Safter several Limitations thereof, according to Proximity of Blood] on the faid Richard and John Worsley successively, and their several Heirs Male, lawfully begotten, and to be begotten, with Remainder over, to the [right] Heirs of the faid Sir Robert for ever.

Richard Worsley, Esq; the eldest Son, succeeded his Father (Sir James) in the same Command, then stil'd Captain of the Isle of Wight; and by Ursma his Wise, the Daughter of John St. Barb, Esq; (who was afterwards marry'd to Sir Francis Walsingham. Kt. the memorable Secretary of State, sub Elizabetha Regina) had Issue only 2 Sons, John and George Worsley, both accidentally blown up with Gun-powder in their Insancy; whereon Appledorecombe, and the whole Estate, devolv'd to their Uncle

John Worsley, then of Swainton in the Isle of Wight, Esq. (2d Son of Sir James) who left Issue by Jane his Wife, the Daughter of Richard Meux, Esq. Son and Heir of Sir Richard Meux, Kt. of Kingston, in the said Isle, two Sons, Thomas, and Richard who deceas'd about the Age of 18 Years, unmarry'd.

(the eldest Son and Heir of John) marry'd Barbara the Daughter of William St. John of Farley Chamberlain, in the County of Southampton, Esq. by whom he had Issue 2 Sons; 1st Richard, and 2d John Worsley of Gatcombe, in the aforesaid Isle: As also one Daughter, Barbara, who dy'd unmarry'd. Which John, by Cecelie his Wife, the Daughter of Sir Edward Richards of Taverland, in the same Isle, Kt. was Father to Sir Edward Worsley, Kt. from whom the Worsleys of Gatcombe descend.

Sir Richard Worsley of Appledorecombe, Kt. (eldest Son of Thomas) was created a Baronet by Letters Patent, bearing Date the 29th Day of June, in the 9th Year of the Reign of King James I. marry'd Francas the Daughter of Sir Henry Nevil of Billingbere, in the County of Berks, Kt. and dying about the Year 1621, left Issue by her 4 Sons and 3 Daughters; 1st, Sir Henry, 2d, Richard, who dy'd unmarry'd; 3d, Thomas Worfley of Bimbridge, in the Isle of Wight, who, by Sarab his Wife, the Daughter of \_\_\_\_\_ Roe, of Shropshire, left Issue George, and Robert who dy'd fine prole; which George Worfley marry'd ..... Daughter of Mr. Lifle, of the Ifle of Wight, and had Issue John and Sarah, which John Worsley is now Vicar of Gatcombe; and by Margaret his Wife, the Daughter of Hancock, hath Issue Frances, Margaret, and Robert; 4th, John, who dy'd unmarry'd. Anne, the eldest Daughter of Sir Richard, marry'd Sir John Leigh of Bury St. Edmund, in Com. Suff. Kt. but left no Issue. Sir Robert Worsley of Appledorecombe, Kt. and Bart. Son and Heir of Sir Hemy, marry'd Mary, Daughter of the honourable James Herbert, Esq. of Kingsey, in the County of Bucks, (second Son of the Right Hon. Philip Earl of Pembroke, &c. Lord Chamberlain of the Houshold to King Charles I.) and dy'd Dec. 19, 1675, having Issue by the said Mary his Wife, (afterwards marry'd to the Right Hon. Edward Earl of Gainsborough) 3 Sons and one Daughter, viz. 1st, Sir Robert, 2d. THIS Family, which had been feated in Lancashire for many Ages, came at the Beginning of the last Century to reside in Staffordshire. (a)

John Fleetwood, Lord of the Manour of Plumpton, in Lancashire, had Issue Henry, his Son and Heir, living in 3 H. 6, Father of Edward Fleetwood, Esq; who, by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter of Roger Holland, had Issue William Fleetwood, Esq; who resided at Heskin, in Com. Lanc. and having marry'd Helen, Daughter of Robert Standish, from them proceeded 4 Sons: John, the eldest, will be mention'd hereafter.

Thomas, 2d Son, was Father of Sir Will. Fleetwood of Cranford, in Middlesex, Kt. Receiver of the Court of Wards, who, by his Wife Johanna, Sifter of the Lord Clifton, had Issue feveral Sons and Daughters: Milo, his eldest Son, succeeded in the Office of Receiver of the Court of Wards.

Robert Fleetwood, 3d Son, was Father of William Fleetwood, an eminent Lawyer of the Middle Temple, who was elected (b) Autumn Reader of that Society in 5 Eliz. and in the 11th Year of the said Queen was double Reader thereof. About which Time being made Recorder of London, he was call'd to the Degree of Serjeant at Law, and in 1592 made the Queen's Serjeant. He was not only a learned Man, and a skilful Antiquary, (c) but marvellous merry and pleasant in his Conversation; and a Poet of those Times, in certain Verses, (d) describes his Learning, Justice, and Eloquence.

He purchas'd an Estate at Missenden, in Co. Bucks, and dying in the Year 1593, left 2 Sons, Sir William Fleetwood, who succeeded in the Estate at Missenden, (from whom the Family now remaining in that County is descended, whereof John Fleetwood, Esq. is Knight of the Shire in the present Parlia-Vol. I.

ment) and Sir Thomas, who was Attorney to Prince Henry, eldest Son of King James the Ist.

John, eldest Son and Heir of William Fleetwood of Heskin, before-mention'd, was seated at Penwortham in Lancashire, and having marry'd Jane, Daughter and Coheir of Thomas Langton, Baron of Walton, and Lord of Newton, his Estate was thereby considerably augmented; and he had Issue by her 3 Sons and several Daughters: Thomas, his eldest Son, marry'd Mary, Daughter of Sir Richard Sherburn of Sherburn, Kt. and lest Issue Richard, his Son and Heir.

Which Richard was the first that resided in Stafford/kire; and being seated at Caldwich, in the said County, was advanced to the Dignity of a Barone t. A. D. 1611. He marry'd Anne. Daughter of John Pershall of Hordesley, Esq. (created afterwards a Baronet) by whom he had 5 Sons, Thomas, Richard, William, Robert, Henry, and a Daughter, Mary.

Thomas, the eldest, succeeded to the Title and Estate, and had Issue the present Sir Richard Fleet-wood of Caldwich, who is very aged, and hath Issue

# THOMAS SPENCER of YARNTON, Esq; Oxon. Nº60

[29 Junii. A. D. 1611. R. Jac. 1.9.]

HE learned Camden, (a) in his Remarks on Surnames, mentions the Spencers to be descended from the Despencers; and that their Name was assum'd from the Office of Steward; whereto our Genealogists agree. The first that occurs in our Records, is Robert Despencer, who sat among the Barons affembled in Council with King William the Conqueror (b) at London in the 17th Year of his Reign, A. D. 1082; as also the Year following. when they fet their Hands and Seals to the Charter (c) of the King (dated at Westminster) for removing the fecular Canons out of the Church of Durbam, and placing Monks in their Stead. was likewise a Witness to the King's Act, (d) granting the whole City of Bath, with the Coinage and Toll thereto belonging, to John Bishop of Bath, and his Successors, for the better Support of his See. This Robert Despencer was Steward to the King, and is recorded by the Monks of Worcester as a very powerful Man; (e) and that he took the Lordship of Elmeleigh from them, which they could never after regain. At the Time of the general Survey, in 18 Will. the Conqueror, he held (f) 4 Lordships in Warwickshire, 15 in Lincolnshire, 17 in Leicestershire, and the great Ma-

nour of Wicvene (g) in Gretestanc Hundred in Glou-

cestershire.

He was succeeded by his Son William le Despencer (or Steward) to King Henry the 1st, Possessor of the Manour of Elington; and he, by Thurstan le Desvencer, Steward to the same King, (b) who had several Sons. From Almerick (i) (who succeeded his Brother Walter) descended Hugh Despencer, one of the greatest Barons of his Time. and Geffery Despencer, hereafter mention'd.

The faid Hugh was one of those Nobles who took Arms in Defence of their ancient Privileges, in the Reign of King Henry the 3d, and was chosen (k) one of the 12, (in 42 H. 3.) who with 12 other Barons, nominated by the King, were to amend and reform what they should think amis in the Kingdom: Likewise in 44 H. 3, was advanc'd to that great Office (1) of Justicier of England, (which in those Days comprehended the Jurisdiction of all the present Law Courts.) In 48 H. 3, he appear'd in Arms against the King at Northampton; as also at the Battel of Lewis, the 14th of May the same Year, and therein behav'd himself very bravely, taking (m) Prisoner Marmaduke de Twenge, who compounded to pay a Ranson of 700 Marks for his Liberty. After this Battel, (where the King was taken Prisoner) the Barons made him Governour of Oreford Castle in (n) Suffolk; as also of the Castles of the Devizes in Wiltsbire, Bernard Castle in the Bishoprick of Durham, Oxford, and Nottingham: And on the 8th of June following, the King sends his Writ (o) for all

all the Cities, Burghs, and Towns on the Coasts of Norfolk and Suffolk, to be obedient to the Directions of Hugh Despencer, his Justiciary: Being likewise the 8th of September following, constituted one of the fix Procurators (p) and Commissioners to treat in the Presence of the King of France, and G. Bishop of la Sabina, Legat of the Apostolick See, or either of them, about the Reformation of the State of the Kingdom, with Power to do whatever they thought fit in that Matter: He was likewise one of the three Barons (q) confided in to be always about the King; nevertheless, he afterwards fell off from them, being disgusted at the haughty Behaviour of Mountfort Earl of Leicester, (r) who took all the Profits and Revenues of the Kingdom, and Ranfom of Prifoners, to his own Use, which, by Agreement, was to be divided; and the said Earl was thereupon conflituted Justiciary in 49 H. 3: However, he put himself in Arms again with them, and fighting with great Courage at the Battel of Evelham, which happen'd on the 5th of August, the same Year, (s) (49 H. 3.) he there lost his Life.

This Hugb (by Aliva (t) his Wife, Daughter of Philip Basset of Wicomb, in Com. Bucks, Widow of Roger Bigod, Earl of Norfolk) was Father of Hugh le Despencer, of full Age, in 10 Ed. 1, who with Hugh le Despencer, his Son, are they whom our Historians so largely treat of, differencing them by Hugh Despencer, Senior, and Hugh, Jun. the one Earl of Winchester in 15 Ed. 2, and the other Earl of Gloucester, in Right of his Wife (u) Elianor, eldest Daughter and Coheir of Gilbert.

Earl of Clare, Gloucester, and Hereford, (and of Joan his Wife, one of the Daughters of King Edward the 1st.) Both of these Despencers were the most powerful Persons of their Time, Possesfors of the greatest Estates, (w) and the unhappy Favourites of King Edward the 2d. Hugh, the Father, had honourably distinguish'd himself under King Edward the 1st, in his Wars in Walcs, France, Flanders, and Scotland, and was likewise employ'd on several extraordinary Embassies; and Hugh, the Son, (Chamberlain to King Edward the 2d) was not less remarkable for many brave Actions in the Wars of Scotland and France: but firmly adhering to that unfortunate Prince in all his Troubles, they both suffer'd Death; the Elder, (tho' in the 90th Year of his Age) being condemn'd unheard, and immediately executed, before the Face of his own Son, and the King; and the younger (tho' he had by Capitulation, Safety, as to his Life and Limbs, when he stoutly defended the Castle of Kaerfilli) would not forsake his Prince, but venturing with him to the laft. and being again taken, underwent the Fate of his Father; and King Edward being afterwards deposed, was most barbarously and inhumanly murder'd.

This Hugh Despencer, the younger, left Issue 4 Sons, (x) Hugh, Edward, Gilbert, and (y) Philip; which last was Ancestor to Sir Philip Spencer, a Baron of the Realm, whose Daughter and Heir Margaret, marry'd Sir Robert Wentworth, from whom those of that Name at Elmsal, in Com. Ebor. descend. From Hugh Despencer, the eldest Son, descended Thomas Earl of Gloucester, who exhibiting

ting his Petition in Parliament in 21 R. 2, (a) had Revocation of the Judgment of Exile against his Great-Grandfather, Hugh le Despencer. In which Petition it appears, (b) that the faid Hugh was then possess'd of no less than 59 Lordships in fundry Counties, twenty eight Thousand Sheen. one Thousand Oxen and Steers, twelve Hundred Kines, with their Calves, Forty Mares, with their Colts, of two Years, a Hundred and Sixty drawing Horses, two Thousand Hoggs, three Thousand Bullocks, Forty Tuns of Wine, six Hundred Bacons, Fourscore Carcasses of Martinmass Beef, six Hundred Muttons; in his Lardere, Ten Tuns of Cyder; Armour, Plate, Jewels, and ready Money better than ten Thousand Pounds. Thirty Six Sacks of Wool, and a Library of Books.

This Thomas Earl of Gloucester, marry'd Constance, (c) Daughter of Edmund of Langley, Duke of Tork, Son to King Edward the 3d, and left one Son, Richard, who dy'd at 14 Years of Age; as also a Daughter, Isabel, betroth'd, first, to Richard Beauchamp, Earl of Worcester, and surviving him, was espous'd to Richard Beauchamp Earl of Warwick, by whom she was Mother to Henry Duke of Warwick, who dy'd without Issue Male.

The direct Line thus failing, the Head of the Family now remaining, is the most honourable Charles, the present Earl of Sunderland, descended from Geffery, Brother of Hugh, (d) Son of Thurstan, first treated of.

Which Geffery was the first Founder (\*) of Marlow Abby in Com. Bucks, and a Witness to X 4. King

King Henry the 2d's Confirmation (1) of Lands to Bungey Abby in Com. Suff. Which King, in the 26th Year of his Reign, (among other Grants) confirms the Donation of Geffery Despencer of the Church (2) of Boynton, to Bridlington Priory, Com. Ebor. He dy'd in 26 H. 3, (1251) leaving Issue John, his Son and Heir, under Age, whose Guardianship (e) was granted to Emma, his Mother.

This John Despencer was of full Age in 40 H. 3; at which Time being still Son (f) of Geffery, (and holding 60 l. per Ann. Land in Com. Leicest. and 15 l. Land in Com. Southamp.) he was call'd to receive the Honour of Knighthood. In 41 H. 3. (1256.) Pope Alexander directs his Bull to the Bishop of Salisbury, wherein he sets forth, that John Despencer, (g) by Petition, prays, that he may build a Chapel, and have a Chaplain in his Manour of Swalefield, (which he is ready to endow) by Reason his said Manour lies in a Forest wherein he liv'd, and that it was unfafe for him and his Family to go to the Mother-Church, many Thieves harbouring in the faid Forest: Which Matter the Pope refers to the said Bishop to determine.

This John took Part with the Barons in their Wars against King Henry the 3d, and was taken Prisoner at the Battel of Northampton. On which Account, his Manours (b) of Castle Carlton and Cavenby, in Com. Linc. were extended by the King; but when the Barons prevail'd, he, with Adam Despencer, (i) were released. Roger de Mortimer, by the King's Writ, (dated 4 Junii, 1264) being requir'd

requir'd (among other his Prisoners taken in April last at Northampton Fight) to bring them (k) to London, in order to their being set at Liberty. He dy'd before the 3d Year of King Edward the 1st, as appears by Inquisition taken (l) at Gertre,

Com. Leicest.

His Son and Heir was (m) William le Despencer, stil'd of Belton, at an Inquisition taken at Bredon & June, 34 Ed. 1, concerning the Right of electing a Prioress of Langley, (n) Com. Leicest. He resided at Desford, in Com. Wigorn, whereof he dy'd possess'd, about 3 Ed. 3, as appears by Inquisition taken that Year at Pershore, which likewise shews (o) that John was his Son and Heir, and of full

Age.

The said John was in the Retinue of John King of Castile, in his Voyage to Spain, (p) and on that Account had the King's Letters of Protection for one Year, bearing Date 6 Mar. 1386. (9 R. 2.) He was afterwards Squire of the Body to King Henry the 5th: (q) and Keeper of his great Wardrobe, and attending him in his warlike Expeditions in France, was (r) at the Siege of Roan. He had by Alice his Wife, (Daughter and Heir of Deverell) Nicholas, his Son and Heir, (s) who, by Joan his Wife, Daughter of —— Pollard, had Issue 2 Sons, Thomas and William. Which Thomas was Father of Henry Spencer of Badby, in Com. Northamp, who is stil'd Son and Heir of Thomas Spencer, in a Book of Subsidies, granted in 13 H. 6, and this Henry having marry'd Isabel, Daughter

and Coheir of —— Lincoln, had Issue 4 Sons, John, Thomas, William, and Nicholas, and departed this Life about 17 Ed. 4; his last Testament being dated Anno 1476, wherein he made his Sons John and Thomas his Executors, and Isabel, his Wise, Overseer, sealing it with the Arms the Family now bear, viz. Quarterly, in the 2d and 3d, a Fret over all, on a Bend, three Escallops. He was succeeded by his eldest Son,

John Spencer, Esq. who is mention'd in several Deeds of Feofment with Sir Edward Rawleigh of Farneborough, Kt. and others, particularly in 13 & 19 Ed. 4, when he feal'd with the Arms of his Mother and Wise together, being both Heirs, viz. On a Cross 5 Stars of 6 Points, (his Mothers) and, a Chever on between 3 Cingfoils, bis Wife's, who was Daughter and Heir of Warsted, by whom he had 3 Sons; 1. William, hereaftermention'd. 2. John Spencer, of Hodnell, in Com. Warm. Esq; who dy'd in 12 H. 7, (t) and held Lands in 18 several Lordships, as appears by his last Will and Testament, by which he appoints his Body to be bury'd in the Chancel of the Parish-Church of Hodenbull. and constitutes his Nephew, John Spencer of Smitterfield, Son of his Brother William, one of his Executors, entailing his Lands on him in Default of Issue Male of his Son Thomas, and in Default of Issue of him, the said John, to the Heirs Male of Thomas, his late Brother.

Which Thomas (3d and youngest Son) had Issue William, who had the Estate at Badby, in Com. Northamp. whose Son, Thomas Spencer, Esq. was of Everton, and left one Son, William Spencer, Esq. who dying without Issue, his 4 Sisters were Heirs to his Estate, viz. Catharine, marry'd to Thomas Brown, Esq. Mary, to Richard Wallop, Esq. 3d Son

of Sir Oliver Wallop of the County of Southampton, Kt. Susan, wedded to John Temple of Stow, in Com, Bucks, Esq. Ancestor to the present Lord Cobbam; and Dorothy, espous'd first to George Cope of Cannons Ashby, in Com. Northamp. and 2dly to Gabriel Poultney of Misterton, in Com. Leicest. Esq.

William Spencer, Esq. (eldest Son and Heir of John, beforemention'd) was written of Rodburn, in Com. Warw. in 1 H. 7. which Estate was granted to the said William on the Attainder of William Catesby, Esq. (u) He had in Marriage Elizabeth, Sister to Sir Richard Empson, Kt. from whom proceeded a Daughter, Jane, and two Sons, John and Thomas:

John Spencer, the eldest Son, took to Wife Isabel. one of the Daughters and Coheirs of Walter Graunt. Esq; and thereby became posses'd of a very good Inheritance at Snitterfield, in Com. Warw. of which Place he was (x) denominated in 2 H.7, and constituted one of the Executors to his Cousin John Spencer of Hodenbull, Esq, as before was said. In 22 H.7, he purchas'd the great Lordship of Wormleighton, in Com. Warw. (y) and foon after began the Structure of a fair Manour-House, wherein (when Inquisitions were taken, concerning Wastes and Inclosures of Lands, in 9 & 10 H. 8.) he was certify'd to have his Residence with sixty Persons of his Family, being a good Benefactor to the Church in Ornaments, and other Things. He was knighted by King Henry the 8th; and by his last Will and Testament, it appears, that he was possess'd of a very great Estate, was a noble House-keeper, had a great Reverence for the Clergy

Clergy, was very liberal to his poor Neighbours. as also bountiful to his Tenants and Servants: He in a manner re-built the Churches of Wormleighton, in Com. Warw. and Brinton and Stanton, in Com. Northamp, and gave thereto Vestments and Chalices; but his other Bequests to Religious Houses, and for Reparations of Churches, are too numerous to be inferted; as are also his Charities to his Servants, and others; whereby it's evident that he had a noble Spirit, temper'd with the greatest Humanity: He was likewise so honest and just, and of so pious a Disposition, "That " he requires his Executors to recompense every " one that can lawfully prove, or will make Oath, " that he has hurt him in any wife, so that they " make their Claim within two Years, tho' (as " is recited) he has none in his Remembrance, " but he had rather charge their Souls than his " own should be in Danger: And requires his " Executors to cause Proclamation thereof to be " made, once a Month, during the first Year after " his Decease, at Warwick, Southampton, Coventry, " Banbury, Daventry, and Northampton. "By this Testament, (z) which is dated the " 12th of April 1522, in 13 H. 8, he bequeaths " his Body to be bury'd in the Chancel of Brinton

" Church in Com. Northamp. before the Image of " our Blessed Lady, and that his Executors cause " a Tomb to be made as nigh the Wall as they

" can, behind the Sepulture.

He lies bury'd, according to his Appointment, as appears by a Monument now remaining, on the North Side of the Chancel of the Church of Brinton.

Brinton, shewing the Figures of a Knight in Armour, and his Lady in the Dress of the Times, lying on their Backs, under an Arch of Free-stone, curiously adorn'd with Carvings; and against the East Wall, is this Inscription in Capitals, setting forth his Marriage and Issue.

Here lieth the Bodies of Sir JOHN SPENCER, Knight, and Dame Isabel his Wife, one of the Daughters and Cobeirs Of Walter Graunt of Snitterfield, In the Countie of Warw. Esquire. Her Mother was the Daughter and beire of Humphrie Rading of the Wich, in the Coun. of Worcester, Esq. Which John and Isabell bad Issue Sir William Spencer, Knight. 1. Anthony Spencer. 2 wbo died without Isfue. Jane, Wife to Richard Knightley, Esquier, Some and Heire of Sir Richard Knightley of Fawsley, in the Countie of North. Knight. Isabel married to Sir Nico. Strelly of Strelly in the Countie of Nott. Knight; Dorothye married to Sir Rich. Catesbie of Legers Ashbie in the Coun. of North. Kni. Which Sir John Spenc. departed this Life the 14 of Apr. A. Dni. 1522.

Sir William Spencer, his eldest Son, (a) receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood from King Henry the 8th, at Tork Place, (now call'd Whitehall) A.D. 1529, the Parliament then sitting; and two Years after, viz. in 23 & 24 H. 8. (b) was Sheriff of Northamptonshire, during which he dyed. His last

last Testament bears Date the 17th of June, in 24 H. 8. "Whereby he bequeaths his Body to be bury'd at Brinton, in such Manner as his Executors should think sit: Orders his Father's "Will to be comply'd with, in every Article not then perform'd: Appoints Dame Susan, his Wise, Sir Nicholas Strelley, Kt. Anthony Cope, Esq. "Walter Smith, Esq. and two others, his Executors, charging them to take care of John his only Son, then very young; and departing this Life; Days after, viz. 22 June, lies buried according to his Desire.

A fine Altar-Tomb, cover'd with Grey Marble, being erected to his Memory, against the North East Wall of the North Chancel, or Burial-Place of this Family; round the Verge whereof is this

Inscription:

Hic jacent Dominus Willus. Spencer, Miles, & Dna. Suzanna, ux. ejus, qui obiit xxiio die mens. Junii, Anno Dni. Milmo. CCCCCXXXII, quor Aibus. propitiet. Deus, Amen.

Over the faid Tomb, on a Tablet under an Arch, is this Epitaph in Capitals.

HERE LIETH THE BODIES OF SIR WILLIAM SPENCER, Knight, and Dame Susan his Wife, Daughter of Sir Rich. Knightley, of Fausley in Comit. Northamp. Knight, and had Issue by her Sir John Spencer, Knight, there onlie Sonne, Isabel married to Sir John Cotton, of Lanwade in Com. Cam. Knight. Jane Wife to Sir Rich. Bruges of Shefford in Co. Berk, Knight, Dorothy married to Tho. Spencer of Everton in Co. Northamp. Esq., Anne Wyse to Sir John Goodwin of Winchington in Co. Buck, Knight, Which Anne died without Issue; Marie Wyse to Tho.

Tho. Boles of Walington in Co. Hertforde, Esquier; which Sir William died the xxii Days of June, An. Dni. 1532.

Sir John Spencer, aforesaid, was Sheriff of Northamptonshire in 5 Ed. 6, and elected (c) one of the Knights of the Shire in Parliament for that County in 4 & 5 Ph & Mary, before which Time he had receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood, and the Year following was again Sheriff of that County; as also in 13 Eliz. And in the 15th Year of the Reign of that Queen, was by Writ (d) appointed (with other Justices of the prime Quality in the County of Northampton) a Commissioner to enquire after such Persons as acted contrary to an Act I Eliz. entitled, An All for the Uniformity of Common-Prayer, Service in the Church, and Admini-stration of the Sacraments. He was a great Œconomist, yet kept a plentiful Table according to the old English Way, as is manifest from his last Will (e) and Testament, bearing Date 4 Jan. 1585, wherein he orders Hospitality to be kept in his Houses of Althorp and Wormleighton, by his Heir, after his Decease, according as he had done. He was bountiful to his Servants; and it also appears that he delighted in Retiredness; was an Encourager of Industry, and so much avers'd to an unactive Life, that tho' he was possess'd of a noble Estate, yet the Allurements thereof were not powerful enough to prevent his Thoughts how he might benefit his Country; so that he daily bufy'd himself, that it might not be said he did ill in doing nothing. His chief Recreation was breeding of Cattel; for, at his Decease, he had nu-

numerous Flocks of Sheep, &c. in his Grounds and Parks of Althorp and Wormleighton. He left great Estates to four of his Sons, who were Heads of as many Families. And, by his Will, aforesaid, desires to be bury'd in a decent Manner, without Pomp, (after the Worldly Fashion) in the Church of Brinton, where his late Wife, Dame Catherine Spencer, lyeth bury'd: Also that they give before his Burial x11. in Alms, and cause a Tomb, such as they think fit, to be plac'd where he and his faid Wife lye bury'd. Accordingly I find one erected to his Memory, neatly painted, gilt, and adorn'd with Arms, (in the Middle of two others) in the Burial-Place of this Family, between the South Chancel and North Chancel, reprefenting (under an Arch of elegant Workmanship, embellish'd with Roses, Lozenges, &c. of different Colours) the Proportions of a Knight in Armour, with his Lady, in the Habit of the Times, lying on their Backs, finely cut in Marble, and against the Wall is the Inscription, shewing his Marriage and Issue, and that he dy'd the 8th Day of November 1586.

His Lady was Catherine, one of the Daughters of Sir Thomas Kitson of Hengrave, in the County of Suffolk, Kt. by whom he had 5 Sons and 6 Daughters: Margaret, marry'd to Giles Allington of Horsbeath, in Com. Camb. Esq. and surviving him, to Edward Eldrington, Esq. Elizabeth, wedded to George Cary, Lord Hunsdon; Catherine, espous'd to Sir Thomas Leigh of Stonley, in Com. Warw. Kt. Mary, betroth'd to Sir Edward Asson of Tixall, in Com. Staff. Kt. but dy'd without Issue; Anne, the Wife of William Lord Monteagle, but had no Issue by him, and being afterwards marry'd to Henry Lord Compton, surviv'd him likewise; and was, 3dly, the Wife of Robert Sackville, Esq. Son and Heir of Thomas Lord Buckburst, Lord High Treasurer of England:

England; Alice, youngest Daughter, was marry'd to Ferdinando E. of Derby; and, in 2d Nuptials, was the Wife of Sir Thomas Egerton, Kt. Lord-Keeper of the Great Seal of England: Of the Sons, four of them were Heads of Families, as before was observ'd; and Edward, the youngest, dy'd without Issue.

Sir John Spencer, the eldest, was knighted by Queen Elizabeth in 1586, the memorable Year of the Spanish Invasion; and departing this Life the 19th of January 1599, had likewise Sepulture at Brinton, under a noble Monument near the middle Window of the Chapel, opposite to that of his Father's; and the Figures of him and his Lady, are in full Proportion, lying on their Backs, with an Arch over them, curiously embellish'd and gilt, and supported by 8 Pillars, viz. two at each Corner; four of which are square and painted, the other four black Marble, of the Corintbian Order. At the Head, against the North Wall, is the Inscription, which mentions only his Marriage and Issue. His Lady was Mary, fole Daughter and Heir of Sir Robert Catlyn, Lord Chief Justice of the King's Bench, and his Issue an only Son,

Robert Spencer, knighted by Queen Elizabeth, Possession of a very great Estate, and was reputed to have the (f) most Money of any Person in the Kingdom, when King James ascended the Throne; which, together with his noble Extraction, and many excellent Accomplishments, render'd him so conspicuous, that he was promoted by that Prince before his Coronation, to the Dignity of a Baron (g) of the Realm, by the Title Vot. I.

of Lord Spencer of Wormleighton, the Ceremony of his Creation (b) being perform'd at Hampton Court. This noble Lord was the same Year sent Ambassador to present Frederick Duke of Wirtemberg with the Habit and Ensigns of the most noble Order of the Garter, and arriving at the City of Stutguard the 2d of November, was receiv'd by the Duke with the highest Marks of Esteem. The Manner and Pomp of this Investiture, is set forth by Mr. Ashmole, (i) who observes, that the Lord Ambassador Spencer, (who represented the Sovereign) and the Elect Duke, were so richly attir'd, glistering with Gold and Jewels, that they attracted the Admiration of all the Spectators.

After his Return to England, he fought no Employment at Court, but he constantly attended his Duty in Parliament; and, on all proper Occasions, appear'd a loyal Subject to the King, a good Patriot, and a Maintainer of the Liberty of the Subject. He had excellent Parts, which were improv'd and cultivated by a close Application to the Service of his Country, and the Knowledge of Men and Business; whereby he grew into the Esteem of the wisest Men of the Age. His quick Apprehension and readiness of Thought was very remarkable; and, in the Debates in Parliament, as few spoke better, so none had a more favourable Attention; on which Account he was nominated in most Committee's on publick Affairs and Conferences with the Commons, as the Journals of the House of Lords shew.

He is applauded by most of the Historians of that Age. Cambden, in his Britannia. makes this honourable Mention of him, viz. Althorp, the Seat of the noted Family of the Spencers, Knights, ally d

to very many Houses of great Worth and Honour: Out of which Sir Robert Spencer, the 5th Knight, in a continued Succession, a worthy Encourager of Virtue and Learning, was, by bis most serene Majesty King James, lately advanc'd to the Honour of Baron Spencer of Wormleighton. And another Author (k) who wrote of those Times, gives this Account of " Spencer, (like the old Roman, chosen Dicta-" tor from his Farm) made the Country a virtu-" ous Court, where his Fields and Flocks brought " him more Calm and happy Contentment, than " the various and mutable Dispensations of a " Court can contribute: And when he was call'd " to the Senate, was more vigilant to keep the " People's Liberties from being a Prey to the en-" croaching Power of Monarchy, than his harm-" less and tender Lambs from Foxes, and rave-" nous Creatures.

This Lord Spencer liv'd a Widower -30 Years, his Lady dying in Childbed, (1) and departing this Life the 25th of October, A.D. 1627, was bury'd in great Splendor, with his Ancestors, at Brinton, the 5th of November following, under a noble Monument at the Head of his Grandfather's, under a like Arch, equally adorn'd, but supported by four Pillars of the Corintbian Order. The Figures of him and his Lady are likewise in the same Posture: He in Armour, with a Helmet on his Head, fhe in the Dress of the Times, veil'd to her Knees: And under the Arch, at their Feet, is a Memorial of his Marriage and Issue in Gold Letters, on a black Marble Tablet. His Lady was Margaret, one of the Daughters and Coheirs of Sir Francis Willoughby of Wollaton, in Com. Nott. Kt. and his Suc-

Successor was his 2d Son, William Lord Spencer; John, his eldest Son, dying at Blois in France, without Issue.

Which William Lord Spencer was made Knight of the Honourable Order of the Bath at the Creation of Prince Charles, in Anno 1616; and was elected all the while he liv'd a Commoner, one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Northampton, (m) in three feveral Parliaments in the Reign of King James the 1st, and two others, call'd in the first Year of the Reign of King Charles the 1st. He inherited all his Father's publick and private Virtues as well as his Honour and Estate; as we are fully inform'd from the Inscription on his Monument, which fets forth, that he was adorn'd with all Virtues; a tender Husband, loving Father, faithful Friend, a fincere Worshipper of God, a most devoted Subject to his King, and a Patriot of his Country. He dy'd in the 45th Year of his Age, on the 19th of December, and was bury'd at Brinton the 27th of the same Month, His Lady, Penelope, Daughter of A.D. 1626. Henry Earl of Southampton, liv'd with him 22 Years. and was with Child by him at his Decease. mourn'd her Lord's Death with an unfeigned Sorrow; and refusing several advantageous Offers of Marriage, continu'd a Widow one and thirty Years, (having Sepulture at Brinton, 16 July, A. D. 1627) leaving a very shining Character, for her Constancy of Mind, prudent Conduct, unaffected Piety, and Love to her deceas'd Lord, for whom she erected a noble and stately Monument of black and white Marble at Brinton; the Figures of a Baron and Baroness lying in their Robes of State on a black Marble Tomb; their Hands lifteđ

ed up in a praying Posture, and over them an Arch of black and white Marble, supported by eight black Marble Pillars (of the Corintbian Order) with white Capitals: And Inscriptions are engrav'd on black Marble Tablets on the sour Sides of the Tomb that sets forth his Marriage and Issue. But as my present Purpose is to give an Account of that Branch of this Family, which attain'd to the Degree of a Baronet, I shall only mention the direct Male Line, and therefore only treat of Henry, who was eldest Son to the said William Lord Spencer.

Which Henry Lord Spencer was born at Althorp,

and christen'd the 23d of November 1620. He had from his Youth a forward Inclination to Learning, (n) and being under an Austere Tutor, the Quickness of his Apprehension and solid Judgment led him to the Exercise of all generous Recreations; so that he was of a staid Nature, even before he arriv'd to Manhood; and at the Parliament that met in 1641, was eminently distinguish'd for his excellent Parts and Accomplishments, and courted by the leading Peers of both Parties. But being led by a natural and inherent Love for the Liberties of his Country, he concurr'd in detecting the indirect Practices of those that

of Northamptonshire. Yet, when he saw those he sided with were throwing off all Obligations to Conscience and the Laws of the Land, he boldly declar'd in Parliament, (the last Words he spoke there) That they might have been satisfy'd long before, if they had not ask'd Things that deny Y 2 them-

had violated the Laws, and thereupon the Parliament nominated him (0) their Lord-Lieutenant

themselves; (p) and if some Men had not shussi'd Demands into their Propositions, on purpose that

they might have no Satisfaction.

He therefore entirely left them, waited on King Charles the 1st at Tork, lent his Majesty 15000 L join'd the Earl of Northampton with 1200 Men, engaging his Brothers and all his Friends in the Service. For which approv'd Loyalty, and other his great Merits, he was rais'd to the Degree and Dignity of an Earl, by the Title of Earl of Sunderland, on the 8th of June, A.D. 1643; at which Time of his Creation, he was said to be ally'd to all the Nobility then at Court, except Duke Hamilton.

As he was much concern'd at the View of the Calamities threatning the Kingdom, he could not content himself, as a quiet Spectator, but always engag'd with the most Forward in any dangerous Enterprize; and after the raising the Siege of Gloucester, being with the King in the first Newberry Fight, (20 September, 1643) in a Dispute about a rising Ground, not far from his Majesty, he lost his Life; and, by the Lord Clarendon, (q) is thus remembred: Here fell the Earl of Sunderland, a Lord of great Fortune, tender Tears, (being not above three and twenty Years of Age) and an early Judgment, who having no Command in the Army, attended upon the King's Person, under the Obligation of Honour; and putting bimself that Day in the King's Troop a Volunteer, before they came to charge, was taken away by a Cannon Bullet. He was certainly a great Loss to his Country, being (as another Author (r) characterizes him) 'Virtuous, a. bove Vice, as well as without it; a good Patriot promoting Trade, Manufactures, and the Privile. ges

ges of his Country; a good Neighbour, belov'd of all; a discreet Landlord, a noble House-keeper. a Friend to the Learned, and an exemplary Ma-'ster of a Family.' He marry'd before he was 20 Years of Age, the Lady Dorothy Sidney, Daughter of the Right Honourable Robert Earl of Leicester. a Lady of fingular Beauty, and admirable Endowments of Mind: commemorated by the fam'd Mr. Waller, in several Copies of Verses, under the Name of Sacbarissa, the most celebrated in his Poems: She was likewise remarkable for Constancy and Love to her Lord; for tho' she was left a very young Widow, yet she entertain'd Thoughts of a 2d Marriage, but liv'd retir'd. a rare Example of all Christian Virtues. Her House at Althorp, (Wormleighton being burnt by the Rebels 19 January 1645) was a Sanctuary to the loyal Sufferers and learned Clergymen in the Reign of King Charles the 1st, and the following Usurpation; neither did the Poor know the Want of her Charity. She departed this Life at and was bury'd by her Lord at Brinton 25 February 1682: They left Islue only two Daughters and an

Robert Earl of Sunderland, brought up under the Tuition of Dr. Pierce, (s) who gives this Character of him: "That his choice Endowments of Nature having been happily season'd and crown'd with Grace, gave him at once such a Willingness and Aptness to be taught, as reconcil'd his greatest Pains with Ease and Pleasure, and made the Education of his dear Lord not so much his Employment as his Recreation and Reward.

This Earl was Principal Secretary of State to King Charles the 2d, (t) and one of his prime Mi-Y 4 nifters.

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nisters: He likewise bore the same Employment in the Reign of King James the 2d, and was also President of the (u) Council, and Knight of the most noble Order of the Garter. He was likewise in the special Favour of King William, who constituted him Lord Chamberlain of his Houshold; and, on his faid Majesty's leaving the Kingdom in the Year 1697, he was one of the Lords Justices for the Administration of the Government, during his Absence. He departed this Life at his Seat at Althorp, the 28th of September, 1702; and the 7th of October following, had Sepulture with his Ancestors at Brinton. Anne, his Lady, surviv'd him 'till the 16th of April 1715, and the 26th of the same Month was bury'd by him. She was youngest Daughter to the Right Honourable George, (Digby) the last Earl of Bristol, and they had Issue that liv'd to Maturity, two Sons and two Daughters; whereof

Charles, the present Earl of Sunderland, succeeded his Father. He was chosen, as soon as he came of Age, a Member of the House of Commons; and, in June 1705; was fent Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Emperor of Germany, to make the Compliments of Condolance on the Death of the Emperor Leopold the 1st; and to endeavour, by the Queen's Mediation, to compose the Differences between his Imperial Maiesty and his Subjects in Hungary; (w) pursuant to which, a Treaty was fet on Foot at Tyrnau the 28th of October; and after several Conferences with Count Berezini, and other Hungarian Deputies, he return'd to Vienna to acquaint his Imperial Majesty with his Negociations: At which Time

Time meeting his Grace the Duke of Marlborough. (who, after the Campaign, came to confer with his Imperial Majesty) his Lordship, with his Grace, on the 22d of November the same Year. fet out for the Court of Berlin; and after the Fatigue of a Journey of 532 Miles in eight Days, in a very hard Season, arriv'd there, and went to Court the same Night; his Majesty of Prusha receiving them with the greatest Esteem and Honour.

On the 6th of December, his Lordship, with his Grace, arriv'd at Hanover, where they were kindly and graciously receiv'd by his Electoral Highness, (our present most Gracious Sovereign) the Electress Dowager, &c. and after some Conferences there, and at the Hague, they embarqu'd, and arriv'd in England the 30th of Decemb.

The Year following his Lordship was (x) sworn one of her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy-Council, and one of her Principal Secretaries of State; and was also one of the Commissioners for treating of a Union between England and Scotland; and the Articles concluded on, were ratify'd and confirm'd. In 1710, on the Change of Measures at Court, he was remov'd from being Secretary of State, without any Blemish on his Character; (y) and her Majesty, as a Testimony of her being satisfy'd with his Services, was pleas'd to fend him Word, That she design'd to present him with 3000 l. per Ann. for bis Life; but his Lordship, with a Generosity and Integrity, hardly parallel'd in these corrupt Times, answer'd, He was glad ber Majesty was satisfy'd be bad done bis Duty, but if be

could not have the Honour to ferve his Country, be

would not plunder it.

At his present Majesty's first coming to the Council Board, the 22d of September 1714, he was sworn of the Privy-Council, and declar'd Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland; but tho' his ill State of Health would not permit his going over, yet he was watchful for the Good of that Kingdom; and, by his Interest, Matters were manag'd with such Prudence and Discretion, that no Disturbance happen'd there when the Rebellion broke out in England.

February 10,  $17\frac{1}{16}$ , he was constituted Joint Vice-Treasurer of Ireland with Henry Earl of Rochester; and, in May following, on the Death of the Lord Somers, elected one of the Governours of the Charter-House; a Trust which none have of late been chosen to, but of the Prime Nobility, and chief Officers of State: Also in July, the same Year, (1716) made sole Vice-Treasurer of Ireland for Life, and embarking about the same Time with his Majesty for Holland, waited on him to Hanover, return'd with him to England, and soon after was again sworn Principal Secretary of State.

March the 16th, 17:7, he was declar'd Lord President of the Council; and on the 23d of the same Month, constituted first Lord-Commissioner of the Treasury, and resigning his Place of Lord-President of the Council, he was made Groom of the Stole to his Majesty, whom he waited on at Hanover in the Year 1719; and, on his Return, was elected one of the Knights of the Most Noble Order of the Garter. In all these honourable Offices, his Lordship has shew'd a generous Concern for the Good of his Country, and an Integrity superior to private Views: Inheriting the Spirit and Virtues of his Great Ancestors.

Having

Having thus trac'd the principal Branch, from Sir John Spencer, the eldest Son of Sir John Spencer, (by Catherine his Wife, Daughter of Sir Thomas Kitson) I now return to the 2d Son, which was, Thomas Spencer of Glaverdon, in Com. Warw. Life. who having purchas'd the said Manour of the Crown, built a fine House there; and, for the Hospitality he kept thereat, (says (z) Sir William Dugdale) was the Mirrour of that Country. He dy'd without Issue, and lyes bury'd under a noble Monument erected to his Memory in that Church. His Estate, by his own Settlement, devolv'd on the Spencers of Tarnton, descended from William, his Brother, who was ad Son of the said Sir John, of whom I am principally to treat. Richard, the 4th, of Offley, in Com. Hertford, was Ancestor (a) to Sir Brocket Spencer, created a Baronet by King Charles the 1st.

The said William Spencer (3d Son of Sir John) posses'd a fine Estate (b) at Tarnton, in Com. Oxon, and receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood from Queen Elizabeth in the Year 1592: He dy'd on the 18th of December 1609, and lyes bury'd with his Lady. under a curious Altar-Monument rais'd against the North Wall, near the East Window of the South Chancel of the Church of Tarnton; which is compos'd of different Sorts of Marble, and adorn'd with Arms of War; as Battle-Axes, Swords. Carbines, Standards, Sheafes of Arrows, &c. On the Tomb, under an Arch, lyes the Figure of a Knight on his Back, compleatly arm'd, (excepting his Head Peice) and his Lady on his left Hand in the Habit of the Times. His Head rests on a Griphon's

phon's Head, (his Crest) and hers on a Pillow, with their Hands in a devout Posture. The Arch is supported by four Pillars of the Corintbian Order; and at the Top, between two Pyramids, is a Shield of the Quarterings of Arms belonging to the Family, viz. 7 Coats. On the Side of the Tomb is a Tablet, and two Men kneeling on Cushions, on the right Side thereof; as also four Women on the Lest: And another Tablet under the Arch, exhibits this Inscription in gilt Letters.

Syr William Spencer, Knight, Lord of this Manour, third Sonne of Sr. John Spencer, of Althorp, in the Countie of Northampton, Knt. here resteth, with Margaret his Vise, Daughter of Francis Bowier of Middlesex, Esquier, leaving Issue two Sonnes and five Daughters: They both, as they virtuously and laudably lived, so, in assured Hope to live eternally in Christ, ended this transitory Life; he the 18th of December 1609, she the 19th of June 1608.

On the Tablet mention'd to be between the two Men and four Women, is an Inscription in Capitals, setting forth their Marriages and Issue, viz.

Syr Thomas Spencer, Sonue and Heir, married Margaret, Daughter of Richard Brainthwait, Serjeant at the Lawe; George Spencer,
Second Sonne; Elizabeth, eldest Daughter,
Wyse to Syr Thomas Russel of Strensham, in
the Countie of Worcester, Knight; Katherine,
Second Daughter, Wyse to Sr. Henry Mountague, Knight, the King's Serjeant at Lawe;
[who was created Earl of Manchester, Ancestor
to Charles the present Earl] Mary, third
Daughter, Wife to Syr Maximilian Dalyson.

of Haling, in the Countie of Kent, Knight; Alice, fourth Daughter, Wife to Syr Thomas Colvyle of Newton, in the Countie of Cambridge, Knight; Margaret, fifth Daughter,

Wife to Sir John Woodward of Evesham, in

' the Countie of Worcester, Knight.

Sir Thomas Spencer, before-mention'd, (Son and Heir of Sir William) fucceeding at Tarnton, was created a Baronet the 29th of June, A.D. 1611, in the 9th Year of the Reign of King James the 1st; also on the 24th of May (c) the Year following, was honour'd with Knighthood at Whitehall with Sir Lyonel Talmach, Bart. He rebuilt (d) the Tower at the West End of Tarnton Church; as also a noble Manour-House near the old one, by the faid Church. This Sir Thomas was famous in his Time (e) for the great Hospitality he kept there, his Charity to the Poor, and other excellent Qualities. He departed this Life on the 16th of August 1622, and was bury'd by his Father. His Lady, who furviv'd him, was marry'd, 2dly, to Richard Butler, Viscount Montgarret, and was bury'd at Tarnton in the Year 1655. By her first Husband she had Issue Sir William Spencer, Kt. and Bart. as also 4 other Sons, John, Thomas, Richard, and Edward, with 4 Daughters, Alice, Anne, Margaret, and Catherine.

Sir William Spencer, after he became a Baronet, was (as his Father had been) knighted by King Charles the 1st at (f) Oxford, 27 August 1629, and succeeding to the Estate of his Great Unkle, Thomas Spencer of Claverdon, in Com. Warw. was thereby possess'd of a very great Inheritance. He

### Thomas Spencer, E/q;

took to Wise Constance, eldest Daughter of Sir Thomas Lucy of Charlecote, in Com. Warw. Kt. (who was, in 2d Marriage, the Wise of Sir Edward Smith, Kt.) and had Issue a Son, Sir Thomas Spencer, Bart. and a Daughter, Alice, marry'd to Francis Keyt of Mecleton, in Gloucestershire, Esq., Brother to Sir John Keyt of Ebrington, in the same County, Bart.

Sir Thomas Spencer, Bart. took to Wife Jane, Daughter of Sir John Garrard of Lamer, in Com Hertf. Bart. and was bury'd with his Ancestors at Tarnton, under a noble and curious Monument of white Marble, erected to his Memory, against the North Wall of the South Chancel. It reprefents the Statues of Seven Persons in full Proportion, in modern Drefses. His own Figure stands on a Pedestal, with his Lady's on his Right Hand; the Figure of his Son is plac'd on his left, and on her right Hand sits a Daughter lamenting, and under her another Daughter. On the Son's left Hand is also a Daughter; and under her another, all Weeping. Under Sir Thomas Spencer is a Tablet, representing the Inscription hereafter-mention'd; and on the right Side of the Tablet, under the Statue of the first Daughter, is another kneeling, her Hand reposed on a Skull; and, beneath her is another praying, laying her Hand on an Hour-Glass; and lower is another. Over all is a Shield of the Arms and Quarterings of the Family; and the Inscription on the Tablet is as follows:

Having already treated of this Family Page 64, wherein I proposed to deduce the Defcent of Sir John Peyton, Kt. 2d Son of Sir Robert, and having therein mentioned the faid Sir John to marry Dorothy, Daughter of Sir Robert Tindal, I find

I find it a Mistake, for it should be Sir John Tindal, Knight of the Bath at the Coronation of Queen Anne Bullen.

Which Sir John Peyton had by Gift of his Father the Manors of Calthorpe, in Burnam St. Martyns, and Knowlton, (a) in the County of Kent; and by the aforesaid Lorothy his Wife, left Issue 2 Sons, Thomas, and John, who was a Person of great Note, and an eminent Soldier in the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, as I shall make appear when I treat of him and his Descendants that were created Baronets by King Charles the 2d, of whom Sir Sewster Peyton of Donnington, in the Isle of Ely,

is now living.

The faid Thomas, eldest Son and Heir of Sir fucceeded to the Estate at Knowlton. and was one of those that receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood (at the Tower, May 4. 1603) from King Fames the 1st, before his Coronation. departed this Life in the Year 1611, and was bury'd at Knowlton, leaving by Anne his Wife, Daughter of Sir Martyn Calthorpe, Kt. Lord-Mayor of London, 4 Daughters that marry'd; and Sir Samuel Peyton, Kt. his Son and Heir. He receiv'd Knighthood May 15, 1608; and in the same Year his Father deceas'd, was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet: He had Issue by Mary his Wife, eldest Daughter, and one of the Heirs of Sir Roger Ashton, Kt. 3 Sons and 3 Daughters; whereof Anne, the eldest, marry'd Henry Oxenden of Herne, in Kent, Esq, Of the Sons, Samuel, the 2d, dy'd unmarry'd; Edward, the youngest, left Issue a Son, that lost his Life in the Dutch Wars.

Thomas, the eldest, succeeded to the Estate at Knowlton, and to his Father's Title. He gave early Demonstrations of his Affections to King Charles the 1st, and hazarded his Fortune in his Ser-

Service: He endeavour'd all he could, to bring the County of Kent (in which he had a good Interest) to join against the Rebels; but being overpower'd, he was taken Prisoner, and committed to the Tower; and from thence, was transported to Fersey: He remain'd 8 Years in Durance, 'till after the Death of his Sovereign, when he was fet at Liberty, and permitted to compound for his Estate; and then retiring to his Sear at Knowlton, was still active in the Royal Cause: The Hardships he had undergone, heightning his Displeasure against the Party that oppress'd him; and tho' he was wary in attempting any Thing against them without a Probability of Success, yet he kept a constant Correspondence with King Charles the 2d, in his Exile; and the Friends of that King in England, entrusted him in all their Transactions, and pursu'd his Advice in many weighty Points. The King was so entirely satisfy'd in his Abilities and Conduct, that he nominated him [by Patent bearing Date at Brussels March 11, 1659.] among Commissioners, whom he impower'd to treat with his Subjects. and engage as many of them as they could in his Service. In which Commission, he, with others, were so active, and proceeded with that Wariness and Diligence, that most of the Nobility and Gentry in England were engag'd, and a Day in July (b) fix'd for their Rising; but the Defeat of Sir George Booth and his Party, who were in Arms before the Day prefix'd, crush'd their Design. However, Sir Thomas Peytou's Zeal and Diligence met with a Reward from the King, who, by Patent dated at Bruffels, granted him a third Part of the Farm of the Revenue arising by the Duty on Coals. The Restoration soon after ensuing, he waited on his Majesty in Kent, when

when he pass'd thro' that County from Holland, and was very graciously receiv'd, and grew so much in his Favour, that he might have had what he pleas'd; but he chose to live at Ease in the latter Part of his Life, and contented himself in the Enjoyment of the politest Company of that Age, being every Way so much a Gentleman, that his Conversation was coveted and admir'd by all. He departed this Life Anno—and was bury'd in Westminster-Abbey, leaving no Male Issue, so that the Title became extinct.

His first Wise was ———, Daughter of Sir Peter Osborn, by whom he had 3 Daughters, that liv'd to Womens Estate; Dorothy, the eldest, marry'd Sir Bazil Dixwell of Bromebouse, in Kent, Bart. and was Mother of the present Sir Bazil Dixwell, Bart. Lieutenant of Dover-Cassle, and

Auditor of the Revenue of the Excise.

Catharine, 2d Daughter marry'd Sit Thomas Longville of Wolverton, in Com. Bucks, Bart. of Nova Scotia, and dy'd about fix Weeks after.

Elizabeth, youngest Daughter, marry'd William Longville of the Inner-Temple, Esq. and deceas'd

Anno 1715, leaving one Son, Charles.

Sir Thomas, by his 2d Wife Esther, Relict of Sir William Swan, had Issue one Son, Thomas, who dy'd of the Small-Pox about Years of Age, and a Daughter Esther, who marry'd Thomas Sandys, Esq.

William Morysine, or Morison, (a) of this Family, possess'd Lands at Chardwell, in Com. Ebor, about the Reign of King Hen. 6, which descended to a Son of his own Name, living at the same Place, who by Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter of Roger Leigh of Preston, in Com. Ebor, had Issue Thomas Morysine of Chardwell, and afterwards of the County of Hertford; and marrying a Daughter of Thomas Merry of Hatseild, in the said County, had 2 Sons, Richard and Fines, and a Daughter—marry'd to Stephen Hales of Coventry.

Fines brought up in University - Learning was Fellow of Peter-House in Oxford; and after having taken his Master's Degree, study'd the Civil Law; and in 1589, at the Age of 22 Years. obtain'd License of the Master and Fellows of his House to travel; (b) and leaving the University, went to London to follow such Studies that might be of Use to him in his Course of Travels. embark'd at Leigh in Essex, May 1, 1591; and after spending 7 Years in foreign Countries, return'd into Ireland Anno 1598, and became Secretary to Sir Charles Blunt, Lord Lieutenant of that Realm. After his Death, which happen'd about 1614, were publish'd his Travels in a thick Fol. entitled An Itinerary; containing bis ten Tears Travels thro' the twelve Dominions of Germany, Bohmerland, Switzerland, Netherland, Denmark, Poland, England, Scotland, and Ireland, divided in three Parts, Lond. 1617.

1617, first written in Latin, and afterwards

translated into English.

Sir Richard Morysine, or Morison, his Brother. spent likewise several Years in the University of Oxford, took a Degree in Arts, afterwards travell'd. and making great Improvement in the Latin and Greek Tongues, became an accomplish'd Gentleman, and well known among the Great Men of his Time. In 1537, July 17, he (being newly return'd from Padua) was made Prebendary of Tatminster secunda, in the Church of Salisbury, and being at length recommended to King H. 8, as a Person of Worth and Parts, was sent by him Embassador to the Emperor Charles the 5th; as he was afterwards by King Edw. 6. At which Time. he shew'd himself a great Friend to, and a Protector of Pet. Martyr, when he encounter'd the Triumviri in a folemn Disputation in the Divinity-School; afterwards having the Honour of Knighthood conferr'd on him, went into Italy; and before his Return, dy'd at Strasburgh in Germany, (being there in voluntary Exile for the Protestant Religion) March 17, 1565. He wrote several Things; was esteem'd a very learned Man; an Encourager of Learning, and very liberal to several noted Scholars: He obtain'd by his own Endeavours (c) a fair Estate, as the Manor of Whitesbury or Whichbury, with all its Appurtenances, in Wilts and Hampshire; the Manor of East-Chinolk in Somersetshire, the Manor of Cashiobury in Hertfordsbire: (where he had begun to build a stately House) All which descended to his Posterity. He had a natural Son nam'd Marcellus Moryfine; and by Bridget his Wife, Daughter of John Lord Huffer; (who afterwards marry'd Henry Earl of Rutland, and after him, Francis Earl of Bedford)

ford) one Son, Charles, and 3 Daughters; Elizabeth, Wife of William Norrys, who afterwards marry'd Henry Clinton, Earl of Lincoln. Mary, who marry'd Bartholomew Hales of Chesterseild, and Jane, wedded to Edward Lord Russel, who dy'd without Issue in the Life-time of his Father, Francis Earl of Bedford.

Which Charles Morrison, aforesaid, Son and Heir of Sir Richard, receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood from Queen Elizabeth, and finish'd the House his Father began, at Cashiobury, in the Parish of Watford, a stately Structure in the midst of a Park with beautiful Gardens and Wood-walks. that were much improv'd by the late Earl of Essex, to whom the Estate descended; as will hereafter be mention'd. This Sir Charles Morrifon lies bury'd in Watford Church, on the South Side of a Chapel (in the Chancel) which he had built, and a noble Monument is erected to his Memory: On each Side, two Angels founding Trumpets, a double Arch underneath, which were five Cherubins; and a Table within the Arch, with this Inscription:

## Non Humilii Serpit alata Virtus.

And the Outsides of these Arches are supported two Marble Pillars; and between them are two Tables of black Marble, and this Inscription engrav'd in the first Table.

## Virtuti, Honori & aterna Memoria

In the other Table, is this Inscription:

Underneath these two Tables, his Portraiture lies drawn in Armour, leaning upon his left Elbow, with his Hand upon the Hilt of his Sword; and under that, are two small Tables in Marble, with this Inscription on the first Table:

Patrem babuit, amplissimum virum, Dominum Richardum Morisonum, Equitem Auratum, omnit nobiliori Literatura instructissimum, Smultis apud Casarem, aliosque Orbis Christiani Principes Legationibus magna cum laude defunctum.

On the other Table is written,

Matrem, illustrem Heroinam, Dominam Brigidiam, Johannis Baronis Hussey Filiam, Rutlandia & deinde Bedfordia dotali jure Comitissam.

At the End of this Monument stands the Portraiture of Sir Charles Moryson in Armour, (who was his Son) kneeling on his Knee, with a Canopy over Y hi

a Canopy over her Head.

The said Sir Charles Moryson (Son and Heir of Sir Charles) was made Knight of the Bath at the Coronation of King James I, and was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet 29 June, A. D. 1611, and leaving Issue an only Daughter, (from whom the present Earl of Essex is descended) the Title expir'd with him; his Character, Marriage, and Issue, is set forth by two Inscriptions on a sumptuous Monument, in Watford Church, Com. Hertf. erected to the Memory of him and his Lady, with their Effigies curiously wrought in Marble; as also the Effigies of two Sons that dy'd young. and the Daughter before-mention'd. On a Table.

within an Arch, is this Inscription:

Sir HENRY BAKER of SISING-HURST, Kt. Kent. Nº64.

THIS Family has been eminent in the County of Kent, ever fince the Reign of King Y 2

. Hen. 8, when Sir John Baker was Chancellor of the Exchequer, and one of his Privy-Council. He was sent Embassador in the Year 1526 jointly with Henry Standish, Bishop of St. Asaph, to Denmark; (a) before which Time he had received the Honour of Knighthood, and was afterwards made Chancellor, in which Post he continu'd 'til his Death. He was the only Privy-Counsellor that refus'd figning King Edward's Will, fetting afide the Succession of his Sisters, Mary and Elizabeth; (b) for which Reason, when Queen Mary ascended the Throne, she likewise continu'd him Chancellor of the Exchequer, and swore him of her Privy-Council; but no other Preferment was conferr'd on him, by Reason (I presume) of his not complying with her in Religion. He dy'd the same Year that Queen deceas'd, (c) and was succeeded in his Seat and Estate at Sisingburst in Kent, by Richard his Son and Heir, by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter and Heir of John Dingley, Relict of George Barret, by whom he had likewise John Baker of London, who had Issue Sir Richard Baker of Highgate, in Com. Midd. knighted at Theobald's May the 7th. 1602, Author of the Chronicle of the Kings of England, and several He was educated in Hart-Hall in Treatifes. Oxford; and in 1620, was High Sheriff of Oxfordhire, being then Lord of the Manor of Middle-Aston, and other Lands in that County; but having thro' Suretiship (d) much impair'd his Estate, and undergone many Cares and Troubles, he departed this Life the 18th of February 1644, in the Fleet Prison, and was bury'd in St. Bride's Church near Fleet-fireet, London. By his Wife Margaret, Daughter of Sir George Manwaring of Igbt-

Ightfeild in Shropshire, Kt. he had Issue 2 Sons,

Thomas and Arthur, and 3 Daughters.

Richard, the eldest Son of Sir John Baker, resided at Sisingburst, received the Honour of Knighthood, and was sworn of the Privy-Council to Queen Eliz. He marry'd two Wives; Mary, Daughter of — Gifford, by whom he had 2 Daughters, Grisogna, Wife of Henry Lennard. Lord Dacres, and Cecilia, Wife of Sir Richard Blount, Kt. Mother of Sir Charles Blount. By Catharine, his fecond Wife, Daughter and Heir of John Tirrel of Heron in Effex, he had 2 Sons, John, and Thomas Baker, who was knighted by King Fames the Ist, at the Charter-House, 1603; and was seated at Witingbam in Com. Suff. and had Issue by Constantia his Wife, Daughter of Sir William King smill, Kt. 2 Sons, Thomas and Richard. and 2 Daughters.

John, eldest Son of Sir Richard, had the Estate at Sisinghurst, and by Mary his Wife, Daughter of Sir Thomas Guildford of Guildford in Kent, had Issue

2 Sons, Henry and Edward.

Henry, the eldest, succeeded to the Estate at Sisingburst in Kent, and having been knighted, was afterwards advanced to the Dignity of a Baronet 29 June 1611. He marry'd Catharine, Daughter of Sir John Smith of the County of Kent, Kt. but the Title has been extinct in this Family many Years.

Family of this Name was anciently feated A in the Western Parts of England, bearing Arms Or, a Fess Sable between three Apples Vert; and in Torksbire, are 7 Towns call'd Appleton, in Lancashire one, and another in Norfolk, which last, I conceive, gave Appellation to this Family; some of whom were seated at Wadding feild-Magna in that County, in which Church lay John Appulton, who dy'd 14 H. 4, A. D. 1416, who, as Principal of the Lineage, bore Three Apples Gules, Leaves and Stalks Vert. Near whom also were several others interr'd, viz. John Appulton, who dy'd the 9th of April 1481, and Margaret his Wife, who dy'd the 4th of July A. D. 1468. Thomas Appulton of Waldingfeild-Magna, dy'd the 4th of October A. D. 1507. Margery Appulton dy'd the 4th of Nov. A. D. 1504, and Robert Appulton, Gent. the 27th of Aug. 1526. Roger Appulton, 12 of H. 6, was return'd by the Commissioners among the Gentry of the County of Kent, and was doubtless a Descendant from the

the Wadding feild Stem. But how transplanted this ther, we know not, unless by the Marriage of

Isaac, a Kentish Family.

Thomas Appleton, of the County of Kent, marry'd Joyce, Daughter of Sir Robert Tirrel of Heron, Kt. with whom he had the Manor of South-Bemfleet in Essex, which came inter alia to the said Sir John Tyrrel, by Marriage with Eleanor, one of the Daughters and Co-heirs of Sir William Coggeshal, Kt. a Descendant from John de Coggeshal, who dy'd seiz'd of the said Manor 25 Edw. 3. (a) The said Roger had Issue by the aforesaid Mar. riage, Roger Appleton of Durford in Kent, Esq. his Son and Heir, who had also the Manor of South-Bemfleet, in the Hundred of Bail-flable. He marry'd Anne, Daughter of John Selyard of Wetherden, in Com. Suff. and had Issue by her Henry Appleton, his Son and Heir, of Darford and South-Bemfleet aforesaid, Esq. who had in Marriage Margaret, Daughter of John Roper of Kent, Esq. Attorney-General to King Hen. 8, from whom proceeded a Son and a Daughter, Roger and Margaret, Wife of John Ufflet of Somerton, in Com. Suff. Gent.

Roger, only Son, succeeded his Father, [Henry Appleton] in his Estate, and espous'd Agnes, Daughter of William Clarke, Sister and Heir of Walter Clarke of Hadley, in Com Suff. which Marriage producd four Daughters and 5 Sons; 1st, Henry; 2d, William Appleton of Kettlebaston in Com. Suff. Ancestor to a Family at that Place; 2d, Roger; 4th, John; and 5th. Edward. The said Roger was knighted, and dy'd the 27th of Feb. 4 and 5 Queen Mary, (as appears by Inquisition taken the 6th of June, 2d of Queen Eliz.) and left Henry, his Son and

Heir, aged 18 at the Time of Enquiry.

Which Henry Appleton having marry'd Faith, Daughter of William Cardinal of Great Bromley in Com. Effex, Gent. had Issue 2 Sons, Roger and Edward; also a Daughter Edith. He dy'd the 2d of Novemb. 4 Jac. 1. at which Time, Roger, his Son and Heir, was of the Age of 35 Years.

Which Roger being possess of the Manor of South-Bemsleet, &c. in Essex, and likewise of Lands in Kent, was advanced to the Dignity of a Baronet A.D. 1611, and departing this Life in the Year 1614, left Issue by Anne his Wise, Daughter of Sir Thomas Mildmay of Moulsham in Essex, Ancestor to the Lords Fitz-Walter, (who was afterwards Wise of John Paschall of Badow in Essex) a Daughter marry'd to Francis Goldsmith of Darford in Kent, Esq, and a Son,

had Issue by her (as I presume)

Sir Henry Appleton, Bart. who marry'd Magdalen, Daughter of Sir John Wats, Kt. Lord-Mayor of London, and was Father of Sir William Appleton, Bart. who had a Son Sir Henry Appleton, Bart. who marry'd a mean Woman, (and, as I am inform'd) run out the whole Estate, and departing this Life about the Year 1709, left a Son, an Infant, whose Name I can't learn.

THIS Family (of very good Antiquity in the County of Kent) was anciently seated near Romney-Marsh, where there are Lands now call'd Sidley's, and Sidley's Marsh; and afterwards fix'd at Southsseet in the said County, and built a Mansion-Seat there, temp. Edw. 3, as appears by their Arms in an old Hall, and the Date 1337. (a)

John Sidley of Southfleet, was Auditor of the Exchequer; and by his first Wife Elizabeth, Daughand Co-heir to Roger Jenkes of London, had Issue two Sons. William, eldest Son, High Sheriss of Kent, 1 E. 6; and Martin Sidley of Morley in Norfolk, who marry'd the Daughter and Heir to Mountney of Mountneysing, in Essex; and, by her, was Ancestor to the Sidleys of Norf.

William Sidley aforesaid, marry'd the Daughter and Heir to Roger Grove of London; and had Issue, Sir John Sidley of Southsteet, and Nicholas, who marry'd Jane, Daughter and Heir of Edward Isaack,

and was Father to Sir Isaac Sidley of Great Chart, who was created to the Title of Baronet the 14th of Sept. 1621, of whom and his Descendants, Mention will be made in the proper Place.

Sir John Sidley, of Southfleet aforesaid, was High Sheriff of Kent 9 Eliz. and by Anne his Wite, Daughter of John Colepepper, had Issue three Sons: 1st, William, 2d, Richard of Southfleet, and 3d, John.

William; (eldest Son of Sir John) was created (b) Baronet A. D. 1611, and resided at the Fryars in Ailesford, the fair Habitation, saith Dr. Holland (in his Additions to Cambden) of Sir William Sidley, painfully and expencefully studious of the common Good of his Country, as both his endow'd House for the Poor, and the Bridge there, with the common Voice, do testify. He marry'd Elizabeth, Relict of Henry Lord Bergaveny, and Daughter of Stephen Darell of Horsmanden in Kent, Esq, and lest Issue Sir John Sidley, Bart. who, by Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter and sole Heir of the learned Sir Henry Savile, Kt. had Issue three Sons that succeeded to the Title and Estate, viz. Sir William, Sir Henry, and Sir Charles Sidley; the two first dy'd unmarry'd.

Sir Charles was a posthumous Son; a most ingenious Gentleman; who has given the World a Specimen of his Wit and Gallantry, in several Poems, Letters, and Speeches, that he left behind him both in Print and Manuscript: He marry'd Catherine, 3d Daughter to John Savage, Earl Rivers, and had no other Legitimate Issue but one

Daughter, so that the Title is extinct.

The said Katherine his Daughter, was created for Life (the 20th of Jan. 1 Jac. 2 1685) to the Title of Countess of Dorchester, and Baroness of Darlington, in Com. Dunelm. She is now marry d to Sir David Collyer, Kt. (created Baron Portmore of.

Adam de Twisden was living there 21 Edw. I, and dying without, Issue, John, his Brother and Heir, succeeded to the Estate; and by Christiana his Wife, had Issue Thomas, de Twisden, who is

Which Roger Twisden, Esq, in the Reign of King Rich. 2, was Steward of the Abby of St. Augustine, a Place of great Trust in those Times; (as Mr. Philpot observes) (b) and in the 5th Year of King Hen. 4, affix'd to a Deed the Signature or Impression of a Cockatrice in Wax, which at this Time is the Crest, annex'd to the Paternal Coat of the Family. He was also living in the Reign of Hen. 5, as appears by several Charters (c) with the same Seal appendant. Having marry'd the Daughter and Heir of Tho. Chelmington of Chelmington, in Great Chart in Kent, the Manor of that Name accru'd to him; and Roger Twisden, his Son and Heir, made it his Residence.

This Roger was 50 Years old 18 H.6, as appears by an Inquisition; and by Anne his Wife, one of the Daughters and Co-heirs of John Baker of Coldham, in Folkdeston in Kent, had Issue a Son, Thomas, who

succeeded him in his Estate.

William Twysden of Chelmington, Esq. (eldest Son of Roger) encreas'd his Patrimony very considera. bly; for by Marriage with Elizabeth, Daughter and Co-heir of Thomas Roydon of Roydon-Hall in East Peckbam in Kent, (by Margaret Wheatenball his Wife) he came posses'd of her Father's Estate: (the Seat of his Posterity to this Time) and his Wife surviving him, was afterwards marry'd to Cuthhert Vaughan, Esq., and lastly to Sir Thomas Golding, Kt. She dy'd Aug. 19, 1595, aged 73, and lies bury'd in Peckbam Church. under a Monument erected to her Memory; she left two Children by her first Husband, viz. a Daughter Margaret, marry'd to Richard Deering of Pluckley in Kent, Esq, and a Son, Roger Twisden, of Roydon-Hall, Esq. who was High Sheriff of Kent 41 of Queen Eliz. and having marry'd Anne. eldest Daughter of Sir Thomas Wyat, Kt. (who was beheaded in Queen Mary's Time, 1553) had Issue 3 Daughters: Elizabeth, Wife of John Ashburnham of Brombam, in Sussex; Margaret, of Henry Fane of Hadlome in Kent; and Bennetta, of-Bathurst of the same County, Esqs, also 2 Sons, William and Thomas. The said Roger, and Anne his Wife, lie bury'd in Peckbam Church; a fair Monument being erected to their Memory; and the Inscription thereon informs us, that they were both born on the same Day, in 1542, and that she dy'd June 4, 1592, aged 50; and he, in Nov. 1603, aged 61; and farther fayeth, That in

in their Lives they were bless'd of God, and belov'd of Men.

William Twisden, Esq; eldest Son and Heir, succeeded to the Estate at Roydon-Hall, and was knighted by King James at the Charter-House the 11th of May 1603, being among those that conducted him to London when he came first from Scotland, to take Possession of the English Crown; and that King afterwards advanc'd him to the Dignity of a Baronet A.D. 1611. He had a learned Education, and was well read in the Hebrew and Greek Languages, which inclin'd him to the purchasing many valuable Manuscripts and Books; for being of a fober Disposition, he knew the Value of the Improvement of the Mind; and having excellent Parts, he determin'd to make himself useful to his Country, both in his Studies, and the Choice of his Company; he set a good Example to the Age he liv'd in, and many were edify'd by his Conversation. The Collections he made, were likewise of Use to the Publick, both in Defence of the Reform'd Protestant Religion, and the ancient Constitutions of the Kingdom. He liv'd to the 63d Year of his Age, when he dy'd much lamented, Jan. 8, 1627, and Anne, his Lady, who survived him, follow'd Novemb. A, 1638, aged 64. was Daughter of Sir Moyle Finch of Eastwell in Kent, Kt. and Bart. and her Mother, who was the sole Daughter of Sir Thomas Heneage, Kt. (Treasurer of the Chamber, Vice-Chamberlain of the Houshold, Chancellor of the Dutchies of Lancafter, and one of the Privy Counsellors to Queen Elizabeth) was a Lady of such excellent Endowments, that King James the 1st advanc'd her to the Dignity of Viscountess of Maidstone; and King Charles the 1st to a higher Title, creating her Countess of Winchelsea; which Honours, were limited to the Heirs of her Body; and the Earls

Farls of Winchelsea, Nottingham, and Aylesford, descend from her.

Sir William Twysden had Issue 5 Sons and two Daughters, that liv'd to Maturity:

1st, Roger, his Successor.

2d, Thomas, who was brought up in the Study of the Law; and on the Restauration of King Charles the 2d, made one of the Justices of the King's-Bench; and being seated at Bradburn in Kent, was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet; of whom, and his Descendants, Mention will be made in the proper Place.

3d William, who dy'd unmarry'd July the 30th,

1641, aged 36, and lies bury'd at Bath.

4th, John, who was a Fellow of the College of Physicians at London, took his Doctor's Degree in the Faculty, and was a Person of general Learning, as his Works, both in Physick and Mathematicks, which are printed, testify. He likewise wrote A Disquisition touching the Sybills and Sibbilline Writings, &c. (c) and having liv'd unmarry'd to a great Age, (81) dyd Sept. the 13th, 1688, and receiv'd Sepulture in St. Margaret's Church Westminster.

5th, Francis, who also deceas'd unmarry'd, aged 63, and was bury'd A. D. 1675, in East-Malling Church in Kent, in a Vault where his Brother,

Judge Twisden, was afterwards laid.

Elizabeth Twysden, eldest Daughter, was marry'd to Sir Hugh Cholmley of Whithy in Yorkshire, Bart. and Anne, youngest Daughter, was Wise to Sir Christopher Telverton of Easton Maudnit, in Com. Northamp Bart. Ancestor to the Lord Viscount Longueville; and from a Daughter of the said Lady, the present Earl of Manchester descends.

Sir Roger Twisden, Bart. (eldest Son of Sir William) was 31 Years old at his Father's Death.

He

He obtain'd from King Charles the 1st a Charter of Free Warren, to make the Park the House at Peckham is at present surrounded with. fifted Mr. Philpot in his Survey of Kent; and that Author (f) returns him Acknowledgments, as a Person to whom for his learned Conduct of those his imperfect Labours, thro' the gloomy and perplex'd Paths of Antiquity, and the many Difficulties that assaulted bim, be was signally oblig'd. He was indeed a Person every Way accomplish'd, well vers'd in the learned Languages, and exemplary in his Devotion to the establish'd Church of England. He kept a steady Loyalty to his Prince, and detesting the undutiful Behaviour of many of his Subjects, was not content to fit still, but enter'd with the first in opposing their arbitrary Proceedings, which drew on him a severe Persecution, and he was confin'd 7 Years a Prisoner, his Estate sequester'd, Timber cut down, and a large Fine paid when he was restor'd to his Estate; for the Usurpers permitted him to compound, after they had brought all Things to their own Desire. he came again to his Seat, he liv'd retir'd during those troublesome Times; and his greatest Comfort, was the conversing with the learned Fathers of the Primitive Church, and the ancient Laws and Constitutions of his Country; hoping for a Time when both might be vindicated; which he afterwards saw accomplish'd, having the Satisfaction of seeing the Restoration. the Decem Scriptores appearing in the World, with several other Collections were owing to his Endeavours, and he wrote a learned Preface before them; and was the Author of The Historical Defence of the Church of England. He finish'd his Course in the 75th Year of his Age, 7 June, A.D. 1672,

1672, in the general Esteem of all that knew him, for Sanctity, Innocency, and other Christian Virtues. Isabella, his Wise, youngest Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Nicholas Saunders of Surrey, Kt. (a Lady of rare Patience and Prudence, in struggling thro' many Troubles and Hardships in assisting her Husband in his long Imprisonment) dying before him in the Year 1655, aged 52, and both lie bury'd at Peckham, having Issue 3 Sons and 3 Daughters.

1st, William, who succeeded to the Title and

Estate.

2d, Roger, educated in the Profession of the Law, who dy'd unmarry'd Feb. 20, 1676, aged 35.

3d, Charles, who travell'd to Turkey, the Holy Land, Egypt, and several Courts of Europe; was esteem'd an ingenious Person, and took the Degree of Doctor of Physick: He dy'd unmarry'd in the 45th Year of his Age, A. D. 1690.

Ame, eldest Daughter, was marry'd to John Porter of Lamberburst, in Com. Cantii. Esq, who dying without Issue soon after his Marriage, she

has fince remain'd a Widow.

Isabella, 2d Daughter, is now living unmarry'd. And.

Frances, youngest Daughter, was marry'd to Sir Peter Killigrew of Arwenaek in Cornwall, Kt. and

Bart. and dy'd Anno 1711.

Sir William Twysden, Bart. (eldest Son of Sir Roger) was born in the Year 1635; and by Reason of his Father's Imprisonment, and the Civil Wars, went Abroad very young; and returning back with the Restoration of the King, he liv'd for a short Time in England, and then travell'd a second Time, both in France and Italy, whereby he became an accomplish'd and well-bred Gentleman; and having made many useful Observations on the Manners and Customs of foreign Z

Countries, was the more in Love with his own. He ferv'd in feveral Parliaments, (a) and in the 1st of King James the second was elected one of

the Knights of the Shire for Kent.

He lik'd the Company of fober Persons, and was averse to Excess or Extreams in any Kind. He liv'd as became his Quality, and knew the Bounds between Œconomy and the Extravagancy of the Age. He employ'd his vacant Hours in the noble Library his Father and Grandfather had furnish'd; having the same Honour for Learning and learned Men, and understanding several Languages himself, was delighted in their Conversation.

He dy'd at London November 27, 1697, and was bury'd at Peckham with his Ancestors. His Lady, Frances, Daughter and Heir of Josias Cross, Esq. survives him; a worthy Example in her Love to her Husband, Tenderness for her Children, and Christian Resignation, in patiently bearing the Loss of several of them taken off in the Flower of their Age, in Defence of their Country. They had 9 Sons and 3 Daughters; of whom, those that survived to Maturity, were as follow:

Roger, their eldest Son, was born in 1666, but

dy'd in the Year 1685.

Thomas succeeded to the Title and Estate.

William is the present Baronet.

Charlesdy'd Anno 1698, aged 20.

Heneage was a Captain of Foot in Sir Richard Temple's Regiment, and being Aid-de-Camp to the Duke of Argyle, was mortally wounded in the Battel of Blaregnies, 1709, in the 29th Year-of his Age; to whose Memory, a handsome Monument of black and white Marble is erected in the North Isle of Westminster-Abbey, with the sollowing Inscription:

John, eighth Son, was a Lieutenant in Sir Cloudley Shovel's Ship, and was cast away with him in the 24th Year of his Age. A. D. 1707.

Folias, youngest Son, was a Captain of Foot, and receiv'd a mortal Wound by a Musquet Shot in Flanders, Anno 1708, aged 23. They are both commemorated by Inscriptions on two small neat Tables on each Side the aforesaid Monument in Westminster-Abbey.

Anne, eldest Daughter of Sir William Twysden.

dy'd unmarry'd.

Frances and Isabella are both living.

Sir Tho. Twylden, Bart, (2d, but eldest furviving Son of Sir William) was 21 Years of Age at his Father's Decease: and soon after travell'd into France. during the short Interval of the Peace of Respick. He marry'd (in the Year 1710) Catharine, Daughter and sole Heir of Sir Francis Withers, Kt. one of the Judges in the King's-Bench, and departing this Life the 10th of Odober, 1712, left one Daughter, born in Decemb. 1711; and Catharine, another Daughter, is born fince his Decease; so that the Title and Estate descended to his Brother.

Sir William Twysden, Bart. who hath marry'd Jane, Daughter of Francis Twifden, Esq. youngest Son of Sir Thomas Twysden of Bradburn, Bart. (one of the Justices of the King's-Bench, before-mention'd) and hath Iffue 3 Sons, William, Thomas, and Philip, who was born Sept. 17, 1713; also two

Daughters. Anne and Jenny.

# Sir EDWARD HALES of WOODCHURCH, Kt. Kent. Nº 68

## (eod. Die prad.)

HE Town of Hales in the County of Norfolk, in all Likelyhood, gave Name to this ancient Family; for Roger de Hales (19 H. 2) gave a Tenement, which he was possess'd of in the said Town, to the Abbey of Bungey (a) in that County; and another Roger de Hales, 18 Edw. 1, was return'd by the Sheriff of Norfolk, (b) as a Knight or Freeman, on the Jury, in a Cause between the King, the Bishop of Norwich, and Robert Tateshale, &c. whom I take to be the same Person, whose Daughter Alice was so beautiful, as to captivate Thomas of Brotherton, Earl of Norfolk, and Marshal, one of the younger Sons to King Edward 1; from which Marriage proceeded Margaret, who was created Dutchess of Norfolk for Life, 21 R. 2. from whom, by the Lord Segrave, her Hull and, the illustrious House of the Howards descend, enjoying the Dukedom of Norfolk, and the hereditary Earl-Marshalship of England.

By what Means the Family came into Kent, doth not appear; but that they gave Name to their Habitation in Halden, call'd from them Hales-Place, Mr. Philpot voucheth in his Survey of Kent. From whence, (faith he) as from their Fountain, the several Streams of the Hales's, that in divided Rivulets have spread themselves over the whole County,

did break fortb. (c)

Nicholas Hales of Hales-Place, had Issue Sir Robert Hales, who was Knight-Prior of the Hospital Z 3 of

of St. John of Jerusalem, and Admiral of the North Parts of England in the Reign of K. Edward 3, and was constituted Treasurer of England 1 Feb. 4. R. 2; (d) but in the same Year had the hard Fate, in the Beginning of the Insurrection under Wat Tyler, (call'd afterwards Jack Straw) to be dragg'd from his Habitation, and suffer Death on Tower-Hill, and his House at Hybury, built like another Paradise, was utterly destroy'd in that popular Fury, as the Chronicler testifies. (e)

Sir Nicholas de Hales, Kt. Brother to this Sir Robert, left Issue Thomas de Hales of Hales-Place, who had 3 Sons, 1. John, 2. Thomas, (from whom descended Stephen Hales of Newland in Warwickshire, Son and Heir of Sir Charles Hales, Kt.) 3. Hemy, whose Son George was of Ledenham in Kent, and was Father to Edward Hales of Rumford in Essex.

John, the eldest Son, was possessed of Hales-Place, and was succeeded therein by Henry Hales his Son and Heir, who took to Wife Julian, Daughter and Heir of Richard Capel of Lenden in Tenterden, Esq.; and had Issue two Sons, John hereafter mention'd, and Thomas, who was Father of Sir Christopher Hales, a noted Lawyer in the Reign of K. H. 8, having been Solicitor-General, Attorney-General, and Master of the Rolls to the said King. (f)

John aforetaid (eldest Son and Heir of Henry Hales of Hales-Place) had Issue a Son of his own Name, John Hales, who study'd the Law at Grays-Inn, of which Society he became Autumnal Reader 5 H. 8; and 1 Ostob. 1523, the 14th Year of that King's Reign, was constituted third Baron of the Exchequer, and afterwards, viz. May 14, 1529, 20 Hen. 8, second Baron of the Exchequer. He was seated at the Dungeon near Canterbury, and had Issue James, his Son and Heir. Which

Which James likewise study'd the Law at Grays-Inn, and having been Autumnal Reader, 24 H. 8, was chosen double Lent-Reader, 28 Henry 8, and Serjeant at Law the 35th of that Reign; (8) and was made on the Coronation of King Edw. 6, one of the forty-Knights, after he was crown'd, the Ceremonies of the Bath being omitted for Want of Time. (b) In the 3d Year of that Reign he was constituted one of the Justices of the Common-Pleas, and was the only Judge that refus'd to sub-scribe the King's Will for disinheriting the Ladies Mary and Elizabeth; yet, in the next Reign, by the Influence of Stephen Gardner, Bishop of Winchester, (i) and Lord Chancellor, he was committed to Prison, and hardly us'd, for urging the Observation of some Laws of King Edw. 6; and tho' the Queen, in Consideration of his Fidelity to her Interests, order'd his Release, yet he afterwards grew melancholy, and in that Change drown'd himself, near his House in Kent, Anno 1555. He left Issue by his Wife — Daughter and Heir of Thomas Hales of Henley upon Thames, in Com. Oxon, 2 Sons and a Daughter.

Humphrey, his eldest Son, had the Seat and Eftate of the Dungeon near Canterbury, and was Father to Sir James Hales, knighted by Queen Eliz. at Cobham Hall, in Sept. 1573, Progenitor to seve-

ral Branches of the Hales's in Kent.

Edward, 2d Son of Judge Hales, was seated at Tenterden, and by Margaret his Wise, Daughter to John Honywood of Seen in Kent, had Issue 2 Daughters, Jane, Wise of Sir John Honywood of Elmsted, Kt. and Elizabeth, marry'd to William Austin of Tenterden, Esq.; likewise 2 Sons, John and Edward, who lest no Issue, 3. William, who was Successor both to his Father and Brothers in the Estate at Tenterden; and having marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter to Z a

Paul Johnson of Nethercot in the Isle of Thanet, Esq. had two Daughters, Mary and Elizabeth, and one

Son, Edward.

Which Edward Hales became possess'd of a good Estate, by Marriage with Deborah, Daughter and Heir of Martin Harlackenden of Woodchurch, Esq. and having receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood, was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet 29 June. A. D. 1611. He serv'd in several Parliaments. and being strictly devoted to the Liberty of the Subject, took Part with those that rais'd the Rebellion against King Charles 1. He dy'd in the Year 1654, and lyes bury'd at Tunffal, under a noble Marble Monument, with his Effigies cut in full Proportion. He had Issue by the aforesaid Deborab 4 Sons, John, Samuel, Edward, and Thomas; and having bury'd her, marry'd a 2d Wife, Martha, Daughter of Sir Matthew Carew, Kt. and Relict of Sir James Cromer of Tunstal, Kt. whereby he added a fine Estate to his Family.

John, his eldest Son, having marry'd Christian, one of the Daughters and Co-heirs of the aforesaid Sir James Cromer, dy'd in the Life-time of his Fa-

ther, and left Issue,

Sir Edward Hales, Bart. who, in his younger Years, risqu'd his Person and Fortune, in endeavouring the Rescue of King Charles I, from his Imprisonment in the Isle of Wight, and from the Hands of those desperate Men that brought him to the Scassfold; of which Enterprize my Lord Clarendon gives the following Relation: "Mr. L'Empres [the famous Sir Roger] (says he) (k) had a great Friendship with a young Gentleman, "Mr. Hales, who liv'd in Kent, and was marry'd to a Lady of a noble Birth and Fortune, he besting Heir to one of the greatest Fortunes in that "Country, but was to expect the Inheritance from "the

the Favour of an old severe Grandfather, who, " for the present, kept the young Couple from " running into any Excess; the Mother of the " Lady being of as four and strict a Nature as " the Grandiather, and both of them so much of " the Parliament Party, that they were not wil-" ling any Part of their Estates should be hazard-" ed for the King. At the House of this Mr. " Hales Mr. L'Estrange was, when, by the Com-" munication which that Part of Kent always hath " with the Ships which lye in the Downs, the Re-" port first did arise, That the Fleet would pre-" fently declare for the King; and those Sea-men "which came on Shore, talk'd as if the City of " London would join with them. This drew ma-"ny Gentlemen of the Country, who wish'd " well, to visit the Ships, and they return'd more " confirm'd of what they had heard. Good Fel-" lowship was a Vice spread every where; and " this young great Heir, who had been always " bred among his Neighbours, affected that which "they were best pleas'd with; and so his House " was a Rendezvous for those who delighted in " that Exercise, and who every Day brought him " the News of the good Inclinations of the Fleet " for the King; and all Mens Mouths were full " of the general Hatred the whole Kingdom had " against the Parliament, as well as the Army."

In this Posture of Affairs, Mr. L' Estrange easily induc'd Mr. Hales to put himself at the Head of his own Country, that was willing to be led by him; and his Lady, who was full of Zeal for the King, joining with him, the young Gentleman resolv'd to do somewhat for his Majesty's Service, at a Juncture when the Scots were ready to march into England, and most Parts of the Kingdom ready to rise; but being not enough conversant in the Affairs of the World, he reserr'd himself and the whole

whole Business to be govern'd by Mr. L' Estrange. who was believ'd, by his Discourse, to be an able Soldier. Accordingly, Letters were sent to parti-cular Gentlemen, and Warrants to the Constables of Hundreds, requiring," In his Majesty's Name, " all Persons to appear at a Time and Place ap-" pointed, to advise together, and lay hold on " fuch Opportunities as should be offer'd for re-" lieving the King, and delivering him out of And meeting accordingly, they unanimously elected Mr. Hales for their General. declaring, They would be ready to join, and march as he directed: And, accordingly, a good Body of Horse and Foot were drawn together at Maidstone, Mr. Hales having taken up, on his own Security, near 80000 l. to defray the Expence; (1) and they were fo strong, that the Commander of the Parliament Forces sent to suppress them, wrote Word, That he durst not advance. On the News of this Commotion, (the first in the Kingdom) the Earl of Norwich was dispatch'd to Kent, to command as General. Upon which Mr. Hales retir'd, with his Friend Mr. L'Estrange, to Holland; not that his Affection was in the least declin'd, but being threaten'd by his Grandfather on the one Side. and his Wife by her Mother, on the other, he was willing to put his Wife out of Reach of her Mother, resolving to return himself, and venture his Person in the Service; which he did after heartily endeavour to do; (m) but that Body rais'd in Kent, being afterwards dispers'd by Faction and ill Counsel, he remain'd in Holland, and was ever after forc'd to abscond, and, for the most Part, live beyond the Seas, on Account of the great Debts he contracted for the King's Service. dy'd in France, some Years after the Restoration, and left Iffine by his Lady, one of the Daughters

and Coheirs of Thomas Lord Wotton, Edward, his Successor, John, now living, of the Inner Temple, Esq. Charles and Thomas, who dy'd unmarry'd.

Sir Edward Hales, Bart. (Son and Heir of Sir Edward) was in much Favour with King James 2. Under which King he had a Regiment of Foot, was one of his Privy Council, and one of the Lords of the Admiralty, Deputy-Governor of the Cinqueand Lieutenant-Governor of the Tower of London. At the Revolution brought about by his Majesty King William, he was confin'd for a Year and an half in the Tower; (m) and on his Release went to France, was at La Hogue, to embark for England, when Admiral Russell burnt the French Ships; and, in Consideration of his Services, was created Earl of Tenterden in Kent, by the late King James, whilst he was in that Kingdom, where he dy'd, and was bury'd in the Church of St. Sulpice in Paris. He marry'd Frances, Daughter of Sir Francis Windibank, and had Issue 5 Sons and 7 Daughters. Of the Sons, the present Sir John Hales and James only survive. Edward, the eldest, was kill'd at the Battel of the Born, fighting for King James the 2d. Charles and Robert liv'd to Mens Estate, and dy'd unmarry'd. Of the Daughters,

. Anne is living, unmarry'd.

Mary marry'd —— Bauwens, Esq; Judge of the Admiralty at Oslend.

Frances marry'd the Rt. Hon. Peter Earl of

Fingall in the Kingdom of Ireland.

Jane, Elizabeth, and Catharine, are likewise unmarry'd. And Clare wedded Mr. Hussey of the

Kingdom of Ireland.

Sir John Hales, Bart. now living, hath marry'd two Wives, Hellen, Daughter of Sir Richard Bealing of the Kingdom of Ireland; and another Hellen,

Thomas, his eldest Son, marry'd Hawise, Daughter of William Gunston of London, and had Issue by her 7 Sons and 8 Daughters. He departed this Life the 21st of September (8 Eliz.) 1566, and his Wife October 8 the Year after, and both of them

were bury'd in the Church of Chelmsford.

iThomas Mildmay (eldeft Son and Heir of the sa d Thomas) was knighted by Queen Elizabeth, and resided at Moulsham-Hall in Chelmsford; and having marry'd Frances, Daughter of Henry Ratcliff, Earl of Sussex, departed this Life 26 July, 1608, leaving Issue a Daughter, Anne, Wife of Sir Roger Appleton, Bart. Thomas Mildmay, Heir to the Bulk of his Estate, Henry Mildmay, and Anthony, (b) Carver to King Charles the Ist, who carefully and constantly attended him during his Imprisonment in the Isle of Wight, and in Hurst-Casse, and with Mr. Herbert, (asterward Sir Thomas Herbert, Bart.) were the two authoriz'd to bury the King.

Thomas, the eldest Brother of the said Anthony, succeeded to the Estate at Moulsham-Hall, received the Honour of Knighthood from King. James, and afterwards the Dignity of a Baronet, 29 June A. D. 1611. He marry'd two Wives, Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir John Puckering, Lord-Keeper of the Great Seal of England, and Anne, Daughter of —— Savile; but by neither of them lest Issue; so that the Title became extinct, but the Estate descended to Henry, his Brother and Heir; who was knighted, and resided at Woodham-Walter in Essex; and after his Brother's Death, and the Decease of Edward Earl of Sussex and Lord Fitzwater, laid Claim, Anno 1640, (by Reason of his Descent in Blood from Elizabeth, sole Daughter and Heir to

Several Pedigrees, (a) and the Certificate of Sir Archibald Napier of Merchiston in Scotland, Kt. Deputy-Treasurer of that Kingdom, and of the Privy-Council to King Charles 1, declare this Family to be descended from the antient Earls of Lenox, created to that Title in the Reign of Malcolm 3, about the Year 1057, the Surname of Napier being taken from the following Event:

King David Bruce of Scotland, in his Wars with the English, convocating his Subjects to Battel, the Earl of Lenox fent Donald, his fecond Son, with fuch Forces as his Duty oblig'd him to: And coming to an Engagement, and the Scots giving Ground, this Donald fnatch'd his Father's Standard from the Bearer, and valiantly encountring the Enemy with the Lenox Men, chang'd the Fortune of the Battel, and obtain'd the Victory: Whereupon every one advancing, and reporting their Acts. (as the Custom was) the King declared, That they had all done valiantly, but that there was one amongst them who had Na Pier [no Equal]: Upon which, the faid Donald took the Name of Napier, and had, in Reward of his Service, the Land of Gosfeild, and other Estates in Fyfe.

Alexander Earl of Lenox, elder Brother to this Donald, had two Great Grand-daughters Coheirs to his Grandson; the eldest married Sir John Monteith of Rosco, who was Earl of Lenox during his natural Life, according to the Laws and Cust-

oms of the Country, but having no Issue by her, the Earldom of Lenox came to the Descendants of the youngest, who married Allan Steuart Lord Darnley, whose Heir-Male in the sixth Descent, Matthew Earl of Lenox, was Father to Henry Lord Darnley, who had Issue James I. King of Great Britain.

The beforemention'd Donald, who took the Name of Napier, had several Sons; Alexander, the eldest, had the Land of Gosfeild; and his Grandson, Sir Alexander Napier, was written of Merchiston, (his Habitation) and was succeeded therein by Sir John Napier, his Son and Heir, who added greatly to his Possessions, by Marriage with the Granddaughter and Coheir of the aforesaid Sir John Monteith, Earl of Lenox, who had a Son by his first Wife, the Daughter and Heir of Rosco; and great Contests arose after his Death about the Title and Honour of Lenox, between the Lord Darnley, the House of Glenegis, who had married the eldest Grand-daughter of the faid Sir John Monteith, and Sir John Napier aforesaid, but Sir John relinquishing his Claim and Suit, had the Lands of Rosca, and Blair Invades; and the Lord Allan Darnley, in Testimony of Affection to the Napiers of Merchiston, and in return of their Renunciation to the Claim of the Earldom of Lenox, oblig'd himself, and his Heirs, to support and maintain the said House of the Napiers, and their Heirs, in all just Pretensions and Engagements, as appears by Evidence remaining in the Family at Merchiston.

Archibald Napier, Son and Heir of the said Sir John, was living Temp. Jac. II. of Scotland, and having married a Daughter of S. Douglas of W hitting-bam, had Issue Sir Alexander Napier, Kt. who succeeded his Father at Merchiston, and by his Wife, Sister to Robert Steuart, Earl of Athol, had Issue three Sons, Sir Alexander, James, and John; the latter

came

came into England Temp. H. 7, and is Ancestor to

the Napiers of Oxfordshire and Dorsetshire.

From Sir Alexander, the eldet, descended Sir Archibald Napier of Merchiston, Kt. Deputy-Treafurer of Scotland, &c. who testify'd under his Hand and Seal of Arms, dated the first Day of June, 1625, That Sir Robert Napier, Kt. and Baronet, Sir Nathaniel Napier, and others therein specify'd, were of his Kindred and Blood, allowing them to bear his Arms, Crest, and Supporters, with due Difference.

The said Sir Robert Napier, Kt. and Bart. was Grandson of the last mentioned Sir Alexander Napier of Merchiston, who had two Sons of the Name of Alexander; the eldest was Great-Grandsather to the said Sir Archibald; and the youngest, for Distinction, was call'd Sandy, and having spent part of his Youth in soreign Parts, came into England, and settled at Exeter, and by Ann his Wife, Daughter to Edward Birchley of Herefordshire, had Issue sour Daughters, and three Sons:

1. John, whose Daughter and Heir Ann became

the Wife of Matthew Stoker of Basing stoke.

2. Sir Robert Napier, who purchas'd the Estate at Luton-Hoo in Bedfordshire, (a fine Seat, with a Park, in the Parish of Luton, that was antiently the Possessions of the Family of Hoo) and was knighted by King James I. in his Progress Anno 1611, and farther advanc'd by the said King to the Dignity of a Baronet, Sept. 24, 1612: He married two Wives, Margaret, Daughter to Richard Barnes, Citizen and Mercer of London; and Mary, Daughter to John Robinson, Merchant, and had Issue Robert, Richard, Alexander, Christiana, Sarab, and Magdalen.

Robert, the eldest Son, received the Honour of Knighthood from King James I. at Whitehall, April 30, 1623, in the Life-time of his Father, and afterwards

terwards succeeded him in the Estate and Title: He married two Wives, Frances, Daughter of Sir William Thornburst of Kent, Kt. by whom he had a Son Robert, and a Daughter Frances: And secondly, Penelope, Daughter of John Egerton, first Earl of Bridgwater, by whom he had two Sons, John, and Alexander; he settled his Estate on John and Alexander, his Sons by the second Marriage, and surrender'd his Patent of Baronet, to the Intent the faid Dignity should be granted to himself, with Remainder to the said John and Alexander, but dying in the Year 1660, before a new one pass'd the Seals, John, the eldest Son aforesaid, being posfels'd of the Estate, had the Patent granted to him by his Majesty King Charles II. bearing Date, March 4, 1660, whereby he was created to the Degree of a Baronet, with Precedency according to the Patent his Father surrender'd, with Remainder to Alexander, his Brother, and his Heirs Male. and likewise to the Heirs Male of Sir Robert Napier. Kt. Grandfather to him the said John.

Which Sir John Napier, Bart. was elected Knight of the Shire for the County of Bedford, in the Year of the Reign of King Charles II. and having afterwards the Misfortune of receiving two Falls from his Horse, was so craz'd that a Commission of Lunacy was awarded against him; and dying in the Year 1712, left Issue by Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter of Sir Theophilus Biddulph, Baronet, (Sister to Sir Michael) four Sons, Theophilus, Archibald, Edward, and Alexander, (since dead) with two Daughters, Susan, who married John High Lord, Esq., and

Frances, unmarried.

Theophilus, eldest Son and Heir, succeeded to the Title and Estate, and afterwards married Elizabeth, Daughter of John Rotheram, Esq; but as yet hath no Issue surviving.

Ebor. and enjoyed great Possessions in Cornwall by Isabel his first Wife; but Sir Geoffery, his Son and Heir, (who resided at Penyston, Temp. H. 3.) was by his second Wife Maud. Daughter of Richard Lord Harcourt; and Edmond Penylton, Grandson to the said Sir Geoffery, was by Marriage with Beatrix, Daughter and Heir of Sir Getfery Falconberg, (second Son to the Lord Falconbeig) possess'd of the Mannor of Beconsfeild, in Com. Bucks (Temp. Edw. 2.) which descended to Sir Walter Penyston, Kt. his Son and Heir, who by Dorothy his Wife, Daughter of Sir Humphrey Ingleby, Kt. had Iffue Sir George Penyston Kt. who married Mary Daughter and Heir of Sir William Harpden, and was Father of Sir Thomas Penyllon, Kt. who largely endowed the Abbey of Missenden, in Com. Bucks, in the Reign of Ed. 3 and by Isabel his Wife, Daughter and Coheir of Fohn Beauchamp, Lord of Haurage in the aforesaid County of Bucks, and Baron of Holt, had Issue Sir John Penyston, Kt. who was posses'd of Haurage in the Reign of Richard 2, and having wedded Eleanor, Daughter and Heir of John Chesham of Chelham-Boys in Com. Bucks, (who afterwards married Sir Thomas Cheyney, Kt.) had Issue Sir Richard Penyston, Kt. Lord of Haurage, and in right of his Wife Margaret, Daughter and sole Heir of Sir Philip Herris, Kt. was likewise Lord of Marshall, and Thomas his Son and Heir succeeded him therein, who was a Knight in the Reign of K. Edw. 4. and by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter of Richard Bulftrode of Hedgley, had Issue Thomas Penyston, Lord of Haurage and Marshall, Father of Anthony, who had several Sons, of which Thomas, the eldest, had the Estate in BuckBuckinghamshire: And from Anthony, second Son,

the Penystons in Torkshire descend.

The said Thomas Penyston, by Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter of Humpbrey Ashfeild of Heathcop, had Issue several Sons and Daughters who lest Posterity; Thomas, the eldest Son, dyed in his Life-time, and lest Issue by Mary his Wise; Daughter and Coheir of John Somer of Newland in Kent, Fig; (who afterwards married Sir Alexander Temple) an only Son Thomas.

Which Thomas Penyston succeeding to his Mother's Inheritance, became feated at Leigh in Suffex; and having received the Honour of Knighthood, was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet A.D. 1611: He married 3 Wives. Ann, 4th Daughter of Sir William Stonebouse, and Martha, 4th Daughter of Sir Thomas Temple of Stow in Bucks, Kt. and Bart. were two of them; he had a Son by the former, and a Daughter by the latter, but they both dyed Infants: By Elizabeth, Daughter and sole Heir of Sir Thomas Watson of Halstead in Kent, Widow of Sir William Pope, he had two Daughters, and two Sons. Thomas, his Successor, and John, who dyed in the Year 1632, and was buried at Leggs: Of his Daughters, Elizabeth married John Hastings of Tesford in Com. Oxon. and Dalisford in Com. Wigorn; and the other was the Wife of Sir James Aftry, Kt. Master in the Court of Chancery.

Which Sir Thomas Penyston, Baronet, (Son of Sir Thomas) having married Elizabeth, sole Daughter and Heir of Sir Cornelius Fermadon, had Issue 3 Sons, 1. Sir Thomas Penyston, Bart. (who dyed unmarried, and was buried in the Parish of St. Dunstan's in Fleetstreet) 2. Sir Fermadon Penyston, Bart. who married the Relict of —— Paul, and left no Issue surviving; and Charles, his Brother, dying before him unmarried

Partu has been the Surname of an eminent Family, anciently Lords of Basing, in Com. Hant. and de Porta, or de la Porta, of another in the Western parts of England, chang'd afterwards to Port, or Old-Port, in Com. Devon. of which Castle

they were Owners.

Of Affinity to this Name, and of like Derivation, is the Family of Portman: Robert Portman was a Burgess in Parliament for the Town of Dunwich, Anno 4. E. 3. (a) William Portman is a Witness, 38 E. 3. to a certain Deed dated at Taunton, and 43 E. 3. to a Charter made by Stephen Carr, (b). Anno 36 and 46 Ed. 3. 10. 11. 15. 23. Ric. 5. and 7 H. 5. the same Person, or another of the Name, served in several Parliaments for the Borough of Taunton in the aforesaid (c) Years: Son and Successor to him (I conjecture) was Walter Portman, who also served in those great Assemblies for

for Taunton in 9 H. 5, (d) and in 4 Parliaments in the Reign of King Henry the VIth. He took to Wife Christian, Daughter and Coheir of the Family of Orchard, in Com. Somers. whereby he became posses'd of that Inheritance, which has been ever fince the capital Mansion of his Posterity. This Walter dying (e) in 14 Ed. 4, was succeeded by John his Son and Heir, Father of William Portman of Orchard, who, by his Wife Elizabeth, Daughter and Heir of John Gilbert, (f) left Issue Hemy Portman, Sheriff of Somersetshire, in 11 Eliz. who (g) receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood in Anno 1574, and departing this Life in the Year 1590, had Issue by Joan his Wife, Daughter to Thomas Mitchel of Carrington, Esq, 2 Sons, Hugh, (b) elected one of the Knights for Somer [et/bire to the Parliament held in 39 Eliz. and dy'd A. D. 1603.

John Portman, his Brother, succeeded to the Estate at Orchard, and taking to Wife (i) — Daughter of Sir John Puckering, Kt. Lord-Keeper of the Great Seal of England in the Reign of Q. Elizabeth, had Issue

Jobn, his Son and Heir.

Which John Portman of Orchard, knighted, at Whitehall the 3d of Feb. 1604, was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet 25 Nov. 1612, 10 Jac. 1. He marry'd Anne, Daughter of Sir Henry Gifford of Hampshire, and left Issue 4 Sons, whereof the eldest,

Sir Henry Portman, Bart. marry'd Anne, Daughter to William Stanley Earl of Derby, and departing this Life without Issue, in the Year 1621, was succeeded by Hugb, his Brother, who dying without Children, the Estate, and Title of Baronet, descended to William, his youngest Brother.

Which Sir William Portman, Bart. elected for Tourton, in the two last Parliaments of King Charle the Ist; was Loyal to his Sovereign, and sate with those Members the King conven'd at Oxford, in the Year 1643. He marry'd Anne, Daughter and Coheir to John Colles of Barton, in Com. Somer S. Esq. and had Issue by her one Son,

Sir William Portman, Bart. (born A. D. 1644.) who was made Knight of the Bath at the Coronation of King Charles the IId, was elected for Taunton. in the first Parliament call'd by that Prince, and ferv'd as one of the Knights for Somersetsbire, and for that Borough, in all other Parliaments, to the Time of his Death, in the Year 1695. He marry'd 3 Wives; the first, a Daughter of Sir John Cutler, Bart. the 2d, a Daughter to Sir John Southcot, Kt. and his last Wife was Daughter to Sir John Holman, Kt. but by neither of them left Issue surviving, whereby the Dignity of Baronet ceas'd in this Family. He left his Estate to his Nephew, Henry Seymour, Esq, 5th Son of Sir Edward Seymour, Bart. who, pursuant to an Act of Parliament, bears the Arms, and hath taken the Name of *Portman*.

THIS Gentleman was 3d Son of Edwin Sandys, Archbishop of York, whose Father, William Sandys of London (descended from those of his Name seated at Hawkesbed in Lancashire) had seven Sons, whom he well provided for, and most of them left Families; the faid Edwin was his eldest Son, and was educated at Cambridge, of which Univer-fity he was Vice-Chancellor, when King Edw. 6. dyed; and having, by Order of the Duke of Northumberland, preach'd against Queen Mary before that University, and defended the Title of the Lady Jane, (a) behav'd himself with that Prudence and Moderation, that tho' he pleas'd the Duke, yet the Offence to the other Side was not so great, but that his Friends prevail'd for his Pardon, and after almost a Year's Imprisonment, he was discharg'd; but disliking the Proceedings of Bishop Bonner, and those of the same Principles, he presently fled to Germany, and openly professing the Protestant Religion, did not return till Queen Elizabeth ascended the Throne, who nominated him to the Bishoprick of Worcester, in the second Year of her Reign, Anno 1559, (b); and the next Year translated him to the Bishoprick of London, which See he fill'd for fix Years, and then was translated to the Archbishoprick of Tork, Anno 1576; and departing this Life in the Year 1588, left behind him an admirable Character for Learning, Probity, and other Christian Virtues, which

drew a Blessug on his Posterity, three of his Sons being knighted, and adorn'd with all Felicities of Body and Mind: Samuel, his eldest Son, of Omber-sley in Worcestershire, was High Sheriss of that County, A.D. 1619, and is Ancestor to those of his

Name remaining there.

Edwin, second Son, went to the University of Oxford in September, 1577, (c) at the Age of 16, or thereabouts, and became a Pupil to the famous Mr. Richard Hooker, who made use of his, and the Judgment of George Cranmer, when he compiled his Books of Ecclesiastical Polity. He was admitted Probationer Fellow of Corpus Christi College, Jan. 23, 1579, being then Batchelor of Arts; and on. the 17th of March, 1581, was collated to the Prebendship of Wetwang, in the Church of Tork: Afterwards proceeding in his Faculty, he left his Fellowship, travelled into feveral Countries, and at his Return grew famous for his Learning, Prudence, and Virtue. In the Month of May, 1602, he refign'd his Prebendship, and had the Honour of Knighthood conferr'd on him by King James I. Anno 1603, and was afterwards employ'd by that Prince in several Affairs of great Trust and Moment. He was a leading Man in all Parliamentary Affairs, well vers'd in Business, and an excellent Patriot to his Country: In Defence of which, by speaking too boldly in Parliament, he, with Selden, was committed into Custody the 16th of June, 1621, and not delivered thence till the 18th of July following, which was voted by the House of Commons a great Breach of their Privileges. He was Treasurer to the Undertakers for the Western Plantations, which he effectually advanc'd, was a Person of great Judgment, a solid Statesinan, of a commanding Pen, and, as my Author saith, (d) Ingenio & Gravitate Morum insignis.

He wrote while he was at Paris, Anno 1599, Europa Speculum: Or, A View or Survey of the State of Religion in the Western Part of the World. Wherein the Roman Religion, and the pregnant Policies of the Church of Rome to support the same, are notably display'd, &c. He lest 1500 l. to the University of Oxford, for the Endowment of a Metaphysick Lecture; and departing this Life in the Year 1629, was buried in the Church of Northbourn in Kent, where he had a Seat, and a fair Estate, which descended to Richard his Grandson, who was created a Baronet by King Charles II. Jan. 23, 1684.

George, another Son of the Archbishop, was likewife a most ingenious Person, and is famous for

his Travels and Poems.

Miles Sandys, 3d Son, beforemention'd, was also a Gentleman of polite Parts and Learning; and being posses'd of a fair Estate at Wilberton in the Isle of Ely, received first the Honour of Knighthood from King James, and afterwards the Dignity of a Baronet, A. D. 1613. He had the Honour to serve the County of Cambridge as one of the Knights of the Shire in Parliament, the 3d Year of the Reign of King Charles I. and having married Elizabeth, Daughter of Edward Cooke of North Cray in Com. Cantii, Gent. had Issue seven Sons and a Daughter, who all dyed without Children.

Miles, the eldest, was knighted in his Father's Life-time, and on his Death, Anno 1644, succeeded to the Title of Baronet, but having no Issue by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter and Heir of Thomas Park of Wishitch in the Isle of Ely, the Baronetship

became extinct.

# WILLIAM GOSTWICK of WILLINGTON, Esq; Bedf. No 80

(eod. Die prad.)

HIS antient Family was posses'd of Willington in Com. Bedf. in the Reigns of King Henry 3, (a) William de Gosswick being Lord thereof, An. 1209, 9 H. 3. and his Son Hugo Goffwick in the Reign of King Edw. 1, from whom, after fix Generations, descended Sir John Gostwick of Willington, Kt. living in the Reign of King Henry 6, who left Islue Sir John Gostwick, Kt. who was Treasurer of the First-Fruits and Rents to King Henry the 8th. and afterwards Master of the Horse to that King. (b) and is supposed to lie buried under an antient Tomb on the North-side of a Chapel, in the Church of Willington, (the Burying-place of the Family) but the Brass at Top being taken away, the Inscription is lost: He married Margaret, Daughter of Oliver Lord St. John (c) and had Issue by her, John, his Son and Heir.

Which John Gosswick, lies buried on the South Side

He married Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir William Peters, Kt. and was succeeded in his Estate by his Son William Gostwick, Esq; who married Martha, Daughter and Coheir of Sir Humphrey Ratcliff of Elsow in Sussex, Kt. (by his Wife Isabel, Daughter and Heir of Edmund Harvey of Elstow, Esq;) and by her was Father of a Son of his own Name, who succeeded him in the Estate.

Which William Gostwick was by King James I. advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet, A. D. 1612, and a noble Tomb is erected to his Memory in the Middle of the Chapel aforesaid, in the Church of Willington, the Image of a Knight in Armour, in full Proportion lying thereon, and on the North side of the Tomb this Inscription.

Here lyeth the Body of Sir William Gostwyke, Bart. who had to Wife Jane Owen, the Daughter of Henry Owen, Esq; by whom he had Issue seven Sons, and four Daughters. He with a most Christian Resolution, and assured Hope of a joyful Resurrection, departed this Life the 19th of September, 1615, in the 50th Tear of his Age: The Lady Jane Gostwyke, his Widow, to perform her last Duty and Love to the sacred Memory of her dear Husband, at her own Cost and Charge, caused this Monument to be erected.

Edward Goswick, his eldest Son, was knighted at Wbiteball, Anno 1607, and succeeded his Father in the Title and Estate, and had Sepulture with his Ancestors, and to preserve his Memory, a fine Monument is erected for him, which shews the Images of a Knight and his Lady kneeling in Niches in the Wall, and underneath the Images of seven Children in the same Posture, and the sollowing Inscriptions:

This Sir Edward, by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter of John Wentworth of Gosfeild in Com. Effex, Esq. (and Sister to Sir John Wentworth of the same Place, Knight and Baronet) had Issue three Sons and four Daughters, answering the Figures in the aforesaid Monument; the Sons were Edward, Thomas, and William; and the Daughters, Elizabeth, Francisca, Margaret, and Jane.

Sir Edward Gostwick, Baronet, (eldest Son of Sir Edward) marry'd Mary, Daughter of Sir William Lytton of Knebworth in Com. Hertford, and had Issue five Sons and one Daughter: Edward dy'd young in the Life time of his Father: William, now the Baronet, Charles, John, and Rowland, all dead un-

marry'd, and the Daughter also.

Which Sir William Goswick, the present Baronet, hath been elected, in several Parliaments, one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Bedford, viz. from the Tenth of King William to the Twelfth Year of her late Majesty Queen Ann; and having marry'd Mary, Daughter of Sir Philip Boteler of Watton-Woodhall in Com. Herts. Knight of the Bath, hath Issue two Sons and three Daughters, John, now living, and William, who dyed an Infant, as did also Elizabeth and Mary; and Ann, now living, marry'd Edward Nelthrop.

AS Son and Heir of Sir John Puckering, Kt. who was Son and Heir of William Pucker-

ing of Flamborough in Torkshire.

Which Sir John Puckering having been brought up in the Study of the Law in Lincolns-Inn, was elected one of the Governors there, 18 Eliz. (a) and the next Year read in that Society on the Quadragesima, was call'd to the Degree of Serjeant at Law, 1580, 22 Eliz. and having serv'd in several Parliaments, was chosen Speaker of the House of Commons 27 Eliz. (b) made the Queen's Serjeant, and receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood 30 Eliz. and in the 34th Year of that Reign had the Custody of the Broad-Seal of England committed to his Charge. He dy'd within four Years after, leaving by Ann his Wife, Daughter of George Chowne of Kent, Thomas aforesaid, Heir to a fair Estate.

Which Thomas Puckering, Esq, seated at Weston in Hertfordshire, (an Estate his Father had by Grant from the Crown (c)) was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet in the Tenth Year of King James the sirst, and afterwards resided at the Priory near Warwick: He marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir John Morley of Halnaker, in Com. Sussex, Kt. and having only three Daughters, the Title dy'd with him. His Estate (after the Death of his Daughters without Issue) came to his Nephew Sir Henry Newton, Baronet, who took upon him the Name of Puckering. Of which Sir Henry I shall hereaster treat.

SIR Christopher Wray, Kt. Lord Chief-Justice of England, Father of Sir William above-mention'd, was the first of this Family that resided at Glentworth; but his Ancestors were antiently seated in the Bishoprick of Durham, and afterwards posses'd Estates in Richmondshire, Com. Ebor.

John Wray, of Richmond, by Alice his Wifer Daughter of Thomas Clyburn, had Issue Richard Wray, who by his Wife ..... Daughter of John Udall, had Issue Humphrey Wray, who marry'd a Daughter of ..... Warcop, and was succeeded in his Estate by Robert, his Son and Heir, who by his Wife, a Daughter of John Danby, had Issue sours, William, Thomas, John, and Christopher.

William, the eldest Son, had to Wife ...... Daughter and Heir of ..... Jackson of Snydall, in Com. Ebor and had Issue several Sons and Daughters; four of the Sons, Christopher, Richard Thomas, and Leonard, liv'd to Men's Litate, and had Poste-

rity.

Christopher, the eldest, born in the spacious Parish of Bedall in In kshire, and educated in Magdalen College, Cambridge, was enter'd for the Study of the Law at Lincolns-Inn, and so profited thereby, that he rais'd a considerable Fortune, and was by Queen Elizabeth (who knew well the Deserts of her Ministers and Servants) promoted to the high Station of Chief-Justice of England. had ferv'd for Burrowbridge in Torkshire in all the Parliaments (\*) call'd by Q. Mary; and being an eminent Lawyer and well vers'd in Parliamentary Proceedings, was chosen Speaker of the House of Commons, in the next Reign. 4 Eliz. he was elected Autumn-Reader (a) to the Society of Lincolns-Inn, to which Persons of great Learning were always chosen. The Year following, Quad-Reader of the same Society, and was again Autumn-Reader 9 Eliz. in which Year, on the 18th of June, he was call'd to the Degree of Queen's Serjeant at Law, and soon after knighted, and the 14th of May, 14 Eliz. (b) promoted to be one of the Justices of the Common-Pleas, and two Years after, viz. the 8th of Nov.

16 Eliz. (d) was constituted Lord Chief-Justice of the Queen's Bench. He dy'd May 7, 1592, after having sat on that Bench 17 Years, and fill'd it with notable Sufficiency: His Piety, Probity, and Justice, rendering him rever'd by the greatest Men of that Age, and his Death generally lamented. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, had so just a Sense of his Merits and Services, that she gave him the Profits of her Coinage, 'till he had built that noble House now remaining at Glentworth. He was indulgent to his Servants, and charitable to the Poor, as appears from his last Will and Testament, made the 30th of July, Anno 1589, wherein he gives to the former several Annuities and Legacies, and orders several Sums of Money to be distributed to the latter, and enjoins his Son Willi-, am, his Heirs and Assigns for ever, Owners of his Manor and Lands of Glentworth, to find and maintain six poor Persons of honest Conversation and Religion, in the Alms-House at Glentworth, [built by him] with Ten-pence per Week, a Gown Yearly, and three Loads of Alh-Wood, and three Loads of Turf, and that the faid poor People should have their Dinner every Sunday in Glentworth-Hall, if able to come thither, and a House kept, else every one a Penny-Loaf of Bread. And if his Son, his Heirs, or Affigns, make Default of Payment in form aforesaid, he empowers the Dean and Chapter of Lincoln to distrain yearly on the Tenants for the Money, Wood, &c. and also for 3 l. every Month after such Default of Payment.

He gave to the Master and Fellows of Magdalen-College in Cambridge, the Annual Rent of 61l. 13s. and &d. payable half-yearly for the Maintenance of one Fellow of the said College. And to the

Governors of the School of Kirton in Lindson, 5 L. Yearly, for the Maintenance of an Usher, enjoin-

ing Penalties on Default of Payment.

He liv'd to a great Age, had his perfect Senses the Day he dy'd, and made a Codicil to his will, wherein he gave other Legacies, and enumerates most of those he had before bequeath'd: He appoints his Son sole Executor, and the Lord Treafurer Burleigh, and Sollicitor-General Egerton, (after Lord-Chancellor) Supervisors, and lest both of them Legacies. He lies bury'd in the Chancel of the Church of Glentworth, under a noble Monument, whereon is the Effigies, in full Proportion, of a Judge in his Robes, with his Lady by him, and this Inscription:

He left Issue by Ann his Wise, Daughter of Niebolas Girlington of Normanby, Esq., one Son, William, and two Daughters, Isabel, marry'd to Godfrey Foljamb, Esq., 2dly, to Sir William Bowes, Kt. 2dly, to Yohn Lord Darcy; and Frances, first marry'd to Sir George St. Paul of Snarford, Baronet, and afterwards to Robert Rich, Earl of Warwick.

William, his only Son, serv'd in Parliament for Grimby.

Grim/by, in his Father's Life-time, was knighted by Queen Elizabeth, and elected Knight of the Shire for the County of Lincoln, in the last Parliament she call'd, and by King James the first was created a Baronet, A. D. 1612. He dy'd the 13th of August, A.D. 1617, at Ashby in the County of Lincoln, (at which Seat he chiefly resided after his second Marriage, whereby he came posses'd of several Lordships in Norfolk and Suffolk) and was bury'd in that Church under a sumptuous Marble Monument, the Effigies of him and his second Ladra lying in full Proportion thereon

dy lying in full Proportion thereon.

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He had Issue by his first Wife Lucy, third Daughter of Sir Edward Mountague of Roughton, in Com. Northampton, Kt. (Ancestor to the Dukes of Mountague, the several Earls of Manchester, Sandwich, and Hallifax) six Sons, Christopher, John, William, Edward, Nathaniel, and Benjamin: And by his second Wife, Frances, (Relict of Sir Nicholas Clifford, and Daughter to Sir William Drury of Hawfied, in Com. Suff. Lord-Deputy of Ireland, and Coheir to her Brother Sir Robert Drury of the same Place) two Sons, Christopher, hereafter mention'd, Charles, who dy'd in Spain, and a Daughter, Frances, Wife of Sir Avthony Irly, Kt. Of the Sons of the first Marriage, only John and Edward surviv'd to Mens Estate: the latter was Groom of the Bed-Chamber to King Charles the first, and marry'd Elizabeth, sole Daughter and Heir of Francis Farl of Berkshire, and Baron Norris of Rycot, in Com. Oxon; but having Issue by her no Son, and but one Daughter, who was the fecond Wife of Mountague Pertie, Earl of Lindsey, James Bertie, (eldest Son by the said Marriage) had the Title of Baron Norris allow'd him, by Descent from his Mother, at the Restoration of King Charles the fecond, and was afterwards created Earl of Alingdon.

John (eldest Son of Sir William Wray) was

knighted in the Life-time of his Father, and succeeded to the Title, and the Estate at Glentworth: He serv'd as Knight of the Shire for Lincoln, in three several Parliaments call'd by K. Charles the sirst: (e) And by Grissilla, his Wife, Daughter and Heir of Sir Hugh Bethell of Ellerton, in Com. Ebor. Kt. had Issue four Sons and three Daughters, John, Christopher, William, Theophilus, and Bethell; Frances, who marry'd John Hotham, Esq. Son and Heir apparent of Sir John Hotham, Baronet; Grissil, the Wife of Anthony Thorold of Marston, Esq. and Theodofia, wedded to Sir Richard Barker, Kt.

Sir John Wray, (eldest Son of the last Sir John) marry'd first Elizabeth, Daughter of Sir Hen: Willoughby of Rifley, in Com. Derb. Bart. and Widow of Sir Simon de Ewes, Bart. and she deceasing without Issue, he took to his second Wife, Sarab. Daughter of Sir John Evelyn of West-Dean, in Com. Surr. by whom he had an only Daughter, Elizabeth, who was his Heir, and marry'd the honourable Nicholas Saunder son, (eldest Son of Sir George Saunder son, Bart. Lord Viscount Caffleton of the Kingdom of Ireland) who had Issue by her Wray Saunder son, who marry'd the honourable Mary Watson, eldest Daughter of the Right honourable the Earl of Rockingham, and dy'd without Children; Elizabeth, his Mother, furviving, who was posses'd of the Glentworth Estate on the Death of her Father, Sir John Wray, Baronet, all his Brothers dying without Issue, so that the Male-Line of the prior Marriage of Sir William (the first created to the Title of Baronet) being extinguish'd, the said Dignity descended to the Heirs of the said Sir William by his second Wife, Frances, Daughter of Sir William Drusy; and having already mention'd that Christopher was the only surviving Son of the

Lincoln, and was likewise denominated of Barlings in the said He receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood from King James, serv'd in several Parliaments. and by his Wife Albina, second Daughter and Coheir to Edward Cecill, Viscount Wimbleton, third Son of the Earl of Exeter, had Issue four Sons, William.

William Wray of Albby, Esq; the eldest, born about the Year 1625, was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet, June 27, A. D. 1660, in the twelfth Year of King Charles II; at which Time he ferv'd in Parliament for Grimsby; and departing this Life, A. D. 1670, had Issue by his Wife Olympia, Daughter to Sir Humphrey Tufton, Kt. and Bart. (a younger Son to John Earl of Thanet) a Daughter, Tufton. marry'd to Sir James Mountague, Kt. (Brother to Charles, late Earl of Halifax) and four Sons, Chriflopher, Edward, William, and Drew, who all dy'd without Issue.

Christopher, the eldest, succeeded his Father in the Fstate and Title: And on the Death of his Cousin. Sir John Wray of Glentworth, succeeded in that Baronetship; but dying without Issue, the Patent his Father receiv'd from King Charles II, became extinct: and that of Glentworth descended to Baptist Edward Wray, Esq. Son of Edward, (second Son of Sir William Wray, Baronet) by his Wife Dorothy, Daughter and Heir of Hanibal Horsley of the Isle of Wight, Esq. and Widow of the honourable ..... Fane, Esq. which Sir Baptist Edward Wray dy'd likewise without Issue; and the Title a third Time came to a collateral Branch in the Person of Drury Wray, third Son of Sir Christopher, eldest Son (by the second Venture) of Sir William Wray before mention'd.

Which Sir Drury Wray, Baronet, was born in Lin:

Lincolnshire, July 29, 1633, and became posses'd o a fair Estate of Inheritance in Ireland, by Marriage with Ann, Daughter and Heir of Thomas Cases of Rathcannon in the County of Limerick, Esq. (by his Wise Bridget, Daughter and Coheir of Sir John Dowdall, Kt.) he had Issue by her three Sons, Christopher, William, (who dy'd in the Life time of his Father) and Cecil, with several Daughters. Sir Drury dy'd the 30th of October, Anno 1710, and was bury'd in the Church of Clonara, in Com. Limerick.

Christopher, his eldest Son, succeeded to the Title and his Mother's Estate in Ireland. He was in Arms for his Majesty King William at the Battel of the Boyne, and other Actions in that Kingdom; and afterwards serv'd in the Wars in Flanders, Spain, and Portugal, in the Reign of Queen Ann, and eminently distinguish'd himself at the Head of his Regiment at the Attack of Oftend. In the Year 1710 he was preparing to go again for Spain, and being at Portsmouth to embark with the Fleet, dyed there unmarry'd, Nov. 21, 1710, and was interr'd in the Church of that Town. He was a fober discreet Gentleman, and had behav'd himself with great Conduct and Bravery in all the Actions wherein he was concern'd; which, together with a Gentleman-like Behaviour, won him the Regard of his Superiors, and the Esteem of all that knew him. The Title and Estate devolv'd to Cecil, his only Brother.

Which Sir Cecil Wray was a Captain in the same Regiment with his Brother, and serv'd in Flanders, Spain, and Portugal, and is now High-Sherist of Lincolnshire; the Lady Elizabeth Saunderson beforemention'd, (who dy'd at Tork April 7, 1714) having left him a considerable Estate in the Counties of Norfolk and Torkshire, being Part of the antient

antient Inheritance of the Wraps of Glentworth.

THE antient Seat and Habitation of this Family was at Boston-Aloph, (a) near Wye, in the County of Kent, of which Town they were possessed in the Reign of Henry 3, and might be of Saxon Extraction; for Mr. Philpot observes, (b) that "Boughton Alulph had that appellative Distin-"Ction united to its Name, to intimate to us, that in the Saxons Time it own'd the Jurisdiction of one Alulphus, a Saxon. And that it was a Family in Kent, appears from Mr. Weaver's Funeral Monuments, who cites this old Epitaph in Milton Church. (c)

Ed. 4, (e) he had Issue by Agnes his Wife, Daughter to William Byrch, by Alice his Wife, Daughter to Roger Grice, a Son and a Daughter, Agnes marry'd to John Bruges, Lord Mayor of London, 13 H. 8. and William Ayloff, who succeeded in the Estate, and had Sepulture in Horn-church, with this Inscription (f) to preserve his Memory.

" Off your Charitie pray for the Soule of Vil-" liam Ayloffe, Gentylman, Owner of the Manor of " Bryton se, in the County of Essex, within the " Lordship of Havering of the Bower: And also " Owner of Great Braxted, with divers others to "him belonging, which William we'ded Au-" dery Daughter of Sir John Shaw, Knight, and " Alderman of London, and had three Children by " the said Audery, William, Thomas, and Agnes, which " deceased the xth Day of August, the Yer of our " Lord MVCXVII. ix Yer of the Reigne of King " Hen. the VIII, and lyeth buried under this Ston. " And for your Charitie say a Pater- noster, and " Ave.

Thomas, the youngest of the two Sons mention'd

in the said Inscription, was a Merchant, free of the Company of Barber-Surgeons in London; and when Bridge-Ward was finish'd, 4 Ed. 6, the first elected Alderman of it: He was afterwards knighted; and dy'd I and 2 Fh. and Mary (g) seiz'd of the Manor of Nether-Chisul, alias Little-Chisul, in Com. Suff. with the Advowson of the Church, leaving William, his Son and Heir, by his Wife Elizabeth, Daughter of James, and Sister of Sir Edward Walfingham, who had Issue a Son of his own Name, William Ayloff, Esq, who was brought up to the Study of the Law in Lincolns-Inn, and elected to the Degree of a Serjeant (b) in Michaelmas Term, 19 Eliz.

William Ayloff, Esq, eldest Brother to the aforefaid Thomas, succeeded to the Lordships of Brittons, Great Braxted, &c. was High-Sheriff of Esfex and Hertfordshire, 6 Eliz. and left Issue by Mary his Wife, Daughter to Thomas Bernardiston of Ketton,

in Com. Suff. William, his Son and Heir.

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Which William was High-Sheriff of the County of Essex, 36 Eliz. and having marry'd Jane. Daughter to Eustace Sulyard of Flemings, in Com. Suff. Esse, had Issue three Sons, 1. William. 2. Thomas, who marry'd Guicciardine of the Family of the Guicciardines of Italy, and was Father to Guicciardine Ayloff, Secretary of the Dutchy of Lancaster. Gregory, third Son, dy'd without Issue.

William Ayloff (eldest Son and Heir of the last William) succeeded to the Estate, and residing at Braxted-Magna, was knighted by King James at the Charter-House, with many more, on his first Arrival at London, and was afterwards advanc'd by the said King to the Degree of a Baronet, A. D. 1612. He marry'd three Wives, first Catharine, Daughter and Coheir to John Sterne of Melburn in Cambridge-shire, and had Issue by her three Sons and sour

Of the Sons, William, the eldest, dy'd in the Life-time of his Father, in the West-Indies. Benjamin, second Son, succeeded in Title and Estate. James, third Son, had his Mother's Estate at Melburne in Cambridgeshire; and from his first Wife Jane. Daughter to Sir William Herris of Shenfeild in Com. Essen, Kt. descended William Ayloff of Basingburn in Com. Cantab. Esq, and by his second Wife Elizabeth, Daughter to Thomas Penyston of Rochester, Esquire, Thomas Ayloff, Doctor of the Civil Laws, now living.

Sir William Ayloff, Bart. by his 2d Wife Barbara, Daughter and Heir of Thomas Lenton, had two Sons that liv'd to Mens Estate; 1. Thomas, of Grays-Inn, Esq. who had in Marriage Elizabeth, Daughter to Edward Wentworth of Bocking in Essex, Esq., and was Father to Benjamin Ayloff of Grays-Inn, now living, who marry'd Vistoria, Daughter to Alexander Ereskin,

Son to the Earl of Mar in Scotland.

John, second Son, was a Colonel in the West-In-

dies, and dy'd, leaving no Children.

Sir William, by Alice, his third Wife, Daughter of —— Stokes, had Issue a Son Joseph, who was also of Grays-Inn, and marry'd Frances, Daughter of Henry Ayscough of Torkshire, and left Issue Joseph Ayloff, Esq. now living, Barrester at Law.

Sir Benjamin Ayloff, Baronet, eldest Son of Sir William, was eminent for his Loyalty to King Charles the first, who appointed him High-Sherist of the County of Esex, on the Commencement of the Civil War, as a Person in whom he could conside; and Sir Benjamin saithfully discharged the Trust reposed in him, by endeavouring, with all his Interest, to hinder the Effects of the Ordinance of Parliament for settling the Militia in that County;

but being over-power'd by the prevalent Party, he was imprison'd in the Tower, had his Estate sequester'd, and was afterwards sent to Tarmouth. with many more, to be banish'd to the Plantations in the West-Indies; but that cruel Order being recall'd, he had the Satisfaction, after many Hardthips, to fee the Restoration of the Royal Family; and ferv'd in Parliament as one of the Knights of the Shire for Essex, in the first Parliament after the King return'd. He departed this Life about the Year 1663, having (as his Father) marry'd three Wives: by Alice, the first Wife, Daughter of -Archdale, and likewise by the last, he had no Issue that surviv'd; by Margaret, his second Lady, Daughter of Thomas Fanshaw, Esq. Remembrancer of the Exchequer, he had one Daughter, Catharine. Wife of Thomas Hardwitch of Leeds in Com. Ebor. Esq; and three Sons, 1. William, 2. Benjamin, 3. Henry, who had to Wife Dorothy, Daughter and Heir to Richard Bulkeley of Chedle in Com. Ceftr. Esq. Widow of William, Son of Sir Adam Littleton of Effex, Bart. and was Father to the Reverend Mr. John Ayloff, now living, Minister of Stanford-Rivers in Essex. Heir apparent to the Title, after the Death of Sir Benjamin, the present Baronet.

William, eldest Son and Heir of Sir Benjamin, embark'd with his Father in the Service of K. Charles I, and was Colonel of a Regiment in Colchester, when it was besieg'd and surrender'd. He marry'd Anne, Daughter to . . . Orbye, and Relict of Frederick de la Tremoville, Count de Lavall and Benon, Baron de Moleon and Didon, in the Kingdom of France, who bore him two Sons; Benjamin, who dy'd an Infant, and William, who deceased at the Age of 18 Years, A. D. 1664, in the Life-time of his Father, who departed this Life in the Year 1675; whereupon the Title descended to Benjamin, his Brother and Heir.

THE Name of Wyvel, occurs in the Lists of those that came into England, on the Norman Invasion of William the Conqueror; and that some of the Family were eminent many Ages past, is evident from several Authorities.

Sir William Dugdale, in his Monasticon Anglicanum, mentions their charitable Donations of Lands in Torkshire, in the Reign of K. Henry III; and Robert de Wyvill was return'd one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Leicester, (a) in the Parliament

Parliament summon'd to meet, Anno 1294, (23 Edw. 1.) likewise John de Wiwell was summon'd (b) among other great Persons, by the King's Writ (dated at Northampton, 2 March, 29 Edw. 1.) to appear before him, with his Dependants, well accouter'd with Horse and Arms, at Berwick upon Tweed, to oppose the Incursions of the Scots. A Descendant of the same Lineage, was another Robert de Wyvell, of Constable Burton, (c) whose Son and Heir, Marmaduke Wyvell, made a large Accession to his Estate, by marrying Agnes, Sister and Coheir of John, Son and Heir of Sir Ralph Fitz-Randol, Knight, by Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter and Coheir of Ralph, Lord Screep, of Massam.

Which Marmaduke was elected one of the Burgesses for Rippon, in Com. Ebor. in the Parliament that met at Westminster (Oct. 5.) in the 1st Year of the Reign of Queen Mary, and afterwards received the Honour of Knighthood. On his Decease,

Christopher Wyvell, his Son and Heir, succeeded to the Estate; and having marry'd Margaret, Daughter of the Honourable John Scroop, a younger Son of Henry, Lord Scroop, of Bolton, had Issue Marmaduke Wyvell, who succeeded him.

Which Marmaduke was elected a Burgess for Richmond, in Com. Ebor. in several Parliaments in the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, who conferr'd the Honour of Knighthood on him, and constituted him Vice-Chamberlain of her Houshold, as appears as well from other Authorities, as from his Picture with a Key, now remaining in the Family.

After King James's Accession to the Throne, he chose Retirement in the Country; but that Prince honour'd him with the Title of Baronet, by Letters Patents bearing Date Nov. 25. A. D. 1611.

He lies bury'd at Massam, under a noble Monument, (erected to his Memory) shewing the Images of a Knight in Armor, and the Statue of a Lady in white Marble, both in full Proportion; and under them the Statues of fix Children, and the following Inscription, (d) setting forth his De-Icent. &c. viz.

Kut. had Issue 4 Sons and 6 Daughters; 3 of the Sons, Marmaduke, Edmund, and William, liv'd to Mens Estate, and were marry'd, as were also 5 of the Daughters.

Marmaduke, the eldest Son, succeeded his Grandfather in Title and Estate; and departing this Life,

Ebor. on the Restoration of King Charles the Second; and having marry'd Ursula, eldest Daughter of Conyers Lord Darcy and Conyers, Earl of Holderness, had Issue 7 Sons and 5 Daughters. Those that liv'd to Men and Womens Estate, were William, aged 20, at the Time of the Visitation of the Heralds, August 19, 1665. Francis, now living his Majesty's Receiver-General of the Land-Tax for Yorshire, Durham, and Northumberland; who by Anne his Wife, Daughter of Sir Will. Caler of Brompton in Com. Ebor. Bar. had only 3 Daughters; Ursula, who married——Chivers of Yorkshire, Esq. Barbara, who dy'd unmarry'd; and Frances, now living unmarry'd. Christopher, 3d Son, was Dean of Ripon, and left 2 Sons now living, Christopher, and Of the Daughters, Dorothy was Wife of William. Charles Tankard, Esq, Son and Heir of Sir Charles Tankard of Whixley, in Com. Ebor, Knt. Baxbara, of St. John Thompson of Crawley, in Com. Bedford, Esc. and Ursula.

Sir Marmaduke Wyvell, Baronet, now living, (Heir to his Father in Title and Estate) serv'd in Parliament as one of the Burg effes for Richmond, 7 W. 3. and in the 1st Year of Q. Anne, was constituted one of the Commissioners for the Duties on Salt, from whence he was remov'd to be Commissioner of Excise; in which Posts, he has continu'd to the present Time. He hath taken to Wise Henrietta-Maria, Daughter of Sir Thomas Yarburgh of Snaith, in Com. Ebor, Knt. (descended from the ancientFamily of Tarburgh of Tarburgh (f) in Lincolnshire, that was of Knightly Degree, and denominated of the faid Place foon after the Conquest) by whom he hath Issue living, Marmaduke, Thomas, and Christopher; and 5 Daughters, Henrietta-Maria, Anne, Margaret, Ursula, and Mary.

tain'd the Name of Pershall.

Which Richard de Pershall was a Knight, and a Person of great Power in Staffordshire, having been High-Sheriff (an Office in those Days of great Authority) 7 Ed. 3. and from the 11th to the 15th of that King; and by Marriage with Margaret, Daughter and Heir of Hugh Lord of Knighton, added the Manor of Knighton to his Possessinas, which descended to Adam de Pershall, his Son and Heir, who was likewise Sheriff, 15 Ed. 3. and made a like Accession to his Estate, by Marriage with two Heiresses, the Daughters of John Weflon, Lord of Weston Lizard, and John de Caverswall of Bishops Offley; by the former he had Issue Adam de Pershall, who resided at Weston, whose Grandson and Heir, Sir Adam Pershall, Knt. left only 2 Daughters and Coheirs; Margaret marry'd to Richard Mitton, who was possess'd of Wefron; and Johanna, the Wife of -Birmingham. He marry'd Anne, Daughter of Ralph Sheldon of Beoly, in Com. Wigorn, Esq. and had a numerous Issue. Those that marry'd were, 1. Thomas. 2. Sir William Pershall, who marry'd 2 Wives, Mary Daughter to Richard Thimelby Esq. and Frances Daughter to Walter Lord Asson. John Pershall, 3d Son, marry'd Bridget Daughter of Robert Knightley of Warwickshire. Of the Daughters, Anne marry'd Sir Richard Fleetwood, Baronet; Elizabeth, William Scott of Sussex Esq. Sir John Pershall, Baronet, (Son and Heir of the faid Thomas) marry'd Frances, Daughter of Thomas Leigh of Adlington, in Com. Cestr. Esq. and was succeeded in Title and Estate by Thomas his Son and Heir; which Sir Thomas Pershall, Baronet, departed this Life about 2 or 3 Years past, and leaving no Issue Male, the Title of Baronet ceased in this Family; John his only Son dying some Years before him, who had Issue 2 Sons that dy'd young, and 2 Daughters; the eldest of which, Frances, marry'd Thomas Ireland, of the County of Salop, Esq. THIS Family, firnam'd from the Town of Englefield, or Englesfield in Berkshire, are Said to be possess'd thereof in the second Year of the Reign of King Egbert, 246 Years before the Norman Conquest; at which Time was an Oratory. as appears by a Terrier of the Land belonging to the same, where it is call'd Cantaria de Englefield.

In several Pedigrees, Hasculfus de Englesyld is first mention'd, as Lord of Englefyld, (a) about the Time of King Canutus, &c. and also in the the 4th Year of Harold 1. or Harefoot, and in the Reign of Hardicnute, and dy'd in the Days of St. Edward the Confessor. This Hasculf purchas'd an Hide of Land in Englefield, of Hasculf de Pinkeny, to which Deed Hely Englefield, Son to

another Hasculf Englefield, was a Witness.

Guy (Son and Heir of Hasculf) liv'd Temp. Will. 1. and was Father to Hely Englefield, Temp. Will. 2. who had Issue two Sons, William and Peter; the former gave the Parsonage of Englefeld to the Abbey of Reading, Joseph then Abbot, in the Reign of King Hen. 1. as appears by his Deed Jans Date, seal'd with the Seal of the said William; which recites that he gave the faid Par-Sonage to the said Foseph, and the Convent there.

This Gift of the Church of Englefeld, soon after is mention'd in a Charter of King Hen. 2. wherein he confirms the several Donations to the Abbot of Reading, but without Notice of the Donor's Name. (b)

This William had 3 Sons; Sir William, who dy'd without Issue, Sir Alan Englefield, and Thomas.

William (Son and Heir to Sir Alan) is commemorated Temp. Rich. 1. and was Father to John Englefeld, of Englefeld, who had Issue Sir William Englefeld, whom I take to be the same Person mention'd with Gessivy de Leuknors, in an Inquisition to enquire about Lands given by King John to Margery de Lacy, to found the Priory of Acornbury, (c) in Com. Hertford, and by the Name of William de Engleseld, is recorded as one of the Justices itinerant for the Counties of Sussex, Southampton, and Wilts, Anno 1255, 39 H, 3. and for Norf. and Sussex, Herts. and Kent; and 47 H. 3. 1263, for Southampton and Wilts. (d)

He had two Wives, and Sir John de Englefeld was his Son and Heir; whose Son Sir William dy'd in France in the Reign of King Edw. 1. having had Issue Sir Roger Englefeld, Andrew, and

Willam.

Sir Roger aforesaid, was return'd one of the Knights for Berkshire, in the Parliament held 6 Ed. 2. (e) and dying 36 E. 3. lest by Joan his Wife, a Daughter Alice, marry'd to Mortely, and two Sons, Sir Philip, and William.

Sir Philip, as eldest Son, enjoy'd the ancient Inheritance, and marry'd 3 Wives, first, Joan, second, Elizabeth, and lastly, Alice, Daughter and Coheir to Walter Rossel, (which Alice surviving her Husband, was afterwards marry'd to William Fawkenore) by whom he had the Isle of Rossel, Udlington, Eton and Teagden, in Com. Salop, and d'yd 7 H. 6. But from Joan his 1st Wise proceeded two Sons, Sir John, and Philip; Brother to whom I presume was Nicholas Engleseld of Ricot, Esq. Comptroller of the Houshold to King Ric. 2. who dy'd Apr. 1. 1415, as his Epitaph testifies in Ashdon Church in Esex; (a) which Nicholas lest only two Daughters and Coheirs, marry'd to

Fowler and Quatermains.

Sir John Englefield aforesaid, serv'd in Parliament as Knight of the Shire for Berks, (b) 21 of King Richard 2. He had Posterity to the 2d Ge-But then the Line expiring without neration. Issue Male, the Estate came to the Descendants of his Brother Philip, who had Issue a Daughter Philippe, marry'd to Edward Brudenel of Ayno, in Com. Northampton, Ancestor to the Earls of Cardigan; and two Sons, viz. Philip Englefield of Englefield. High Sheriff of Berkshire, 8 H. 6. and Robert Englefield, who dyd 13 Edw. 4. and was succeeded in the Lordship of Englefield by his Grandson Thomas. (John his Son and Heir, who had to Wife Joan, Daughter to John Milburne of London dying 3 Edw. 4. in his Life-time) Which Thomas receiv'd, with many more, the Honour of Knighthood (c) on the Marriage of Prince Arthur, Son to King Hen. 7. having, Anno 1496, been elected Speaker of the House of Commons, and was made Judge

Judge or Justice of Chester, Aug. 20. 19 H. 7. which he held 'till his Death, and was Speaker of the 1st Parliament, call'd by King H. 8. He had Sepulture on the North Side of the Chancel of the Church of Englefield, under a fair gray Marble Monument, (d) at the Head of which, in Plates of Brass, is the Figure of a Knight in a kneeling Posture, habited in Armor, over which is a Surcoat of his Arms quartering a Fefs between fix Martlets; the Figure of his Wife kneeling oppofite, with a Table and Dish between them, and behind him five Sons; and out of his Mouth proceeds in an Escrole, O bone Jesu tu novisti & potes. & vis bonum animabus nostras nos nec novimus nec possumus. Out of hers, in a like Escrole; Tu pro pietate tua ineffabili nobiscum dispones secundum quod noveris tibi velle & nobis prodesse. What remain'd of that Epitaph as it was taken by Mr. Ashmole, A. D. 1665, was,

here lyeth lure Thomas Englefilde, .... Margery his Wiffe the whych lure .... The 2d Day of April, the Year of our .... On whole Souls Jelu have ... (v & xiiii

i. e. 1514, (about the 6th H. 8.) in which Year the Chapel on the North Side of the Church was built, as appears by an Inscription in the North Window,

The aforesaid Margery was Daughter to Sir Richard Danvers, Knt. and of his Sons, I find Richard dy'd without Issue Male, and Thomas succeeded to the Inheritance.

This Thomas Englefeld underwent the Office of High Sheriff of Berkshire and Oxfordshire, 11 H.8. and having been educated at the Middle Temple, was the next Year Autumnal Reader, and the Year

Year after call'd to the Dignity of the Coif (c) by the KingsLetters Patent, dated (Decemb. 3. 15 H. 8.) at Hampton-Court. He had 100 l. per Ann. granted him for Life, and 3 Years after was constituted one of the Justices of the Common-Pleas. He was Knighted, and departed this Life A.D. 1573. as a Memorial (on the right Side of the Last Window against the Wall in the Church of Englefield) evidences; containing the Pictures of him and his Lady; he in his Judicial Robes. she in a Surcoat of her Arms plac'd against a Faldstool, and both kneeling, with 3 Sons behind him, and 9 Daughters behind her. Out of his Mouth a Scrole containing the two first Verses of the 103d Pfalm; Out of her Mouth, O Beata benedicta & gloriosa Trinitas, Pater & Filius, & Spiritus Sanctus-Tibi laus, tibi gloria, tibi gratiarum actio. Above the Figure is the quarter'd Arms of the Family, and under them this Inscription.

Here lyeth Sir Thomas Englefyld Knt. Son and Heir to Sir Thomas Englefyld Knt. hereby lying, and One of the Kings Justices of the Comyn Place; and Dame Elizabeth hes Wysse: The whych Sir Thomas decessyd the 28th Day of September, in the Year of our Lord God 1573, on whos Soule, and all Chrysten Soules Thu have Mercy, Amen.

The faid Elizabeth was Daughter to Sir Robert Throckmorton of Coughton, in Com. War. who bore him 3 Sons, Francis, John hereafter mention'd, and Thomas, and 9 Daughters, as the Figures before-mention'd shew.

Francis, the eldest Son, succeeded to the Inheritance: (a) He purchas'd Erdington, in Com. Warw. 21 H. 8. and having receiv'd Knighthood 22 Feb.

Anno 1 Ed. 6. was that Year High Sheriff of Berkshire and Oxfordshire. He was afterwards Master of the Court of Wards, and of the Privy Council to Queen Mary. But being a great Enemy to the Lady Elizabeth, upon the Account of Religion, when she ascended the Throne, he, in very Zeal, with the Lord Morley, Sir Thomas Shelley, Sir John Gage, and others, retir'd beyond (b) And tho' he had a most large Inheritance here in England, liv'd for the most part in Spain, where he was a most industrious Agent to follicit the Cause of (c) the Queen of Scots, both to his Holiness, and to the Catholick King. was also a great Promoter of and Benefactor to the English College at Valladolid in Spain, where he was interr'd, 1571. He marry'd Catharine, Daughter and Heir of Thomas Fettiplace, Esq, but left no Issue, so that the Estate descended to his Nephew, viz. the Son of his Brother John Englefield, Esq. for whom in the North Wall of the Chapel of Englefield is a Brass Plate fasten'd, and thereon is insculp'd the Portraiture of a Man in Armor, with his Wife, and the following Inscription.

Here lyeth buried John Englefeld, Efq; second Son to Sir Thomas Englefield Knight, who had to Wife Margaret Fitton, Daughter to Str Edward Fitton of Gawsworth, by whom he had an only Child nam'd Francis, yet living; who married Jane, eldest Sister to Anthony, now Viscount Montague, and had Issue by her four Sons, and one Daughter. The said Margaret, after she had liv'd a Widow 38 Tears, caus'd this Monument to he made in the Tear 1605, in Remembrance of her said Husband, who died the first Day of April, 1567.

And on a white Marble set in a black Gravefrone under the said Plate in the Wall, is her Obit.

Here lyeth buried John Englefield, Esq, and Margaret bis Wife, whose Monument is in the North Side of this Chapel; which Margaret died the 29th of August, 1612.

Thomas Englefield, Esq, only Son aforesaid, was of Wotton-Basset, in Com. Wilts, (of which Place his Father was also nominated) as well as Englefield in Berkshire.

In the 10th Year of King James, A. D. 1611. he was advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet, and liv'd'till 1631, as appears by a beautiful Monument in the North Chapel of Englefield Church, against the North Wall, adorn'd with the Portraitures of a Knight in Armor, and his Lady, both kneeling at a Desk, four Sons behind him, and one Daughter behind her, in praying Postures; on the Side of the Desk the Arms of Englefield impaling Brown. Under the said Monument, on a Marble Stone, is a Brass Plate with this Inscription.

Here lyeth interr'd the Body of Sir Francis Englefield, Baronet, (only Son of John Englefield, Esq, and Margaret his Wife) who married Jane, eldest Daughter to Anthony Viscount Mountague, by whom he had Issue 10 Children, viz. Thomas, Dorothy, Francis, Thomas, John, Anthony, William, Mary, Margaret, and Henry, of which Thomas the eldest, Dorothy, and John, died hefore their Father. He died the 26th of Octob. Anno Dom. 1631, being 69 Years, 3 Months, and 27 Days old.

Of the Daughters, I find Mary marry'd to—Morgan; of the Sons, Thomas marry'd Mary Daughter to William Wollescot of Shenifield in Berks, and Anthony, who was of Whiteknights in the Parish of Sunning in Perks, aged 50 Years, 1665, had by his Wife Susan, Daughter to—Ryley in Com. Oxon. Sons and Daughters.

Sir Francis Englefield, Baronet, (eldest Son and Heir of Sir Francis) receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood from King James the 1st at East-Hamsted, Aug. 10. 1622.—He resided sometimes at Sholby, in Com. Leicest. which Estate came to him in Right of his Wise Winested, Daughter and Coheir to William Brookesty, Esq. and in his Behalf I meet with this indemnifying (c) Letter of King Charles I.

HEREAS Our Trusty and Well-beloved Sir Frances Englesield, Knight and Baronet, being a Recusant, is thereby subject to our Laws and Statutes in that Case provided: These are to signify Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that no Person or Persons shall, at any time hereaster, sue, prosecute or implead, either by Way of Indiament, Information, or otherwise, against the said Sir Francis, for being a Recusant, or convicted by Virtue of any of our Laws or Statutes against Popish Recusants, 'till we shall signify our Pleasure to the contrary. Given under our Signet at our Palace of Westminster, Decemb. the 6th, in the 10th Tear of our Reign.

This Sir Francis had Issue a Daughter Mary, marry'd to Christopher Roper, Lord Tenham, and Charles his Successor.

Which Sir Charles Englefield, Baronet, (as I am inform'd) marry'd—natural Daughter of Thomas Lord Colepepper, by Mrs. Susan Willis, but hath no Issue.

Sir THOMAS RIDGWAY, of Tor, Kt. Devon. No. 87

THIS Family anciently written Ridgway, alias, Peacock (alluding to which, the ancient bearing of Arms was Three Peacocks Heads eras'd) has been in Devonshire for many Generations, as appears from the Collections of the best Antiquary of that County (Sir William Pole's Manufcript of Deeds and Charters.) The Name may be presum'd to be local, there being two Places so call'd in the said County, one near Plimouth, and the other in the Parish of Owlscomb, near Homiton. (a.)

The first that advanc'd this Family I take to be Stephen Ridgway, who was one of the Stewards of the City of Exeter, 6 Edw. 4. 1466, and Mayor thereof, 7 H. 7. Son or Grandson to whom, in all D d Proba-

Probability, was John Ridgway of Tor in Com. Devon. Esq. who was elected one of the Representatives for the City of Exeter, in the two first Parliaments call'd by Queen Mary; (b) He lest Issue by Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter of John Wentford, Thomas his Son and Heir, who took to Wise Mary, eldest Daughter of Thom. Southeot, Esq. and Coheir to her Mother Grace, Daughter and Heir of John Barnhouse of Marsh in Com. Devon. Esq. from which Match proceeded a Son of his now Name, Thomas Ridgway, hereafter mention'd; and in Commemoration of them are the following Inscriptions in the Parish-Church of Tor Mohun,

Thomas Ridgeway Filius, Hares, & Equesti Dignitate ornatus, invictissimi Regis Jacobi primi in Regno Hib. Vice-Thesauranius ac Praceptor Generalis, & Thesauranius (ut vocant) ad Guerras, unusque è Secretioribus ejusdem Regni Consiliis, summi Amoris,

Officii & Pictatis ergo mastissimus posuit.

Which Thomas (Son and Heir of Thomas Ridgeway) distinguish'd himself very eminently against the Rebels in Ireland, in the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, and planted the 1st Protestant Colony in. that Kingdom. He was High-Sheriff of Devonflire, 1600, and in the same Year receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood. At the Accellion of King James to the Throne of England, he was elected one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Devon, in the 1st Parliament call'd by that Prince, who well discerning his Merits and Services, employ'd him in fome of the highest Places of Trust and Command in the Kingdom of Ireland, and swore him of his most Honourable Privy Council. He was Deputy-Treasurer that Kingdom, and Commander-General and Treasurer of Wars for many Years; was esteem'd an able Counfellor, full of Honour and Fidelity. He was, as was faid before, first knighted, afterwards, viz. Nov. 25, 1612, advanc'd to the Dignity of a Baronet, and in the Year 1616, as a peculiar Mark of the Royal Favour, promoted to the Peerage of the Kingdom of Ireland, by the Titles of Baron of Gallen-Ridgway, and on the 23d of Angust, 1622, was promoted to be Earl of Londonderry. He lyes interr'd in the Isle belonging to his Family, in the Parish-Church of Tor Mobin. He marry'd one of the Maids of Honour to Oucen Elizabeth, Cecilia, Sifter and Coheir of Henry Mackwilliam, and had Issue 3 Sons and 2 Daughters, as before is mention'd in the Inscriptions, Cassandra.

dra, one of the Daughters, was Grandmother to

the present Lord Middleton.

Robert, the eldest Son, succeeded in his Titles and Estate; he was honour'd with Knighthood when very young, and marry'd in his Father's Lisetime Elizabeth the only Daughter and Heir of Sir Simon Weston of Lachsfield, Knight, by whom he lest Issue 2 Sons, Weston his Successor, and Shalloon.

Weston Earl of Londonderry, &c. marry'd Martha Daughter of Sr. Richard Temple, Baronet, Father of the present Lord Cobham, and left Islue 2 Sons, Robert and Thomas, with several Daughters.

Robert, the eldest Son, succeeded to the Title and Estate, and departing this Life, March 7th, 1713, was bury'd the 19th following with his Ancestors in the Church of Tor Mohan, leaving only two Daughters his Coheirs.

# WILLIAM ESSEX of LAMBORNE Esq; Berks. N° 88•

(25 Nov. A.D. 1612. R. Jac. 10.)

THE Surname of this Family accrew'd from the Office of Sheriff of the County of Effex, hereditarily possess'd before the Conquest. Wynmark was Father to Robert, who liv'd in the Time of Edward the Confessor, and Swene de Essex, his Son, at the Time of the General Survey made by the Conqueror, had no less than 55 Lordships in the said County, 9 in Suffolk, with 41 Burgesses in Ipswich, and the Manor of Wedresley in Huntingtonshire; the Castle of Raleigh in Essex, call'd in Domesday Riganea, he re-edity'd, or built, and in the Church, he, or some of his Descendants, lye bury'd under a Tomb which makes a Shew of great Antiquity. (a)

By Gunnora his Wife, who gave the Church of Frammingham to the Priory of Thetford (b) he had iffue Henry and Robert, a Witness to a Charter which King Hen. 1. made to the Priory of Leve-

fham in Kent. (c)

Henry, eldest Son and Heir to Swene de Essex, was Sheriff of Buckinghamshire and Bedfordshire, 2 & 3 H. 2. (d) and gave the Church of Walden to the Nuns of Clerkenwell, and his Lordship of little Fraincham to the Knights-Templars. He left Issue by Cecilia his Wise, Sir Henry and Hugh.

This Sir Henry was styl'd Constabularius Regis, 3 H. 3. and enjoying the Office of Standardbearer

bearer to the King by Inheritance, behav'd himfelf so unworthily in that Expedition which the King himself about that Time made into Wales. (throwing down that Enfign, and betaking himfelf to Flight; whereby the Welf became so animated, and the English so discourag'd, through a sudden Apprehension of the King's being slain) that the whole Army fell presently into Confufion, and was utterly routed. For which high Missemeanor, being charg'd (a) with High Treason by Robert de Montfort (an eminent Nobleman) and in a folemn Trial by Battle clearly vanquish'd, he was to have suffer'd Death by the Law, had not the King's Clemency interpos'd: who, sparing his Life, caus'd him to be shorn a Monk in the Abby of Reading, and seiz'd on his whole Estate, which had the Reputation of an Honor or Barony, for by that Name it is recorded in the Sheriffs Accompts.

He had two Sons that were Knights; and Alice his Wife, Sister to Alberic E. of Oxford survived, him, and was marry'd secondly to Roger Fitz Ri-

chard, Lord of Warksworth and Clavering.

Hugh de Essex asoresaid (Brother to the said Sir Henry) confirm'd the Donation of Walden, made by Cicely his Mother and Henry his Father, 4 R. 1. Richard Bishop of London corroborating the same. He also granted to the Monks of Hatfield, Lands in Goldangre, of the Gist of Fulk de Mures, and a Rent of (b) 4 s. one of the Witnesses being Ralf de Essex; which Charter was seal'd with the Arms of an Orle. Hugh, Grandson and Heir to the said Hugh, dy'd seiz'd of Lands, & c. in Rywchall in Com. Essex, as appears by an Inquisition taken there 34 H. 3. whereby another Hugh de Essex was found his Son D d 4

and next Heir, aged then five Years. From whose Daughter Anne, Wise to John Prayers, descended the Bourchiers Earls of Bath. About which Time Walter de Essex was High Sherist of Essex and Hertford, 53 and 56 H. 3. and 1 and 2 Ed. 1. and a Benefactor to St. Paul's London. (b)

A younger Brother to the last Hugh was John de Essex, who dy'd seiz'd of Lands in Radiswell in Com. Effex, An. 18 Ed. 1. as is evident by Inquisition taken there, leaving another John Effex his Son and Heir, who dy'd feiz'd also of those Lands. and was dead 35 E. 3. (c) having had Issue by Joan his Wife two Sons, John and Thomas, whereof the former dy'd issueless, and from the other descended William de Essex, who serv'd in Parliament for the City of London, Anno 6 R. 2, (d) leaving William his Son and Heir, who was of Wandon Gieen in Com. Mid. and relinquish'd his o Paternal Coat of Arms, assuming to himself the bearing of the Eagles, by Conceilion of the King of Arms. He was a Burgess in Parliament 28 H. 6. for Dorchester; and in the Reign of King Edward 4. was one of the Remembrancers of the Exchequer, and Under-Treasurer of England; and by Edith his Wife, Daughter and Heir of-Maro of Stepney, left Issue Thomas his Son and Heir, who succeeded in Wandon Green; and departing this Life, was bury'd at Kenfington in Com. Middlesex, having this Sepulchral Epitaph, (e)

Hic jacet Thomas Essex, Armiger, filius & hares Gulielmi Essex, Armigeri, Rememoratoris Domini Regis Edwardi quarti in Scaccario ac Vicethesaurario Anglia. Qui obijt 10 Nov. 1500.

By Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter and Heir of William Baltborp of Elston in Com. Leicest. he had a Son William; which William came possessed of Bewcote and Lamborne in Com. Berks, in Right of his Wife; was a worthy Man in his Generation, and of great Command in that County, whereof he was four times Sheriff, together with that of Oxfordshire, viz. 1, 10, 16 and 32 Hen. 8. and the Year after serv'd in Parliament as Knight of the Shire for the faid County. He receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood on or before the 10th Year of that King; and by his Wife Elizab. Daughter and fole Heir of Thomas Rogers of Benham, whose Grandfather, John Rogers, had marry'd Elizabeth Daughter and Heir of John Shotesbroke of Bewcote in Com. Berks, left Issue Thomas his Son and Heir. who was likewife knighted.

Which Sir Thomas Effex marry'd Margaret Daughter to William Lord Sandys, and had Issue Thomas, his Son and Heir, who was living at Lamborne, 1584, having to Wife Elizabeth Daughter to Sir Edward Palmer Knight, by whom he had Issue 5 Sons, and 3 Daughters, and lies bury'd in the Middle of the Chapel in Lamburne (on the North Side of the Chancel) under a fair rais'd Monument, the Statues (as big as the Life) of a Knight and his Lady lying thereon; he with his Surcoat of Arms over his Armour, his Head resting on a Helmet, and an Eagle's Head with a Firebrand in its Mouth, and his Feet on a Dolphin bow'd; she in her usual Habit and Attire, her Feet resting on a Goat with Wings, and round the Ledge this Epitaph:

Here

Here lyeth the Bodyes of THOMAS ESSEX Kt. who deceased the 29th of August, in the Teer of our Lord God One thousand five hundred fifty and eight, and Dame Margaret his Wife

Thomas Essex Esq; his eldest Son, marry'd Joan, Daughter to Thomas Harrison, and left Issue a Son and a Daughter; William, and Joan, Wife to William Anderson, Esq; second Son to the Judge of that Name.

This William was created a Baronet, Nov. 25. in the 10th Year of King James, and was possess'd of great Estate, the Revenues of a Baron, as one writes. (a) He marry'd Jame eldest Daughter to Sir Walter Harcourt, of Stanton-Harcourt in Com. Oxon. and had Issue Charles his Son and Heir.

This Sir William, indulging himself in a licentious Course of Life, wasted his great Fortune, and in his old Age, compell'd by his Wants and his Son's Invitation, (b) accepted of the Command of a Company of Foot in the Parliament-Army, at the first breaking out of the Rebellion against King Chwles the 1st, and serving in the same Regiment whereof his Son was Colonel, was taken Prisoner at the Fight at Edgebill; in which Battle he likewise suffer'd the Missortune of losing his Son by a Musket-Shot; and he afterwards dying without Issue Male, the Title became extinct.

The aforesaid Colonel Charles Essex was bred a Page under the Earl of that Name, and afterwards preferr'd by him to a Command in Holland, (c) where he liv'd with very good Reputation, and preserv'd the Credit of his decay'd Family.

Family. But as foon as the faid Earl accepted of the Command of General of the Parliament Army, he thought his Gratitude oblig'd him to run the Fortune of his Patron; and out of pure Kindness to the Person of the Earl, as many others did, engag'd himself against the King, without any Malice or Rebellion in his Heart towards the Crown. He had the Command of a Regiment of Foot, was Serjeant Major-General of the Army, and esteem'd the best and most expert Officer therein, and of whom they had the best Opinion, and his Loss was much regretted by them. He had (as my Lord Clarendon writes) " preserv'd a " good Reputation in the World, till this last Action, which was now the worfe, over and " above the guilt of Rebellion, by his having " fworn to the Queen of Bohemia, by whose In-" tercession he procur'd Leave of the Prince of " Orange to go into England, that he would never " serve against the King.

## Sir Edward Gorges of Langford, Kt. Wilts. No 89

(eod. Die prad.)

HIS Family, by paternal Extraction, was of the Surname of Russel, (of the same Lineage as the Dukes of Bedford) and derive their Surname of Gorges from a maternal Ancestor, as will appear by the following Account. Ivo de Gorges, the first of the Name that I meet with. is a Witness to a Charter Temp. H. 1. which Geva (Daughter to Hugh Lupus Earl of (hester) made to the Priory of Canewell in Com (a) Staff. and Cotemporary with him was Patrick de Gaurges, who gave half a Carve of Land in Kirkby-Mesperton to the Abbey of St. Maries at Tork, mention'd in a Confirmation-Charter of King Hen. 2. (b) After him was Ralph de Gorges, who flourish'd under the Reign of King Hemy 3. and was Governor of the Castles of Sherburne and Exeter, and High Sheriff of Devonshire, 54 of that King's Reign; and having been fign'd with the Cross, dy'd in or before the 56 H. 3. Ellen his Wife, Daughter and Coheir to John de Morevill (who brought him the Manor of Bradpool) furviving him, and dy'd Anno 20 Ed. 1. This Ralph had also a former Wife, who was Daughter and Heir of Foliot of Warleigh in the Parish of Tamerton, from them called Tamerton Foliat; for 29 Ed. 1. Thomas de Gorges, (I presume his Son) was one of the Knights of Devonsbire, who were summon'd to arm with Horse and Armour at Berwick upon Tweed, (c) upon an intended Expedition into Scotland.

land; and 21 E 1. upon an Assessment he held Tame: ten Foliot; (d) which Estate continu'd about fix Deicents in this Line, till Jane, Daughter and Heir of John Gorges of Warleigh, convey'd it by Marriage to the Bonviles of Shute. Brother to this Thomas in all Probability was John, who in the said 29 Ed. 1. was summon'd among the Knights of the County of Northampton, on the like Expedition; and from one of them descended Sir George Gorges, Governor of Cardiff Castle 14 Edw. who was taken Prisoner by Mortimer Earl of March, (e) and the Gorges of Alderston in Com. Nor-The aforesaid Ralph left Issue sir Ralph Gorges, who marry'd Eleanor, who surviv'd him; for in a Deed, dated 14 Edward Son of King Edw. she wrote her self Alianor late the Wife of Ralph Gorges, sealing with Escutcheons of Arms of Losengy and of a Cross Moline plac'd alternately and circular round the Seal. This Ralph had Issue another Ralph, and either he or his Father, the aforesaid Ralph, in the Reign of King Edward 1, was Marshal of the King's Army in the Wars of Gascoigne, and had the Misfortune to be made Prisoner by the French, 22 Edw. 1. but commanded again in the Wars of Gascoigne. 28 of that Reign; and 3 Years afterwards went against the Scots, viz. 31 Edw. 1, at which Time he held one Fee in Brainston in Com. Devon. (f)

He was summon'd 3 Edw. 2. among the Peers of the Realm; and 14 Edward Son of Edward the King, styling himself therein Lord of Wraxball, he granted to John de Penderon and Anne his Wife 20 libratas terra in Dunkerton, Credelington, and Otewike, which John Champneys Lord of Colneball us'd

us'd to pay him for the Manor of Dunkerton; dated at Glasson, with a Seal of Arms Losengy appendant to it: (g) More of him may be seen in Sir William Dugdale's Baronage (b) (who coalesces these two Ralphs.)

He dy'd seiz'd of the Manor of Wraxball, inter alia, 17 Edw. 2. leaving Ralph his Son and Heir; but whether he was seiz'd of Wraxball in Right of Marriage, or by Descent, or Purchase, I can't determine, tho' I find one John de Wraxball High-Sheriff of Dorset. and Somerset, 6 and 8 Ed. 2.

Ralph Gorges his Son dy'd without Issue and Eleanor his Sister became his Heir, who was, Wife of Theobald Russel of Kingston Russel in Com. Dors. Son of Sir William Russel, Knight, of the same Place, and Lord of half the Barony of Newmarch, in Right of his Mother Isabella, Daughter of James de Newmarch Baron of Dercham; which Sir William descended from Robert Russel, who had Lands in Normandy.

The said Theobald, by another Wife, Eleanor, Daughter and Heir to John de la Tour, had Issue William Russel, Progenitor to the Dukes of Bedford; but by his Wife Eleanor aforesaid, Sister to Ralph Gorges, he had, among other Children, Theobald hereafter mention'd, and Sir Ralph Russel of Kingston Russel; whose Son, Mauritius Russell, dy'd II H. 6. and left Issue Sir Ralph Russel of Kingston Russel who dy'd issueles, and left 2 Sisters his Coheirs. The said Theobald, younger Son of Theobald, assum'd the Surname of Gorges, (i) and bore the Arms of that Family; which occasion'd a Dispute between him and Warbleton, 21 Ed. 3. before Henry E. of Lancaster, and others

at the Siege of the Town of St. Margarets, both claiming to bear Losengy Or and Azure. How this was determin'd I don't find, but in this Controversy he was written Theobald de Gorges, and Horsley. He was High Sherist for the Counties of Dorset and Somerset, 35 Edw. 3. and serv'd in Parliament with Maurice de Bruine as Knight of the Shire for the County of Southampton, (k) 50 Ed. 3. having their Writ of Expences for 151. 12 s. for 39 Days Attendance. He departed this Life 4 R. 2. seiz'd of the Manor of Wraxball, leaving by his Wife Mary, Daughter to Tho. Beautharm of Utak

champ of Hatch 4 Sons.

Sir Ralph who dy'd without Issue, and was succeeded by his Brother Bartholomew, who also dy'd without Issue 20 R. 2. After whom William the 3d Brother inherited, who likewife dying iffueless, Thomas Gorges, 4th Son of Sir Theobald, succeeded, and dy'd 5 Hen. 4. having had Issue by Agnes his Wife, John, who dy'd seiz'd of Wraxhall, 2 H. 5. and Sir Theobald succeeded his Brother in the Estate at Wrokeshall. This Sir Theobald held Horsington; was a Knight-Banneret; and in the Reign of H. 6. was Lieutenant of (1) Normandy, under Richard Duke of Tork, then Regent of France, and had a Salary of the King for his Government and Maintenance, as appears by Acquittance given to Richard Wigmore, Receiver-General to the said Duke, under the Hand and Seal of the faid Theobald. He dy'd 9 Edw. 4. having been twice marry'd; by Joane, his 1st Wife, Daughter to-Hanchford, he had Issue two Daughters, Elizabeth, Wife of Thomas Grenvile, and Jane, to John Hatch of Dillon in Com. Devon. and a Son, Walter; by his second Wife, Joane, Daughter to John Beauchamp

of Lillesdon, he had Issue Richard Gorges, to whom his Father gave Lands in Sturminster and

Hasington, and dy'd 20 Edw. 4.

Walter Gorges dy'd in the Life-time of his Father Sir Theobald, and left Issue (by Margaret his Wife, Daughter and Heir to Sir William Oldell of Oldball, Knight, by Margaret his Wife, Daughter to William Lord Willoughby of Eresby) Edward his Son and Heir.

Which Edward Gorges succeeded his Grandsather as Heir to the Estate, and received the Honour of Knighthood at the Creation of Arthur Prince of Wales, Son of King Henry 7. (m) and having marry'd Anne, Daughter to John Howard Duke of Norfolk, had Issue by her 3 Daughters, and 5 Sons. 1. Sir Edward. 2. Edmund, who marry'd the Daughter of Sir John Walsh of Gloucestershire, and left Posterity. 3 William, who marry'd Winisted Daughter to Richard Badock, and had a Family. 4 and 5, Thomas and Nicholas.

Sir Edward Gorges (eldest Son of Sir Edmund) marry'd two Wives; first—Daughter to—Newton, by whom he had Issue Edward, from whom descended Sir Edward Gorges of Wraxhall in Somersetshire, Knighted 6 Jac. 1. Father to Sir

Robert Gorges of the same Place.

By his second Wife Mary, Daughter to Sir Anthony Poynts, (by his Wife, the Daughter and Heir to Sir William Hudfield) he had Issue two Daughters, Elizabeth and Frances, and four Sons, who were all knighted. 1. Sir William, who marry'd the Daughter of Rudockshud, and dy'd 28 Elizabeth, Daughter to Henry Clinton, Earl of Lincoln. 3. Sir Ferdinand, Captain of the Castle of Plymouth, A.D.


A.D. 1597, who was Father of John, who had to Wife Frances, Daughter to Thomas Clinton, Earl of Lincoln.

Edward (eldest Son of Sir Thomas) succeeded to the Estate at Langford, and was knighted by King James the 1st, (9 April, 1603) having met him at Widerington, in Com. Northumb. when he sirst enter'd the Borders of England to take Possession of the Crown. He was afterwards advanc'd by the said King, the 25th of Nov. A. D. 1612, to the Dignity of a Baronet, and created a Peer of the Kingdom of Ireland (by the Title of Baron of Dundalk, in the County of Louth) 13 July, in the 18th Year of his Reign. This Lord was twice marry'd: By his 1st Wise, — Daughter to Sir Robert O/borne, he had Issue a Son, Thomas, who dy'd in the Life-time of his Father:

By his 2d Wife, he had Richard Gorges, his Son and Heir, who succeeded to the Titles, and with whom, I suppose, they became extinct; for I can hear of no Descendants remaining.

## Sir Harbottle Grimston of Brad-Feild, Kt. Essex. Nº92

THIS Family denominated from their Posfessions in the County of Tork, is descended (as Mr. Camden has attested) from Silvesser de Grimston, (a) who did Homage to William the Conqueror for Grimston-Hoxton, Tonsted, and for other his Lands held of the Lord Roos; as of his Manor of Roos in Holderness. Which Lord was Chamberlain of the Houshold to the King Anno 1067.

William de Grimston of Grimston, the 7th in lineal Descent from the said Silvester, had Issue (by Armatreda his Wise, Daughter of Sir Roland Ryson of Ryson, Kt. in Holderness) 3 Sons; 1. Thomas, whose Posterity remained in Torkshire; 2. Robert; 3. John, Dean of Windsor, 6. H. 5. Robert, asoresaid, 2d Son, became seated in Sussolk temp. H. 5. by marrying the Daughter of Sir Anthony Spilman, Kt. and Edward, his Son and Heir, succeeded him in Lands at Risebangles and Ipswich, in the said County.

Which Edward marry'd 2 Wives; Philipa, Relict of Thomas Lord Roos, and Daughter of John Lord Tiptoft, (and Sifter and Co-heir to John Tiptoft, Earl of Worcester, and Constable of England) and Mary, Daughter of William Drury, of Rougham in Suffolk, Esq. He had no Issue by the former; but by the later, he had 3 Daughters and 4 Sons. From John, the 3d Son, the Grimston's of Norfolk and Essex descended. Edward, eldest

Son, marry'd Margaret, eldest Daughter of Thomas Harvey, Lsq, and lest Issue Edward, his Son and Heir; who, by Anne his Wife, Daughter of J hn Garnish, of Kenton in Suffolk, Esq, had a Son nam'd also Edward, who had the Estate at Risebangles, and serv'd in several Parliaments in the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, for Ipswich in Suffolk. He marry'd 2 Wives, and had Islue by the 1st a Son of his own Name.

Edward Grimston, Esq, who was seated at Bradfeild in Essex, served in Parliament for Eye in Suff. 31 Eliz. his Father then living, and having in Marriage Joan, Daughter and Co-heir of Thomas Risby, of Lavenham in Suffolk, Esq. (whose Mother was Daughter and Co-heir of John Harbettle of Crosseild, in Com Suff. Esq.) He considerably enlarged his Estate, and dy'd the 15th of August 1610, scaving 2 Sons, Harbottle and Henry, who both received the Honour of Knighthood, and marry'd 2 Sisters.

Sir Harbottle, the eldest, became possessid of the Estate at Bradseild, and was advanced to the Dignity of a Baronet 25 Nov. A. D. 1612: He was well esteemed in his Country, and was elected Knight of the Shire for Essex in 3 Parliaments, in the Reign of King Charles the 1st, and dy'd about the Year 1640. He marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of Ralph Copenger of Stoke, in Kent, Esq, who brought him 5 Sons, Edward Harbottle, Hem7,

Thomas, and William.

Edward, the eldest, marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of Thomas Massam, Esq. and dy'd in the Lifetime of his Father, leaving no Issue, whereupon the Inheritance, and the Title of Baronet, (after his Father's Decease) devolv'd on his Brother Harbottle.

Which Sir Harbettle Grimston, Bart. having his Education in the Inns of Court, was well learn'd in

in the Laws, and the ancient Customs, and Usage of Parliaments, and behav'd himself with a steady Zeal to the true Interest of his Country, in those trying and distracted Times, during the Reign of King Charles the 1st, and the Usurpation that follow'd: He knew, and observ'd, the Bounds between arbitrary Power and a legal Duty: He oppos'd and refus'd the Payment of illegal Taxes, (on which Account, his Father had been imprison'd in the Fleet) and in the Parliament that met the 3d of April in the Year 1640, was one of the first that insisted on the calling those Persons to Account who advis d the levying Ship-Money; and in an excellent Speech on that Subject, said, (b) " He was perswaded that they "who gave their Opinions for the Legality of it, " did it against the Dictamen of their own Con-But as he only intended the Reform of fuch Abuses and Invasions on the Liberty and Property of the Subject, so did he endeavour, with all his Interest, the pacifying the Minds of Men that were fet upon extravagant Demands from their Sovereign; for he rather continu'd to fit with the long Parliament, than concur with them, till after the Treaty with the King, in the Isle of Wight: When he was one of the Commillioners fent to treat with his Majesty; and, as my Lord Clarendon observes, (c) behav'd himsclf so, that his Majesty was well satisfy'd with him; and pressing the Acceptance of the King's Concessions, after his Return from thence, was, with others, excluded by Force from the House: He was the more obnoxious, for having been instrumental in procuring Part of the Army to Ee 3 be

be disbanded; and the Houses of Lords and Commons signify'd to him by Letter, (d) (29 May, 1647) that they appointed him one of the Commissioners for disbanding them at the several Places of Rendezvous. When the King was brought to his Trial, the Persons then in Power had such Apprehensions of his Duty to his Majesty, and his Interest with the Army and People, that they put him under Confinement, and did not release him till after the Death of the King, as appears by the following Warrant:

Y OU are, on Sight bereof, to set at Liberty Sir Harbottle Grimstone, be having engag'd himself not to all, or do any Thing to the Disservice of the Parliament or Army. Given under my Hand the 30th Day of Jan. 1648.

To the Marshal-General or his Deputy.

Fairfax.

When he had sign'd a Protestation, declaring all Acts to be void, which from the Time of his Expulsion, had been done in the House of Commons, he contented himself with waiting the Return of the People to their Allegiance, and liv'd Retir'd, 'till General Monk pav'd the Way for the Restoration of the Royal Family: At which Time, the Corporation of Colchester (e) sent him the following Letter:

Honourable Sir,

As we cannot but with Thankfulness action in general, so more particularly to this Town

'Town, that after the many Changes and Alterations we have been toss'd in, that now there is (as we are credibly inform'd, and do believe) 'a free Admission of the Members of the late Parliament, fo long interrupted by Force, we cannot but with much Earnestness, (in the Behalf of our ' selves, and the free Burgesses of this Town) ' make our humble Request, that you will be pleas'd to return to that Trust to which you were ' To freely and unanimously elected, in the Year 1640, which we do the rather request out of the ' former Experience; that not only this Town, ' but the Nation in general, hath had of your faithfulness and Ability; and the many Mise-' ries and Calamities we have groan'd under fince 'your Absence: And as we formerly had the ' Honour of fending so eminent and worthy a ' Member, so we shall hope, (by the Blessing of 'God upon your Endeavours) that not only our ' selves, but the whole Nation in general, shall ' have Cause to bless God for your Return; and, in his due Time, reap the Benefit of your Coun-'cils, and labour in that great Assembly. Sir, 'We shall not farther trouble you at present, ' than to affure you we are, as by many former ' Favours, bound to be

On the calling of a new Parliament, all those that meant well to the King, contriv'd his Election for Speaker; and the noble Author before. mention'd, tells us, That he submitted to it out of a Hope and Confidence, that the Designs it was laid for would succeed. And King Charles the 2d had so just a tense of his Merits and Services towards the Restoration, that he advanc'd him the 3d of Nov. the same Year, (d) to the honourable Post of Master of the Rolls, (and appointed him of his Privy Council) which he very judiciously executed, to the Satisfaction of all concern'd in the Law, and his compiling and publishing the Reports of Law Cases of Sir George Crook, one of the Justices of the Common Pleas, sufficiently demonstrate his Learning therein: He was likewise well read in the Writings of the ancient Fathers of the Church, and wrote in Latin, for the Use of his Son, a small Manual of the Duty of a Chridian: He likewise lest in Manuscript a particular Fournal of the several Debates in the Treaty in the Isle of Wight, wherein he was concern'd; among which are many weighty Arguments concerning the Liberty of the Subject, and the Authority of Church-Government: He was a Member for Colchester in all Parliaments, from 15 Car. 1. to the Time of his Death, and was as well heard as any in the House of Commons: As his Views and Designs were directed to the Good of the Publick, which he had always at Heart, he was the less Sollicitous, in the Reign of King Charles the 2d, to be Great at Court, tho' he held a Friendship and Correspondence with many of the leading Men, particularly the Earl of Clarendon, as appears by Letters between them:

He was an honourable Friend, a kind indulgent Father and Master, and finish'd his Course like a pious, charitable, good Christian, with a full Assurance of Happiness in another World, in January 1683, possess of a large Estate, which descended to Samuel, his only surviving Son and Heir, by Mary his Wife, Daughter of Sir George Crook, before-mention'd: He had by her 5 other Sons that dy'd before him, and 2 Daughters.

Mary, who marry'd Sir Capel Luckin, Kt. and Bart. and Elizabeth, Sir George Grubham-How, Bart. and, by a 2d Wife, the Relict of Sir Thomas Meauty's, (Daughter and Heir of Sir Nicholas Bacon, of Culford-Hall in Suffolk, Kt.) he had an

only Daughter that dy'd young.

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Sir Samuel Grimston, Bart. (only surviving Son of Sir Harebottle) was born the 7th of Jan. 1643, and having all the Advantages of Education, was a Gentleman well esteem'd; he serv'd in five several Parliaments for the Borough of St. Albans, during the Reigns of King James the 2d, King William, and Queen Mary; his chief Residence being at Gorhambury, in Com. Hertf. (a Seat and Manor his Father had purchas'd of the Heirs of Sir Thomas Meauty's;) He marry'd two Wives, Elizabeth, Daughter to Heneage Finch, Earl of Nottingham; and Anne, Daughter of John Earl of Thanet; by the former he had an only Daughter, the Lady Elizabeth, who marry'd William Savile, Marquess of Halifax; by the other, he had a Son and a Daughter; Edward, born the 22d of July, 1674; and Mary, born the Year after; but they both dy'd young; so that the Dignity of Baronet expir'd with the faid Sir Samuel, who departed this Life in the 52d Year of his Age, A.D. 1700, leaving a great Fstate to William, 2d Son of Sir William Luckin of Messing-hall, in Essex, Kt. and Bart. (who was Son and Heir of Sir Capel Luckin,

Bart. by Mary his Wife, eldest Daughter of Sir Harbottle Grimston, Bart. and Sister to the said Sir Samuel, under certain Limitations; and that he should bear the Name of Grimston for ever.

Which William Grimston of Gorbambury in Hertfordshire, Esq, is now Member in the present Parliament for the Borough of St. Albans, and having marry'd Jane, Daughter of Mr. James Cook, Citizen of London, hath Issue 4 Sons, Samuel, James, Harbottle, and George.

THE ancient Deeds and Writings of this Family being destroy'd, when Asson-House was plunder'd, in the Time of the Rebellion, A.D.

A. D. 1641. the first that I can discover, (a) is Sir Henry Holt, Father to Sir Hugh Holt, who marry'd Matilda, Daughter to Sir Henry de Erdington, Baron of Erdington, (by Joan his Wife, Daughter and Co-heir of Sir Thomas de Wolvey) and had Issue by her a Son, John, at Holte, and dy'd, leaving her a Widow, Anno 16, E. 2. (b)

John, his Son, had to Wife Alice de Castello, or Castell, Daughter, and at length sole Heir to Sir George de Castell, descended from the Castells ancient Lords of Withibroke, in the County of Warwick; and, by a Female Ancestor from Reginald de Asseles, Lord of Nechels: And, Anno 4 Edw. 3. Alice, (then Widow of Sir George, Neice and Heir to Aliva, one of the Co-heirs to Simon de Asseles) in Consideration of 40 Pounds, pass'd away all her Inheritance in the Mauour, unto Simon del Holt of Bermingham, and his Heirs; which Estate is still in the Family.

This Simon del Holt, was Son of John, aforesaid; and, by his Wise, Albreda de Bermingham, (a Daughter of a noble and eminent House, Progenitor to the Earls of Louth, in Ireland.) had

Issue 2 Sons, John and Walter.

John Atte-Holte, call'd Senior, in Respect of his son, was living 21 Edw. 3. and had also 2 Sons, J. hn and Walter. The first of which purchas d the Manor of Dudston, 38 Edw. 3. for 40 Marks of John de Grimesarve. And Maud de Grimesarve, (40 Edw. 3.) convey'd the Manor of Aston to the said John Atte-Holte, (denominated of Eermingbam) as her Charter, dated at Aston on the Sunday next before the Feast of St. Agapite the Martyr testifics. (c)

This John Holt having had in Marriage Eleanor Durvassal of Spernall; and the Heir of that Family dy'd Childless; and Walter Holt, his Uncle, succeeded in the Estate.

Which Walter, Anno 49 Edw. 3. and 1 Ric. 2. underwent the Office of Escheator to the King for Counties of Warwick and Leicester, a Service in those Times of great Trust, and wherein none but Persons of noted Worth and Quality were employ'd. (d) In the later of which Years, he was the principal Commissioner assign'd in that County of Warrick, for levying and collecting a Fifteenth and Tenth, then granted to the King in Parliament; and, by a Feoffment to one William Whetele, and other Persons in Trust, he settled the Manor of Aston to the Use of himself, and Margery his Wife; (Daughter of - Bagot) as also to his own right Heirs: And departing this Life, left Issue 3 Sons, John, Simon, and William: His Wife Margery furviving, who, the better to secure her Estate, enseost John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, Sir William Bagot of Bagington, and other Persons of Quality.

John, the eldest Son, was stil'd of Yardly, and had Issue Audomar Holt, his Son and Heir, who was disposses of Asson, by his Uncle, William Holt, who having great Favour and Countenance from King Hen. 4. got a Grant of the said Estate for Life, in the 1st Year of his Reign, in Consideration of the good Service done, and to be done, as the Words of the Patent import. Which King chaleng'd a legal Title thereto, as Son and Heir to John Duke of Lancaster, above-mention'd; whereas that Duke was only a Feosse. In the Patent, the King calls this William Holt, dilestus Armiger noster;

whence it is conjectur'd, he was his Servant before he attained the Crown.

Notwithstanding the aforesaid Grant, Sir William Bagot, another Trustee, set on Foot his Title to Asson Manor, 5 H. 4. and, in Conclusion, there was a Reserence betwirt them made to Edward Duke of Tork, and Richard Benuchamp, Earl of Warwick, to whose Arbitration they bound themselves to submit in 200 l. Bonds apiece: The Particulars of the Award, Sir William Dugdale (who mentions it) had not seen, but William Hole kept the Possession. For 14 Hen. 6. he releas d to Ward and Shyngler, (as Feosses) all his Right therein; and the next Year, for the better corroborating his Title, Andomar, his Nephew, the right Heir, releas d to him his Right and Claim, and dy'd without Issue.

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This William Holt, Anno 12 Hen 6. was one of the chief Persons in Warwickshire, chosen to make Oath for Personance of divers Articles, concluded in the Parliament then held, having the Stile of William Holt de Asson, Armiger; but, for ought appears, the Estate he had granted by King Hen. 4. was only for Term of Life; so that the Inheritance resting in the Crown, occasion'd John Holt, his Nephew, (2d Son to his Brother Simon) Anno 19 Hen. 6. to procure a Patent thereof, with all the Liberties and Privileges thereto belonging, (therein particularly express'd) for himself and his Heirs, to be held of the chief Lord of the Fee, and not of the King in Capite.

This John (Son and Heir of Simon Holt, by Matilda his Wife, Daughter and Heir of Richard Collyng of Brigg North, in Com. Salop, Esq; being so vested in the Manor of Aston, as aforesaid: Taking likewise Notice of a certain Act of Reassumption, made in the Parliament held at Westminster

minster 29 Hen. 6. exhibited his Petition to the King, that the same Act might not be prejudicial to him, nor unto Margaret his Wise, nor the Heirs of the said John, in Respect of the said Patent, considering that it had been duly recover'd (as the said Petition alledged) according to due Course of Law, before the Justices of the Common-Pleas, in the tenth Year of the said King's Reign, by the said Aymer Holt, Cousin and Heir [i. e. Grandson] to the before specify'd Walter, against William Holt, Esq, then Tenant thereof, by Virtue of certain Letters-Patent to him made, which Petition was accordingly granted.

Of this John, I farther find, that he was constituted Escheator of Warwick and Leicestersbire. Anno 16 Hen. 6. and became afterwards a Esquire of the Body to the same King; who, in Recompence of his Fidelity and Diligence, made him Ranger of Sutton Chase for Life. The Words of which Patent (e) being memorable, I shall insert them: " Rex, &c. Sciatis quod de gratia nostra " speciali, ac consideratione diutini & continui scrvitii quod Humilis servitor noster, Joh. Holt, Armiger, de " Hospitio nostro, nobis impendit, & impendere propo-" nis in futuro Concessimus ei Officium de Ridership, " infra Chaceam de Sutton, in Com nostro de Warwici, quod per Rebellionem Ricardi nuper Comitis War-" wici vacat, & de dono nostro existit Habend. &c. Pre-" fato Johanni seu deputato suo sufficientii, pro termi-" no vita sua &c. Teste Rege apud Coventre, xxiii " May.

He left Issue by Margery his Wife, Daughter of Sir Richard Delabere of Kynardsley, in Com. Heref. Kt. William Holt, Esq. who marry'd Margaret, Daughter of William Cumberford of Cumberford, in

Com.

Com. Staff. Esq; and left a Son of his own Name,

William, who succeeded to the Estate.

Which William Holt, Esq, lies bury'd in the North-Isle of the Church, at Aslon, under a curious Marble Monument, whereon his Essigies, cut out in Sculpture, lies in Armour under a Surcoat, his Hands conjoin'd and erect, his Head resting on an Helmet for Pillow, and at his Feet a Lyon couchant: Round the Monument on the Sides, in the several Areas, or Inter-columns, are Angels crown'd and vested in long Robes, exhibiting before their Breasts Shields, containing the Arms of Holt, impaling the Arms of Knight; and Single, the Arms of Delabere, Comberford, &c. The Inscription round the Verge, is,

" Of your Charity, pray for the Soule of William Holt, Esquyre, sometime Lord of this Towne, and Joane his Wife. Which William dy'd the xxviii September, the Teare of Howre Lord MCCCXXIII.

But the Date of the Year is either mistaken, or imperfect, thro' Time. His Wife was Daughter of Adam Knight, of Shrewsbury, Esq, and he

had Issue by her

Thomas Holte, who was a learned Lawyer, and Justice of North-Wales, temp. Hen. 8. As also in Commission for the Peace in his County, the greatest Part of that King's Reign; and also in Commission for the taking the Surrender of religious Houses in that County. He wedded Margery, eldest of the seven Daughters and Co-heirs to William Willington of Barcheston, in Com. Warw. Esq. (a wealthy Merchant of the Staple) who surviving him afterwards, became the Wife of Sir Ambrose Cave, Kt.

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The faid Thomas was bury'd with his Ancestors at Allon, under a prostrate Stone, whereon are the Portraitures of himself, and his Wife; and a Shield of Arms over their Heads, viz Holt impaling Willington; and, in the Middle Part, the following Tetrastick.

"Thomas Holt here lyeth in Grave: Thu, for this Passion " Of him have thou Compassion, And his Soule do Save.

Below are the Ichnographical Figures of their Sons, and 2 Daughters. Round the whole, (in a Bordure, having at the four Angles quadrangulated Circles, figur'd with the Symbols of the four Evangelists, viz. a Cherub, Lyon, Bull, and Eagle) is this Incription:

" Of your Charity, pray for the Scoles of Tho-" mas Holte, Ffquier, late Justice of North-" Wales, and Lord of this Town of Aiton, and " Margaret bis Wife: Which Thomas deceas'd "the xxiii Day of Marche, Anno Dom' MCCCCCXLV. whoose Sooles God pardon.

Edward Holt (Son and Heir of the faid Thomas) had his Education with Sir John St. Leger, (then of Weobly-Cafile, in Com. Wigorn.) as by his Fathers Will appears, and was constituted one of the Justices of Peace for Warwickshire 14 Eliz. and in the 26th of that Reign, High Sheritf of that County. He had Sepulchre with his Ancestors in the Parish-Church of Aston: A curious Mural Monument being erected to his Memory, with this Memorial, in Roman Capitals.

" Here

"Here lyeth buried Edward Holte, Esquier, and borothy bis Wife: Edward was Lord of this Town, and Patron of this Church and Viceridge: He was also Lord of Duddeston and Nechels, ..... and other Lands within this Parish. Who dyed about Candlemas, being about the Age of One and fifty Tears, in the xxxvth Tear of the Reigne of Queen Elizabeth, and in the Years of our Saviour Christ 1592.

By Dorothy, Daughter of John Ferrers of Tam-

worth-Castle, Esq, he had a Son,

Thomas Holt, Esq, who was of full Age at the Death of his Father, was High Sheriff of the County of Warwick, 42 Eliz. and receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood (18 April 1603) from King James I. at Grimfton, in Com. Ebor. when he arriv'd there from Scotland, in his Way to London, to take Possession of the Crown of England; and was afterwards farther advanc'd by that Prince, to the Dignity of a Baronet, 25 Nov. in the 10th Year of his Reign. He was a Gentleman well read in most Parts of Learning, and vers'd in several Languages; was highly esteem'd in his Country by Men of all Conditions, being of an even Temper, truly Just, Charitable, and exemplary in his Life and Conversation: Having amply increas'd his Estate, which receiv'd a very large Accession by his first Marriage, he enclosed the Park, began the Structure (in April 1618) of that ancient and noble House now remaining at Asson Stockland's, which, (Sir William Dugdale says (f) for Beauty and State much exceeds any in those Parts:

Parts: He was nominated by his Majesty King Charles the 1st, to go Embassador into Spain, but by Reason of his great Age he got himself excus'd: Upon the Irruption of the Civil Wars. he heartily affifted the King with his Purfe; but being very old, and of a quiet Disposition, stay'd at his own Seat, without following the Camp. and had the Honour of a Visit from the King, who lay at his House two Nights, about six Days before the Battel of Edge hill: His Affections to the Royal Cause being visible; and his Son actually in the Service, the Rebels plunder'd his House, imprison'd him, decimated his Estate, and forc'd fuch Contributions, that the Damage he sustain'd. was computed at 20000 l. (g) He dy'd in the 82d Year of his Age, A. D. 1654, having by his last Will and Testament assign'd 300 l. for the erecting an Hospital at Asson, for 5 Men and 5 Women, appointing a Rent-Charge out of his Manor of Erdington, of 881. per Ann. for their Support.

He marry'd 2 Wives, Grace, one of the Daughters and Co-heirs to William Bradburne of Hough, in Com. Derb. Fig. and Anne, Daughter of Sir Edw. Littleton of Pilleton Hall, in Com. Staff. Bart. but by her had no Issue. By his first Lady he had is Children; most of which liv'd to Men and Womens Of his Daughters, Anne marry'd Walter Gifford of Chillington, in Com. Staff. Esq. Katherine was Wife of --- Roper, and Grace of Sir Richard Shugborough of Shugborough, in Com. Warw. Kt. but of the Sons, no Issue is surviving, except from Edward, his eldest Son, who was one of the Grooms of the Bedchamber to King Charles I. and attended him during the Rebellion; and was, with other his Majesty's Friends, in Oxford when it

it was besieg'd; but falling ill of a Feaver, dy'd before the Surrender thereof, and lies bury'd in Christ Church, leaving Issue by Elizabeth his Wife, Daughter of Dr. John King, Bishop of London, Robert, Successor to his Grandfather, and John, who dy'd unmarry'd: Also a Daughters; Grace, wedded to George Hampson, Esq. Katherine, Wife of Sir Edward Nevill, Kt. and Bart. and Elizabeth, of —— Duncomb, Esq.

Sir Robert Holt, Bart. (Grandson and Heir to Sir Thomas) did his best Endeavours for the Restoration of the Royal Line, and for his known Loyalty, (b) was appointed High Sherist of Warwickshire the 1st Year after the Return of King Charles; and the Year following, (13 Car. 2.) was elected Knight for that County in Parlia-

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He marry'd first Jane, Sister to William Lord Brereton of Brereton, in Com. Cestr. who dy'd in Child-bed of her only Son, the present Sir Charles Holt; and after her Decease, taking to Wise Mary, Daughter of Sir Thomas Smith of Hough, in Com. Cestr. Kt. had 8 Children, whereof 1 Son, nam'd Robert, is now living unmarry'd, 1714, and no Issue remaining of the rest. He dy'd 2 Ost. 1679, and was interr'd by his first Wite, in the parochial Church of St. Clement's Danes, Midd. His only Son, by his first Venter, succeeding him in Title and Estate.

Which Sir Charles Holt, Bart hath ferv'd as one of the Knights of the Shire in Parliament for the County of Warwick, in the 1st Year of King James II. and having marry'd Anne, eldest Daughter and Coheir of Sir John Clobery of Winchester, Kt. hath Issue Clobery, Anne, Jane, Mary, Charles, Frances, Selena, John, Diana, and Elizabeth, all being unmarry'd 1714. 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From Urian, (who bore, for Distinction, a Feß Argent, interpos'd between the three Silver Pheons, on a red Field) by Alice his Wife, a Daughter and Heir of Caldicot de Caldicot, descended the Egertons of Caldecot and Wrinebill, who vary'd the Feß to Ermin, and were enrich'd by the Intermarriages of Almaly Haselwell, Hawkstones of Wrineford, or Wrinebill, and Hill of Mountbill, a younger Branch whereof are the Egertons of Bettley in Staffordshire, whose chief Heir-Mail, Major-General Randolph Egerton, is commemorated with his first Lady, Penelope, Daughter to Robert Needbam, Lord Viscount Kilmurrey, in the Abbey Church of Westminster, A. D. 1670, where she was bury'd, leaving no Heirs Male: Neither had he any Issue by his 2d Wife, Elizabeth, Daughter to Henry Murray, Esq. (by Anne, Daughter to the Viscount Banning.) David de Egerton, eldest Son and Heir of Philip, last mention'd, and elder Brother of the afore-nam'd Uryan, was High Sheriff of Cheshire, 7 Ed. 3.

A. D. 1333, (d) and having to Wise Isabella, Daughter to Richard Foulshurst of Crew, in that
County, lest Issue 3 Sons, Philip, Uryan, David,

and Robert Egerton of Bickerton in Cheshire.

Urian Egerton succeeded as Lord of Egerton, varying the Coat Armour born by his Ancestors, the Belwards and Egertons, viz. This Uryan, by Amelia his Wife, Daughter of John Warburton of Warburton, had Issue John, his Son and Heir.

John de Egerton marry'd Matilda, Daughter of David de Malpas, and left Issue Sir John Egerton of Egerton, Kt. who, with Sir Hugh Venables, Sir Thomas Dutton, Sir Richard Molineux, Sir William Troutbeck, Sir John Leigh, and Sir John Done, having receiv'd the young Prince's Livery of the Swans, fought strenuously for the House of Lancafter, under the Lord Audley, General for King Hen. 6. and seal'd their Loyalty to their Prince with the Loss of their Lives, being slain with many other of the principal Gentry of Cheshire, in the great and bloody Battel on Bloore-beath, in Staffordsbire, fought Sept. 22, A. D. 1459, (s) by Richard Earl of Salifbury, in Behalf of the Tork Interest. This Sir John had, by his Wife Margaret, Daughter of Sir John Fitton of Cheshire, Philip

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Philip, last nam'd, marsy'd Margaret, Daughter to William Manwaring of Ightfield, Esq. (or as others, to John de Waren) and had Issue 3 Sons: 1. William, who marry'd Margery, Daughter of Sir Ralph Egerton of Wrinebill, but had no Issue; 2. John, (hereafter-mention'd) 3. Sir Ralph Egerton of Ridley, in Com. Ceftr. Kt. also 4 Daughters: I. Anne, marry'd to John Starkey of Wrenbury; 2. Katherine, Wife of John Almore, Esq. 3. Ellen, marry'd to Richard Wilbraham of Woodhey, Esq. and lastly, Elizabeth, Wife of John Lod of Clover, in Com. Salop. Which Sir Ralph Egerton of Ridley, aforesaid, was, with Roger Manwaring, made Eschaetors of Cheshire for their Lives; and the Survivor of them, 7 July, 1 Hen. 8. And under that King he was one of the Gentlemen-Ushers of the Bed-chamber; and in the 6th Year of his Reign was conftituted Ranger of the King's Forest of Delamere, during Life. (f) From him, and Margaret his Wife, Daughter and Heir of Ralph Baffet of Blore, sprung the Egertons of Ridley, whose chief Descendant is now seated at Shaw in Lancashire; and of this Ridley Branch, (natural Son of Sir Richard Egerton, and Alice Spark of Bickerton) was Sir Thomas Egerton of Dodlefton, Solicitor-General, Attorney-General, Chamberlain of Chester, Master of the Rolls, and Lord-Keeper of the Great Seal fuccessively, in the Reign of Queen Elizabeth; made Baron Ellesmer, Viscount Brackley, under King James 1. and the Progenitor of the Earls of Bridgwater, whose younger Branches are the Egertons of Tatton, in Com. (call'd Oldeton, (g) Dorms [day Book, held at the Time of the Conquest by Nigel, Baron of Haulton) and in this Lady's Right, he obtain'd that Manor; and (Leland mentions this John to reside there, as then the eldest House of the Egertons) (b) his Issue by her was Philip, his Successor, and Susan, Wife of Randle Egerton of Dynbam.

Which Philip Egerton, of Egerton and Oulton. Esq; had in Marriage Jane, Widow and Relict of - Winnington, Daughter, and at length Heir to Sir Gilbert Smith of Cuerdley, in Lancashire, (Brother to William, Bishop of Lincoln, and Founder of Brasen-Nose College in Oxford) whence procceded a Daughter, Margaret, Wife of Sir Hugh Starkey of Oulton, and Sir Philip Egerton his Successor, who was High Sheriff of Cheshire 5 Q. M. and having marry d Eleanor, Daughter to Sir Randal Brereton of Instances, was succeeded by his Son and Heir

John Egerton, Esq; who had to Wife Jane, Daughter to Richard Mossin of Talacre, in Fintshire, Esq. who bore him a Daughter, Elizabeth, (marry'd to Sir William Stanley, Esq., Son and Heir to Sir Rowland Stanley of Hooton) and 2 Sens; 1. John, 2. Philip, who dy'd without Issue.

Which John posses'd his paternal Inheritance, A. D. 1580, and was usually call'd Black Sir John, being knighted by Queen Elizabeth, A.D. 1599, and having marry'd Margaret, Daughter of the

Peter, 4th Son, who marry'd Margaret, Daughter to Sir Thomas Hawes Kt. and Alderman of London, by whom he had Issue a Daughter, marry'd to ---- Cox, Father of Folm Cox, Keeper of the Council-Chamber at Wbitehall, in which Office he dy'd, A.D. 1711. and 5 Richard Egerton, who dy'd without Issue: His Daughters were Frances, Wife of John Winshall of Winshall, Esq. (whose Daughter marry'd ----Cholmondley of Valeroyal) 2. Margaret, marry'd to Thomas Hall, also to Lawrence W bittacer of London, Esq. and Mary, to Richard Cartwright of Aynboe, in Northamptonshire, Esq, The faid Sir John had a second Wife, Anne, Daughter to Robert Barnard. Esq; and dying at London April the 27th, A.D. 1614, in the 63d Year of his Age, was bury'd at Madeley, in Staffordsbire, in July following, being succeeded by his eldest Son,

Sir Romland Egerton, of Egerton, Kt. whom his Majesty King James 1. advanc'd to the Degree of a Baronet, A. D. 1617, by Letters-Patent, bearing Date the 5th of April, in the 15th Year of his Reign: Hewas possess of a very great Estate, in the Counties of Chester, Stafford, Salop, Bucks, Northampton, and Flint, and was a Person of great Abilities, and steady Loyalty to King Charles the 1st, during the Rebellion that overwhelm'd this Kingdom, as appears as well by other Testimonies, as from a particular License granted him by that King, upon a full Satisfaction of his suture as well as past Fidelity and good Services, (as is therein express'd) to continue at his Seat at Farthinghoe in Northamptonshire, when others that

July, A. D. 1648.

She was Daughter to Arthur Lord Grey, Baron. of Wilton, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland to Queen Elizabeth, a Knight of the Garter, and Sister of the whole Blood, and Heir to Thomas Lord Grev. the last of that Line, which had enjoy'd the Peerage even from the Reign of King Edward 1. The faid Sir Rowland had Issue by her 3 Daughters; Sibil, 1st, marry'd to - Bellot of Moreton, in Cheshire, afterwards to Edmund Anderson of Broughton, in Com. Lincoln, 1:sq: Elizabeth, to Sir William Radcliffe of Foxdenton, in Lancashire, Kt. and Mary, who dy'd unmarry'd. Also 6 Sons; 1. Thomas, who marry'd Barbara, Daughter of Sir Fohn St. Fohn of Lydyard Tregoz, in Wiltshire, Bart. but dv'd without Issue in the Life-time of his Father, (whom he constituted his Executor) A. D. 1641, and lies bury'd at Farthinghoe. 2. Sir Fobn. his Successor. 3. Arthur Egerton, who dy'd without Issue. 4. Philip, knighted soon after the Restoration, by King Charles the 2d, for his Lovalty during the preceding Rebellion. Sir Philip obtain'd of his Father the ancient natural Estates in Cheshire, and marry'd Katherine, Daughter and Heir to Piers Conway of Hendry, in Com. Flint, Esq. by whom he had 2 Sons; John Egerton, now living at Oulton, whose present Lady is Elizabeth, Sister to the present Earl of Cholmondeley, and Philip Egerton, Doctor of Divinity, Rector of Ashbury in Cheshire. Also 2 Daughters; Mary, Wife of Richard Lord Viscount Bulkeley, of Cashells in Ireland, Father by her to the present Lord of that Name; and Bridget, who dy'd unmarry

marry'd. The other Sons of Sir Rowland, were Rowland Egerton of Chedleton, in Com. Staff. and Charles Egerton of Walasea, in Cheshire, who both

dy'd without Issue.

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Sir John Egerton, Bart. (eldest surviving Son and Heir of Sir Rowland) resided sometime at Wrinebill, in Com. Staff. where he dy'd, A.D. 1675, and had Sepulture at Madeley; having Issue by Anne his Lady, Daughter to George Wintour of Derbam, in Com. Gloucest. Esq. one Son, the prefent Sir John, and 3 Daughters; Bridget, Wife first of Ralph Thicknesse of Balterly, in Com. Staff. Esq; secondly, of Timothy Hyldeyard, de Com. Linc. Margaret, marry'd to Windsor Finch of Rushock, in Worcestershire, Esq. and Anne, to John Gardiner of

Brackley, in Com. Northamp. Esq.

Sir John Egerton, Bart now living at Farthingboe, in Northamptonshire, marry'd A.D. 1684, Elizabeth, Daughter of William, and Sister and sole Heir to Edward Holland of Denton and Heaton, in the County of Lancaster, Esq. by whom he had Issue six Sons: 1. Holland, 2. John, who dy'd of the Small Pox A. D. 1709; 3. Edward, 4. Ralph, 5 Thomas, and 6 William. Also 2 Daughters, Anne and Elizabeth, both unmarry'd. His said Lady. dy'd of the Small Pox 31 May, 1701, and was interr'd at Madeley: And he hath fince (viz. A. D. 1703) marry'd Anne, sole Daughter and Heir of Francis Wolverston of Statsold, in Staffordsbire, by whom he has a Daughter nam'd Katherine.

Holland Egerton. Esq; eldest Son and Heir Apparent to Sir John, is Possessor of his Mother's Estate at Heaton, in Com. Lanc. and had in Marriage (A.D. 1712) Eleanor, youngest Daughter to Sir Roger Cave of Stanford, in the County of Leicester, Bart. (by his second Wife Mary, Sister to the the Right Hon. William Bromley, Esq. late Speaker of the House of Commons, and Principal

THIS Family, fur nam'd from a Female Ancestor, is paternally descended from the ancient Family of Woodchurch of Woodchurch, in Kent, that was possessed of the said Place at for foon after) the Conquest; for Ralph de Woodchmich, Son of Anchetellus de Woodchurch, is said to be Eustos castri London, (a) in the Reign of King William Rufus; and Mr. Philpot, in his Discourse on Woodchurch, in the Hundredof Blackburn, (b) gives an Account, 'that it was the Habitation of a Family of as deep Root in Antiquity as any in that Track; who extracted their Sur-name, as well as borrow'd their first Original, from that Place. Roger de Woodchurch, (he says) is the first who does occur; who in ancient Evidences and Deeds, not cloister'd within any Date, finds a frequent "Mention; and from him (as appears by an old Pedigree of this Family) did it devolve to his Grandchild Sir Simon de Woodchurch, who is in the Register of those eminent Persons, who accompany'd Edw. I. in his victorious and triumphant Expedition into Scotland, where his Victories entail'd upon his Memory the Character of Maleus Scotorum; but in this Sir Simon the Name, tho' not the Male Line, determind; for he, by matching with Susan, Heir of Hemy e le Clerke of Munfidde, brought a large Inheritance to own the Signiory of Woodchurch; and

his Successors, in Gratitude to a Family, which had added so much of Splendour, and annex'd fo plentiful a Revenue to his Name, alter'd their paternal Appellation from Woodchurch to · Clerke: And so in all their Deeds, subsequent to this Match, have written Clerke, alias Wood-· church, ever fince. But as all Families have their Descent and Period, as well as Gradation and Ascent, so had this; for after this Manor ' had for so many hundred Years continu'd in ' this Family, which had been productive of ' Men which had been planted in Places of the greatest Eminence, by which they were oblig'd ' to perform their Service to their Country, it ' came down at last to Humphry Clark, Esq. who, about the Year 1594, pass'd it away by Sale. to Walter Harlackenden, Esq. Which Humpbry Clerk, (Son of John Clerk of Woodchurch) was afterwards of King's-North in Kent; (c) and, by Margaret his Wife, Daughter of John Maney of Biddenden, had Issue 4 Daughters that were marry'd, and 2 Sons; 1st Humpbry Clark, of Buckford, in Great Chart, (Father to another Humphry, who had a Son Francis) 2d Walter Clarke

and a Daughter Anne, the Wife of Abel Barnard.

Simon, the eldest Son, marry'd Margaret, Daughter and Co-heir of John Alderford of Abbots Salford, in Com. Warw. Esq. which induced him to purchase in that County several Manors, and a good Estate, particularly the Manor of Salford-Priors, (d) where he resided, and was created a Baronet, A. D. 1617. He was an Encourager of Sir Dugdale,

of Rudeliffe, in Com. Bucks, Fig, who marry'd Elizabeth, Daughter of Simon Edolph, Fig, and had Issue 4 Sons, Simon, Martin, John, and Humphry;

in his writing the Antiquities of Warwickshire; and on the Importunity of this Sir Simon and his Lady he came first to London, (e) accompanying them in their Journey in Easter Term, 1638, who asterwards introduc'd him to Sir Henry Spelman. He had Issue by the said Margaret, 3 Sons; John, Peter, and Woodchurch; also a Daughter, Elizabeth. But no farther Account, to be depended on, can I obtain; the Estate in Warwickshire, being out of the Family, and Sir Simon Clarke, the present Baronet, (as I am inform'd) very poor.

Edward Fitton of Gawsworth, Esq; Cest. N°99

[Oct. 2, A. D. 1617, R. Jac. I. 15.]

THE first of this Family, written of Gawfworth, (a) was Sir Edward Fitton, Kt. Son of John Fitton, by his Wife, a Daughter of Brereton. Which Sir Edward, by Mary his Wife, Daughter of Sir Guschurch-Harbottle, Kt. had 3 Daughters and 4 Sons; of which Edward, the Eldest, succeeded

ceeded at Gawsworth, was Sheriff of Cheshine in 23 Hen. 8, and made one of the Knights of the Bath at the Coronation of Queen Anne Bullen, in 25 Hen. 8. (\*) and, in 36 Hen. 8. again Sheriff (b) of the aforesaid County; and having marry d Anne, Daughter of Peter Warburton, Esq; was succeeded by a Son of his own Name.

Edw. Fitton, who was elected one of the Knights of the Shire for the County of Cheller, in the first Parliament call'd by Q. Mary; (c) afterwards receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood, was High Sheriff of the said County when Queen Elizabeth ascended the Throne; and giving Proofs of his Loyalty and Affection to the Protestant Interest, he was fent with Forces, in the Beginning of her Reign, against the Rebels in Ireland; and in the Year 1566, marching with Sir Henry Sidney, Lord-Deputy, from Tredagh, thro' Ulster to Galway, was there establish'd President of Connaught; and, in three Years Time, by Valour in the Field, and severe Justice in the Courts, so quell'd the stubborn Hearts of the Rebels, that his Province had but very little Disturbance. (d) these, and other Services in that Kingdom, he acquir'd a good Reputation; was fworn of the Council, and made Treasurer (e) of Ireland. marry'd Alice, Daughter and Heir of Sir Fobn Holcroft of Holcroft, in Com. Ceft. Kt. and left Issue 2 Daughters and 3 Sons; Edward, Richard, and Alexander: The two later fettled in Ireland; and, with their elder Brother, had a confiderable Part of the Earl of Desmond's Estate, that was forfeited for Rebellion against Queen Elizabeth.

Edward (eldest Son of the last Sir Edward) was knighted with the Lord Chancellor Gerrard, by Sir William Pelham, Lord Justice of Leland, on the 11th of Oct. 1579, when he was sworn in his Office. He succeeded his Father at Gawsworth, and having a very good Estate in Ireland, he resided for the most Part in that Kingdom, being promoted to the honourable Post of Lord President of Munster (f) He was a wise and learned Knight, and Master of Arts in Oxford. Dying at London, he was bury'd at Gawsworth, A. D. 1605, leaving a Son of his own Name, Successor to his Estate.

Sir Edward Fitton, Bart. (Son and Heir of the last Sir Edward) engag'd in the Service of King Charles the 1st, during the unhappy Rebellion; rais'd a compleat Regiment of Foot at the Beginning of those Troubles, and at Tork receiv'd his Commission to be Colonel. His Behaviour in those Times was very eminent, his Majesty's Service being always at his Heart, which dispos'd him to march with his Regiment into the West, to the Siege of Bristol; and on the Surrender of that City to Prince Rupert, he was left in Garrison, and dy'd of a Consumption Gg 2

there, in August, A. D. 1543, leaving no Issue, tho' twice marry'd; fo that the Title of Baronet ceas'd. Felicia, his last Wife, (6th Daughter of Richard Sneade of Keele, in Com. Staff. Esq.) surviv'd him, and marry'd Sir Charles Adderley of Warwickshire, Kt. After the Decease of this Sir Edward great Contests arose about his Estate; his Sisters, as Co-heirs, enter d on it; and, upon three several Verdicts and Judgments at Law, were evicted out of it by Mr. William Fitton, (Son of Alexander Fitton, 2d surviving Son of Sir Edward Fitton, Treasurer of Iteland) by Virtue of a Conveyance alledg'd to be made by the said Sir Edward Fitton, settling his Estate (on his own Decease, without Issue) on his next Male Kinsman, the said William Fitton, and the Heirs Male of his Body: Accordingly the faid William, and his Son, Alexander Fitton, enjoy'd for some Years the said Estate: but after the Restoration of King Charles the 2d, the Lord Gerrard, (after Earl of Macclesfield) commenc'd a Suit against the said Alexander, (Son of the said William Fitton) on a Will he produc'd of the said Sir Edward Fitton. his Unkle, devising the Estate to him; upon which a Trial at the King's-Bench Bar enfu'd, and the said Alexander set forth a Deed Poll. bearing Date 3 April, 18 Car. 1. wherein the faid Sir Edward Fitton debarr'd himself to settle (in case he had no Issue) his Estate, by Will, on any others, but the Jury, after a full Hearing, found for the Lord Gerrard, who afterwards got Posfellion of the said Estate, and maintain'd it against the Pretenfions of the Fittons, who gave him much Disturbance by several Suits, as may be feen more at large in their feveral printed Narratives, wherein both charge each other with Perjary and Forgery.

Sir Richard Lucy of Broxbourn, Kt, Hert. No 100

[March 11, A.D. 1617, R. Jac. I. 15.]

THIS Family is generally said to take the Name of Lucy from a maternal Ancestor; (tho, thro Distance of Time, it can't evidently be made out) and that learned Antiquary Sir William Dugdale proves it to be paternally descended from Gilbert de Gaunt, Son of Baldwin, Earl of Flanders, whose Sister, William the Conqueror marry'd; of whom, and his Descendants he gives a long Account, in his Barronage of England, and Antiquities of Warwickshire.

This Gilbert de Gaunt affisting his Unkle. William Duke of Normandy, in the Conquest of England, had, in Reward for his Services, (beside other Possessions) the Lands of one Tour, a Dane; and, at the Time of the general Survey, (14 W. 1.) held (a) one Lordship in Berkshire, 2 in Oxfordshire, 3 in Torkshire, 6 in Cambridgeshire, 2 in Buckinghamshire, 1 in Huntingdonshire, 5 in Northamptonshire,

I in Rutland, I in Leicestershire, I in Warnietshire, II in Nottinghamshire, and II2 in Lincolnshire, of which Folingham was one; and the Head of his Barony, where he seated himself; and marrying Alice, Daughter and Heir of Robert, Son of Hugh Mountford, had Issue 3 Sons.

And Hugh, from the Eldest, descended the Gaunts, Earls of Lincoln, which Line extinguish d in Daughters, in the Reign of King Edward the

First.

Hugh, the Youngest, assumed the Name of Mountfort from his Mother, (b) (as was usual in those Days) she being a very great Inheritrix; for Hugh Mountfort, her Grandsather, an expert and valiant Soldier, accompanying William the Conqueror into England, and sharing in the Victory over King Harold, had by his Gift 28 Lordships in Kent, besides a large Proportion in Romney-Marsh, 16 in Essex, 51 in Suffolk, and 19 in Norfolk.

Which Hugh, Son of the faid Alice Mountfort. taking to Wife Adelina, Daughter of Robert Mellent, Earl of Leicester, (c) had Issue 2 Sons and 2 Daughters; Robert, the eldest Son, dving without Issue, was succeeded by his Brother, Thrustan de Mountfort, who erected a strong Castle in Warwickshire, whereunto was given, from its pleafant Situation, the French Name, Beldeser, which continu'd the chief Seat of his Descendants for He had 2 Sons; Henry de Mountdivers Ages. fort, who succeeded at Beldesert, (whose Descendants were Barons of the Realm) and Thurstan, fur-nam'd de Charlecete, from the Manor of Charlecote, the ancient Possessions of the Mellents, Earls of Leicester; (d) which, by the Marriage aforesaid oť

of Hugh de Mountfort, with Adelina, accru'd (no doubt) to Thurstan, his Father, Son of the said Hugh, with other large Possessions belonging to the Mellents.

The said Thurstan de Charlecote, had a Son Walter, to whom Henry de Mountfort, with Alice de Harcourt, the Widow of Robert de Mountfort, his elder Brother, gave all his Right in the Village of Charlecote; which Grant King Richard 1, by his Letters Patents, bearing Date at Dover 6 Decemb.—confirm'd to the same Walter and his Heirs, adding divers Immunities and Privileges thereto; all which were ratify'd by King John, in the 5th

of his Reign.

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From this Walter de Charlecote, (who was a Knight) by Cicely his Wife, descended William, that assumed the Sur-name of Lucy, (as Sir William Dugdale (e) thinks) from his Mother, that might be an Heir to some Branch of that Family, the Lucy's being denominated from a Place of the same Name in Normandy, (f) and eminent Barons of the Realm, being Lords of Egremont and Cockermouth; which Baronies devolv'd on two Coheirs, marry'd to Lambert and Alan de Multon, Brothers; the Eldest of whom had Egremont; and Alan, the Youngest, (whose Posterity took the Name of Lucy) Cockermouth; (g)

Of the said William de Lucy, Sir William Dugdale gives this (b) Account; that he had a Confirmation of the Lordship of Cherlecote from Thurstan de Mountfort, Son and Heir of Henry de Mountfort, above-specify'd, and was in Arms with the Barons against King John; but returning to his Allegiance in 1 H. 3. had his Lands seiz'd upon

for that Offence, restor'd to him, as appears by the King's Mandate to the Sherists of Worcester, Gloucester, Warwick, and Leicestershires, within which Counties this Estate lay. In 6 H. 3. he had the King's Letters Patent, confirming to him the Hundred of Kinton, that had been granted by King H. 2. to Walter, the Son of Thurstan de Charlecote, but had been seiz'd by King H. 3. with the Demess of the Crown, and such Escheats as had

happen'd.

This William de Lucy was a Knight in 17 H. 3. and Executor to his Brother, Stephen de Lucy, by whose Death he had a great personal Estate. 18 H. 3. Walter de Lasey, (a great Baron) conferr'd on him and his Heirs the Stewardship of all his Lands in England, with two Carucates, part of the Demesne of Ludelaw-Castle. In Consideration of which two Carucates, the said William and his Heirs were to be Constables of that Castle, and maintain there, as formerly, a Priest, a Porter, and two Centinels; but when the said Walter and his Heirs came thither, then he and his Heirs were to remain in the outer Ward. And farther it was agreed, that the faid Walter and his Heirs should fortify and defend it themselves, at their own Costs, in Times of Hostility. And that the faid William and his Heirs might take the accustom'd Rates assess'd on Bread and Beer in the Town of Ludelaw, in the Absence of the said Walter and his Heirs; and that he and they Thould have Fewel in the Woods belonging thereto. And farther, that when ever the said William and his Heirs, by Command of the said Walter and his Heirs, should be call'd to hold their Courts, receive Accompts, or other Occasions; that he and they should have Entertainment for themselves and Horses, at the Charge of the said Walter and his Heirs; which agreement beareth Date

Date at Trim in Ireland, 1 Augusti, 18 H. 3. In 20 H. 3. the Cuttody of Warnicksbire and Leicestershire was committed to his Charge, together with the Castle of Kenilworth; in which Trust he continu'd for the Space of 3 Years; and in 25 H. 3. was join'd in Commission with the then Sheriff, Fhilip de Assells, and others, for viewing all the Castles in Warwicksbire, and certifying their Defects to the King. In the next Year, he is mention d to be fign'd with the Cross for a religious Crusade: And this William was he that Tounded the Monastery of Thelesford, stiling himself in the Charter filius Walteri de Cherlecote, giving Lands for the building a Church and an Hospital for the Relief of poor People, receipt of Pilgrims, and Sustenance of religious Men, there ferving God for ever. Adding to this his Gift, the Advouson of the Church at Cherlecote, and confirming half a Yard Land, which Cicely his Mother had granted. He bore for his Arms, Verry, 2 Lucies hauriant, Argent, as appears by the Impression of one of his Seals; but by another, the Distinction of the Furr is omitted. He marry'd 2 Wives; Isabel, Daughter to Absolon de Aldermoneston, with whom he had certain Lands given him by Gervase, Abbot of Pershore. The 2d was Maud, Sifter, and one of the Co-heirs to John Cotele, of whose Inheritance he had the Manor of Berenton in Hantshire; and departed this Life about 32 H. 3. leaving Issue.

Sir William Lucy, Kt. his Son and Heir, of whom is nothing memorable but his Marriage, which was with a great Heir, viz. Amicia, Daughter and Heir to William de Furches, and Heir also of William Fitz-Warin, by whom he had Issue Fouk

de Lucy.

Which

Which Fouk was of the Retinue to Peter de Montfort, one of the rebellious Barons that took up Arms against the King, in 48 H 3. and was in such Fayour with them, that being indebted to one Elyas le Blund, a Jew of London, he procur'd a special Mandate (dated 7 Maii, 49 H. 3.) to the Commissioners, in whose Hands the Estates of the Jews then seiz'd on were intrusted, to deliver up the Bonds, and discharge him thereof; acquitting him of all Interest, but reserving the Payment of the Principal into the Exchequer; the Barons at that Time having the King's Person in their Custody, and made Use of his great Seal, &c. in his Name.

But these Barons being soon after utterly vanquish'd at Evesham, their Estates were confiscated, and the Estate of this Fouk de Lucy was given to Robert Waleraund; however, by that favourable Decree, call'd Distum de Kenilworth, he was admitted to Composition, and enjoy'd his Estate

again.

This Fonk took a Liking to good Horses; for in 11 Edw. 1 he gave 10 Marks to two Londoner's, that were Merchants of Horses, for a black Horse; about which Time a fat Ox was sold but for 16 s. In 14 Edw. 1, he was one of the Justices for the Goal-Delivery at Warwick; as also 17 Ed. 1. and 15th of that King's Reign, when he was one of the 4 Knights to take Care for the Conservation of the Peace in the County of Warwick, according to the Statute of Winchester; and having been a Benefactor to the Canons of Thelesford, dy'd 21 Ed. 1. leaving Issue, by Petronil his Wife, William Lucy, his Son and Heir, then 26 Years of Age.

Which William had Livery of his Father's Lands the same Year he dy'd, and was a Knight in 2 Ed. 2. if not sooner; and bore for his Arms,

Gules, seme of Croslets, with three Lucies hauriant, Argent, as by his Seal appears. He was a Person of great Note, for he serv'd as Knight for Warwickshire in the Parliament held at Westminster 6 Ed. 2, in that at Tork, 15 Ed. 2. and likewise in the Parliaments held 16 and 17 Ed. 2. 2 and 10 Ed. 3. (i) He was often in Commission for Goal-Deliveries at Warwick, and for Confervation of the Peace, according to the Statute of Winchester. In 15 and 16 Ed. 2. for choosing Foot-Soldiers. and conducting them to Newcastle upon Tine, to march against the Scots. In 18 Ed. 2. for ordering the Knights, Esquires, and other Soldiers that were to serve on Horse back with the King, in his Wars of Gasgoin: He was likewise a Benefactor to the Canons of Thelisford; and, by Elizabeth his Wife, had Issue a Daughter, marry'd to Geffery Son of Robert Lascells, and William, his Son and Heir.

Which William de Lucy, in 15 Ed. 2. was in the Well Expedition; and in 18 Ed. 3. was a Knight. being then in Commission to enquire and certify the Names of such in his County, who had from an C Shillings to 1000 l. per Ann. deducting the Services and necessary Reprizes. In 19 Ed. 3. he · receiv'd Summons, with many other Persons of Quality, to attend the King in his French Expedition, provided with Horse and Arms, at which Time the famous Battel of Creffy was fought, he being of the Retinue of Thomas Beauchamp, Earl of Warwick, but exempted from Attendance at that Time, being then join'd in Commission with the Sheriff to array 160 Archers in Warwickshire. for the King's Service. He dy'd about 22 Ed. 3. and, by Elizabeth his Wife, left Issue Thomas Lucy, who had 2 Wives; Elizabeth, Daughter and Heir

of Guy [Son of] Fitz-Robert, and Phillippe; which last, 28 Ed. 3. join'd with him in a Grant of certain arable Land in Cherlecote, to the Canons of Thelesford, to pray for the Souls of William de Clinton, Earl of Huntington, and them the said

Thomas and Phillippe.

This Thomas had Issue William Lucy, who being a Knight in 5 R. 2. was the same Year retain'd to serve John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, and King of Castile, with one Esquire for Life, as well in Times of War as Peace; for which Service, to have 20 l. per Ann. besides his Diet; and, in 1 H. 4. was one of the Knights for Warwickshire, in the

Parliament then held at Westminster.

To him succeeded Thomas, his Son and Heir, retain'd also with the said Duke of Lancaster for Term of Life, to serve him as well in Times of Peace as War; for which he was to have 10 Marks per Ann. Wages. This Thomas being a Knight, in 7 H. 4, ferv'd the same Year for his County in Parliament; and the next Year was constituted Sheriff of Warwick and Leicestershires, and was of the Retinue to Richard Beauchamp, Earl of Warrick, for which he had 201. per Ann. Fee. He wedded Alice, only Daughter of Sir William Hugford (but by the Death, without Issue of Margerie, Daughter to William, Son and Heir to the said Sir William) and at length his Heir, whereby he had a fair Inheritance lying in the Counties of Bedford and Salop: And departing this Life 28 Julii, 3 H. 5. left William his Son and Heir, 12 Years of Age; the faid Alice marrying Richard Archer, Esq. within eight Weeks after his said Decease.

This William was, during his Minority, in Ward to John Boteler of Werrington, in Com. Lanc. Fig. and in 2 H. 6. upon the Death of Elizabeth,

zabeth, Widow to Sir John Clinton, was found Cousin and Heir to her. In 14 H.6. he was Sheriff of Warwick and Leicestershires; as also 28 H.6. and the same Year join d in Commission with the Lord Grey of Groby, and others, for treating with the People about a Loan to the King; as likewise (31 H.6.) with Humphry Duke of Gloucester, and others. He adher'd to the House of Tork in their Quarrel with the Lancastrians; for 38 H.6. he had a Protection from the Earls of March and Warwick, dated 18 July, and ended this Life 16 Ed. 4. leaving by Elizabeth his Wise, Daughter to Reginald Lord Grey of Ruthyn, William, his Son and Heir, 26 Years of Age.

This William was in Commission of the Peace in 11, 12, 13, and 14 Ed. 4 in which 14th Year he had, for some great and special Considerations, the Gift of 160 l. bestow'd on him by the King, out of the Profits of Warwickshire and Leicestershires. being the same Year Sheriff of those Counties. In 20 Ed. 4. I find he was a Knight; and in 1 H. 7. he was created Kight of the Bath at the Queen's Coronation. 6. H. 7. he was in Commission for arraying Men in Com. Warwickshire, upon King Charles 8. King of France, threatning an Invasion, and the next Year releas'd to the Canons of Thelesford certain Privileges, that he and his Ancestors had, viz. Toll Tack, Stallage, and Bloodshed: And, by his Testament, bearing Date 2 July 1492, bequeath'd his Body to be bury'd in the Church of Stratford upon Avon, leaving Bequests to 8 Churches next adjoining, to Cherlecote, and for the Observation of his Exequies, divers Sums to the House of Thelesford, Nuns of Pinley, the Canons and Vicars of Warwick, and to the Wardens and Priests of Stratford; dying the Day after.

He

He marry'd first Margaret, Daughter to John Breckmeck, Treasurer to King Hen. 6. by whom he had Issue, Edmund, Henry, and Humphry; and Rose wedded first to John, Son of Sir Thomas Poultney; 2dly to John Braconbridge. His 2d Lady was Alice, Daughter of William Hambury, which Alice dy'd 10. H. 7. and was bury'd on the lest Side of her said Husband, as in her Life-time she desir'd: She had by him, William, Edward, and Mary, afterwards Wise of John Densell.

Edmund Lucy, Esq. (eldest Son and Heir of Sir William, succeeded in the Estate at Cherlecot, aged 28; and in 2 H. 7. was a Commander in the King's Army at the Battel of Stoke. And in April 7 H. 7. retain'd, by Indenture, to serve the faid King in his Wars for one Year, with two Men at Arms, having with him his Custrell (k) and his Page, and three Demi-lances, 30 Archers on Foot, and 6 Bills of good and able Persons; taking for himself, and Men at Arms, 18 d. per Diem, for his Demi-lances, 9 d. and Archers and Bills 6 d. per Diem. This being the Time that King Henry took his Voyage into France, and besieg'd Bulloin. In 10 H. 7. (20 Sept.) he had Summons among divers Persons of Quality, to attend the King, ready fitted, to be made a Knight of the Bath at the creating the King's Son Duke of Tork: But it seems he did not appear; for in April following, his Testament bears Date, wherein he is stil'd Esquire; and, among other Matters relating to his Funeral, &c. willed his Burial to be in the Monastery of Thelesford, near his Mother. He had by Jane his Wife, Daughter of Richard Ludlow, (and afterwards Wife of Richard Hungerford) 2 Sons, Thomas and Edmund; and a Daughter, Anne marry'd to --- Leigh.

Thomas,

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Thomas, eldest Son and Heir, succeeded at Cherlecote, and was one of the Sewers to King Henry the 8th in the 1st Year of his Reign; at which Time he obtain'd Letters Patent, bearing Date Sept. 21, for the Custody of all the Lands belonging to George Catesby, (of Ashby-Legers, in Com. Northamp.) Esq, then deceas'd, to hold, during the Minority of William Catefby, his Son and Heir. He was a Knight 6 H. S. and in 16 H. S. Sheriff of Warwick and Leicester shires. He took to Wife Elizabeth, Widow of the said George Catesby, Daughter to Sir Richard Empson of Easton-Neston, in Northamptonshire; and, by his Testament, ult. Julii 17 H. 8. bequeath'd his Body to be bury'd in the Grey-Figars at London; appointing, among other exequial Matters, a grave Stone, &c. with the Portraiture of himself, his Lady, and Children, and his Arms at the four Corners; and dying the same Year, (3 Sept. 1525) was bury'd before the Altars in the said Grey-Fryers, now call'd Christ Church, near Smithsteld. He left 3 Sons and 2 Daughters; Anne, wedded to Thomas Herbert; Radegund, marry'd to ---- Betts; and Barbara, to Richard Tracy of Stanway, in Com. Gloucest. Esqs, of his Sons, William, the Eldest, had the Estate at Cherlecot; to Thomas, 2d Son, he gave the Manor of Cleybrook, in Com. Leicest. and to the Heirs Males of his Body, with Remainder to Edinund his youngest Son, to whom he bequeath'd the Manors of Beckering and Sharpenho in Seginho, and Richmont in Bedfordshire, with Remainder to Thomas aforesaid, for want of Issue-Male of the faid Edmund.

William Lucy (eldest Son and Heir of the said Sir Thomas) marry'd Anne, Daughter of Richard Farmer, Esq. and dy'd 5 Ed. 6. leaving Issue Thomas, his Son and Heir, Richard, William, Timothy, and Edward; and these Daughters; Alice

Alice marry'd to William Fuller, Mary to Christopher Hales, Jane to George, Son of Sir Robert

Verney, Kt. Martha and Foyce.

Thomas (eldest Son and Heir of the said William) succeeded at Charlecot, and, in I Eliz. rebuilt the Manor-House of Brick, as it now stands. 7 Eliz. he receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood; and in 13 Eliz. was elected Knight of the Shire for the County of Warwick, and likewise in the Parliament held in the 27th of that Queen. (1) When he dy'd I don't find; but he surviv'd his Lady, and erected a fair Tomb on the South Side of the Chancel, at Cherlecot, on which is the Effigies of a Knight in Armour, with his Lady by him, in proftrate Postures; their Hands conjoin'd in Prayer, their Heads on a Pillow; and at their Feet his and her Crest. On the exteriour Side, in the two Columns, are the Effigies of his Son in Armour, and a Daughter kneeling on Cushions, in praying Postures; and, over all, in a Table fix'd against the Wall between two Pillars, adorn'd with Arms, and a quarter'd Atchivement, is this Inscription:

Joyce Lucy, Wife of Sir Thomas Lucy of Cherlecote, in the County of Warwick, Kt. Daughter and Heir of Thomas Acton, in the County of Worcester, Esq; who departed out of this wretched World to her heavenly Kingdom, the 10th Day of February, in the Tear of our Lord God, 1595; and of her Age Ix and three: All the Time of her Life, a true and faithful Servant of her good God, never detected of any Crime or Vice; in Religion most sound;

found; in her Love to her Husband, most faithful and true; in Friendship most constant; to what in Trust was committed to her, most Secret; in Wisdom, excelling; in governing her House, and bringing up of Youth in the Fear of God, that did converse with her, most rare and singular, a great Maintainer of Hospitality; greatly esteemed of her Betters; mislik'd of none, unless of the Envious. When all is spoken that can be said, a Woman so furnish'd and garnish'd with Vertue, as not to be better'd, and hardly to be equall'd by any. As she liv'd most Virtuously, so she dy'd most Godly. Set down by him that hest did know what hath been written to be true.

#### Thomas Lucy.

The said Sir Thomas left Issue a Daughter, Anne, wedded to Sir Edward Asson of Tixhall, in Com.

Staff. Kt. and a Son of his own Name.

Thomas Lucy, who receiv'd the Honour of Knighthood in the Life-time of his Father; and after marrying 2 Wives, dy'd 1 Jac. 1. A.D. 1603, and lies bury'd in a Chapel on the North Side the Chancel of the Church of Cherlecote, under a sumptuous Monument. (erected by Dame Conflance, his Lady, who surviv'd him) but without any Inscription: (n) The Effigies of a Knight in Armour lying on his Back under a Canopy, his Hands conjoin'd, his Head on a Cushion, and his Crest at his Feet; and, between two Enarchings, is a Pilaster exhibiting a Final of the Figure of Time, the whole supported by two Pillars, with the Atchievement of the Family, and Lucy impaling King smill, &c. On the Basis, the Figures of 14 Children

Children kneeling; two in Armour singly, and the others, two and two in Gruppa; and, adjoining to the same, (on a protuberant Stone) is the Figure of his last Wife, (Constance, Daughter and Heir of Sir Richard Kingsmill,) kneeling on a Cushion at Prayer.

This Sir Thomas, by Dorothy his first Wife, I aughter of Nicholas Arnold, Esq, had one Son, Thomas, who dy'd young, and a Daughter, Joyce, marry'd to Sir William Cook; and, by the Lady

Constance, before-mention'd, 6 Sons.

Thomas the eldest was knighted; and succeeding at Cherlecote, had the Honour of being elected Knight of the Shire (o) for the County of Warwick, in fix several Parliaments, from the 18th of King James the 1st, to the Time of his Death, the 8th of Dec. 1640. His Character and Virtues is fet forth in a Latin Inscription, (on a noble and curious Monument (p) erected to his Memomory at Cherlecote; the Effigies of him and his Lady lying at full Length under a Canopy, supported by four Pillars; at their Feet, the Figure of a Gentleman riding a manag'd Horse; and, at their Head, a Study of Books) importing, that he was the Ornament and Delight of his Country; glorying more in Vertue than the Blood of his Ancestors; wherein he was greater, and more illustrious. How much his Country lov'd him, and he his Country, the Assemblies in Parliament demonstrated; and, as no one better minded, so none study'd less their domestick Affairs. He was a most indulgent Husband to his Wife and Children, and a kind Master to his Scrvants. His Tables were open to the Learned;

nor were his Gates fast to the Poor. He gave, Yearly, Cartloads of Food to divers Parishes, and daily busy'd himself in some Work, that it might not be said he did Ill in doing Nothing. The manag'd Horse was his chief Exercise; and that (by a Bruise in his Bowels,) occasion d his Death, in the 56th Year of his Age. Alice, his Lady, Daughter and Heir of Thomas Spencer of Claverdon, Esq., surviving, who brought him several Sons, from whom the Family now residing at Cherlecote, is descended.

Richard, his Brother, (2d Son of Sir Thomas Lucy, and the Lady Constance) was knighted at

Lucy, and the Lady Constance) was knighted at Wbiteball 8 Jan. A.D. 1617, and advanced to the Dignity of a Baronet on the 11th of March sollowing being seated at Broxburn in Hertfordshires in Right of his Wise, who was Elizabeth, Daniel ter and Co-heir of Sir Henry Cock, of the said Piace, Kt. (q) and Widow of Robert West, Hsq. Son and Heir of Thomas Lord De la Warr, and likewise of Sir Robert Oxenbridge: She dying A.D. 1645, Sir Richard Lucy marry d, 2dly, Rebecçah, Daughter and Co-heir of Thomas Chapman of London; and was succeeded in his Estate and Title of Baronet by his Son and Heir.

Sir Kingsmill Lucy of Facomb, in Com. Southamp. who afterwards purchas'd a Seat and Estate at Netley, in the same County, and for the most Part resided there; but departed this Life at Facombe, in which Church he had Sepulture. He marry'd the Lady Theophila, 2d Daughter of George Earl of Berkeley, and left Issue one Son, the present Sir Perkeley Lucy, and 2 Daughters; Theophila marry'd to Sir William Ingoldsby, Bart.

and Mary, who dy'd unmarry'd.
